Lot of 'Paintin' Up, Fixin' Up' Going on in Town This Summer

Hammers and paintbrushes are swinging in Eastland this summer as property improvements are being made by local residents, a survey indicates.

Participation in the current Title I FHA home improvement project being sponsored by building materials dealers and the local bank, is heaviest on record.

The three materials firms, Crowell Lumber Co., Hanna Hardware and Lumber Co., and Higginbotham - Bartlett Lumber Co. and the Eastland National Bank have sponsored the plan through intensive promotion and advertising for the past three years.

More inquiries and resulting building plans have been noted this year than in the two previous years, Grover Hallmark of the bank reports.

"We believe that this is a healthy condition for our town. When our citizens invest their time and money in improving their residences, they are repaid by more comfortable and attractive living accommodations, as well as increasing the value of their property, and the town benefits by having more and more beautiful homes in its bounds," he said.

The FHA plan offers homeowners, and buyers, the opportunity to make extensive improvements and repairs, with long-term, low interest loans, made by the local lending institution, guaranteed by the federal government.

44-Year-Mail Carrier Speck Greer Retiring

The man who has probably plowed more Eastland County creeks, splashed through more of its mud holes and carried the mail to many of its residents, was 70 years old Saturday and is retiring Tuesday.

Walter J. (best known throughout the county as Speck) Greer is turning in his mail sack Tuesday—writing his final letter in 44 years, seven months and 17 days of mail delivery service over country roads in the county.

Back in November of 1919 ("When carrying the mail was the last thing anybody else wanted to do because of the good paying jobs in the oil boom"), Speck started as a substitute ("For \$130 a month.") He was appointed a regular carrier in 1920 and since that time has been one of Carbon's regular rural carriers.

His route was 25 miles long then and he used a horse and buggy ("Which I bought to get the route"), and waded mud, snow and high water to get the mail along its appointed rounds. When Daylight Savings Time came in, a

flashlight became regular equipment to read the addresses so early in the morning, "And we were giving 'em mail delivery before they got up."

After 12 years of walking and using horses and-or mules ("Depending on the weather") he finally began using a Model T Ford. Until rural roads began to improve substantially, Speck used a car a year and sometimes two. The route was extended to 35 miles, then to 38 miles, until in 1952 when Route Two and Route One was consolidated and totaled up to 73.60 miles of delivery.

Born June 27, 1894 near Carbon, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Will Greer, Speck and Mabel Clair Morris of Sidney were married in 1919, the year he came back from service in World War I, and started carrying the mail.

Friends are going to give Speck a little retirement party at his home Wednesday evening and his neighbor, the First Baptist Church in Carbon, has even agreed to move its prayer meeting service up a little so everybody can go over to visit with Speck and Mable. Friends from his route and throughout the county are expected to call that evening. An avid deer hunter, Speck Greer is also known on just about every lease in this area.

The Greers have four children and eight grandchildren. Their children are Mrs. Bill (Joydene) Oliver of Irving; Mrs. Glenn (Marciel) Justice of Carbon; Mrs. Lee (Leatrice) Montgomery of Fort

A violinist, Speck has played at the Carbon Methodist Church for many years where he is active on the Official Board and a Trustee.

He's served under four postmasters and an acting postmaster in Carbon. They were the late Elmer Gilbert, the late Miss Rebecca White, Devoe Dover, the late Willard Trimble, Mrs. Ella Trimble, and the present postmaster, Clifford Gilbert.

Industrial Foundation Is Operating Under Strict Rules and By-Laws

(ED. NOTE: This is another in a series about Eastland's Industrial Foundation Corporation. Beginning with today's article, the by-laws under which the non-profit organization was incorporated, are given.)

BY-LAWS EASTLAND INDUSTRIAL FOUNDATION, INC.

ARTICLE I. (Offices; The principal offices of the corporation shall be in the City of Eastland, County of Eastland, State of Texas.

