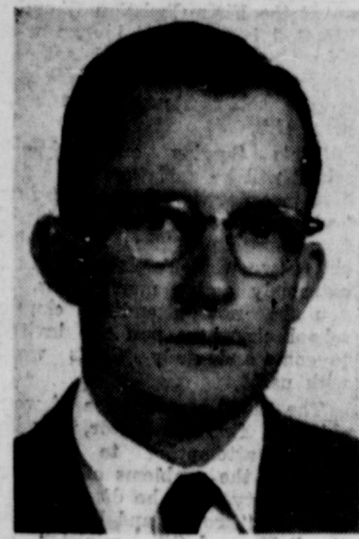


# Sayer, Freschlag And Mrs. M. Anderson Are Staff Of United Fund

Mr. Branton died in a Houston hospital. He became ill while visiting a son, Hosea Branton, at Pasadena, Texas.

Funeral services were conducted by the Rev. Willie Hazel, pastor of the church. He is survived by the three sons and four daughters. The sons are L. N. and G. L. Branton of Odessa, and Hosea of Pasadena. The daughters are Mrs. J. T. Price of Tahoka, Mrs. N. G. Parker of Port Lavaca, Mrs. A. L. Buchanan of Rising Star and Mrs. Aaron Robinson of Houston. One son, Garland, and a daughter, Mrs. Ruth Freeman, are deceased. Two brothers, G. L. Branton and Ding Branton, both of Knox City, and a sister, Mrs. Leonard Roberts of Knox City, also survive.

Mr. Branton was born in Bastrop, Texas, on May 5, 1878. He operated Branton's gin north of Rising Star during the period when the section was a cotton growing area and closed it down about 1925 when cotton largely passed from the local agricultural scene.

## Little League Sets Up Survey On Needs For Building Park

A survey committee was appointed at a meeting of the Little League Association Friday night to determine what all was needed and what would be the cost of building the new Little League ball park for use of the young ball players this coming season.

Appointed in the committee were Travis Wheat, Dan Finch, J. A. Carter, R. M. Sneed and L. C. Kinard.

The committee has been instructed to make the survey and report back at another town-wide meeting which has been set for next Friday night, Feb. 17, at the Texas Electric Service building.

The Little League Association also formally accepted the land near the high school, which had been offered by the School Board, as a site for the new park.

Little League President James Wright was pleased with the attendance and enthusiasm of some 30 men interested in the ball program, but took note of "the extreme absence of parents of the young boys who play." He said he hoped to see a big turnout of them at the Feb. 17 meeting.

Tom Lovelace III presented the Little League with \$33.37 that he and Rex Lewis had raised in the sale of pencils, and thus placed the first money in the Little League's bank account. Lovelace Transfer & Storage had bought the pencils and the youngsters had raised the money on them. Mr. Tom Lovelace said several people had given the boys as much as a dollar for a pencil, just to keep as a Little League souvenir.

There are still about 200 pencils left, and Lovelace said the boys would offer them for sale again as soon as they could get some help. Lovelace will sponsor the Lovelace Bulldogs next season.

Erection of the new park will be an asset to Eastland and its youngsters for years to come, and will be quite a monument to those who helped build it, league leaders observed.

## Septic Tank Proposal For Sewerless Region Given City By League

A delegation of Eastland women representing the Civic League and Garden Club appeared before the City Commission Thursday night and presented a proposal to the city for providing septic sewage possibilities for the negro community.

Mrs. Horace Horton league first vice-president, spokeswoman for the group, pointed out that Eastland has a reputation as a clean city, once won a prize for it, and that while extension of sewer facilities for these patrons would be of considerable cost, and heretofore had prevented such service, a septic tank arrangement could be provided much cheaper.

She had obtained prices on septic tanks and pipe, and concessions of prices on pit-digging and fittings and suggested that if the city could pick up the tanks and pipe in its trucks and haul them in, she figured that about \$1,200 would make the septic system available to the twenty houses in the group. This, she said, would reduce fly and mosquito and other health hazards.

## Mavericks End 1956 Season With Loss To Gorman By 43-42

The Eastland High School Mavericks wound up their 1956 basketball season in a blaze of something-or-other by the incredible feat of dropping three games in a row in four days and ending up, most likely, in third place in District 7-A.

A Friday night defeat at the hands of the Gorman Panthers, who downed the Mavs by one point in a 43-42 thriller, climaxed a disastrous week that began last Tuesday night when the Mavericks lost a heart-breaking overtime decision to the Ranger Bulldogs by a score of 60-56, after having led the game all the way.

The Bulldog defeat was followed by a 63-46 plastering administered by last place Wylie Thursday night, and then came the one point defeat by Gorman Friday night.

The Mavs went into the final week with a splendid 5-2 record, having lost to nobody except (Continued on Page Two)

## FHA Tells Of Plans of Use Of Farm Loans

Approximately \$5,130,000, or 48 per cent of the production and subsistence loans obtained by farmers in Texas from the Farmers Home Administration during the past year were used to purchase equipment, livestock and make similar investments, Homer P. Cole, County Supervisor for the agency said today.

