

Lake Crimes Solved

A Ranger senior, vacationing with his class on the Prade Ranch near Leaky, faced serious charges today after he admitted stealing a pickup truck, and sinking a boat at Lake Leon Monday night.

The pickup, belonging to T. A. Utley, was recovered in Ranger Tuesday afternoon.

The 18-year-old high school senior was returned to the Eastland County jail by Ranger Policemen Ed Freeman and Joe Faircloth, Constable Ralph Veal and Deputy Sheriff John Boyd Wednesday night. The officers, who made the trip in two cars, were prepared to bring back at least five other seniors.

However, investigation satisfied

the officers that only the one returned here was implicated in the theft and sinking of the boat even though the others admitted being near the scene earlier Monday night.

Officers pieced the story together like this:

The youth, now in county jail, was among many others who planned to stay at Lake Leon Monday night prior to the departure of the senior class on their annual trip at 5 a. m. Tuesday morning.

After rain began falling, the group came back into town. At least one of the group entered the Wallace boat house where the boat was sunk earlier.

It was after this the suspect re-

turned alone to the lake where his pickup truck ceased to run. He walked to the Wallace boat house, broke the lock to the shed and took out the 14-foot aluminum boat with 30 h. p. motor.

After a short ride, he came back into the boat house at such a speed that he jumped the V-landing, crashed partially through the end of the boat house and as the boat slipped back into the water, the heavy motor dug the boat underwater.

He then went to the Utley residence on the old Staff road, and first attempted to wire around the switch on a car, but failing settled for the pickup, which he used to tow in his own truck.

He arrived in town only minutes before the chartered bus was to leave with the senior group.

The boat and motor that was sunk was valued at nearly \$1,200, including accessories.

The suspect was confined in the Eastland County jail Wednesday night when officers returned from the trip to the Prade Ranch where Ranger seniors have spent their annual trip for the past three years.

Officers questioned six suspects in all Wednesday but all had reported being home earlier than the time the incidents occurred. Latest time any one of the group was reported out was about 11 o'clock.

week at a meeting of interested citizens, who organized a Water Board and named officers.

The group named O. H. Dick chairman and J. C. Everett secretary-treasurer. Twelve families agreed to join in paying for a three inch main line to the line leading from Lake Leon to Eastland. The move was made after checking with Eastland City Commissioners several months ago to find out if Eastland would sell water to Olden users if they paid the cost of running the line to their homes.

Eastland city fathers agreed to supply Olden's water needs and the move was on to try to raise the money which would be needed to lay a line into Olden. The line leading into Olden will be 1800 feet. Dick said that it would cost each family about \$200 each to have the line brought into Olden, and then each family will have to lay the line to their homes. In addition there will be a \$10 charge by the City of Eastland for each tap and a \$5 deposit and \$1 turn-on fee will be charged. The City will bill Olden water users just as they do those in Eastland, and the charge will be the same, \$3.50 for the minimum of 3,000 gallons and 40 cents a thousand thereafter.

Dick said, "We hope to have the pipe ordered and on the ground by June 1."

He said that other Olden families interested in joining the group had until that date to do so, with each sharing in the cost equally. "After that the Board will charge a penalty of \$100," he declared.

Sabanna Valley Game Preserve May Get Deer

Hopes of Sabanna Valley Game Preserve Association members that the State Fish and Game Commission will stock the area with deer improved this week after a survey by Robt. G. Maverman, State wildlife biologist.

Maverman told Association members he would improve the area for deer, but that he would require an absolute minimum of 15,000 acres of solidly blocked land to be signed up with the state before deer could be brought in.

"So it is up to the people of the area," a spokesman said. "If they want deer they can get them. If they don't want deer they won't get them."

At the last meeting of the Association, guest speakers were E. E. McAlister and W. L. Garner, of the Eastland Soil Conservation work unit.

Motorcycle Hill Climb Planned At Metcalfe Gap

The annual 4-star motorcycle hillclimb will be held at Metcalfe Gap, on U. S. Highway 180, 20 miles west of Mineral Wells Sunday afternoon, at 2 p. m.

In keeping with other hill climbs in the past six years, weather permitting, between four and five thousand spectators are expected to be on hand to watch this contest, and an attempt to negotiate the 70-degree trail up the mountainside—some 470 feet, almost straight up.

Already registered among some 50 entries, are a dozen of the nation's top motorcycle riders, including the world's champion, Howard Metzger, of York, Pa. Many Texas and Oklahoma riders will also take part.

