Wood grain patterns in Marlite paneling are especially suitfor wall racks. Authentic reproductions of selected wood, they supply a distinctive touch in decoration and harmonize with a variety of backgrounds.

For a simple and interesting construction, the rack may be put together with leather or plastic lacing, threaded through holes in the pieces of paneling that form the rack. The predecorated pan-eling, made of Masonite tempered hardboard, can be drilled with a hand drill. Loles should be started on the finished side.


