## Need For Oil Due To Continue Increasing

CHICAGO (AP)—It will soon be necessary to discover twice as much new oil each year as is now produced, a Texas editor said Wednesday.

Warren Baker, editor of World Oil of Houston, told an industry convention, "an average of 4 billion barrels of new oil will have to be discovered each year to satisfy enlarging producing requirements."

He addressed the American Petroleum Institute.

Despite a rising need, Baker said, the industry has been able

to find "more than enough oil to satisfy requirements."

Production now is about 2 1-3 billion barrels a year. If production expands at the same rate of the last several years future discovery requirements will reach 4 2-3 billion barrels by 1960, he said.

The demands present new problems, Baker said.

Nearly 46,000 wells were drilled in 1951 and in 1952. Some 48,000 are expected this year, he said.

While the number of well drillings has increased, he said, so has

the number of dry holes. In 1952 there were 17,759 dry holes.

However, the postwar average is about one-third of all drilling operations, Baker said.

The average cost of drilling and completing one well for four companies in 1948 was \$80,000, Baker said, but in 1952 it was \$113,000.

John Suman, vice president of Standard Oil Co. (NJ) told the industry leaders crude oil is not being imported to this country in "floods" or "torrents." Actually, he said, since 1950 imports have averaged around 10 per cent of domestic crude production.

Suman said if crude imports rise "the U. S. producer should find a ready market for all liquid hydrocarbons we produce."

"Despite present worries, it's my belief the U.S. oil industry is fundamentally healthy," he said.

### Income Tax Forms Now Being Printed

One of the government's biggest annual printing jobs is nearing completion and the product is due to start flowing to taxpayers soon.

Some 70,500,000 bundles of income tax report forms are being printed and will be distributed to individual taxpayers and corporations between now and Jan. 1.

Ben Hawkins, local collection officer for the Bureau of Internal Revenue, says residents of the Big Spring section probably will be receiving tax forms by Dec. 15 and everyone who paid an income tax last year is due to have new forms by the end of December.

The tax forms, all kinds, first will be shipped from Washington, where they're being printed, to Kansas City. It will take about 140 railroad cars — two full trains — to haul the 3,400 tons of tax blanks.

In Kansas City, the forms will be addressed to individuals and business concerns, then sent to postmasters throughout the country for distribution.

The printing of forms started several weeks ago. The tax blanks have been rolling off the presses at the rate of 30,000 an hour, and that phase of the tax collection job is nearly complete.

Addressing—the second big step—also will be done by machine, but the third big operation—distribution — will call for some foot-

work. Postmen will deliver the blanks to everyone who filed a tax return last year, like regular mail.

Several changes have been made in the various types of tax forms this year, the BIR has announced.

Form 1040, for persons earning more than \$5,000 per year, will be "top folded" rather than at the side this year. The change is supposed to aid auditors, etc., who had trouble getting the side fold forms in their typewriters.

Form 1120, for corporation income taxes, is being reduced in size. The new models are 14 inches in length, rather than 16, so they'll fit in standard filing cabinets.

Ink has been changed on the partnership and declaration of estimated tax forms. The green color formerly used didn't photostat very well, so brown and black inks are being used. Paper on which the corporation form is printed has been changed from blue to white, for the same reason.

Also on the corporation forms, there'll be no lines to divide the dollar and cent columns. This change also was made to accommodate accountants who complained that the lines fouled them up when long columns of figures had to be typed on the returns.

