Schwartz Now Full Colonel In US Army

Lieut. Col. Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, whose sister is the wife of Mrs. Henry Pullman's brother - Louis Engelberg of Fort Worth - has been advised of his promotion to full colonel in the U.S. Army.

Colonel Schwartz was informed of his advancement in a telephone call from Governor Allan Shivers, who received news of the promotion from Major General Lewis B. Hershey, national Selective Service director.

Governor Shivers and Brigadier General Paul L. Wakefield, former state Selective Service director, pinned Colonel Schwartz's new insignia on his blouse at the governor's office.

Colonel Schwartz has been state Selective Service director since the past October, when he was appointed by President Eisenhower to succeed General Wakefield, who resigned.

At that time, Colonel Schwartz had been deputy state director since 1948, when he was appointed to that office by Major General Kerlie L. Berry, first state director under present law.

Colonel Schwartz is a veteran official of the Western Union Telegraph Company, the Army Signal Corps, and Selective Service, having served for years in all three.

Cost Per Patient Day At Eastland Hospital Well Below Average

The low cost per patient day in the Eastland Memorial Hospital is considered something to be proud of.

According to figures from the American Hospital Association, the average hospital in 1954 spent \$22.78 per patient per day, but billed each patient \$21.07 per day. The difference was made up by charity contributions and government aid.

Compared to the national average in 1954, Eastland Memorial Hospital in November, 1955, had a charge to its patients of \$19.00 per patient per day. That is, \$3.78 per patient per day below the national average.

Milk Drive of CROP Results Are Outlined

The Rev. Richard R. Smith, who suggested the successful CROP drive for milk here Halloween — a campaign conducted by the "Y" — has learned of the success of the movement in a letter from Director John Gillies of Austin. He said:
"A shipment of 22,020 pounds of powdered whole milk (a half carload) left New York Jan. 5 aboard the SS American Scientist, destined for Korean hospitals, where whole milk is desperately needed for advanced cases of tuberculosis. The shipment cost \$7,486.80 (34c a pound) and was purchased by Texas CROP from funds made available in the Halloween project."
"A total of \$27,070.60 has been forwarded by our office in church world service for distribution of government donated surplus non-fat milk overseas. This money will distribute 5,000,000 pounds — enough powdered milk to fill 120 freight cars. Most important: At least 81,000 children will receive two cups of milk each day throughout this year of 1956."

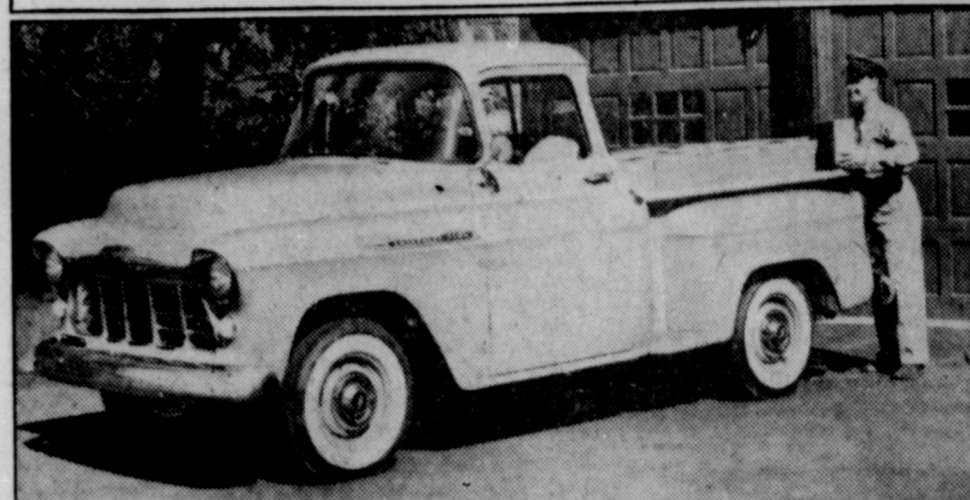

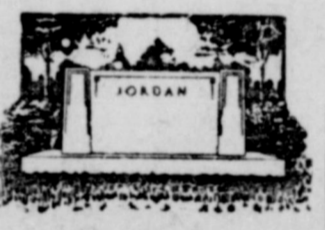

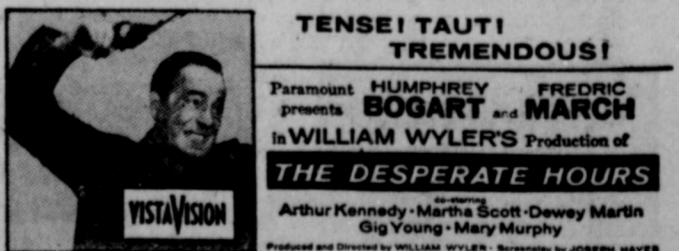

Mr. Siebert then introduced the chief speaker of the evening, George Sauer, athletic director of Baylor University, an All-American, a member of football's Hall of Fame, and one of the highest winners of Southwest Conference football games over the past six years.

Mr. Sauer said when he was driving into Eastland he estimated that he was approaching a city of some 10,000 people, and after hearing the accomplishments of the Quarterback Club and viewing the turn-out for the banquet and the perfection of it all, he was amazed that so much could be done by a city of 4,000.

Mr. Sauer said we were lucky to be living in a country run by men who learned the spirit of competition early in life and built it up to a fine degree. "Football," he said, "teaches many things that come — the spirit of competition, clean play, hard drive, and a knowledge of the rules of what's right and what's wrong."

Mr. Sauer said a person could not buy what it took to win, that it had to come from within; that there was no short cut to success, but it depended upon effort. "I want to admonish you," said the speaker, "that it is not enough to put out 100 per cent of your best to win. You can depend upon your opponent to be doing that much. The man who wins the victory is the man who puts out 105 per cent."