ARTICLE II. (Members) Section 1. (Qualifications and Basis of Voting) Any person, firm or partnership, corporation, or association of persons may become a member of the corporation upon contribution of \$100.00. Members shall each be allowed one vote in the affairs of the corporation for each \$100.00 so contributed. Each member shall receive from the corporation a membership certificate, showing the amount of his contribution, which certificate shall be transferable as hereinafter provided upon written assignment by the member, and notification to and transfer on the books of the corporation. Upon demand of any member

designated by the Board of Directors in the City of Eastland, State of Texas, at 3:00 P. M. on the second Thursday in September in each and every year, if not a legal holiday, and if a legal holiday, then on the next day not a legal holiday, for the purpose of electing directors and of transacting such other business as may come before the meeting.

The secretary shall cause written notice of the time and the vote on any question before any meeting of the membership shall be by ballot.

Section 2. (Annual Meeting) The annual meeting of the membership of the corporation shall be held at the office of the corporation, or at such other place as may be

place of holding each annual meeting to be mailed, not less than ten (10) days nor more than fifty (50) days prior to such meeting, to each member of record entitled to vote at the time of taking the list of members for such meeting, at such meeting, as such address as appears on the records of the corporation.

Section 3. (Special Meetings) Special meetings of the membership for any purpose, or purposes, other than those regulated by statute, may be called by the president, and shall be called by the president or secretary at the request in writing of a majority of the Board of Directors, or at the request in writing by a majority in interest of members. Such request shall state the purpose or purposes of the proposed meeting.

The secretary shall cause written notice of the time and place of holding each special meeting, indicating briefly the object or objects thereof, to be mailed at least five days before such meeting to each member of record entitled to vote at the time of taking the list of members for such meeting, at such address as appears on the records of the corporation. 'Beware Those Fireworks,' Lions, Sight Society Warn

Fourth of July fireworks have always been a real menace to Eastland County youth, the Texas Society for the Prevention of Blindness and local Lions Clubs reminded parents today in a pre-holiday safety warning.

A random survey in several states by the Society disclosed at least 28 boys and girls who had suffered damaged or blinded eyes in fireworks accidents, said Marcus S. O'Dell, immediate past president of Eastland Lions and member of the Society. The greatest number of these victims fell within the 10-14 year age group and two were children under five years of age, he said.

The Society also warned against the holiday hazards of caps and "harmless" sparklers that burn at more than 1600 degrees and present a constant fire threat.

Mr. O'Dell said the Prevention of Blindness Society offered these suggestions to parents: Check closely on the activities of your children during the holiday period, especially if they have shown an interest in matches, powder or rockets.

If your child has obtained fireworks or gunpowder, confiscate them immediately and make him understand they are dangerous.

Do not buy or use fireworks yourself. Take your displays where fireworks can be enjoyed in safety.

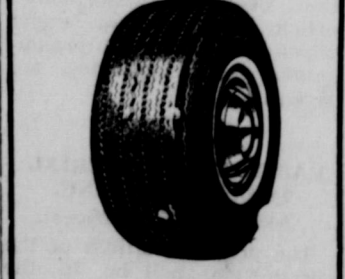

Eye Protection In Class Rooms Is Being Urged

HOUSTON—What may be the first step toward a Texas law to require safety eye protection in school laboratories was taken Friday at a meeting in Houston of the executive committee of the Texas Society for the Prevention of Blindness.

The group unanimously passed a resolution that the State Legislature should enact a law to "require eye protection for teachers and students in all public school classes in laboratories and chemical-physical laboratories."

The Society has asked State Senator Criss Cole, general chairman of the Texas SPB, to introduce such a bill when the legislature convenes in January next year.

Roman Boerger, Dallas, president of the Texas SPB, said that mishaps in school labs and shops ruin many young eyes every year.

"Just as with a worker in an industrial laboratory," Mr. Boerger said, "the difference between blindness and sight for a youth can simply mean the wearing of safety goggles or glasses made with safety lenses in the school lab or workshop."

