65-Year Olds **Urged To Apply** For SS Benefits

Eastland County residents 65 or over who have not yet applied for social security benefits were advised this week to file a claim now even if they are not planning to retire right away.

R. R. Tuley, Jr., district manager of social security in Abilene, explained that it is to the benefit of an applicant to file when reaching age 65 to protect his social security

"A sizeable number of county people in our district who applied late last year found that they had lost some benefits by not applying earlier," he said. "We have found that the best way for a person to protect his social security benefit rights is to file his claim at 65 whether or not he ntends to go on working.
