Church Unity Encouraged By Rotary Speaker

Dr. Dudley Strain, pastor of the First Christian Church, Lubbock spoke to the Rotary Club here Monday, telling about his participation in a speaking ministry in the Orient last year, and made a strong plea for church unity.

Rev. Strain, father of Mrs. C. W. Hoffman Jr., called the conference an "international, inter-cultural, inter-faith and inter-denominational meeting.

International in that so many countries participated; inter-cultural in that it was a contrast of East-West; inter-faith because of the prevailing Japanese religions, Buddhists and Shinto; and inter-denominational because many denominations participated.

He described the increasing similarity of the Japanese habits and mores to the West — until five p. m. when the Western influence is dropped and the Japanese return to their own customs of community baths, and oriental leisure.

Dr. Strain warned, too, of an increase in a militant sect which claims ten million followers in Japan.

Bernard Hanna was program chairman and Club President Rev. Cyrus Barcus presided and introduced Dr. Strain who spoke Sunday in the pulpit of Rev. Barcus at First Methodist Church.

Church unity was stressed by the Lubbock minister, who said that individually the denominations can not hope to make an impact on this generation, at home or abroad.

Guests introduced by Secretary Kenneth Thompson were Gordon Smith of Brownwood (formerly of Eastland); A. I. Anderson, Standlee McCracken and Eris Ritchie, all of Cisco; Terry Rankin of Commerce; Tom Staggs; and C. W. Hoffman Jr.

"The things that divide us or not as great as the things that join us," Dr. Strain in connection with his church unity plea.

Unplanted Land Due To Drought Won't Penalize Area Farmers

Farmers who have not planted at least 75 per cent of their 1964 cotton and peanut allotments due to extreme drought conditions or other conditions beyond their control may file written requests that the planting provisions be waived, according to an announcement by Jesse G. Meredith, Eastland County office manager of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

Requests concerning cotton allotments must be filed not later than Sept. 15, and peanut farmers must file by Nov. 1, Mr. Meredith said. Questions about the provision can be answered at his office.

Feed grain farmers were reminded that in order to qualify for price support and diverted acreage payments, the feed grain base or permitted acreage may not be exceeded on any farm in which they have an interest. They must also be within their conserving base on participating farms, Mr. Meredith added.

The 1965 Community Committee election will be held on Sept. 8. Nominations by petition are now being accepted through Aug. 19, it was reported.

Mystery Skeleton Still Unclaimed By Relatives

The skeleton of what is believed to be the body of a Mexican ranch hand Jesse Torres, is still unclaimed at County Sheriff's office, according to a report from Sheriff Lee Horn.

The skeleton was found July 6 in a pasture leased by R. M. Sneed about seven miles from Eastland near the Yellow Mound community. The skeleton which had apparently never been buried, was in natural order and was found with a black sport tie shoe, with white laces and some of the toe bones still inside. The shoe was in fairly good condition considering exposure.

The head of the skeleton provided practically the only clue to the identity containing four gold capped teeth including two bridged teeth. Efforts were made to identify the skeleton through a dentist in Weatherford believed to have done dental work on the teeth of the Mexican laborer.

The mystery was considered solved when the wife of the laborer, Mrs. Jesse Torres of Quanah, called and claimed the skeleton. She was expected in Eastland almost two weeks ago to claim the body and was to have been accompanied by a Catholic priest from Quanah.

Since no word has been heard from the woman, the local sheriff's office contacted the Quanah sheriff recently and has not yet received an answer.

The Mexican farm hand disappeared from the Gordon Woods ranch near Cisco and an intensive search for him was conducted near the Yellow Mound community, thus it was believed that the skeleton was his.

A positive identification is expected when Mrs. Torres arrives and identifies the dental work in the skeleton's teeth, authorities said.

JIM WHITEHEADS RETURN FROM TRIP TO NEW YORK

Mr. and Mrs. Jim Whitehead, grand award winners in the April-May "Chevy Sales Fair Contest" have returned from the trip to the World's Fair and to Nassau, with one word to sum it up, "Wonderful".

Approximately 86 winners in the Dallas zone and their wives made the trip. Chevrolet chartered a World Airways 707 Jet which carried the winners 4,500 miles in 7 hours and 31 minutes actual flying time.

The Whiteheads drove to Dallas July 16th to meet with the others for breakfast at Love Field at 6:30 a.m. on the 17th and departed at 7:30 p.m.

