Dublin Boy's Holstein Cow Produces Record

Bradley View Burke Joy 49-14551, a five-year-old Registered Holstein cow owned by Billy S. Bradley of Dublin, has produced a noteworthy record of 17,940 lbs. of milk and 649 lbs. of butterfat in 305 days.

Texas A&M University supervised the production, weighing, and testing operations, in cooperation with the official breed improvement programs of the Holstein-Friesian Association of America.

This level of production may be compared to the average U.S. dairy cow's estimated annual output of 7,500 lbs. of milk containing 275 lbs. of butterfat.

Rotary Governor Plans Visit To Eastland Club

Dr. C. J. Dodsworth of Bowie, governor of district 579 of Rotary International, worldwide service organization, arrives here July 20th to visit the local Rotary club, one of 40 clubs in his district. In addition to addressing Eastland Rotarians at their regular meeting, he will confer with Dr. V. Cyrus Barcus, president of Rotary Club in Eastland and other officers on Rotary administrative matters and service activities.

Dr. Dodsworth is a dentist in Bowie and a member and past president of the Rotary club there. He was elected a district governor for 1964-65 at Rotary's 1964 convention in Toronto, Ontario, Canada, last June. He is one of 276 district governors responsible for supervising the activities of more than 11,800 Rotary clubs with a total membership of 553,000 in 125 countries around the globe.

"The governor of this Rotary district," the president of the local club points out, "comes here not as an inspector but as a counselor to discuss such Rotary matter as expansion in membership, attendance at District meetings, and ways and means of implementing Rotary's program of service. He also comes to give Rotarians here in Eastland a better understanding of the global Rotary organization."

As the governor of this Rotary district, Dr. Dodsworth supervises the organization of new clubs in his area. Last year, more than 285 new Rotary clubs were organized in 45 countries.

Before assuming his duties as district governor, Dr. Dodsworth attended a nine-day meeting at Lake Placid, New York, held to assist Rotary governors to meet the duties of their office.

Helen Hailey Completes Special Course

Miss Helen Hailey, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Hailey of Rt. 1, Gorman, has just completed specialized training in psychiatric nursing at Austin State Hospital, according to an announcement by Dr. Sam A. Hoerster, Jr., superintendent.

The psychiatric nursing program is designed to train nurses in the recognition of psychiatric disorders, techniques useful in caring for emotionally ill patients and of community agencies established for dealing with social problems arising out of mental illness, Dr. Hoerster said. Students spend three months in ward training and classroom instruction under psychiatrists, psychiatric nurses, social worker, psychologists, rehabilitation therapists, dietitians and chaplains.

Their association with mentally ill patients and qualified professional personnel gives the students invaluable training opportunities.

Miss Hailey is a 1962 graduate of Gorman High School attended Ranger Junior College and Midwestern University. She is presently living in Wichita Falls.

Bids Asked On Hwy. 206 Project South Of Cisco

Work Expected To Require Year

The State Highway Department will open bids on Tuesday, Aug. 18, on a project to build the final 14-mile section of Highway 206, a new route from Coleman to Cisco, according to a report by County Engineer R. P. Haun.

The contract calls for work to begin at the Interstate 20 (U. S. Highway 80) interchange, one mile west of Cisco, and to end 14 miles south near the Sabano Church. The road has been completed from Coleman through Callahan County to Sabano.

Mr. Haun said the job calls for grading, structures, base and two course surface treatment. He expected that approximately a year would be needed for the work.

The route will follow closely to FM 569 part of the way. Mr. Haun said that most of the right-of-way buying has been completed by County Commissioner C. B. Dill of the Cisco precinct and Highway ROW Supervisor Jack Kirby. It was understood that several condemnation suits would be required to complete the right-of-way.

Mr. Haun suggested that the project would be speeded along if fence building work

along the route could be completed in the near future. He added that the contractor will have to get underway soon after August 18 in order to meet his time requirements.