The proposed bill would be patterned after one recently passed by the state of Ohio, Sen. Cole said.

Support for the bill also will be enlisted from other groups such as the American Legion, Texas Safety Assn., and the Gulf Coast Chapter of American Safety Engineers, Mr. Boerger said.

Big Figures Are Necessary When You Talk Of Oil

June is a time of brides and bridal showers. An appropriate gift for the bride sometimes becomes a difficult decision for friends to make. A choice the bride will appreciate is one or more basic small tools which most homemakers use every day.

The list to select from might include these categories:

Pots and pans: a large chicken fryer, a small frying pan with cover; one-quart, two-quart and three-quart saucepans; an oblong cake pan or large utility pan; a loaf pan; a covered casserole with pie-pan lid; six custard cups; and a coffee maker.

Kitchen tools: a measuring cup or cluster of cups; a set of

measuring spoons, a set of mixing bowls; a perforated mixing spoon; one spatula; a rubber scraper; a paring knife; a vegetable peeler; a vegetable brush; a small strainer; an egg beater; a rolling pin; a can opener; a pancake turner; a long-handled fork; a grater.

Some first additions: A cookie sheet; a cooling rack; a tube cake pan; 2 pie plates, 9-inch size; 2 round cake pans, 8-or-9 inch size; one muffin pan; a teakettle; 1 or more salad or pudding molds; a potato masher; a wooden mixing spoon; a utility knife, and a carving knife.

Now, some tips on how to give him the right styles in a collar for:

The Long, Lean Face: Wide-spread collars with cutaway effects of the point. This makes the neck seem shorter, and the face wider.

The Full Face and Heavy Jaw: Pointed, semi-spread collar, worn low. This gives added length to the face.

The Thin Face: Spread collars that fit moderately high on the neck. This gives added width to the face.

The Round Jovial Face: Collars of medium length and spread, slightly rounded ends. This softens the mouth lines formed by smiling and hearty laughing.

