New Feedlot Will Be Built At Littlefield

Littlefield Chamber of Commerce & Agriculture and Littlefield Feeders, Inc., proudly announces the location of a 30,000 head cattle feed lot to be located in the Littlefield area.

Construction will start immediately on a 354 acre tract. Projected time for the 1st cattle to be on feed in 9 months.

They will employ 24 to 28 people with an annual payroll in excess of \$200,000.00.

The actual feed pens will cover approximately 100 acres. They will operate their own feed mill and do custom feeding for single owner and joint owner feeders. They will have the latest automatic equipment for feeding cattle. They also will encourage feeder clubs where individuals may belong to a small partnership or corporation for the purpose of feeding cattle.

They will use some 120 million pounds of grain annually, which our local area should be able to supply.

Dr. Pummill Elected To AAFP

Charles L. Pummill, M.D., from the Muleshoe area has been elected to active membership in the American Academy of Family Physicians, a national association of more than 34,000 family doctors. The Academy formerly was called the American Academy of General Practice.

As a member of AAFP, Dr. Pummill will be required to complete 150 hours of continuing medical study every three years. The program, unique among national medical associations, is designed to help member physicians keep abreast of the latest scientific developments in medicine.

Founded in 1947, the AAFP is the country's second largest national medical association. It was instrumental in the establishment of a new primary specialty in family practice in 1969. The Academy's continuing education program is the foundation of eligibility for family doctors now in practice who apply for certification in the new specialty.

The Littlefield Feeders, Inc., will ship finished cattle all over the U.S., but mainly to the North, East and South.

Cattle normally go to the feed lot at 550 to 700 pounds and finish out between 1,050 and 1,100 pounds.

Mules Lose Final Game Of Season

Friday night the Muleshoe Mules played a fine defensive game, but could muster only 165 yards total offense as they succumbed to Perryton, 18-0 in a game played here.

In the first quarter, both teams showed a fine defensive ability as neither could move

the ball. Then a 17 yard Muleshoe punt gave Perryton the ball on the Mules 28 yard line. It took four plays for the Rangers to score with Halfback Dave Palmer scoring from the 11 yard line. The PAT failed.

In the second quarter the Mules proved that they hadn't given up by any means when Ricky Smallwood and Hector Posados of the Mules smashed the Perryton quarterback Jim Dear causing him to fumble which was recovered by the Mules. This action occurred after Perryton had driven to the Mules four yard line. The Mules, in possession of the ball, were content to run out the clock leaving Perryton with a 6-0 lead at halftime.

In the third quarter, the Mules could still go little offensively, but the Rangers offense was also stalled. With the Mules in possession at their own seven yard line, disaster struck. An attempted pass by Mules Quarterback Don Long was batted into the air and then intercepted by Ranger linebacker,

Jim Dear as he avoided a couple of Mules in taking the ball in for the touchdown. The try for two failed.

He will discuss the energy crisis as it affects agricultural producers.

Entertaining at the Recognition and Awards Program on Tuesday evening, December 4, will be singing star Jeannie C. Riley. She will be accompanied by a five-piece Country-Western band, The Homesteaders. Miss Riley, who hails from Anson, was skyrocketed to

fame several years ago by her hit recording, "Harper Valley P.T.A."

The convention gets under way with registration beginning at 2 p.m., Sunday, December 2. Highlights will include a Vesper Service and Young People's Discussion Meet and Talent Find on Sunday evening; general session and special conferences Monday, December 3, with the Queen Contest finals that evening; Voting Delegates' Breakfast and more special conferences Tuesday morning, December 4; and the business session beginning Tuesday afternoon and continuing through Wednesday, December 5.

Shortage Of Cotton Gin Workers Noted

The Muleshoe Manager of the Texas Employment Commission, Lonnie D. Merriott, reports that a shortage of cotton gin workers has developed over the area. Also, trailer hands are in short supply. TEC offices all over the area are experiencing shortages of workers. There are several reasons for the labor shortage with the principal reason being the low unemployment rate in the area. Right now the unemployment rate in this area is 3.4 percent of the labor force, which is the lowest in years.

The Texas Employment Commission has a program whereby workers can be brought in from other areas of the state when the local supply of labor is exhausted. This is being done now by all area TEC offices, but the labor shortage is statewide resulting in a limited a-

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SPAG To Conduct Community Workshop

The South Plains Association of Governments will be conducting a Community Development Workshop for the citizens in the South Plains Region on Tuesday, November 20, starting at 8:59 a.m. at the South Plains Electric Co-Op, 110 North Amarillo Highway, Lubbock, Texas.

This workshop will be providing information on State and Federal Programs that are now available to cities and counties on the South Plains. The latest revision of the State law as it pertains to the city and county will also be discussed.

Several cities in the South Plains have indicated an interest in building local airports or improving the ones they now use. The Federal Aviation Administration and the Texas Aeronautics Commission will discuss their loan and grant programs. They will be describing who is eligible to apply and how and where to apply for assistance on local airports in rural communities.

Representatives from the Department of Housing and Urban Development will discuss the National Flood Insurance Program. This is an opportunity for cities to receive a complete study of their city. This program makes flood insurance, previously unavailable from private insurers, available to the residents of eligible communities. It is the only possible way to obtain this type of insurance.

The Texas Industrial Commission representative will discuss the various services that are available from their offices. Any community that is attempting to attract industry will benefit from hearing this presentation. The Commission will be describing their aids, programs and computer assistance for industrial development.

During the last session of the legislature, several bills were passed and are now law that pertain to the cities. A summary of this relevant legislation will be presented.

The 100 point ducks are canvasbacks and redheads in all except several coastal counties where there is no season on these birds. Seventy point ducks include mallard hens, wood ducks and hooded mergansers. The ducks worth 10 points are blue-winged and cinnamon teal, widgeons, scalups (bluebills) and mergansers except hooded. Other legal birds are worth 20 points.
The first part of the season ends November 25. The second part of the split begins December 8 and runs through January 20, 1974.
