Annual Eastland County Orchard Field Day will be observed Thursday, Feb. 23, on the J. E. Spencer farm about 6 miles southwest of Carbon, it was announced today by County Agricultural Agent J. M. Cooper.

Mr. Spencer grows a sizable commercial peach orchard there.

"We always get the best orchard nen in Texas to speak to us on these occasions," said Agent Cooper. "This time, we will have at least five men - all from out of the county - talk on topics definitely profitable to the growers."

These meetings have been held annually the past decade.

"There are a number of orchard growers in the county," said Cooper, "and the meetings have always drawn goodly turn-outs."

Fruits grown in the county include peaches, plumbs, pears, apples and grapes.

"I have always thought it too hot here for growing apples in quantities," said Cooper, "b u t there is one apple orchard of 140 acres and another of 40 acres in the county

He said that peaches do well and that some trees over 20 years old are still producing.


"Some of the dead peach trees are being replaced," said Cooper. "One man, A. P. Broiles of Carbon, put out several hundred trees last year. He lost some to the freeze, though, but is replanting.'
