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Local Teachers To Attend Meet Of Homemakers

Miss Loretta Morris, homemaker teacher at Eastland High School, and Mrs. Elizabeth Vaughn, homemaker teacher at Olden High School, will participate in the State In-Service Education Conference for Homemaking Teachers to be held in San Antonio, August 3-7. The meeting, with the theme, "A Forward Look at the Vocational Purposes of Homemaking Education," will open with the first general session on Monday evening, Aug. 3, in the Granada Hotel Ballroom.

Approximately 1,000 homemaker teachers are expected in San Antonio for the conference. The homemaker education program in the state is under the direction of the Division of Homemaking Education, State Department of Education, with Miss Ruth Huey, Director of the Division. Teachers meet annually for the state-wide conference followed by area meetings, for

training in new developments and trends in homemaking education.

During the five-day training conference, emphasis will be given to provisions of the Vocational Act of 1963, and to the contributions of homemaking education in the preparation of youth and adults for the occupation of homemaking and for occupations involving home economics knowledge and skills. Teachers will explore the concept and generalizations approach to teaching, and identify the basic subject matter in homemaking education.