The hill climb is sponsored by the Asphalt Aviators Motorcycle Club of Mineral Wells and sanctioned by the American Motorcycle Association, a non-profit organization.

Eight grandchildren and seven great grandchildren also survive.

140,000 More Bass Added To Lake Leon

Breckenridge Sets Large Armed Forces Day Event

Armed Forces Day will be observed in Breckenridge on May 19 with one of the largest parades held in the community in years.

Beginning at 11 a.m., the ranks will form at the intersection of Walker and Miller Streets and parade down Walker Street to the Y.M.C.A., with Colonel H. S. (Hank) Beeler as Parade Marshal.

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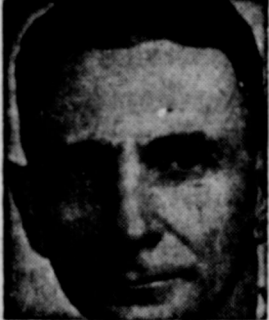

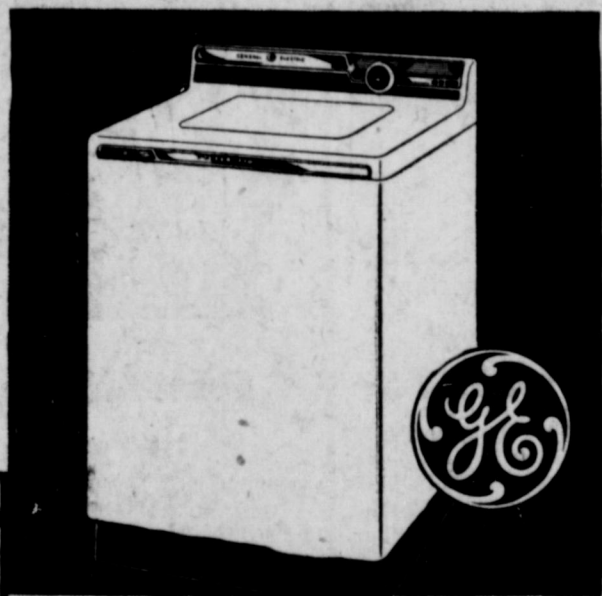

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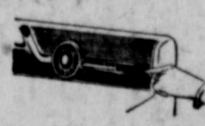

Other business was discussed and the treasurer's report was given by Mrs. Henry Pullman.

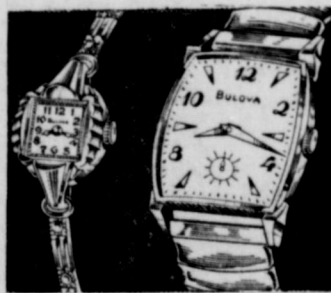

LEGAL NOTICE

NOTICE TO THE PUBLIC

Under the Laws, Rules and Regulations governing Lake Leon as passed and put into effect as of July 12, 1955, ARTICLE X, Section 9 has been revised as follows:

The doing of any act forbidden to be done by this ordinance, or the failure to do any act required by the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed to be a misdemeanor, which, in case of a lawful conviction thereof shall be punishable by the infliction of a fine of not more than \$200.00 plus cost of court. The fines collected shall be payable to the District and shall be credited to its recreational fund. In case of assessment of fine hereunder and the refusal or inability of the guilty persons to discharge and such fine together with cost of Court incurred by the reason of the prosecution of the offense,

the Court may order any such person committed to the County Jail to serve out any such penalty at the same rate of credit as would be done in case of correction of a misdemeanor under the Laws of the State of Texas. It, however, is provided, that no such imprisonment shall be ordered by the Court of Jurisdiction unless this District makes provision to reimburse the County for the confinement and maintenance of any such person at the same rate per day as would prevail in the case of confinement of a county prisoner, or upon any other basis of a compensation which may be agreed between the County Commissioner's Court and the Directors of this District. The penalty hereby authorized shall be in addition to any other penalty provided by the Laws of the State of Texas, or by the laws of the United States of America, and may be enforced or imposed upon complaints filed by the District, its Peace Officers, or any other

interested person, in an appropriate court of jurisdiction.

Any person, persons, firm or corporation found guilty of violation of any section or sections of this ordinance shall upon request of the District, surrender his permit or lease for suspension or cancellation by the District. In event of such suspension or cancellation by the District, any fees which may have been paid by the permittee for such permit, shall automatically be forfeited, and the District shall not, in any event, be liable for the return or refund of any part thereof.

