

Scribe Reports Albany Is Pick For 10-A Title

The Albany Lions will repeat as schoolboy grid champions of District 10-A this fall. And it's a toss up between Ranger High's Bulldogs and Baird High's Bears for the second spot in the seven-member loop.

The Eastland Mavericks will wind up the season in sixth place — just one step out of the cellar.

At least that's the prognostication of Mike Wester, Abilene Reporter-News sports writer, following a poll of opinion of area coaches attending the Texas Coaching School in Fort Worth.

Clyde Bulldogs were rated fourth in the 10-A circuit. DeLeon Bears fifth, Eastland Mavericks sixth, and Cross Plains Buffaloes seventh.

Coach Millard Glass reported that his charges will begin workouts Monday.

Here's Wester's summation of the situation with initial workout time for the District 10-A high school grid squads.

"Tradition, line experience and power are all found in the Albany Lions this year as the defending champs call upon fullback Joe Joyce to move to quarterback and Charles Brewster to take over the power position in the attack. The Lions have 13 lettermen back, seven of them starters. However, a new type of offensive built around power plays and not speed and passing is expected to carry Albany this season.

"Ranger returns 11 lettermen, nine of them regulars while Baird has 15 lettermen and eight starters back. Fullback Richard Windham and guard Bruce Bell top the Baird roster of hopefuls.

"Clyde's Bulldogs have Rick Dennis at halfback in an attempt to improve on last year's 5-5 showing as 17 lettermen are back this season.

USDA Okays Grazing Soil Bank Acreage As Drought Assistance

Approval for emergency haying and grazing privileges on diverted cropland because of the severe drought in Eastland County has been granted in Washington Cong. Omar Burleson announced, and procedures for securing local permission were expected to be given immediately by the local Agricultural Stabilization Conservation Service office.

A telegram from Cong. Burleson received by this newspaper Monday said: "Eastland County today approved for haying and grazing privileges on diverted cropland, through October 31, account drought."

Gilbert Meredith, local ASCS office manager, talked with the state disaster committee headquarters Monday afternoon by telephone and reported that although the state office had not received the official approval, officials expected it momentarily.

Meredith had estimated that there are about 10,000 acres in the county presently diverted and that approximately 7,500 acres of this has good, acceptable cover which will be of immeasurable benefit for stock.

Minimum cost to stockmen for grazing the diverted land will be \$1 per acre per month

on diverted grazing land and conservation reserve (soil bank) acreage. Haying cost will be one-half of the annual payment rate, he said. Some of the diverted land has good cover and some doesn't, he said. "Our records indicate the quality of the cover and landowners will be charged on the basis of the quality at the \$1 minimum." This cost, he said, may initially seem high, but will be found to be considerably less than in buying and hauling in feed stuffs.

Persons must fill out the necessary forms in the Eastland office and make arrangements for payment before grazing of the diverted lands is permitted, Meredith warned. He stated that envelopes are addressed to all eligible persons in the county, and official notice of the program will be sent as soon as word is received by the local office.

There are presently 225 farms under the feed grain diverted program in the county; 43 in the conservation reserve; and 53 in wheat diversion. Making a total of 321 farms.

The county's request for emergency livestock feed assistance because of the drought was denied by the state disaster committee recently. Approximately three and a quarter million pounds of feed was delivered in the county last spring under an emergency feed assistance program.

The county disaster committee forwarded a second appeal for the feed assistance program last week and County Judge Scott Bailey urged the Farmers Home Administration to assist local qualified farmers and ranchers in securing low-interest loans through that agency.

'Crittter' No Hoax, Says Former Area Resident In Letter To Newspaper

A railway mail clerk who travels through Ranger and area regularly on Texas & Pacific passenger trains believes that the "Caddo critter" actually exists.

The former Ranger area resident, Thomas R. Blair of 2733 South Adams St., Fort Worth, was quoted in The Star-Telegram Tuesday morning as saying "it is absolutely no hoax."

Another quote: "All the money in this world for the past 46 years wouldn't get me to enter a certain canyon east of Ranger." Blair apparently is referring to Wiles Canyon. Many Ranger residents assert that there are a number of yet unexplored areas in the canyon.

Blair wrote a letter to the Fort Worth Star-Telegram and it appeared in the Tuesday morning edition.

Here is what it said: "Recently I have been reading about the so-called Thing near Caddo. For almost 50 years now I have known of this monster, although I really never did see it. As a boy I lived near Ranger, which is just beyond Caddo. A few miles east of the city there was and still is a small lake in which I went swimming long ago. One day several of us local boys were in the water when we heard a mighty scream or growl and not so far away. We quickly grabbed our clothes and took off for Ranger. I could see no honor in lagging behind so I led the parade.