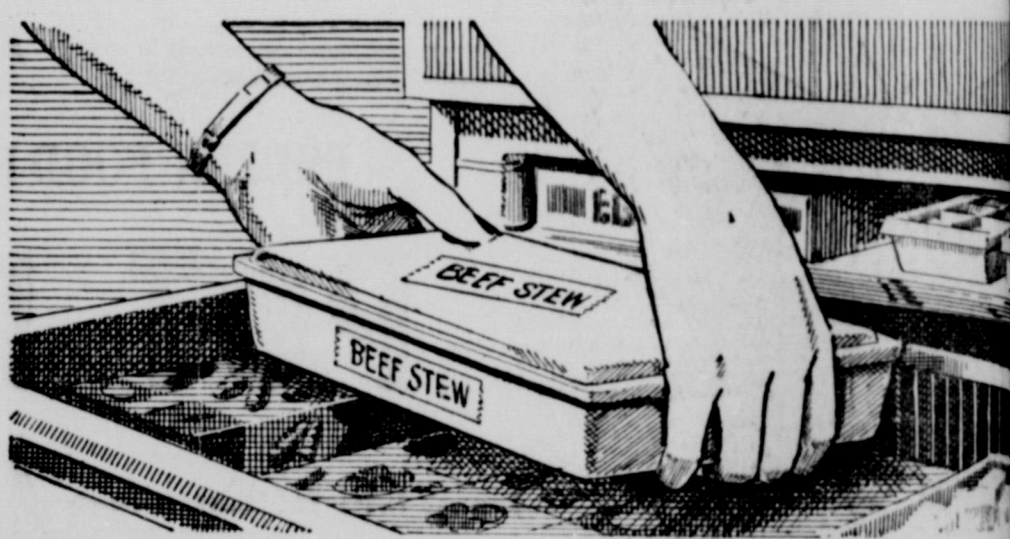

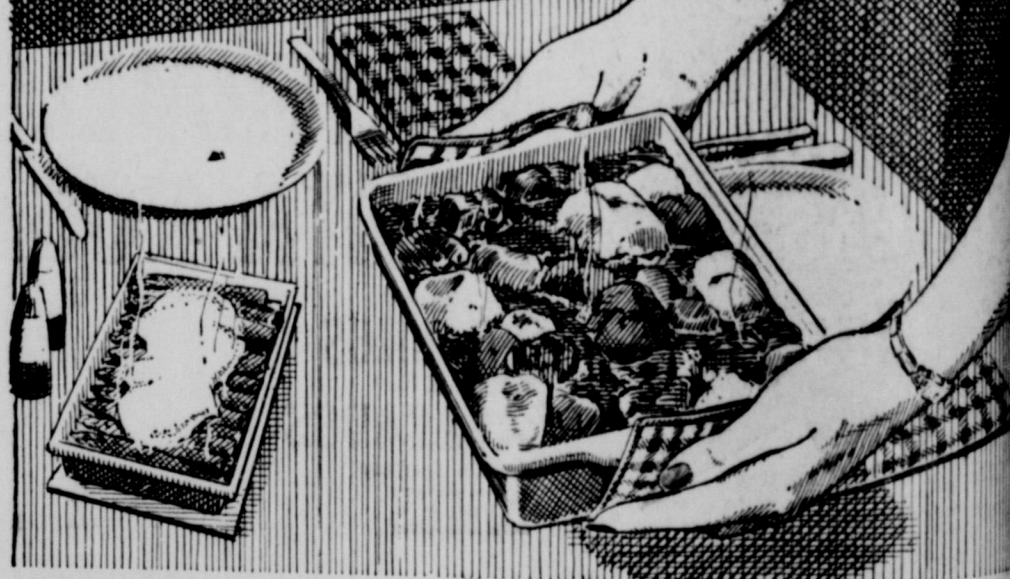

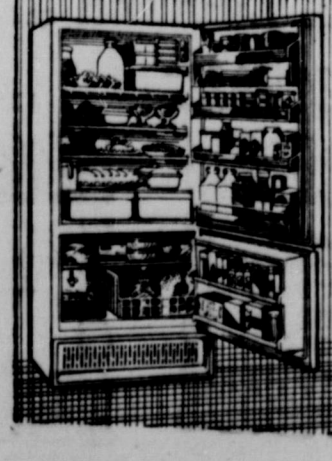

The program of activities includes baseball, swimming, movies, handicraft, camp fires, stunt night, amateur programs and worship services.

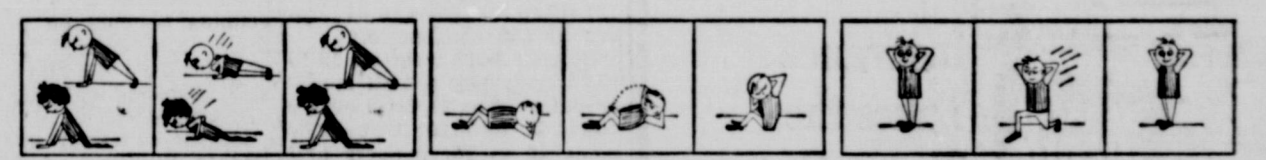
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Regular Exercise Can Provide Both Physical and Mental Tonic, says AMA



Stretcher (4 to 10 times). Reach high, rise on toes. High-stepper (10 to 20 steps). Run in place, pumping knees and arms. Side Bender (6 to 15 times). Raise first one arm then the other straight over head.



Push-up (6 to 15 times). Men on hands and toes; women on hands and knees. Starting in raised position, with trunk and neck straight, lower trunk to two inches from floor and return. Curl (6 to 15 times). Starting on back with knees bent, hands behind head, tuck chin and "curl" as far forward as possible, aiming elbow to opposite toe in place, lower knees. Stride Squat (6 to 15 times). Hands behind head, as stride forward deeply with right leg. Keep left foot in place, left knee off floor. Return and exercise opposite.



