The blaze was touched off about 3:30 o'clock Sunday afternoon and was not brought under control until about 10:30 p.m.

About 30 firemen from Ran-Eastland and Gorman battled the raging fire with three trucks.

"I bet the wind was blowing 50 miles an hour. Eastland Fire Chief Robinson said. "We couldn't catch it, we just had to wait. It had to go to the road - and then it jumped the road on us!"

The fire started on FR 570 on the old Dr. Weir place, belonging to his daughter, Mrs. Pete A. Jameson, a cattle rancher. A man told officials that he had seen another man who apparently is known by name — stop a car and set the blaze. 



Texas had a total of 10,325 manufacturing plants which added \$6,400,000,000 of value by processing raw materials into finished goods in 1962, according to the "Annual Survey of Manufacturers", recently released by the Bureau of Census.

Figures represent an addipenditure for new plants dur ing a single year. Some 500, 000 plant workers earned a total of \$2,700,000,000 for the year, while 350,000 production workers earned \$1,600,000.

Food processing was the largest employer with 80,239 employees. Biggest investment was made by the chemical industry, with \$167,000,000 in new capital expenditures.

The petroleum refining industry spent \$155,000,000 for plant construction and improvement.