"Some of the old-timers told

us that there was a monster in those canyons and now for 40-odd years I have believed it. All the money in this world for the past 46 years wouldn't get me to enter a certain canyon east of Ranger. I was made a believer once and for all that something really did exist and I'm convinced it still does.

"It's no secret that I am afraid to stand in the door of the T&P mail car on which I work when it is traveling this sector. Just what this Thing is I don't know and am one that isn't trying to find out. But it is absolutely no hoax."

A Drought-Centered Plan For Livestock Operations

"Keeping livestock operations flexible so needed changes can be made to protect grass resources during the present drought has been worth a lot to us," says conservation ranchers in the Upper Leon Soil Conservation District.

These same ranchers agree that having enough reserve grass and forage to go through one or more years of

drought adds a lot of stability to the ranching enterprise. "You don't have to depend on that certain rain to be sure you can keep your cattle for the next three months," they say.

They have also found that leaving enough leaf surface so the grasses can do a good job of feeding themselves and store food for future growth is very important. Soil Conservation (Continued on Page 6)

The Lopez child's life was the third claimed by drowning at Lake Leon, according to records here.

County To Get \$32,196 For Use In Road Projects

These funds are made available each year through a surplus accumulated in the road bond indebtedness fund. The funds may be spent only on improving county lateral road systems. Each precinct will receive a little over \$8,000.

Lincoln Slavery Letter Passed to Eastlander

A copy of a letter from Abraham Lincoln to her great-grandfather was received this past weekend by Mrs. Cyrus (Ann) Justice while visiting relatives in San Antonio. Copies of the letter were distributed to the children.

The letter, clearly legible and written on both sides of a single sheet, was addressed to A. H. Stephens, Mrs. Justice's late great-grandfather. Dated Springfield, Ill., Dec. 22, 1860, it was apparently written shortly after Lincoln's nomination and in reply to a letter from Mr. Stephens.

The letter follows: "My Dear Sir— "For your own eyes only (underlined.) "Your obliging answer to my short note is just received, and for which please accept my thanks — I fully appreciate the present peril the coun-

try is in, and the weight of responsibility on me. "Do the people of south really entertain fears that a republican administration would, directly (underlined), or indirectly (underlined), interfere with the slaves, or with them, about their slaves? If they do I wish to assure you, as once a friend, and still, I hope, not any an enemy, that (Continued on Page 2)

there is no cause for such fears — "The south would be in no more danger in this respect than it was in the days of Washington. I suppose, this does not meet the case — you think slavery is right and ought to be extended; while we think it is wrong (underlined) and ought to be restricted — that I suppose is the rule — it certainly is the only substantial difference between us. "Yours very truly, "A. Lincoln."

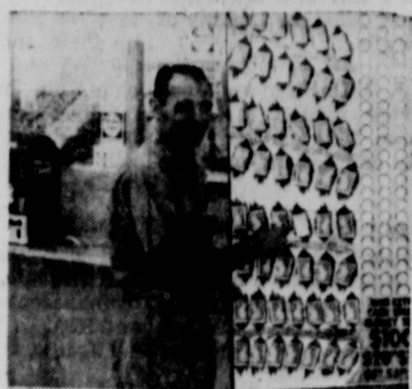

Boyce House Museum

A Boyce House museum for Eastland? That's the topic of discussion by several Eastland people right now, and it seems a logical idea. But shouldn't Eastland be the site for the perfect memorial to this man, who during his lifetime became "Mr. Texas" near and far? His Tall Texas tales were famous and his typewriter put the county's oil boom and Old

Rip's exploits down on paper for all the world to enjoy. Eastland was his ballewac. His career began and blossomed here — giving all the credence in the world to the idea of a museum to his memory here. That period, which he recorded so well is the crux of the county's history.

The goof people in Ranger are well along with their project of establishing an oil museum and boom town. They are on the path toward "making the most of their history." If Eastland were to establish a Boyce House museum, there's every reason to believe that the Ranger folk would help us, as we should help them with their plans, because the ideas go together. There are many segments to the oil boom. Boyce House was one of them, and Ranger and Eastland could work together to help commemorate the total picture. Eastland's entre to the late Mr. House

would of course also include Old Rip. Would the beloved Old Rip story "gotten off the ground" had it not been for Boyce House? Who knows. He certainly didn't do anything to discredit the story, did he?

He wrote too of Cisco's Santa Claus Band Robbery and the Big Dam Lobos.

