AN OCTOBER DRIVE FOR THE SALE OF MEDALLIONS

State Chairman Maury Hughes of the democratic committee has let it be known that a drive will be started Oct. 8 to sell at least 40,000 Roosevelt-Garner medallions, from which the major part of the campaign fund in Texas is supposed to come. Frank Schofield of Hill county, chairman of the state finance committee, has let it be known that Texas democrats have already contributed \$38,000 of the \$150,000 quota for the national campaign chest. Roosevelt-Garner medallions sell for a dollar and up "as the buyer is moved by his spirit." According to the totals of the July primaries there are 973,000 democrats in Texas. It should be an easy matter to raise a campaign fund of at least \$250,000 in Texas. If the democrati cparty is the party of the people then the people should defray the cost of the campaign in nation and state. A dollar speaks louder than a hundred words. It is impossible to direct campaigns, winning campaigns for the people, unless all the people are willing to do their part, in coin as well as conversation.

The forms of dancing are many and varied. In Tigre, the Abys-sinians dance in a circle, and keep time by shrugging their shoulders and moving their elbows back-wards and forwards.

The Gonds, a hill tribe of Hindustan, dance in pairs, with shuffling step, eyes on the ground, arms close to body, and elbows level with the closed hand. The women of the tribe, dance in a circle, backwards and forwards in a bended position.

In fact nearly all the orientals have some pecular body posture in their dancing. It remains for the Javanese to be distinct in their graceful gestures of the hand and

fingers in the dance.

Writers tell us there is a close relation always to be found to exist, between the excellence of a nation's dancing, and the excel-lence or complexity of its music

and poetry.

In many foreign phases of dancng, music is struck from some crude instrument, or a rude chant is improvised. Often marking time done through striking of sticks

on the ground. The student of dancing knows that the early initiative dances of the first civilization were of great interest, and imitated the habits of wild beasts in their sudden leaps and violent turns.

In fact the history of dancing is full of interest, and tells a story within itself of many countries of the world, the kind of lit-erature and music of the periods, all reflected in the dances of the

Perhaps no dances have been so stately or beautiful as that of the French minuet, and the modern ballet which had its birth in Russia and France. And noted for its grace, airiness or motion, and deliate poise of body.

To be graceful, one must know how to dance or to be able to dance. Dancing is an innocent art, and if rightfully used a proper education, but like all arts, dancing may be used rightfully or wrongfully, lifted to its excellence or debased for a lower purpose.

The world does not look upon dancing in the narrow way, that

once obtained; dancing is considered an important part of one's education nowadays and just as essential, as to know how to use the right spoon or fork at a formal dinner, and the way to enter a room or leave it gracefully.