Highway 206 was started some three years ago after civic leaders in Coleman, Cross Plains and Cisco began working on it as a new route for traffic to and from south-

west Texas. Mr. Haun said the Interstate 20 project west of Cisco was progressing on schedule. Plans call for bids to be opened in the near future on an IH 20 project from Ranger to the east county line. He believed that the Ranger by-pass would be ready for letting soon after the first of the year.

Final Chapter Written In Life Of Jesse Torres

The final chapter in the life of a young Latin American named Jesse Torres was written Saturday as his widow appeared at the Eastland County sheriff's office to claim his skeleton for formal funeral and burial at Quanah.

The young man, about 25 years old, had been ill when he wandered away from the Gordon Woods Ranch one night two years ago, dressed only in his shoes and khaki trousers. A posse of officers and neighbors hunted him for days before finally giving up.

On July 6th, a skeleton was found in a pasture in the Yellow Mound community, not far from the Woods Ranch.

An investigation began. Dep-

uty Sheriff L. E. Sublett reported Saturday the skeleton was formally identified as the remains of Jesse Torres. A dentist at Weatherford, for whom he had worked, identified extensive bridge work still on the teeth in the skull. Former employers and friends added weight to the identification.

Justice of the Peace L. W. Dalton of Eastland prepared the death certificate in the name of Jesse Torres.

The young man's widow signed a release at the sheriff's office and took the skeleton back to Quanah where she lives for burial. She was accompanied by a priest, Mr. Sublett said.

AND ONE OF the most tragic memories of the newspaper business we now have is the afternoon last November when we entered the American Statesman about 1 p. m. to find the whole staff in a state of silent shock after the shooting of President John F. Kennedy. Many of the staff had worked hand in hand with the President in Washington and with Vice-President Johnson.

The whole city of Austin was preparing for Kennedy's arrival that afternoon. The banquet room of the Municipal Auditorium across the river from the city was already laid in white linen and silver and china and attractive but ironic program that read — "A Day to Remember." It was indeed a day to remember — a tragic day from the pages of our nation's history — as the entire staff of reporters huddled in tears and sadness and averted silence around the static filled radio in the conference room, waiting for anxious words from the Dallas newscasters.

In downtown Austin, crowds of people in town to await the arrival and parade for Kennedy and his attractive wife, stood in silence and horror, awaiting word.
And at the American Statesman, for once on a busy fall afternoon, the typewriters were still, the busy feet motionless and the news staff of the state's capitol newspaper waited in rapt and fearful attention.

And then the word came. The President was dead. Many broke into tears, unashamed of their grief. Veteran newsmen who handled the goriest and most horrible that city life has to offer, broke into heart-touching sobs.
Our editor, Mrs. Frankie Peterson, sat at her desk, unable to work. She expressed the opinion that nothing could be worth working for in a world that would cause such

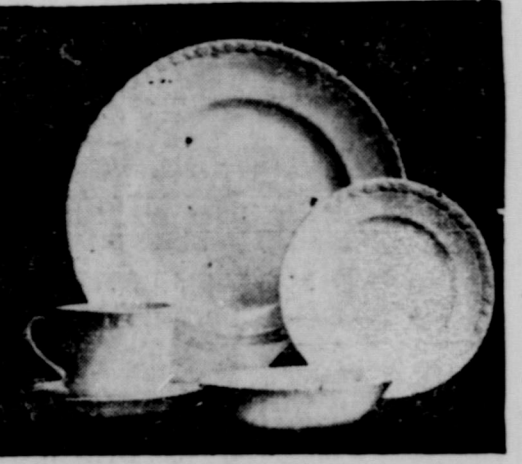

County Farm Bureau To Note Farm Safety Week July 19-25

County Judge Scott Bailey has officially proclaimed July 19-25 as Farm Safety Week in Eastland County, according to Jack Cozart, president of the local county Farm Bureau. The farm organization is coordinating activities for the special farm safety campaign.

President Johnson and Governor Connally have previously designated this week on national and state levels as a period to call attention to worthwhile safety practices that can reduce disabling injuries and deaths.

