last year. Cover cropping is the using of close growing or high residue producing crops for erosion control, improving rate of moisture intake, improving fertility, and/or improving plant-soil-moisture-air relationships within the soil.

Another cropland practice closely related to cover cropping is crop residue utilization. This is the management of crop residues or other vegetative material so as to leave a protective cover on the surface of the soil during a critical period of the year. Last year 21,936 acres of this practice was applied on the land.

Teracing was another popular conservation practice last year. This is the building of channels with supporting ridges across slope at various intervals to intercept runoff. Terraces are built of proper cross section to carry excess water and permit tillage operations with farm equipment and 134 miles of terraces were constructed last year protecting 2,500 to 3,000 acres of cropland.

Diversion terraces are large terraces constructed primarily above cropland to intercept outside water and prevent damage to lower areas. They are designed to carry runoff in excess of what could be carried by standard field terraces, and are also used for such other purposes as to divert water in or out of farm ponds. Thirty-five miles of diversions were built last year.

(Continued From Page One) this state tax exemptions, he added.

Last year the American Farm Bureau Federation recommended to Congress and the President that the federal tax on farm-used gasoline be abolished. In his January 9 message on agriculture, President Eisenhower urged Congress to pass legislation to relieve the farmer of the federal tax on purchases of gasoline used on the farm.

"The inclusion of this recommendation can be credited one hundred per cent to Farm Bureau's action on the matter," County President Campbell said.

The gas tax exemption is expected to be one of the first issues to be considered by Congress. The permanent federal tax rate for gasoline is 1 1/2 cents per gallon. The temporary rate is 2 cents a gallon, but this temporary rate expires March 31 of this year.

This means that Congress will not wish to see the temporary rate expire, Campbell said, and it is expected that a tax bill covering the federal gasoline tax will have to move through both Houses and be approved by the President before March 31.

The federal highway program is closely related to the use of gasoline tax revenues. It is generally anticipated that an effort will be made in 1956 to increase the federal tax to 3 cents a gallon to pay for the proposed increase in federal expenditures in highways.


President Campbell listed these reasons why Farm Bureau is attempting to secure an exemption on the tax on gasoline used on farms:

1. The tax on non-highway-used gasoline is inequitable and discriminatory.
2. The government does not tax power used by industry in the form of coal, oil, natural gas, electricity, etc. but at present, taxes power when used on the farm in the form of gasoline.

The total consumption of gasoline in tractors and other farm machinery is estimated by USDA at 3 billion gallons per year. This means that at the present, farmers are paying a tax of .60,000,000 a year on gasoline used for farm production. If the tax is increased to 3 cents a gallon, the amount of this tax will go to \$90,000,000 a year.

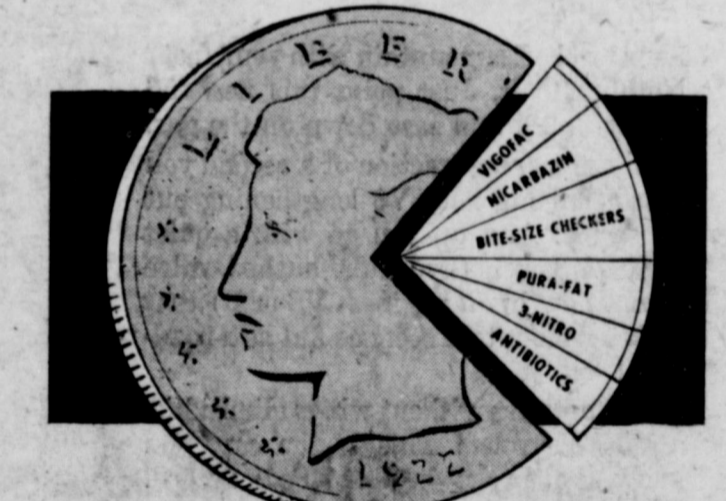

One of the most outstanding things about the Gorman game was the team spirit and cooperation shown by the Mavericks. ### The Rev. Richard R. Smith III Speaker At South Ward P-TA

When the South Ward P-TA met Tuesday afternoon at the school, the speaker was the Rev. Richard R. Smith III, pastor of First Methodist Church. His subject was "Meeting the Spiritual Needs of Our Children."

The Rev. Mr. Smith pointed out that the home, the school and the church are the three institutions vital in the life of every child by illustrating with three pencils (representing the three institutions) holding up a cardboard. When he would remove one pencil it was extremely difficult to

balance the cardboard with the two left.

These three institutions working together prepare the child for problems; the school teaches and applies but the home and the church must do the most important work in the spiritual spheres, he said, because church and state are separated.

As the church has the children only about 20 to 30 minutes a week in actual Sunday School teaching time, the child must have much additional spiritual instruction at home and also the home

must carry even a larger portion of spiritual training, instruction and practice when there is absenteeism in Sunday School. The church can't teach a child if he is not there and, incidentally, at present, there is an attendance campaign among all Protestant churches, the speaker added.

He emphasized the need of the family being together, talking and studying together — doing things together as a family at least one night a week — daily prayer and of praying together, quoting "Families that pray together usually stay together."

The fifth grade children were presented and sang two numbers.