Farmers are making these investments to set up the kind of farming systems that will make the most of their labor, land and other resources.

Production and subsistence loans are also made for fertilizer, seed, tractor fuel, insecticides and other farm and home operating expenses. The loans bear 5 per cent interest and repayments are scheduled in accordance with the borrower's ability to repay. Loans for crop production are repayable when income from the crop is received. Loans for capital investments are repayable over periods up to 7 years. The maximum loan is \$7,000 and total indebtedness cannot exceed \$10,000.00.

Several steps are taken by the Farmers Home Administration to assist farmers in making the best use of their loan funds. Before a loan is made a complete farm and home plan is prepared by the farm family with the assistance of the agency's local supervisor. The plan shows how the farm will be operated, estimated yields and income, and a budget for farm and home expenses. Provision is made for the production of a large portion of the family's food supply and provision is made in the budget for household expenditures and medical care.

No loan is made unless the farm and home plan shows that the farm when properly operated under normal conditions will produce an income that will provide the family a good living and enable them to repay their debts, Mr. Cole said.

Guides have been established with the aid of the Extension Service and other agricultural agencies that show desirable combinations of enterprises, the amount of land, quantity of livestock, amount and quality of pasture, and feed, acres of cash crops, and the yield per acre and production per animal that are needed for the successful operation of family-type (Continued on Page Two)

### Christian Science 5 Questions -

He will use Schedule F listing all farm income and deductions to determine net farm profit or loss. Page 4 of this form is used to figure your self-employment tax. This form needs to be filed along with his income tax return, Form 1040.

3. Can a farmer owe self-employment tax and not owe any income tax?

Yes. His net income from farm operations is \$400 or more and the total amount of his exemptions is more than his income, then he would be required to pay self-employment tax but would owe no income tax.

4. What is the self-employment tax rate for farmers?

If, in the taxable year, he receives no wages subject to social security taxes and his self-employment net earnings from farming for the year are at least \$400 and no more than \$4,200, the entire amount is subject to the 3 percent rate.

5. Are farm rents, as such, subject to self-employment tax?

No. If the landowner rents his land receiving a crop share or the proceeds thereof, under the ordinary crop-sharing arrangement, he is considered to be receiving rentals from real estate, and such rentals are excluded from net earnings for self-employment.



farms in each given area. These guides are used in developing the farm and home plans.

In addition, at the end of the crop year a complete review of the year's operations is made by the farm family and the Farmers Home Administration supervisor to determine which farm enterprises were the most successful and what further improvements are to be made in the coming year.

Credit is also extended by Farmers Home Administration for financing annual operating expenses. These loans are short-term credit designed to help farmers finance one year's operations. Annual production and subsistence loans may be made to farmers provided there is a sound basis for credit. This means that the anticipated gross income from farming and other sources must be sufficient to repay the loan, meet farm and home expenses not provided for in the loan and provide a reasonable margin above such amounts. This type credit is in addition to emergency loans available to farmers or ranchers primarily engaged in farming, Cole stated.

Real estate credit for purchase and development of family-type farms for financing soil conservation measures, and or the development of water systems for farm home, livestock and irrigation are also available.

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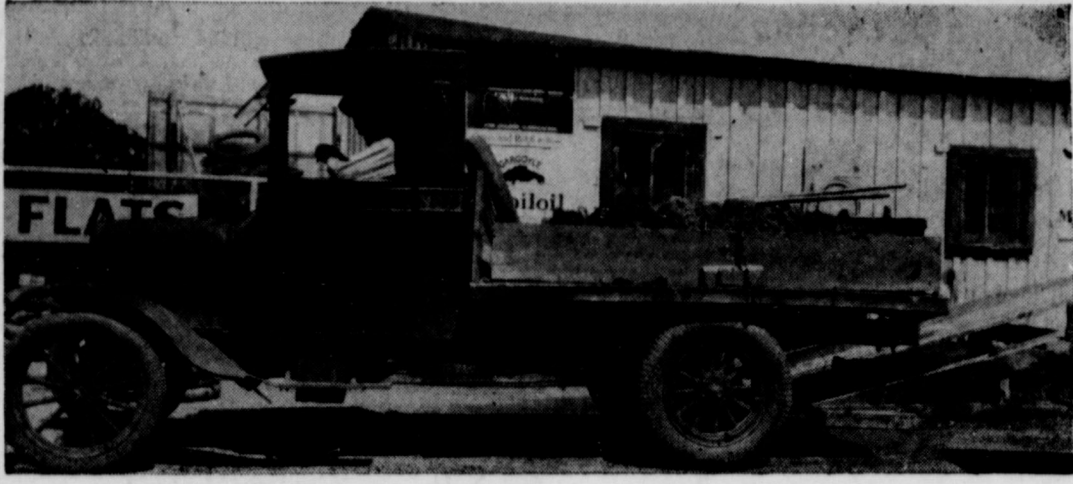

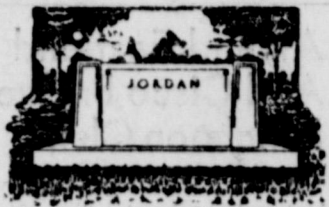