Compressor (6 to 15 times). Lie spread-eagled on back. Roll onto hip and with leg and arm straight touch toe to opposite hand. Return and exercise opposite. Twister (6 to 15 times). Sit with legs and arms extended straight. Touch fingers to opposite toe. Return and exercise opposite.

ISOMETRIC EXERCISES —
The following exercises do not involve movement, but rather muscular contractions. One of their advantages is that many can be done at times and places where normal exercise would be impossible, such as in the office. Hold each contraction forcefully for six seconds. Repeating is not necessary.



(1) Organ Grinder. Push hand against hand, then pull hand against hand.
(2) Thinker. Push forehead against palm, then push back of head against palm(s).
(3) Bird. Put back of hand against door jamb, then push palms in the same manner.
(4) Sampson. Push palms against door jams, then straighten arms high against jams and push again.
(5) Sista. Sitting with back against one door jamb, push foot against other side, then push other foot in same manner.

There's more to physical fitness than mere muscles, but you can't be truly healthy and a bundle of flab at the same time.

To be physically fit you must be both medically fit and dynamically fit. The two don't necessarily go hand in hand, points out Raymond L. White, M.D., director of Environmental Medicine and Medical Services for the American Medical Association.

"Medical fitness means body soundness. This can be determined only by a medical examination. Dynamic fitness or 'action capacity' is a measurement of strength, agility and endurance," he said.

"A person who shuns activity may get a 'clean bill of health' from his doctor but if he can't endure even slight exertion, he's hardly physically fit. On the other hand, neither is the athlete with a chronic or undetected health problem."

In a sense it seems silly to be concerned about strength and endurance in a push-button age.

But the fact is, the human body was not designed for push buttons but for work, said Dr. White. "The absence of dynamic fitness through lack of physical exertion is a detriment to health. Furthermore, muscle tone, or lack of it, can be a factor in your whole outlook on life."

Strength and endurance, developed through regular exercise, leads to skill and agility and adds to poise and grace. Not only do daily tasks become easier, you also look better and so feel more at ease in social situations.

Even more evident, however, are the benefits to physical health, Dr. White pointed out.

Since exercise is a factor in weight control, it indirectly aids in preventing degenerative diseases, such as diabetes and arthritis, which are more prevalent in the obese.

Evidence indicates that exercise also may help prevent heart and blood vessel diseases. Active people have fewer heart attacks and a better recovery rate when such attacks do occur.

The best exercise is enjoyable exercise. Activities such as hiking, swimming, skiing, tennis or gardening along with their physical benefits can provide relief from tension, thus serving as a safe, natural tranquilizer.

When there is no opportunity for taking exercise in such form, however, a daily walk and series of calisthenics can provide much the same tonic.

Above are a few examples of scientifically sound exercises, taken from the AMA pamphlet, "Physical Fitness." Used daily, they will help to increase muscular strength, body suppleness and motor reaction, and to improve circulation and other body functions.

Start out slowly, Dr. White warned, and gradually work up to the point where you can do all of these exercises quickly without stopping.

Eye Protection In Class Rooms Is Being Urged

HOUSTON—What may be the first step toward a Texas law to require safety eye protection in school laboratories was taken Friday at a meeting in Houston of the executive committee of the Texas Society for the Prevention of Blindness.

The group unanimously passed a resolution that the State Legislature should enact a law to require eye protection for teachers and students in all public school classes in industrial and chemical-physical laboratories.

The Society has asked State Senator Criss Cole, general chairman of the Texas SPB, to introduce such a bill when the legislature convenes in January next year.

Roman Boerger, Dallas, president of the Texas SPB, said that mishaps in school labs and shops ruin many young eyes every year.

"Just as with a worker in an industrial laboratory," Mr. Boerger said, "the difference between blindness and sight for a youth can simply mean the wearing of safety goggles or glasses made with safety lenses in the school lab or workshop."