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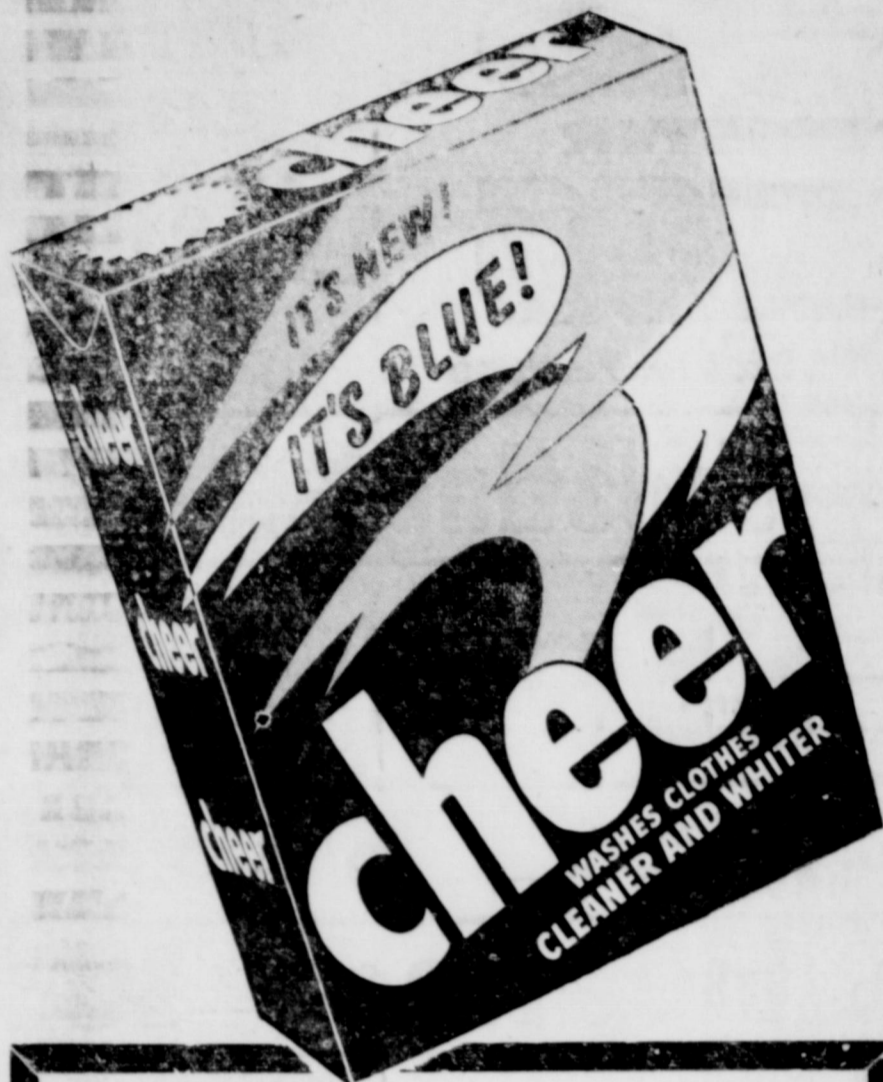

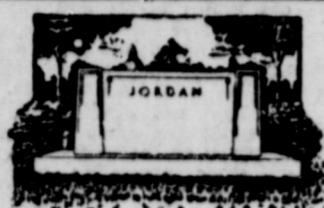

HOW TO PLANT HOUSE PLANTS

House plants should be planted carefully to ensure good growth. A layer of coarse sand or gravel in the container bottom is important in providing proper drainage.

Next, add a layer of potting soil. Mix your own, using equal parts of sand, soil, and peat or compost, or use one of the special potting mixes now available at most garden centers, suggests an article in the April Better Homes & Gardens magazine.

To remove the plant from its original pot, turn the pot upside down, place your fingers under the soil ball, and give the pot a sharp tap on the edge of a table. The plant should drop out.

Don't disturb the roots more than necessary. Remove the soil gently when needed to fit the plant into the space, the article says. Fill in around the plant with loose soil only after it is placed, then firm the soil with your fingers. Thump the container on a planting surface once or twice to sift the soil about the roots, and water thoroughly.

