Members conducting the poll told the United Press today they believed 275 votes could be secured for outright repeal. It was anticipated there would be enough absentees to lower the two-thirds majority requirement of 287 votes which would apply if the full house were present.

NEW FARM PRODUCT MARKET DEMANDED

This is a swift moving age. President Hoover has had his problems and troubles. President-elect Roosevelt is facing as heavy a load as any chief magistrate ever carried. He thinks the war debts foreign nations owe the United States can be used to help "stabilize American agriculture." He thinks new uses should be found for farm products, and, above all, foreign markets preserved and in most cases reestablished. Louis I. Taber is a dyed-in-the-wool republican. He has ever been lined up with republican administrations. He was a never-die Hoover supporter in the late unpleasantness. Now what is his plan? War debts must not be cancelled but used to build trade, rather than trade, rather than to destroy it, by giving debtor nations credit on their debts for a certain per cent of their total purchases of farm products. Moreover he is thoroughly convinced that one million speeches on farm relief in congress are just a repetition of what has gone before; that a million members in the Grange means "a fighting, working addition to rural forces, adding to morale and stabilizing rural life." Speaking for the oldest of existing farm organizations founded 66 years ago this leader of the tillers of the soil has declared that handicaps placed in the way of agriculture by the government must be removed. William Gibbs McAdoo said it better. President Taber has ever upheld the tariff and taxation policies of the republican party. He backed to the limit the party of Harding and Coolidge and Hoover. Now he would trade the war loans made by America to foreign purchases of American farm staples. Perhaps President Louis J. Taber, now and all the time ultra-republican, will tell the farmers of the American world just how this plan will relieve the American taxpayer from the payment of billions representing Liberty bonds. There may be a way out of it somewhere or in some way. President Taber's plan is to pay foreign purchases of American farm staples for their trade and then permit American taxpayers to liquidate in future times the huge bonded war debt of the republic of Washington. It may be the wisest way out but there are millions of patriotic and conscientious Americans "who must be shown."