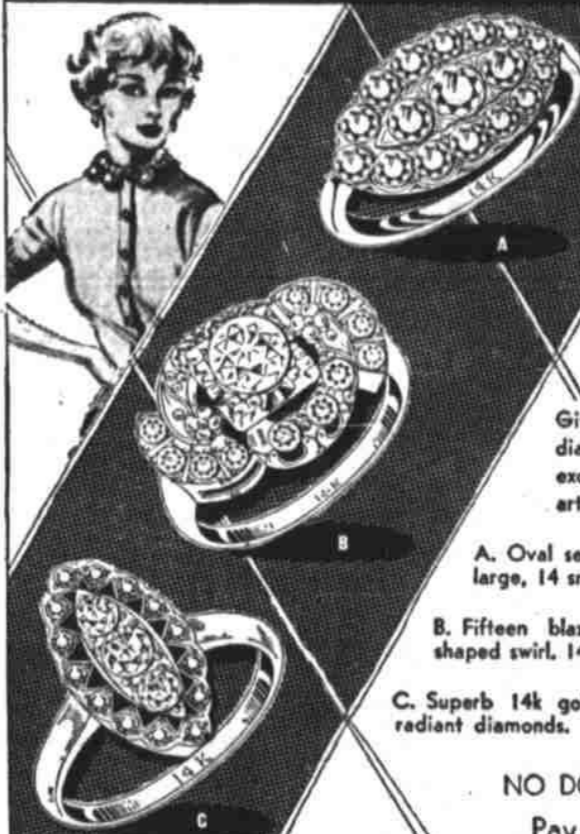

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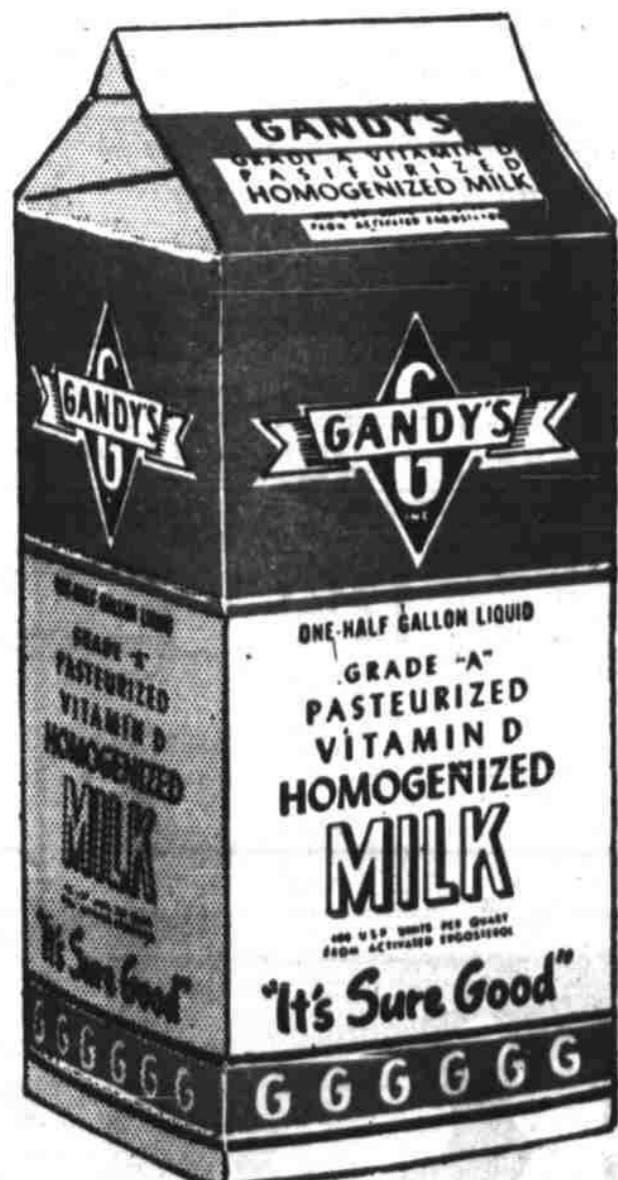

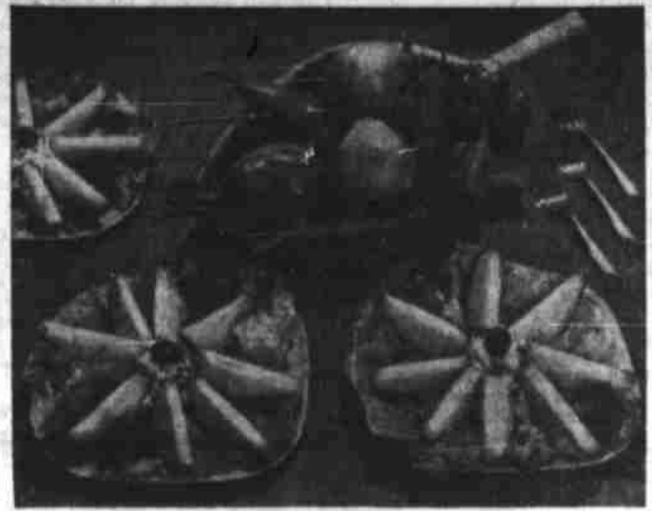

## Mincemeat Can Be Made From Venison

Texas A&M Foods and Nutrition specialists recommend Venison Mincemeat as a tasty dish for this week. Here's how you do it.