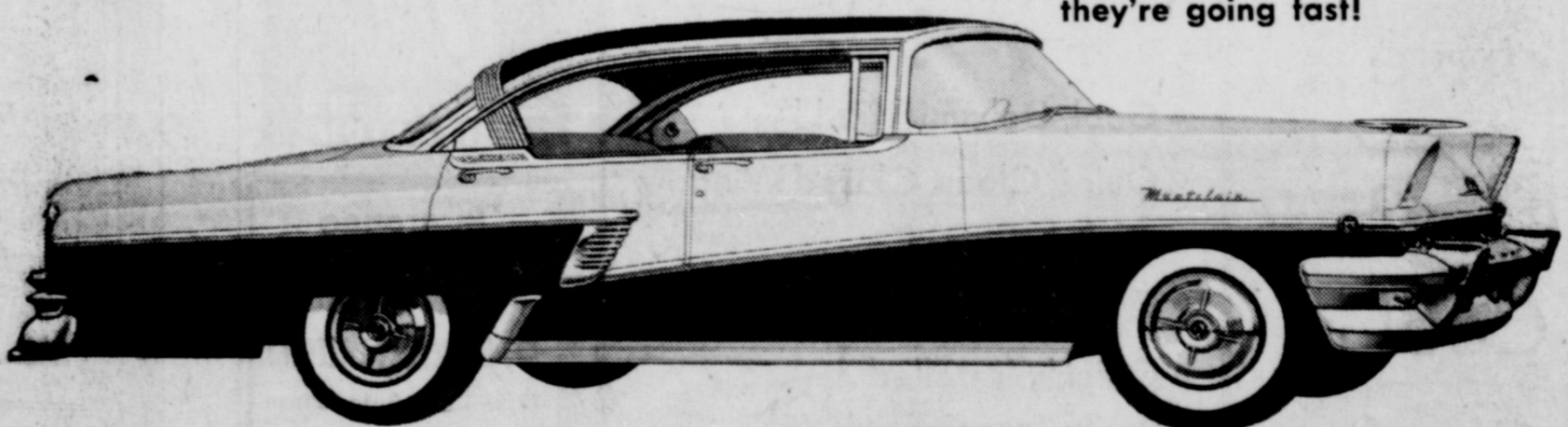

Home Garden Melons Need Lots of Food, Water

It is a proud home gardener who can feast his friends on sweet muskmelons or water melons grown in his own garden. Melons and squash are usually the last vegetables sown in the spring, as they require warm weather from start to finish.

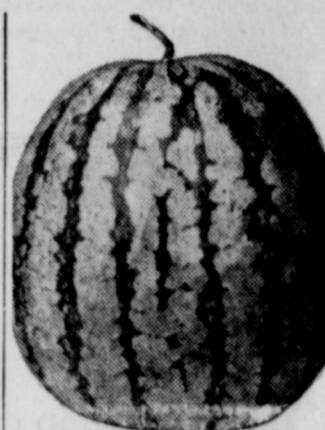
A light, well drained soil. Lots of water and more plant food than you are accustomed to use on other vegetables pay off especially well with the melons. The vines of squash and muskmelons can be grown as climbers, provided large fruits are supported. A mesh bag such as often used for fruits in supermarkets provides a good support.

With melons the time required from seed sowing to maturity will determine the variety you sow. Muskmelons take from 80 to 100 days and watermelons from 75 to 100 days. Seed cannot be sown until at least a week after the frost-proof date when the ground is thoroughly warm. If nights continue cold it may be desirable to protect seedling plants with waxed paper tents at first.

Both muskmelons and water melons are usually grown in hills, which may be as close together as three feet each way, in small gardens. Such close spacing is likely to reduce the size of the fruits, and more room should be given where possible.

Heavy fertilizing pays well. As much as a pint of balanced plant food may be mixed with the soil beneath each hill several days before the seed is planted. Or use a shovel of well rotted manure, and half a pint of plant food. Sow ten seeds to the hill and thin out to the two strongest plants that develop.

Do not harvest watermelons or muskmelons until they are ripe, as they improve in flavor very little after they are picked. It takes some study to determine when a watermelon is ripe, with-

out "plugging" it. Thompson's one test, ripe melons give a dead flat sound, green ones a ringing sound. The color of the spot where the melon lay on the ground usually changes from a greenish white to yellow as it ripens.

A muskmelon is ripe when it parts from the vine with a gentle pull, and the characteristic odor of a ripe melon is noticeable. When ripe melons are not sweet, a lack of sunbaking during the growing season is usually at fault. Cool, wet summer weather is not what the melons need; but hot, dry weather with lots of water supplied by the gardener.