The county farm leader said that farm accidents have been reduced in the past several years; however, farmers cannot afford to let down their guard against accidents. He emphasized that farming remains one of the most hazardous occupations in America today.

In his official proclamation, County Judge Bailey said, "All citizens of Eastland County are concerned about the safety and wellbeing of farm families from whom we receive our abundance of food and other essential agricultural commodities."

"Farm accidents result in over 150 deaths and thousands of disabling injuries in Texas each year.

"Farm accidents are responsible for needless suffering and incapacity, and greatly effect the economic wellbeing and progress of our agricultural population in our county, state and nation.

"Throughout this special week, a statewide farm accident prevention and educational program will be undertaken by the Texas Farm Bureau, the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Texas Safety Association and the Eastland County Farm Bureau with the theme, 'Safer American Families Everywhere'."

County Farm Bureau President Cozart said that a different phase of safety would be emphasized each day during the week with the following scheduled to be followed: Sunday—reverence for life; Monday—safety begins at home; Tuesday—agricultural chemicals; Wednesday—prevent falls; Thursday—rural highway safety; Friday—farm machinery; Saturday—recreation safety.

Statement and Waivers Make Up Final By-Laws

(ED. NOTE: This is the fifth in a series outlining the by-laws of the Eastland Industrial Foundation Inc. and concludes the series. Eastland residents are being urged to clip and save the articles for permanent reference.)

ARTICLE VII (Miscellaneous)
Section 1. (Annual Statement) The Board of Directors shall submit to the members, at their annual meeting, a statement of the physical and financial condition of the corporation covering the previous fiscal year, and a consolidated balance sheet showing the assets and liabilities of the corporation at the end of the preceding fiscal year.

Section 2. (Notices of Waivers Thereof) Whenever under the provisions of these by-laws notice is required to be given to any member, director or officer, unless otherwise provided such notice may be given personally, or it may be given in writing by depositing the same in the post office or letter box in a postpaid envelope or postal card addressed to such member, director or officer, at such address as appears on the books of the corporation, or in default of other address, to such member, director or officer, at the general post office in the City of Eastland, Texas and such notice shall be deemed to be given at the time when the same shall be thus mailed. Whenever any notice whatever is required to be given by law, or by these by-laws, a waiver thereof in writing signed by the person or persons entitled to said notice, whether before or after the time stated therein, shall be deemed equivalent thereto.

Section 3. (Negotiable Instruments) All checks, drafts, notes or other obligations of the corporations shall be signed by such of the officers of the corporation or by such person or persons as may be thereto authorized by the Board of Directors or the executive committee.

ARTICLE VIII (Amendments)
The Board of Directors shall have power to make, amend and repeal the by-laws of the corporation by vote of a majority of all the directors, at any regular or special meeting of the board.

The membership, by the affirmative vote of a majority in interest may make, alter or amend the by-laws without notice at any regular meeting, or any special meeting, if notice thereof be contained in the notice of such special meeting.

pressing interest in the Chamber's proposed Texas Oil Museum project.

Civic and business leaders in Eastland and Cisco also are considering development of tourist attractions to lure travelers off Interstate 20 when it eventually will by-pass all three cities.

A major goal of the RAMPs program is the erection of 5,000 Official Texas Historical Markers and Texas Historical Building Medallions within the next five years — in addition to the some 1200 historical markers previously erected by the state and the 1500 markers erected in the past two years. These new markers, 1090 each year, will be erected in a joint state, county-city and privately-financed program. Seventy-five per cent will be located for tourist consumption with 25 per cent marking actual sites.

These markers will cover Texas history from the archaeological finds, old Spanish and French explorer routes and Indian culture, through the days of the Texas Ranger, the cattle drives and the railroad movement to the history of industries, educational institutions and famous Texans.

Included are markers giving the name, founding and history of each town and stream in the state with special emphasis on those with unusual names. Ghost or oddly-named and promotional towns that never materialized will be marked.

The Texas State Historical Survey Committee serves as the clearing house for historical information which will be used in more than 1000 Texas Historical Tours (each county will be included in at least one tour), in a statewide historical road map, Calendars of Historical Events and in the compilation of directories and guides of Texas Historical Museums and their Collections, Official Texas Historical Building Medallions and all official markers in the state.

