Stripping Rules Are Explained By ASC Manager

Rules for stripping cotton and peanuts in Eastland County were announced today by the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee.

Emmett Powell, ASC office manager, said rules were about the same as in past years.

"If cotton and peanuts are stripped with crops that compete with the allotment crops for moisture and plant food for the entire growing season, only that part of the land occupied by the allotment crop will be counted," Powell explained.

"Idle or fallow strips must be at least four normal rows wide," he said. "Crops that do not compete the entire growing season must be four normal rows wide and the same row width must be used for allotment crops and the strip.

"If there is any doubt as to the strip competing with the allotment crop it would be a good idea to make the strip four rows wide," Powell added.

The committee also voiced its appreciation to producers in the program of releasing unused cotton and peanut acreages.

"The committee will make re-allocation of this released acreage within the next few days and producers receiving some of the acreage will be notified," Powell said.

Mrs. Tucker To Edit New Farm Bureau Paper

Eastland County Farm Bureau will publish a monthly news sheet beginning July 2, it was announced today.

The Farm Bureau Board of Directors made the announcement following a called meeting in Eastland. Mrs. Bill Tucker will edit the paper.

County President Mitchell Campbell told the directors that, "Many people still ask what is Farm Bureau. What do you do? What do you get out of Farm Bureau?"

He said, "A local newspaper of Farm Bureau and its organizational policies might be a voice of agriculture in informing the public in general on county, state and national issues which directly affect the farmers and ranchers."

County Farm Bureau Has Goal Of 425 Members As State Seeks Lead

"Lead the South in '56!" That is the goal of the Texas Farm Bureau, according to a statement made by Millard Shivers, state organizational director, before a group assembled in Brownwood Wednesday.

Those attending from Eastland county were A. Z. Myrick, Cisco, Mr. and Mrs. E. C. McMurray and Ray A. Norris, of Eastland; Mrs. John Love, of Ranger, and Mrs. Bill Tucker, of Gorman.

Comanche counties who attended were County President Cecil Fisher, Mrs. Jean Rachel, office secretary and Don Chester, service agent.

Sixteen counties of District 7 were represented. This "Lead the South" campaign for membership has been set for 78,000, and has the approval of the Texas Board of Directors, Shivers said. "This is the year for Texas to show its colors, and lead the southern states in membership, when the American Farm Bureau Federation convenes in Miami, Florida. The eyes of the nation will be looking to the South this year.

Eastland County goal for 1956 is 425. Comanche county has a goal of 400.

An appropriate program of recognition will be given at the state convention and at the National convention for each county Farm Bureau which has participated in the membership drive and assumed an equitable share of obtaining the statewide goal.

Service committee chairmen and membership chairmen were given training at the Brownwood meeting, which will enable them

to carry out their particular assignments in the counties throughout District 7.

"Farm Bureau's platform might be pictured as a bridge with five worthwhile and important planks. First, remove road blocks to earning a high net income. Second, get our income in sound dollars. Third, halt threats to our individual freedom. Fourth, strengthen ourselves for peace to prevent the disaster of war, and fifth, build a better America with opportunities for all," a spokesman said.

Tech Announces Signing Of Eastland Star

LUBBOCK (Spl.) — A second team all-state end from Eastland and a trio of footballers from Kilgore High School are the latest gridders receiving Texas Tech athletic scholarships to be announced by Coach DeWitt Weaver.

Clyde Evatt, 6-2, weighing 188 pounds, is the Eastland star. He was captain of C. R. Shelton's district runner-up team. Besides being active in track and basketball he was class president two years. Evatt plans to major in business.

Ty Bain, Texas Tech quarterback 1939-41, coached the Kilgore players, backs Wallace Miller and Forrest Johnson and end Willy Gumert.

Johnson, 5-11, 150, team captain, made all-district while scoring 147 points. Miller, 6 feet, 180, alternated between fullback and halfback, made all-district three years in baseball, and went to the state meet in the 100-yard dash this year. He was senior class president.

Gumert, co-captain and all-district, stands 5-11, weighs 170. A prospective geology student, he was selected to the National Honor Society.

J. Stan Stephen To Graduate From School of Law

J. Stan Stephen, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe C. Stephen, will graduate from the School of Law at the University of Texas Saturday night.

He is a member of the Sigma Alpha Epsilon social fraternity and the Delta Theta Phi Law Fraternity, the latter being the one that the Governor of Texas belongs to. Stan has served in the Legislature for four years, and was employed by the State Industrial Accident Board for one summer while in school.