Squash are not so demanding as melons, though some are just as sweet. Italian marrows, which produce mature fruits weighing pounds, are delicious when a few days old. You can get your squash from many different types, some maturing in 60 days and others 100 days. Many are splendid winter keepers, and sweeter than melons when properly cooked.



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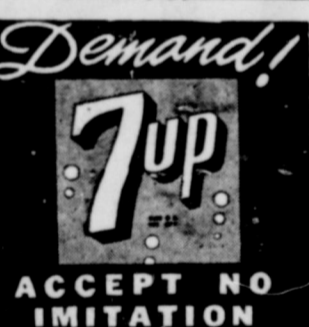

War on Garden Pests Is Aided by New Weapons

Gardeners this year have at their command a group of insect and fungus destroyers which are new chemicals, now D.D.T., being displaced by newer chemicals for the gardener to use, than ever before.

Great progress has been made by scientists toward the ideal combination, which in one dust or spray will include killers for all insects, and curatives for all plant diseases.

No one has yet discovered anything, however, which will repair damage done to plants by these pests. You must protect your plants from injury by destroying the invaders as soon as they appear.

Since D.D.T. was made available to gardeners 10 years ago, prewar poisons have been almost entirely abandoned in favor of garden enemies, and safest for those who use them as pesticides and eat the fruit and vegetables they protect.

Many of these have been developed, but experience and experiments have gradually centered attention upon a small group deemed most deadly for garden enemies, and safest for those who use them as pesticides and eat the fruit and vegetables they protect.

Outstanding for efficiency and safety are three—Methoxychlor, malathion and captan. Methoxychlor kills most of the leaf eating insects that D.D.T. kills and many which it fails to destroy. Malathion kills scale insects, mites, aphids and other hard to reach plant juice feeders, as well as many leaf chewers. Captan is a fungicide which controls black spot on roses and fungi which attack fruit trees, lawns and plants in general.

These three champions can be combined, either for a spray or dust, to take care of almost all insects and diseases which prey upon vegetables, fruits and flowers. Not only are they more effective, but far safer to use than were the trio that served home gardeners prior to World War II, which were arsenic, nicotine and bordeaux mixture.

For those with special problems in plant protection, there are other chemicals which may handle specific insects better than the all-around destroyers. For mites, of which red spider is most prevalent in gardens, aramite and karathane are excellent. Against fungi on roses and fruit trees, fermate, also known as ferbam, is good.

Lindane is an excellent insecticide for flowers. It kills both

chewers and juice drinkers but should not be used on fruits and vegetables, as it may impart an unpleasant taste. Chlordane is the most effective killer of insects that live in the soil or crawl on its surface, including ants and grubs.

The federal government keeps a close watch on garden chemicals sold in interstate commerce. Before they can be offered they must be approved, not only for effectiveness against pests, but for safety to humans. Instructions for use must be approved by government experts and printed on the labels.

This care for your safety cannot insure protection unless you read the labels and follow exactly the instructions they give. Even though the pesticides used on vegetables and fruits may be entirely safe, never fail to wash thoroughly all fruits and vegetables harvested in your garden or purchased in the market.

Remember that the garden chemicals are, not cures, but preventives; they cannot repair damage but must be used before damage has been done.

State Trappers To Collect Spare Antelope

AUSTIN — Approximately 350 head of far west Texas antelope NOT harvested during the past open season are being trapped for restocking purposes, said the assistant director of Wildlife Restoration for the Game and Fish Commission.

Less than 1000 permits for antelope hunting were taken up and overpopulation had become so acute in some restricted areas that herd reduction had to be placed on an emergency basis.

The assistant director said the surplus antelope, comprising both bucks and does, are being released on ranches whose owners made formal application for the fleet game animals and whose lands fulfilled the requirements governing such releases.

He explained that antelope require vast areas of habitat in which to roam and that a minimum of ten thousand acres of open country is a basic requirement to receive the two-toned colored game for restocking.

The assistant director said such tracts are available generally in the western portions of the state beyond Fort Worth and the hill country.

Crews catch the antelope by driving the herds into large net traps by use of an airplane. They are loaded on trucks and taken to

the release areas. Unlike deer that will come from west of the Pecos but added that a few head may be trapped in the Panhandle where the herds have increased rapidly in recent years.