It contemplates the cooperation of tourist-related businesses as hotels, restaurants, service station, etc., to use Texas history subject in pictures in hotel rooms or informative placemats in restaurants.

With the acceptance of the RAMPs program by the Historical Survey Committees in every county in Texas, history will be preserved and made available. Plans are to furnish technical assistance and guidance in the establishment of permanent, safe archives in every county, to have a history of every county written and published. Every county that so requests can secure consultants for advice and assistance in the fields of restoration of houses and buildings, museums, archives and papers, and tourism.

Yearly surveys conducted in every county will determine the location and condition of historical markers and the extent of the county archives and books on Texas history in county libraries. This information is then turned over to the State Archives and made available to researchers and visitors.

"The RAMPs program is designed to benefit the counties as well as the state, with information and resources flowing up and down, to accomplish the ultimate goal of preserving and displaying the unique history of Texas," said Mr. Sheppard.

Mrs. Bint, Mrs. Gordon and Mrs. Short were elected as the delegates to represent the county at the state meeting, during the July Council meeting.

Mrs. Hines, Mrs. Ralston and Mrs. Bostick were elected as the alternate delegates to attend the state meeting.

The Home Demonstration Clubs will not meet during July or August, as these are vacation months. Several of the members will participate in the Basic Clothing Workshop conducted by the agent during July, and during August the clubs have picnics for their members and their families.

The meeting will last until 3:30 or 4 p.m., and Dr. John W. Foster, D. V. M., chairman of the chamber agricultural committee will preside during the all-day event.

Some of the top sheep and goat authorities of the state will appear on the program: Jim Gray, sheep and goat specialist of the Agricultural Extension Service, San Angelo; John G. McHaney, A&M University Economist, College Station, Texas; Dr. J. B. Henderson, area veterinarian of the Texas Animal Commission, Coleman; Dr. W. T. Hardy, DVM, Ranch Experiment Station and Vestal Askew, president of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association, both of Sonora.

Selection of breeding animals, future price outlook, status of the screwworm program, feeding and management of Angora Goats and the activities of the state sheep and goat raiser organization will be among the topics discussed or demonstrated.

The annual event the past two years has attracted over 135 ranchers and their wives not only from Eastland but also from neighboring counties. With the large number of sheep and goats in the West Cross Timbers area, sale of wool and mohair play an important part both in the general and agricultural economy of the section. The field day program is aimed at upgrading both the quality and quantity of wool and mohair for an increased impetus to the economy. The last census showed nearly 50,000 head of goats in Eastland County alone.

Elsewhere in the area, E. V. McCright's No. 1 R. S. Lee et al has been completed as a good gas well. It is located between Cisco and Eastland, a mile north of the Joy Drive-In Theater. It was gauged at about 8,000,000 cubic feet per day from the Ranger formation at about 3,600 feet deep. The well was shut-in awaiting completion of arrangements for a pipe line connection, it was reported.

Four miles north of Cisco, Cities Service Oil Company of Wichita Falls has announced a plug-back operation for their No. 3-C S. E. Hittin in the Eastland County regular field. Location is in Section 1, SPRR Survey. The well has been producing from the Duffer lime. Production would be sought from the Lake Sand in the new test.

An oil test of interest to this area is the D. W. Underwood, Midland, No. 1-B O. G. Joiner, a wildcat located some 12 miles southeast of Cisco, in Eastland County. Low Drilling Co. has the contract, and the well was drilling at about 2,500 feet Saturday morning. Plans called for a 3,000 test to check the Fry and Marble Falls formations. The location was 2,423 feet from the south and 2,000 feet from the east lines of Section 35, John Sayers Survey. The test is some 1,200 feet southwest of a ga well.

The Underwood company has a period for a second test—their No. 1 Thelma Joiner et al — 1,420 feet from the south and 2,210 feet from the west lines of the same survey. The company has some 500 acres under lease in that area, it was understood.