- VENISON MINCEMEAT**  
 Ingredients:  
 2 pounds cooked venison, chopped in food grinder  
 4 pounds chopped apple  
 2 cups raisins  
 4 cups either brown or white sugar  
 ¼ pound chopped suet or butter  
 ¼ teaspoon cloves  
 1 teaspoon mace  
 ¼ teaspoon nutmeg  
 2 teaspoons salt  
 1½ teaspoons cinnamon

**Method:**  
 Add cider to cover mixture. If cider is not available, use fruit juices or water with ¼ cup vinegar. Sweet fruit juices reduce the amount of sugar required. Cook very slowly until the fruits are tender (about 1 hour).

## Diabetics Can Have Good Things To Eat

Nov. 15 heralds National Diabetes Week, one "week" that usually goes by without much fanfare. But diabetics have to eat too and this week's food feature is devoted to those people in Big Spring who have a diabetic condition.

Being a diabetic doesn't mean at all that a person must give up good things to eat or lead an abnormal life. True, too much sugar must be avoided, the starch intake must be limited and most diabetics must take insulin to aid their condition; but one housewife, Mrs. N. R. Smith, who has to prepare meals for a diabetic husband, has little trouble keeping her working husband well fed and active. A delicious-sounding recipe that she uses is a banana nut bread. Note that it calls for very little sugar and nutty brown or gluten flour.

**BANANA NUT BREAD**  
 Ingredients:  
 2 cups sifted nutty brown or gluten flour  
 2 teaspoons baking powder  
 ¼ teaspoon soda  
 ¼ teaspoon salt  
 ¼ cup sugar  
 1 cup chopped nuts  
 1 egg, beaten  
 1 cup salad oil  
 1 cup mashed bananas  
 1 tablespoon lemon juice

**Method:**  
 Sift together the dry ingredients. Add ¼ cup of the nuts. Combine the remaining ingredients and add to the dry ingredients. Stir until the flour is moistened. Pour into a greased 8 x 5-inch loaf pan. Sprinkle the remaining nuts over the top of the loaf. Bake in a moderate oven (350°) for 1 hour.

## Helpful Hints

If you want to hasten the setting of flavored gelatin, substitute crushed ice for the cold water called for in the directions. For a tasty beef gravy try adding crushed ginger snaps. To remove white water spots or rings from hardwood floors or tables, moisten a small piece of soft toweling with spirits of camphor and rub lightly with the grain. To remove telltale onion or garlic odors from cutting boards, wash with baking soda and water.

## Venison Tips

Venison is among the most highly prized wild game. Good cooking is important to appetizing venison dishes. It can be as good as the best meat from the butcher. It should not be necessary to try to conceal the venison flavor. The characteristic flavor seems to be concentrated in the fat and if strong, trimming excess fat will help. Venison is a rather dry meat and is improved by addition of suet, butter or other fat when using dry heat methods as roasting, broiling and frying.

## November Foods

The Department of Agriculture puts beef, potatoes and onions in the top bracket of plentiful foods for fall. Record numbers of grassed cattle will go to market and less expensive beef continues to be plentiful. For the holiday season pecans, almonds, raisins and winter pears are expected to be abundant. And there will be ample supplies of turkeys for Thanksgiving.

Round stainless steel pudding pans come in 2, 2½ and 3 quart sizes. They're handy not only for puddings, but for other baked desserts, macaroni and cheese and scalloped potatoes. And they're handsome enough to bring right to the table.

## Texas Pecan Pie Is Timely Dessert

This will be a season to gladden the hearts of all pecan lovers. Local grocery men are predicting that this favorite Texas nut will be more plentiful and also cheaper this winter.

To take advantage of the pecans, we've gathered some recipes for pies, puddings and cakes that feature the pecan flavor. Mention pecans and the first thing some people think of is pecan pie. Although it is probably one of the richest pies baked, it is not one of the most difficult. Anyone who can boil syrup and beat eggs can make this pie.

**Ingredients:**  
 1½ cups sugar  
 ¼ cup dark corn syrup  
 ¼ cup butter or margarine  
 3 eggs, well beaten  
 1 cup pecans  
 1 unbaked pie shell

**Method:**  
 Combine sugar, corn syrup, and butter or margarine, and bring to a full rolling boil, stirring constantly. Beat eggs and add pecans. Gradually stir in hot syrup. Cool. Pour filling into unbaked pie shell. Bake in moderate oven (375 degrees F.) 40 to 45 minutes, or until filling is firm to touch. Serve plain or with unweetened whipped cream.

## Check Your Cooking Method For Roasts, Steaks, Chops

Roasting, broiling, panbroiling—these are dry heat cookery methods used for roasts, steaks and lamb chops. It's wise to frequently "brush up" on your cooking techniques. And meat expert Reba Staggs, gives you step by step instruction for preparing meat by these methods.