The proposed bill would be patterned after one recently passed by the state of Ohio, Sen. Cole said.

Support for the bill also will be enlisted from other groups such as the American Legion, Texas Safety Assn., and the Gulf Coast Chapter of American Coast Engineers, Mr. Boerger said.

appears on the records of the corporation. Section 5. (Quorum) At any meeting of the membership for which due notice has been given, twenty-five (25) percent in interest (as determined by the amounts of their respective contributions to the capital of the corporation) of the members, present in person or represented by proxy, shall constitute a quorum of the membership for all purposes unless the representation of a larger number shall be required by law, by the charter or by these by-laws, and in such cases the representation of the number so required shall constitute a quorum.

If such a quorum of the members shall fail to attend in person or by proxy, at the time and place of meeting, the chairman of the meeting, or a majority in interest of the members present in person or by proxy, may adjourn the meeting from time to time without notice other than by announcement at the meeting, until the number of members requisite to constitute a quorum shall attend. At any such adjourned meeting, at which a quorum shall be present, any business may be transacted which might have been transacted at the meeting as originally notified.

Section 5. (Organization) The president shall call meetings of the members to order and shall act as chairman of such meetings. The Board of Directors or the members may appoint any member to act as chairman of any meeting in the absence of the president and vice-presidents.

The secretary-treasurer of the corporation shall act as secretary at all meetings of the members, but, in the absence of the secretary-treasurer, the presiding officer may

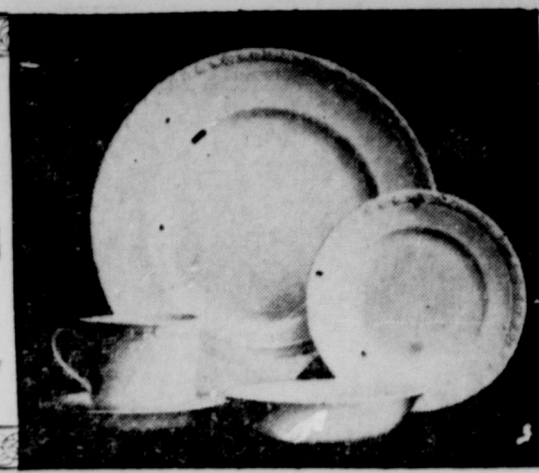

BROWSING with BEV.....

June is a time of brides and bridal showers. An appropriate gift for the bride sometimes becomes a difficult decision for friends to make. A choice the bride will appreciate is one or more basic small tools which most homemakers use every day.

The list to select from might include these categories:

Pots and pans: a large chicken fryer, a small frying pan with cover; one-quart, two-quart and three-quart saucepans; an oblong cake pan or large utility pan; a loaf pan; a covered casserole with pie-pan lid; six custard cups; and a coffee maker.

Kitchen tools: a measuring cup or cluster of cups; a set of

measuring spoons, a set of mixing bowls; a perforated mixing spoon; one spatula; a rubber scraper; a paring knife; a vegetable peeler; a vegetable brush; a small strainer; an egg beater; a rolling pin; a can opener; a pancake turner; a long-handled fork; a grater.

Some first additions: A cookie sheet; a cooling rack; a tube cake pan; 2 pie plates, 9-inch size; 2 round cake pans, 8-or-9 inch size; one muffin pan; a teakettle; 1 or more salad or pudding molds; a potato masher; a wooden mixing spoon; a utility knife, and a carving knife.

Now, some tips on how to give him the right styles in a collar for:

The Long, Lean Face: Wide-spread collars with cutaway effects of the point. This makes the neck seem shorter, and the face wider.

The Full Face and Heavy Jaw: Pointed, semi-spread collar, worn low. This gives added length to the face.

The Thin Face: Spread collars that fit moderately high on the neck. This gives added width to the face.

The Round Jovial Face: Collars of medium length and spread, slightly rounded ends. This softens the mouth lines formed by smiling and hearty laughing.