Handy Jim's FIXIN-UP TIPS For the Home

Emergency Supplies

FOOD, water and light are often shut off to families whose homes have been damaged by floods, fires or other disasters. In the event of an enemy air attack, these essentials of life would pose problems for all people in the area. The answer is to keep emergency supplies in the home.



A convenient and safe way to store the supplies is to use covered galvanized steel cans or pails. These containers are available in several sizes, so there is one to fit the space needs of every family. They are strong and durable, so fire, moisture and rodents cannot destroy supplies kept in them.

Items stored in the containers should include bottled water, canned foods, flashlights, candles and matches. These are basic emergency supplies.

A family which is isolated from its neighbors might also elect to keep a portable battery-powered radio and extra clothing among the emergency supplies, even though this may require using more than one covered metal storage can.

An important point is to keep the emergency cans of materials where they can be reached quickly and easily.

SAVE EXTRA ICE CUBES

When you take just a few ice cubes from the tray, put the extras into a plastic bag and return it to the freezer.

The cubes won't stick together and are handy for the future when you want only one or two cubes, the Better Homes & Gardens magazine. The tray is then free to use additional ice cubes. Plastic bags are also handy containers for cracked ice.

Spring Designed by Nature For Boatman; It's Outfitting Time

From the boatman's point of view, spring was designed by nature especially for him, for this is "fitting-out" time.

Fitting out takes on a different form for each type of boat, but outboard enthusiasts are among the luckiest in that their labors needn't be long or arduous.

Assuming that a 16-foot runabout is typical of the nation's outboard fleet, only two week-ends are required to put the boat and motor into condition, according to Harry Ewald, chief engineer of Evinrude Motors, Milwaukee, who outlined the general procedure.

The first step, of course, is to remove the covers which have protected the boat from winter weather. Inasmuch as these wraps were not tied too tightly to prevent air circulation, dry rot will not be a problem.

Cobwebs, silt and other dirt can be hosed off the hull with an ordinary garden hose. Scuff marks can be generally be removed by the application of scouring powder and arm power.

Where the paint is cracked, chipped or peeling, in a small area, it is not usually necessary to re-paint the entire hull. Loose or blistering paint should be removed with paint remover, steel wool, scraped or sanded off down to the bare wood. The edges of the bare spot should then be faired so that no break in the surface can be felt when running a hand over it.

If the boat is constructed of plywood, it is generally unnecessary to prime bare wood. When the boat is to be used extensively

in salt water, one or two coats of anti-fouling paint below the water line is recommended.

The interior of the boat should also be washed down and where grease has collected, a detergent should be used to cut it. Varnished surfaces should be checked for scratches and scrapes and should be sanded smooth and refinished with a good grade of marine varnish.

Brass hardware is easily polished with many preparations currently used for copper pans. Brass polishes easily and retains a high luster. Where brass is pitted or highly corroded, application of very fine steel wool will generally bring it back to life.

Remote controls should always be checked at the beginning of a new season. Connections should be tight and cables firmly in place. Steering cables should also be checked for fraying and replaced when necessary. Since many fuel lines are of rubber, they should be carefully inspected for breaks, cuts or nicks which can cause serious inconvenience later in the season as fuel is forced through them under pressure from the tank.

Where storage batteries are used for electric starting outboard motors, they should be brought to an automobile or outboard repair shop for a specific gravity check and a charge. Even though not used, the storage battery "leaks" its charge. If a storage battery purchase is indicated, a unit providing about 100 ampere hours should be used. Smaller batteries rapidly reach the stall speed of most electric starting

motors and can melt battery-motor connections.

The outboard motor should also be serviced to assure continued efficient operation throughout the year. Less than a half hour is required to perform all the service steps necessary.

Since most difficulties arising from gasoline engine use center around the ignition it is well to start here. Spark plugs should be cleaned, adjusted or replaced if pitted or highly carbonized. Spark plug connections should also be inspected for corrosion and rubber insulators should be checked. Torn or cracked insulators should be replaced.

The carburetor sediment bowl protects the carburetor from gummy deposits present in all gasoline. This bowl should be kept clean. A few turns of a thumb-retaining screw releases the bowl for cleaning.

Linkage and steering gears should receive a good coat of grease to keep them operating smoothly and to protect them from the weather and corrosion.

The first time the motor is operated, a few drops of thin lubricating oil should be squirted through the air silencer to keep the carburetor in top condition.