Lunch was served on the plane and the group arrived at John F. Kennedy Airport at 12 noon EST, and boarded a

chartered Greyhound bus to the Rodman St. Gate No. 7 at the World's Fair in New York. The afternoon was spent touring the fairgrounds and the group met at 6:30 p.m. at the Hawaii Pavilion for Luau (dinner) and a very colorful Polynesian show.

They were registered at the Statler Hilton Hotel and had breakfast there in the South Wing dining room. They were then taken on a two hour guided tour of the General Motors Exhibition. Following the tour, they were free to go anywhere until the dinner hour which was served in the Main dining room of the Hotel.

The Whiteheads and three other couples took a cruise aboard a Circle Liner on Hudson Bay around Manhattan Island, which was 35 miles long and circled the Statue of Liberty.

Before departing for Nassau on July 19th, they took a taxi tour of New York, where they visited Central Park, Times Square, Greenwich Village and China Town.

They arrived in Nassau at 6 p.m. and immediately upon arrival at the Emerald Beach Hotel a welcoming cocktail reception was held on the patio.

Next day they were taken on a tour of the island, which is 7 miles wide and 21 miles long with many historical places, such as the Anglican Church, the oldest on the island, the Water Tower which was 2,160 feet above sea level and from the observation deck you can see almost everything on the Island. The tour took them by Princess Margaret Hospital, with a memorial wing built for King George IV, and by Fort Charlotte, which was built during King George III reign in 1789. The fort was used in the wars between Napoleon which began in 1791. The cannons were never fired however, and the Fort was in good repair. The tour ended with a Smorgasbord lunch at the Royal Victoria Hotel.

The afternoon was spent shopping in the downtown markets and a "Go Native" party at the Emerald Beach Hotel was held on the beach. Entertainment was provided by Sudanese dancers, a steel band, and bongo drums, followed by a Limbo exhibition.

They left Nassau airport July 21 and arrived at Love Field in Dallas at 7 p.m. "We were happy to have had the opportunity to make the trip but we were leaving Dallas for Eastland and really looking forward to getting home. Just wish we could have brought some rain and beautiful green scenery back with us from Nassau," Mrs. Whitehead said.