The most important point to remember in meat cookery is using a low temperature, points out Miss Staggs. In roasting that means a 300 degree F. oven for beef, veal, smoked pork and lamb; 350 degree F. for fresh pork. A roast is more juicy and tender, and there is actually more meat to serve when it is cooked at a low rather than a high temperature.

In roasting, place the meat with the fat side up on a rack in an open roasting pan. Do not add liquid. If you have a roast meat thermometer by all means use it to eliminate any guessing as to when the meat is done. Insert it in the largest muscle, but not in fat or on bone. Do not cover the meat. Cook at the recommended low temperature until done as registered by the thermometer or for the minutes per pound recorded on a reliable time-table.

## Lunch Box Idea

An egg and olive spread will make delicious sandwiches for the lunchbox. Mash the hard-cooked eggs and mix with chopped pickles-stuffed olives; now add enough mayonnaise to moisten and salt and pepper to taste. Layer this spread between slices of whole wheat bread. A vacuum bottle of cream of tomato soup makes a good send-along for these sandwiches.

## Merchants Expecting A Big Yule Volume

For every retailer who gloomily predicts that business during the coming Christmas season will drop below year-ago levels, there are six who are confidently aiming at sales increases.

For every merchant who will be satisfied to equal last year's record Christmas sales during the coming months, there are two who will be disappointed with anything less than a 5 to 10 per cent gain in volume.

For every retailer who foresees no noticeable change in business conditions in the next two months compared to last year, there are four who predict that business will be much tougher to get.

And for every store planning to advertise less this Christmas than last, there are three who will advertise more; for every retailer who will start '53 Yule promotions later than last year, there are two who will kick off their advertising earlier than ever before to help set a new all-time high in Christmas advertising by retailers during the coming season.

This cross-section of the psychological frame of mind of retailers as the peak selling season of the year approaches emerged this week from a survey of 87 stores of varying sizes and types in 35 major metropolitan markets, conducted by the Bureau of Advertising of the American Newspaper Publishers Association. It was disclosed today by Edward H. Burgess, director of the Bureau's Retail Department.

The survey, covering mostly department stores, but also including gift shops and furniture, jewelry, men's and women's specialty, hardware, sporting goods, and stationery stores, also revealed: More than 56 per cent of surveyed merchants plan to launch Christmas promotions on or before November 16.

Daily newspapers are the overwhelming and unanimous choice of surveyed retailers as the medium in which they will invest all but small fractions of Christmas advertising budgets.

Over one-quarter of the merchants covered indicated they expect to invest 100 per cent of their Christmas promotional outlays in daily newspapers, 46 per cent plan to place 95 per cent and over in newspapers; 60 per cent will allocate 90 per cent and over to newspapers; and 70 per cent will earmark 85 per cent and over for newspapers.

Results of the survey were disclosed this week to accompany the unveiling of a new four-page folder presentation issued by the Bureau of Advertising and entitled, "Christmas 1953—Will You Meet Or Beat Last Year?" Designed as an aid to retailers in planning Christmas advertising schedules, the folder is being distributed to local merchants by The Herald.

The folder lists some of the factors which point to the biggest Christmas in retailing history, quotes leading retailers about the need for aggressive promotion to realize the record potentials, and features a long list of hot items for Yule promotion. It also suggests six ways for retailers to get maximum results from Christmas promotions and proposes a tested four-step advertising plan.

## Appellate Court Reverses Case in Bomb Convictions

AUSTIN (AP)—The Court of Criminal Appeals reversed Wednesday convictions against two men charged with possession of a bomb, declaring both indictments faulty because they failed to specify the type of bomb.

Prosecution was ordered dismissed against Glenn Roach and James Hill, arrested in Cleburne last December.

A small canvas bag containing various tools and a quantity of nitroglycerine was found in the car in which they were riding, and they were identified as the men who had been running behind a parked car with a small canvas bag near a Cleburne theater.

They were convicted under a 1951 law making it illegal merely to have possession of a bomb.

Appellate Judge W. A. Morrison said Roach's 15 year sentence and Hill's \$10,000 fine had to be reversed and prosecution dismissed because of the faulty indictments.

"The state was required to prove that accused possessed a bomb and that such bomb came within one of the six enumerated categories set forth in the statute, some of which it will be noted are not explosives," Morrison ruled.