He will report to Tyler Monday morning where he will be associated with the Humble Oil Company.

Demonstrations On Peanut Planting Set

Three demonstrations on planting peanuts, rolling and spraying a 12 inch band of herbicide behind to kill grass and weed seed as they sprout, will be held on Rising Star farms Monday, June 11 according to County Agent J. M. Cooper and Vocational Agricultural teacher H. L. Geyer of that city.

The demonstrations will begin at 9:30 a.m. with the first demonstration on the J. B. Caudle farm six miles east of Rising Star. The afternoon demonstrations are to be held on the T. J. Wellborn and the Hulon Erwin farms northwest of that city.

The demonstrations are a follow-up to a meeting held in February when the use of the new herbicide in other Southern states was explained. A large number of peanut farmers attended the meeting held in the agricultural building near the high school there at that time and many expressed a desire to see the material tried out.

The new herbicide does not work on other crops, it was explained. If it works as well in this area as in Alabama or Georgia it is expected that it will save one or two cultivations and perhaps one hoeing depending upon the moisture. The cost of the material is negligible. Special equipment is necessary however for the planting and spraying. This will be brought up from either Waco or Houston for the demonstrations.

Peanut farmers in this area are invited to these demonstrations.

BIDS ON WORK TO BE OPENED ON JUNE 12

The State today called for bids on highway work in this area which will include paving of 47 blocks in the City of Eastland.

In all nine miles of construction is scheduled in Eastland and Stephens counties. Bids on the work will be opened in Austin June 12.

Work to be done in Eastland includes re-doing Highway 80 (Main Street) with asphaltic concrete pavement from Hillcrest Avenue to Broughter Street, near the bridge across the Leon River.

Also included in the proposed construction is re-doing of Highway 6 (Seaman Street) from the Texas and Pacific railroad track to the Main and Seaman Street intersection and then from the Main and Seaman Street intersection to Burkett Street.

Work in Eastland will include approximately 47 blocks of paving, including two sides of the downtown square.

Other work to be included in the same bid includes paving from Caddo to the Palo Pinto County line, from the M.K.&T. RR in Cisco to U.S. Highway 80 and from Cisco to Highway 380.

The State today is publishing a legal notice in The Telegram calling for bids on the work.

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

Veterans Asked To Cash Those Old Leave Bonds

DALLAS (Sp.) — Thousands of World War II veterans in Texas are holding Armed Forces Leave Bonds that have drawn no interest for five years or longer, and Uncle Sam would like to pay up — an average of \$200 apiece.
 Jesse L. Adams Jr., state sales director of the U.S. Treasury's Savings Bonds division, has an idea for these ex-G.I.'s who apparently don't need the money right now. He suggests they redeem those Leave Bonds and put the money in Series E Savings Bonds, which pay 3 per cent interest compounded semi-annually when held to maturity of nine years and eight months.
 In the country as a whole, 130,000 veterans hold Leave Bonds worth \$26 million. It's all that's left of more than two billion dollars paid to members of the Armed Forces discharged between April 1943 and October 1, 1946. The five-year bonds, carrying an interest rate of 2 1/2 per cent a year, were used to reimburse veterans for unused leave.
 A special act of Congress in 1947 made the bonds redeemable after September 1 of that year. Some \$1.5 billion were cashed within the next few months; others were held to draw additional interest. However, the last of these matured on October 1, 1951, and have drawn no interest since that date.
 "Now the Treasury would like to clear its books of this bond issue," Mr. Adams said, "and is calling on all veterans' organizations to help locate the 130,000 bond owners. Then when these bonds are cashed, I can think of no better place to put the money than in safe, sure, indestructible United States Savings Bonds And," Mr. Adams added, "if you don't have any Leave Bonds, Savings Bonds are still a good buy."

