SPEAKING OF THANKSGIVING AND TEXAS

Thanksgiving is on the way. Now it is said production cost of turkeys in DeWitt county, "the turkey raising center of the world," is being cut to a low figure this year. Producers have fattened their birds "on feed raised on the farm." Splendid records have been made by the growers. One couple raised 293 turkeys from 15 hens at a total feed cost of \$64.54 of which \$13.80 was skimmed milk. For this season buyers are talking opening prices of around 11 cents. Although no price level has been set in the Cuero area opening of the market was scheduled for Monday, Oct. 31. There is an enormous crop of turks. There is a lower purchasing power than in former years but the buyers are ready and the shipments to the larger cities of the republic will be as heavy if not heavier than ever before.

Four years ago Senator Borah and his fellow campaigners promised "two chickens in every pot daily and a garage for every home owner." William Green, president of the American Federation of Labor, reports 9,700,000 idle workers in the United States, which is a slight deduction as 650,000 idlers found jobs or half-jobs in the month of September. Another high authority "on the unemployed" tells it through a magazine that 200,000 youngsters, ranging in age from 16 to 20, are floaters in the highways and byways of the republic. Well, the passing of another year may show a remarkable change for the better. All the American commonwealth lived on coarse pioneer men and women who made the rations, conquered the wilderness, created oases and made civilization what it is today. Here's hoping that there will be a turkey in every Texas pot or roasting pan Thanksgiving morning and that happiness will reign in all the households of Texas. All of which is a reminder that Cuero, the beautiful capital of the county of DeWitt, is the center of the turkey-growing industry of the nation.

Last night Prexy Anderson called us and asked "How did the Bulldogs make out with the A. C. C. freshmen?" "Oh," we said, casually, "we beat 'em by a score of 13 to 0."

The Abilene Christian college freshmen came as near scoring as any team Abilene has sent over this year, getting to the five-yard line in the last minute of play when the Pups were defending the goal line. And a good job of defending they did, too, because when the four downs were over the ball was still on the five-yard line.

It looked almost inhuman for Coach Eck Curtis to send in his second line against the big Abilene freshmen, because they were outweighed so much it looked as though it would be a slaughter. But Eck knew his second string linemen. Though small, they went in fighting. They knew they had to put out everything they had in order to hold their heavier opponents. They knew that they had but about 10 minutes to play and that they could put everything they had into the game and not become exhausted in that time. They had everything to win and nothing to lose, so they went to work. And did they work?

If the first string line could work as hard for an entire game as those Pups did in the last quarter they wouldn't be a team in the district that could score through the line. Though little, they are fighters and they held Abilene like veterans. Their defense against Abilene passes was not as good as their line defense, but that was probably because they were so determined that they would "hold that line."

Next year those Pups will be serious contenders for line positions and even the veterans will have to work hard to retain their positions. The backfield substitutes did just about as well, if not equally as well as the line. We did not know who was calling the signals when Lyon was relieved, but whoever had the assignment did it well, showing that he had a level head. One pass, in particular, looked good. Briley drifted back, dodged a couple of blockers and tossed a pass to Cole that looked almost impossible from every angle. It looked as though Briley could not get the pass down to the right place and when he did Cole made a circus catch, wheeled, dodged one tackler and was stopped on the five-yard line. It was as neatly executed as any play we have seen this year.

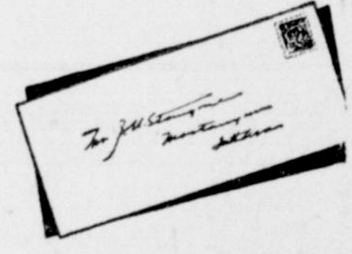

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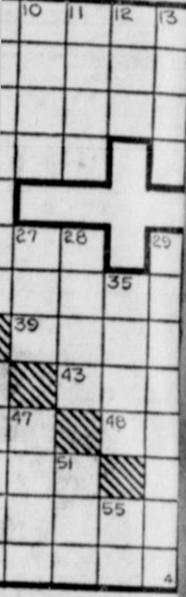