## Valley Toll Now 67

MCALEEN (AP)—Two traffic accident deaths Tuesday raised the Lower Rio Grande Valley traffic toll for 1953 to 67. Miguel Gonzalez Sr., 34, of McAllen was killed when he lost control of his car north of Edinburg. Jose de los Santos Cavazos, 7, Brownsville, died of injuries suffered when struck by a car in Brownsville last weekend.

## Gold-Plated Bicycle

LONDON (AP)—A British firm reported today it has made a bicycle plated with 18-carat gold as a birthday present for the son of Jamindar Das Nundy, a wealthy Indian merchant. The super-bike cost \$500.

## Expect Higher Demand For Air Conditioning

NEW YORK (AP)—The air conditioning industry says it expects its sales to go up even if business in other lines slackens off.

The reasoning: As competition gets tougher, more building owners will install air conditioning to hold tenants, more stores will install it or lose customers, more factories will install it to increase productivity.

Home air conditioning has been the glamor girl of the industry in the last two years, but commercial and industrial conditioning may be the next big field.

Sales have risen 50 per cent since 1947, according to George S. Jones Jr., managing director of The Air Conditioning and Refrigeration Institute, which this week is holding an exposition in Cleveland.

The industry has as its goal the air conditioning of a third of the nation's offices and stores by 1958, a third of its factories by 1965.

The increased competition in business and industry which many see ahead will speed the march of commercial and industrial air conditioning, according to Claude Wampler, president of Carrier Corp., which makes all types of air conditioning used in factories, offices, stores and by industry in its production processes.

He argues that stores will have to be air conditioned to hold customers. He contends that as soon as 15 per cent of desirable office space in a community is air conditioned, other owners will be forced to install it or face falling rent levels and loss of tenants.

## 3 Whooping Cranes May Have Raised Refuge Population

CORPUS CHRISTI (AP)—If the three whooping cranes seen near Regina, Sask., last Thursday have arrived at the Aransas Wildlife Refuge near here, the known whooping crane population of the world has increased.

The day after Fred Bard, Canadian ornithologist, saw three south-bound whoopers, Julian Howard, local refuge manager, counted 21 birds, including three young, already here for the winter. Only 21 of the vanishing species were counted all last year.

Another count will be made as soon as weather along the Gulf Coast permits.

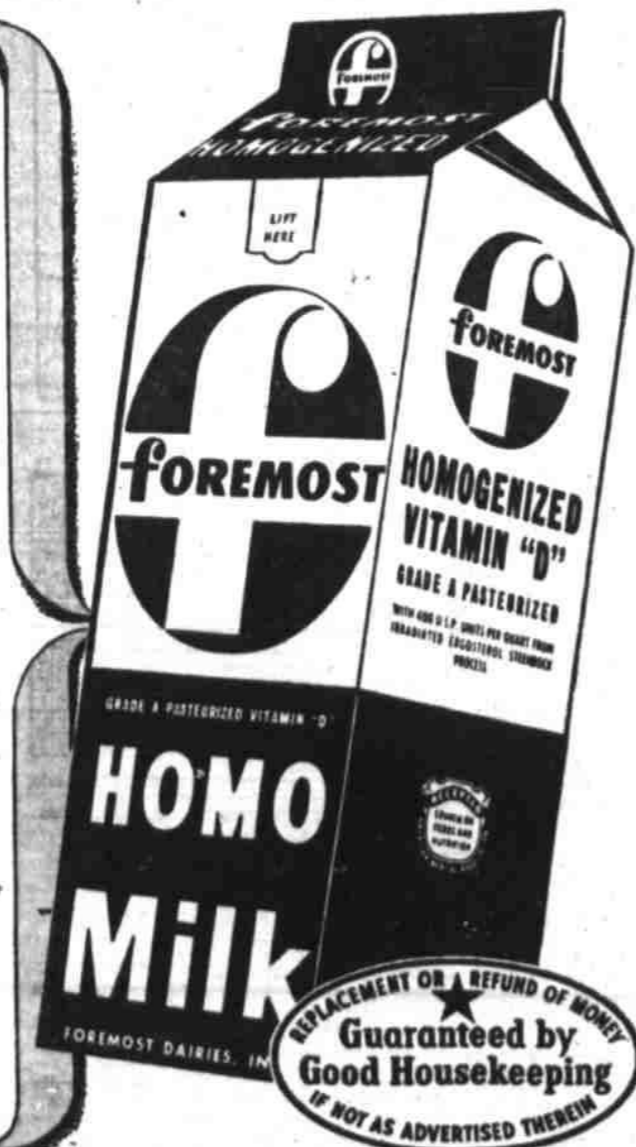