But most important of all, perhaps, is the fact that he lived here; knew people; and was well known by many, many people — many who fortunately are still here and who could contribute ideas, moments and history to such a museum.

If it's done in time. Regrettable of course, Eastlanders slipped when they didn't ban together and declare a museum for Mr. House at the time of his death. Now the personal collections, artifacts and treasures of Mr. House are housed in another abode.

But even so, considering the natural setting (His typewriter used to clack in the old Oil Belt News Building which still stands) for such a museum — is it too late?

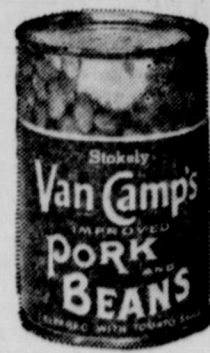

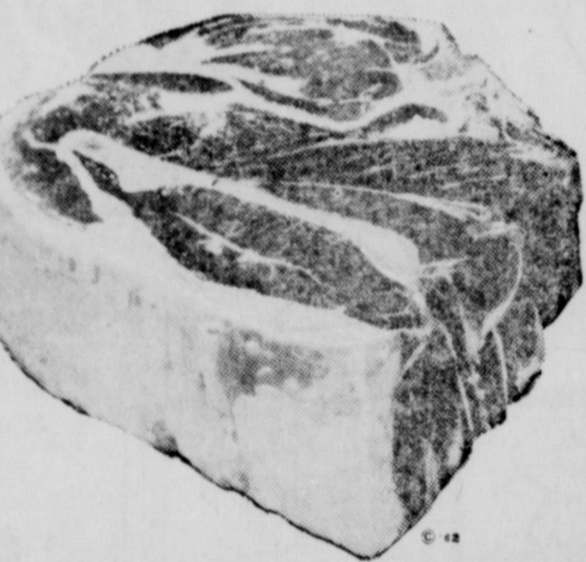

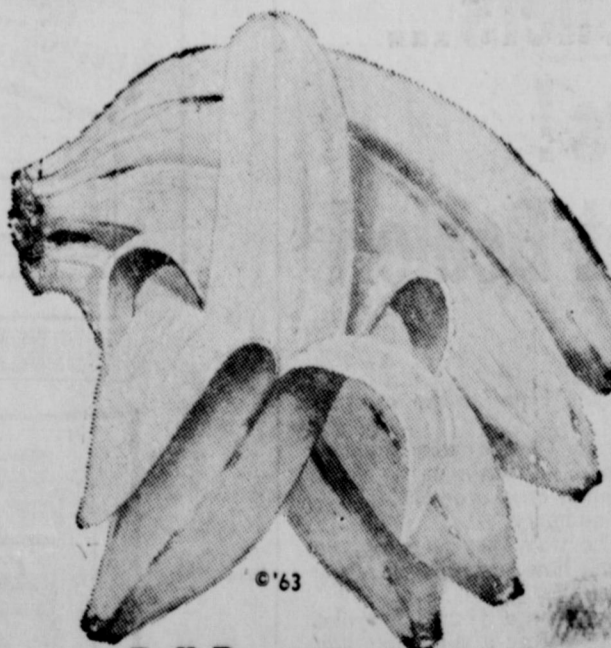

vation Service technicians say the plant cover on the land holds moisture where it falls and prevents soil erosion.

Experience has also proven that regulating livestock numbers to control grazing use on grasses will conserve the grass resource which is the foundation for the ranching industry.

Operations can be kept flexible by carrying 60 to 70 per cent of a base herd of breeding animals such as mother cows that can be safely grazed on the ranch and still use no more than 50 per cent of the annual growth of the grasses. The remaining livestock are made up of readily salable livestock such as stockers, steers or lambs. These can be disposed of at the beginning of a drought or the rancher can choose not to run them through the winter if forage production has been below normal. A rancher who has a stocker, steer or lamb operation has the most flexibility because he can elect to sell early or not buy at all.

Others gain flexibility by always keeping a reserve of livestock feed. This can be in the form of stored hay or silage or excess grass on the rangeland. Some plant cropland to hybrid sudans or perennial grasses such as, coastal bermuda, switchgrass, blue panic or weeping lovegrass for summer grazing. This will allow ranges to rest during the summer and increase the forage reserve. Excess grass on the rangeland can be deferred pastures or ranges stocked for less than average forage production or rainfall. This will enable the rancher to go through a 3 to 6 month drought without having to sell livestock when there is a "run" on the market and prices are depressed. Then he can sell his livestock at