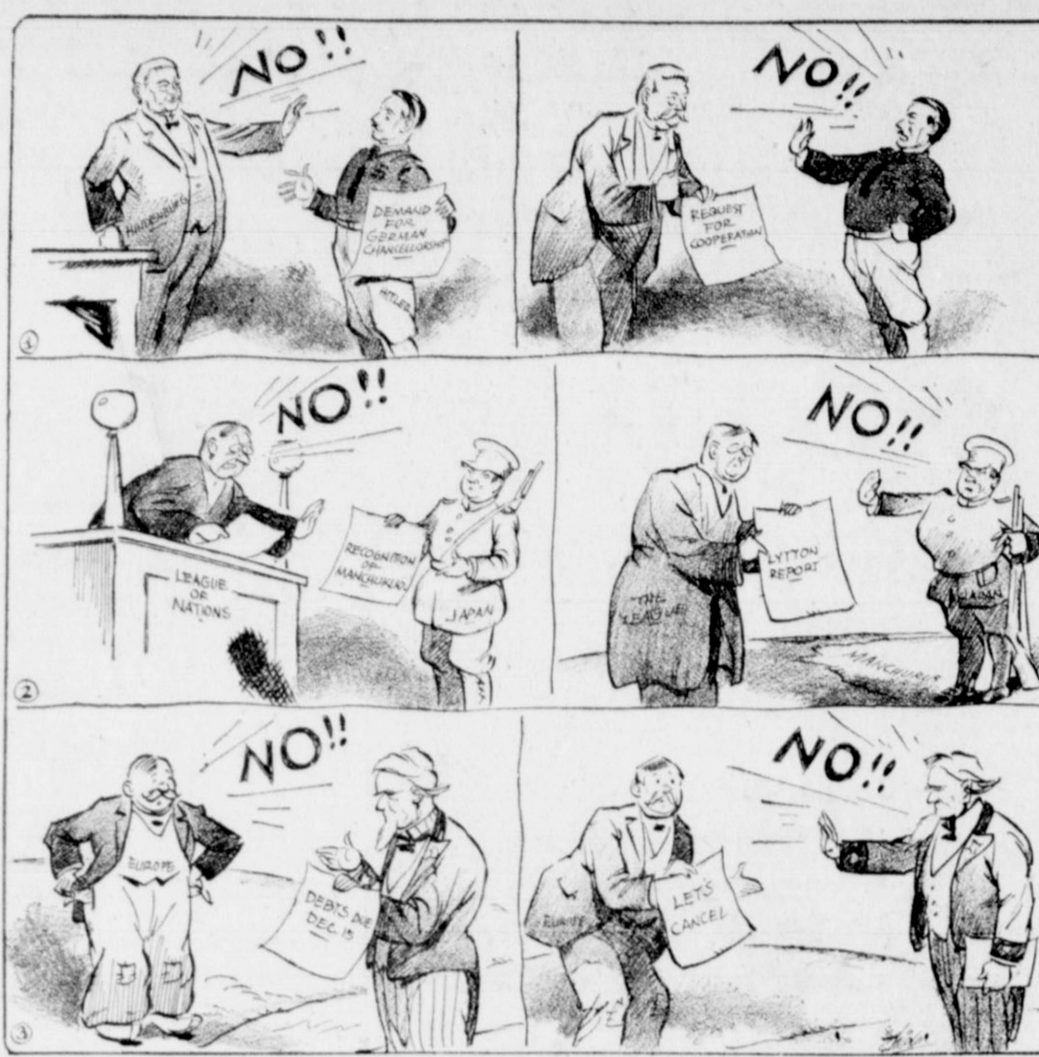
GARNER WILL NOT MAKE CHOICE

There is a wild row coming over the naming of the successor of Speaker John Nance Garner. It is now an established fact that Garner knows "where to find his political hat." All American voters were taught in the campaign that is a dead memory the Texan knew when to speak and when to place the muzzle on his tongue. It was a magnificent demonstration of individual self control. As to the battle over the speakership, Garner will not take a hand in the contest. Place his words in the record: "I will give everybody here all the help I can until next March 4; but when it comes to the speakership, I expect to tell them, 'That's your problem; work it out to suit yourselves;' and I'll bet that I'll be friends with the next speaker." There is a merry political row brewing down on the banks of the Rio Grande. Garner has warned the democrats of his district that if it is a free-for-all voting contest the republican may get away with the plum. A republican from the old Garner district would prove to be a hard knock on the nose for the democratic donkey. National Committeeman Rene B. Creaker is a voter in the 15th district. He is a native Texan; he is a sly fox when it comes to politics; he is the close personal friend of the "Cavalier of the Chapparal." He will push one of his race horses onto the track whenever he sees an opening. There are many republicans in the 15th district. Just watch them perform when the flag falls in the contest to come for the succession. It certainly would be a grim joke at the expense of the Cavalier from his perch in the senate to read of the cavorting of a Rio Grande republican in the proceedings of the house after an unbroken record of 30 years for the donkey and its trainers.

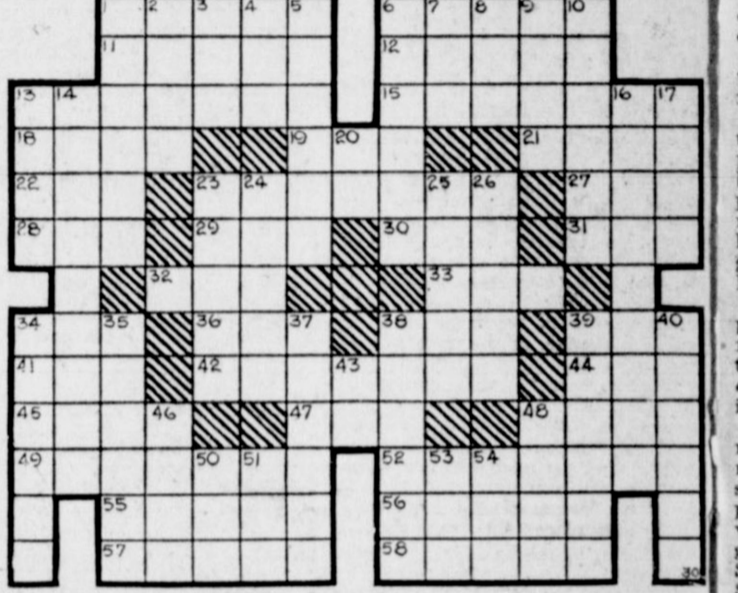

HERE--- AND THERE

The entente cordiale between nations is of no more importance than that same good will between counties and county affiliations, and being stressed through the King of interests of Eastland and Eastland county in many ways and along divergent lines.