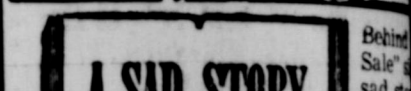

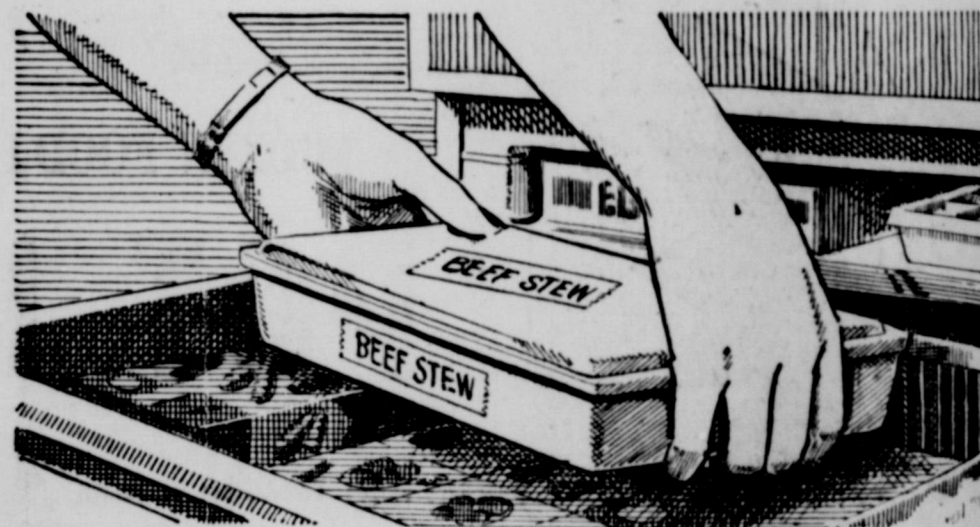

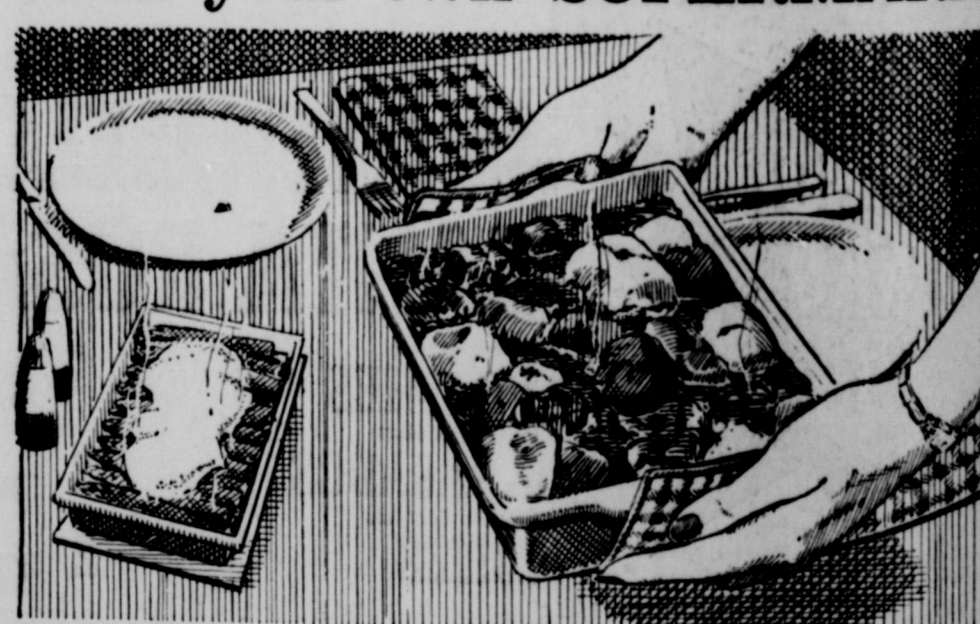
