There was a spirited contest between coin collector's around town to see who had the oldest United States money. Everytime we thought we had found the oldest coin, someone else brought in a still older one.

We saw some coins that we didn't even know existed. Lots of them are worth quite a bit of t then you want to know the oldest, so here is a

Carl Johnson is king of the old money collectors. Carl brought in a 1799 silver dollar that ranks six years older than any other brought in. In fact, the dollar lacked only money came into existence. 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

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


Mrs. Hernandez suffered fractured neck; the youth received a fractured collarbone and Mrs. Ayala is recuperating from fractured ribs.



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
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