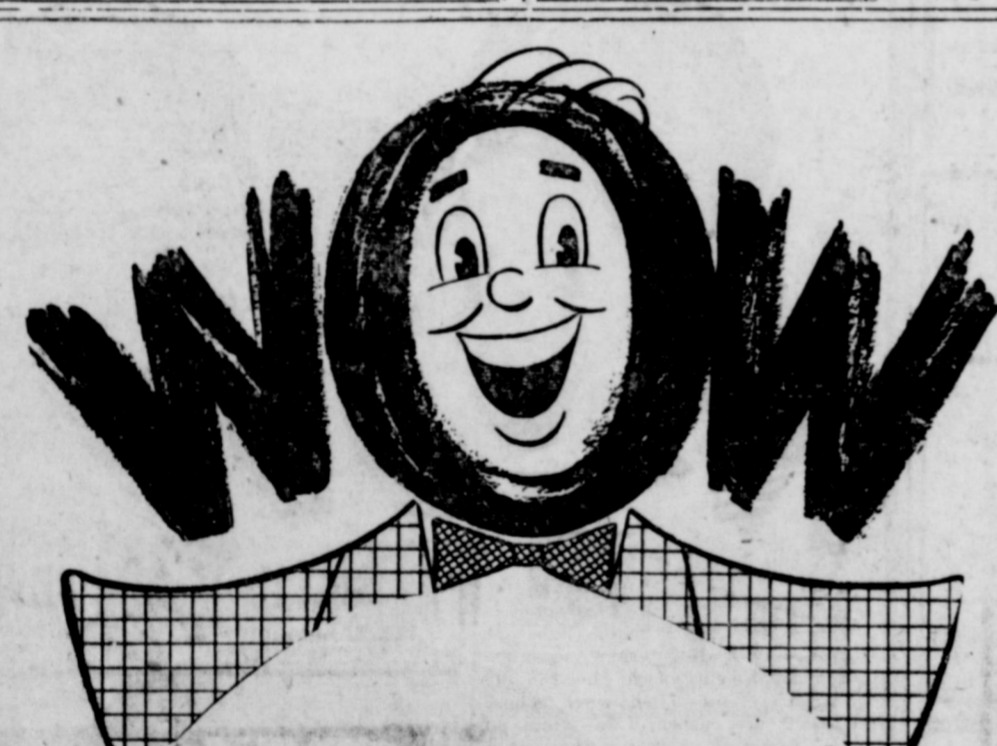

Bible Comment:

Lord's Prayer Is Model Of Perfection

PRAYER and thanksgiving are linked together in Christian life. We cannot be truly thankful except in the spirit of prayer; otherwise our thankfulness may be concerned only with self. Nor can we be prayerful except in the spirit of thanksgiving, for our approach to God is unreal and inadequate unless back of it is what Paul expressed in his cry, "Thanks be to God for His unspeakable gift."

All this is expressed in the Lord's prayer, in the manner in which all prayer should be made.

Let us note a few things concerning this manner. First, the prayer begins with God and with reverence toward Him. The first petition is that of God's kingdom come and the second is that His will may be done in earth as it is in heaven.

It is only upon this high plane that the Christian comes to pray for his own needs, and the Christian's prayer is not for wealth or abundance but for daily bread.

The next petition links the Christian both with his fellow men and with God; as he prays for forgiveness of his own trespasses he asks only that he may be forgiven as he forgives others.

The prayer for deliverance from evil is an expansion of the prayer for forgiveness. And the Lord's prayer ends as it begins, with adoration to God and contemplation of His goodness.

Paul admonished the early Christians to pray without ceasing. It is easy to pray without ceasing this sort of prayer, for it is not only expressed in words but is the constant aspiration of the devout soul.

John F. Collins To Get Medical Degree Friday

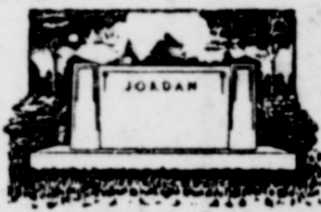

Navy Plans To Recruit Company From This Area

Chief J. P. Tompkins, navy recruiter, announced plans today to recruit a complete company of local area men for service in the Navy. The Abilene area company would enlist under the banner "Mesquite." They will travel together, do recruit training together at San Diego, California, and return home on leave together after nine weeks of recruit training.

Every able-bodied young man faces a military responsibility upon reaching his 18th birthday. Chief Tompkins explains that a voluntary enlistment for four years in the Navy will satisfy all of the active duty requirements and then two years in the inactive reserve, to satisfy his military responsibilities. If he desires to postpone his military service to order to continue in school, deferment is possible in some cases. The local Navy recruiter will be glad to explain this since all young men are encouraged to go on to college if possible. If a man is not eligible for deferment, Chief Tompkins feels that nowhere are there greater opportunities to continue general and specialized training than in the Navy. In fact, most of the men who will make up the "Mesquite" Company, will be high school graduates, and thus be eligible for assignment to schools even before they are sworn into the Navy.

Recruitment of special companies from local areas is nothing new, and has proved to be an excellent policy. The "Texan" Company, composed of young men throughout Northeast Texas, and enlisted into the Navy at Dallas on April 24th, augmented the Navy's strength by 96 men. These "Texans" will be back in Texas on leave around July 4th.


