#### "MY WORK IS DONE-WHY WAIT?" George Eastman, the kodak king and one of the indus-

trial and financial leaders of America if not the world, finished his career at 77. His closest friend, Lewis B. Jones, vice president of the Eastman Kodak company, furnished the epitaph for his chief after the end had come when he George Eastman played the game to the last. By his

hand he lived his life and by his own hand he ended it." His life had been a romance and his career had been startling in its achievements. He found the camera a crude and raw thing. He made it one of the great industries of civilization. He achieved vast wealth. He was not money mad, he was not miserly. After success had come to him he gave more than \$75,000,000 to the city where he had amassed his fortune, to schools and colleges, to dental dispensaries in foreign lands, to the cause of education where young men could be trained along practical lines, and in the dark hours of the World War his remaining miljor were at the command of the government.

More than three years ago he was stricken. His physical power had broken. He was face to face with the messenger of death. His brain was as clear as ever. He put his household in order, he divested himself of his vast holdings, he had been the very soul of generosity with his dealings with his employes and business associates. He had been charitable to a fault. Men said of him that he had been just to all his fellows, rich or poor or high or low. There was no chance for recovery. He was on the brink. This was the note he pinned before he stepped out into the unknown: 'To my friends-my work is done. Why

American financiers say that his business affairs were most satisfactory. He had no worries of a financial nature. There were no blowholes in the structure of the great Eastman Kodak corporation. He had wisely planned everything. Then he stepped aside and the men whom he had named to conduct his colossal business will carry on as George Eastman carried on ever since he began active life in his boyhood as a messenger boy at a salary of \$3 per week. His biographer declared when all was over it was the ambtion of the life of this masterful industrial leader and financier to die as poor in purse as he was when he started out a little wage earner more than 65 years ago. Did he make the grade

### THRILLING EVENTS THE WORLD OVER

Germany cast 38,000,000 votes in the most exciting election in its history and President Von Hindenburg lacked a majority of only 168,000 over all. This was an historical event. It let the world know that Germany is determined to walk in the path that is sane and safe. In the wake of the election came the suicide of Ivar Krueger, the Swedish match king. He was widely known in financial circles the world over. His financial concern had loaned \$250,000. 000 to 12 nations. He owed \$80,000,000 in short time notes to Americans. American bankers refused to carry. French cankers offered to carry and make the necessary advance but the demands of the bankers the match king considered very exacting and he calmly snuffed out the candle of life. Then the third day after Von Hindenburg astounded the world by the largeness of his vote and his nearness to one of the greatest personal victories in modern times. George Eastman, a king of industry and a king of finance, feeling that his work has been done and that disease was wrecking his frame, ended it all, leaving this interrogatory behind him in a short note, "Why wait?" Ivar Krueger in his youth won his start in America—a construction hand in Chicago, a contractor for great buildings the republic over. Later the organization of independent match companies in Sweden, and then loans to the rest of the world secured from grants on monopolies on the match business.
