Tuesday, January 31st, 1956 is the deadline for paying your 1955 City Taxes without penalty. The collections are really lagging. Only about 75% of the roll for 1955 has been paid to January 24th.

The total of the roll for 1955 is \$61,283.04 and we have collected \$46,531.84, leaving a balance of \$14,751.20 unpaid to date.

There is \$21,935.67 of delinquent taxes due the City, most of which is for the last 5 years, amounting to \$19,-275.89.

The City of Eastland certainly needs this money to do some of the things that would go a long ways to improve the services that are so badly needed to make Eastland a better place to live in.

Remember you have only a few more days to pay your City taxes, without penalty. After January 31st, there will be penalty and interest on all unpaid taxes.