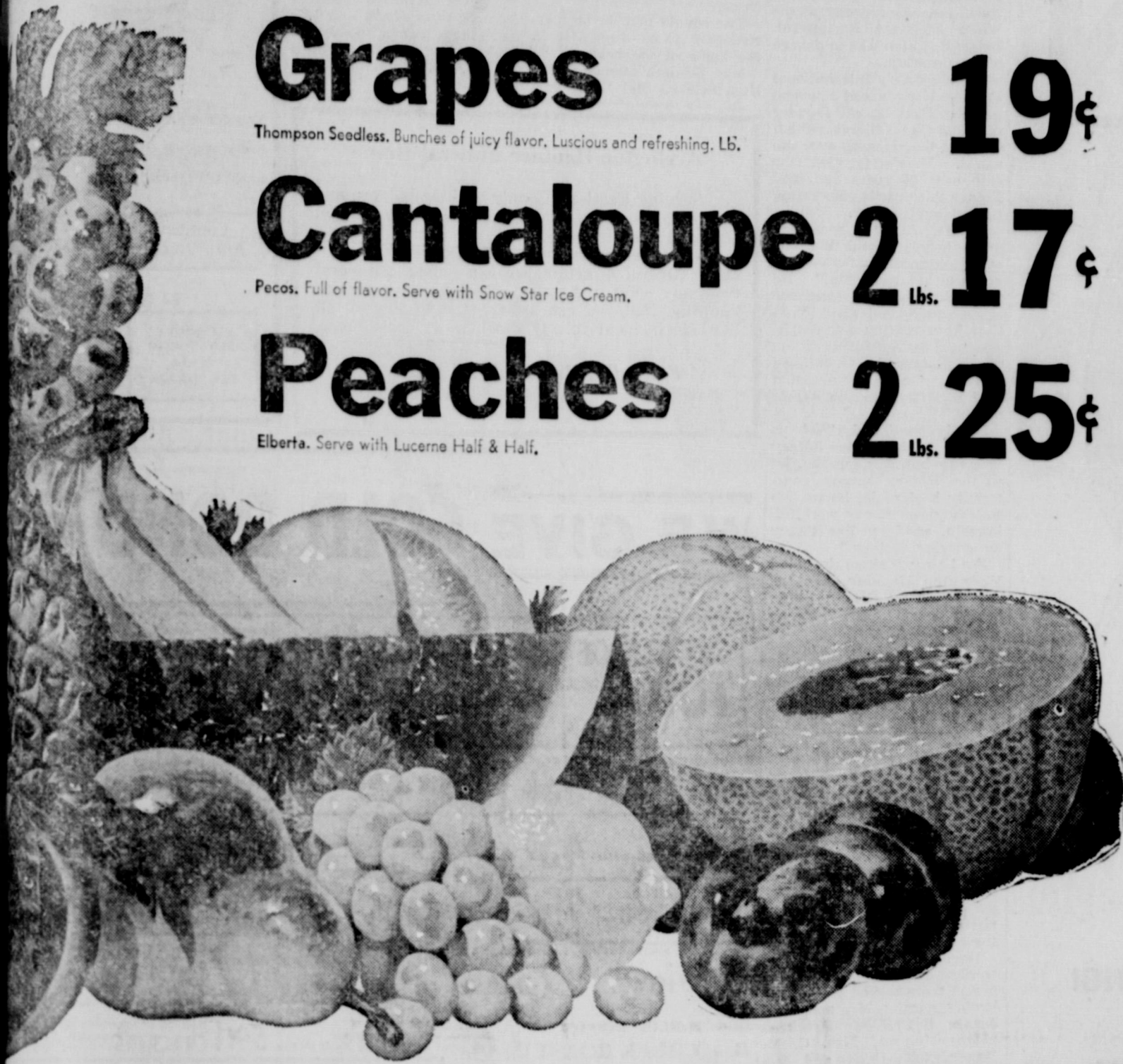

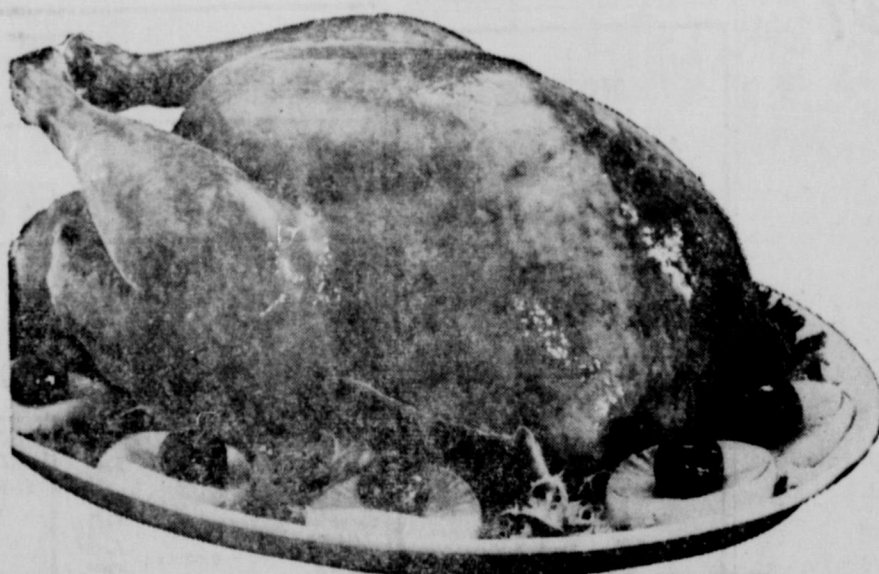

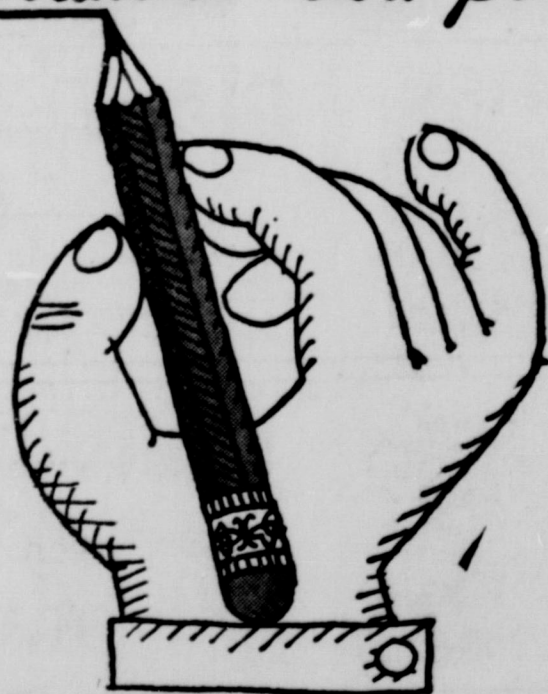