In the canning operations carried by the Eastland Chamber of Commerce this summer, a strong personal foundation of friendship was established and will benefit both the rural communities and city.

Not only was the thought of feeding the living behind all their work, but close upon this activity comes the feeling of showing respect for the dead.

The United States government it was learned would furnish free marble headstones for the unmarked graves of soldiers, sailors, marines, or war nurses, for those who have been honorably discharged from any war America ever engaged.

In 1929 this privilege was extended by congress to include Confederate soldiers.

This announcement, carried in the Eastland press, was accompanied by the offer of the Chamber of Commerce to forward applications to Washington, with the result that 40 of these headstones have been placed over unmarked graves through the efforts of Dr. H. B. Tanner, secretary of C. of C.

All expenses of freight were paid by the government. Beautiful ceremonies of the unveiling of the monuments were held and drew large gatherings, especially in the rural communities.

The pre-service included a biographical sketch, with the announcement, of day and place of service. On unveiling day, an impressive formal procedure opened with flag placement, at head of grave, assembly bugle call by Boy Scout squad, who accompanied Secretary Tanner at all ceremonies, and prayer by presiding pastor.

A sketch of the deceased was read by a citizen, and the headstone was formally presented to the family by the secretary in charge, on behalf of the war department.

Firing of salute, by the American Legion, and " taps " by Boy Scouts, have concluded these services, which have resulted in the cementing of city-county friendships, and establishment of lasting good will.

The relatives of Edmond Duncan, this week delivered a headstone for his grave. A Confederate soldier and private in Company I, of the Sixth Alabama Infantry, Rosser's brigade, and who died Aug. 15, 1929, and is buried in the Merriman cemetery, near Ranger.

There are now in the Eastland Chamber of Commerce these headstones awaiting delivery to the relatives of James C. Drake and Thomas J. Drake, brothers, who served Company B, Philippa Georgia Cavalry; and for Henry Halum, of Company K, Second Tennessee Infantry. The last stone will be placed at the grave of William B. DeShazo in Wayland cemetery, Stephens county, who served in Company C, Sixteenth Missouri Infantry, of the northern army.

And so it goes. Old factional fights are forgotten, and the memory of the valor and courage remains.

Death is a great leveler, and respect is the best leveler of all.

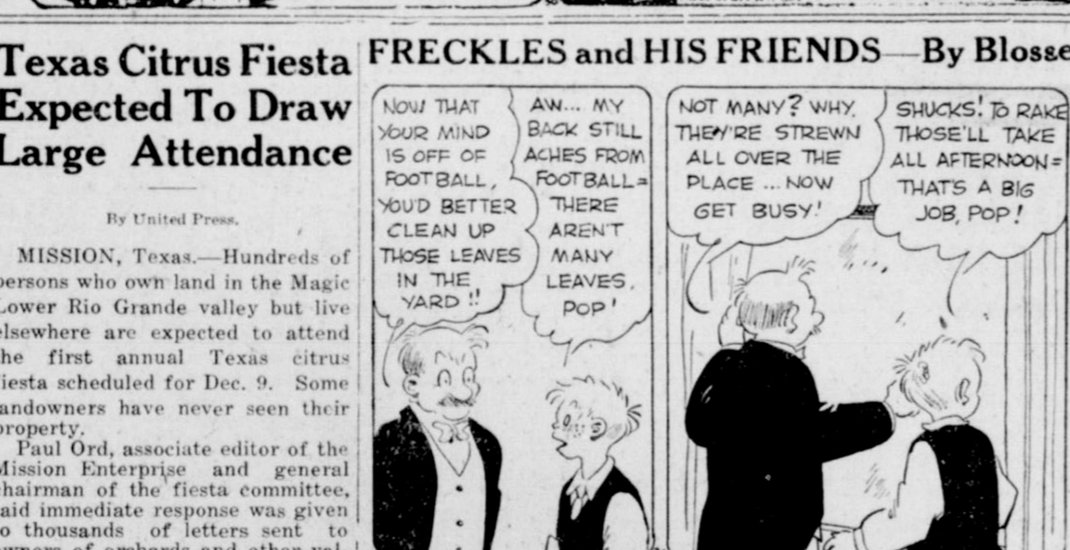
