

Yes. His net income from farm operations is \$400 or more and the total amount of his exemp-For to be carnally minded is tions is more than his income, then he would be required to pay self-employment tax but would owe no income tax.

4. What is the self-employment tax rate for farmers?

If, in the taxable year, he receives no wages subject to social security taxes and his self-employment net earnings from farm ing for the year are at least \$400 and no more than \$4,200, the entire amount is subject to the 3 per cent rate.

5. Are farm rents, as such, subject to self-employment tax? No. If the landowner rents his land receiving a crop share or the proceeds thereof, under the ordinary crop-sharing arrangement, he is considered to be receiving rentals from real estate, and such rentals are excluded from net earnings for self-employment.