Cotter and shear pins should be inspected and if the shear pin is nicked or bent it should be replaced. The propeller should also be checked for cracks and balance. A damaged propeller should be brought to the attention of an outboard serviceman.

The lower unit lubricant should be drained and replaced if this was not done prior to winter storage.

A clean motor is a delight to the eyes as well as an efficient recreational tool. A thin coat of oil or wax applied with a soft

cloth will help maintain the motor's finish and will protect it against extremes of weather.

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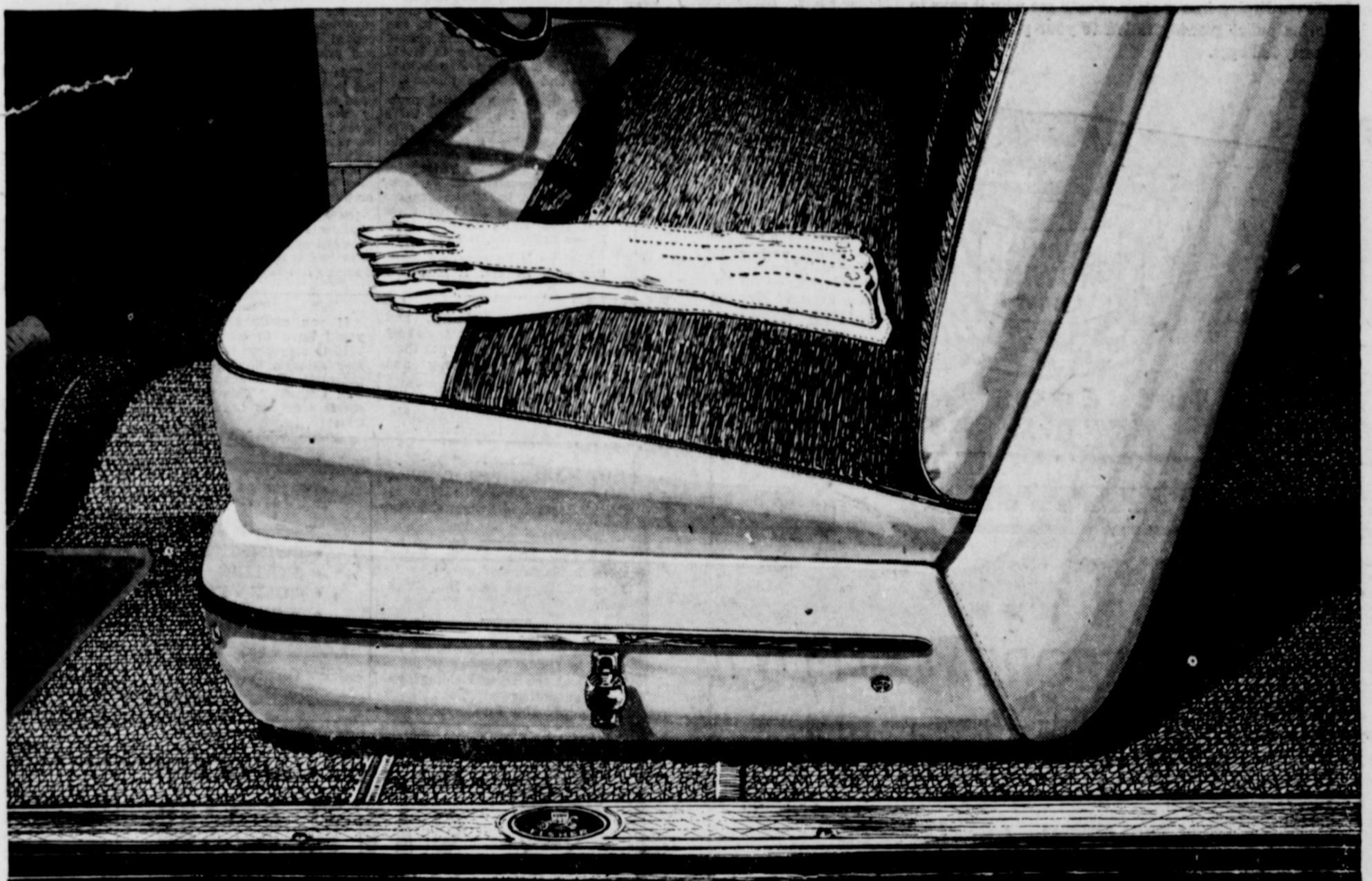
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
