Some of the main highways should be closed until the death traps are removed.

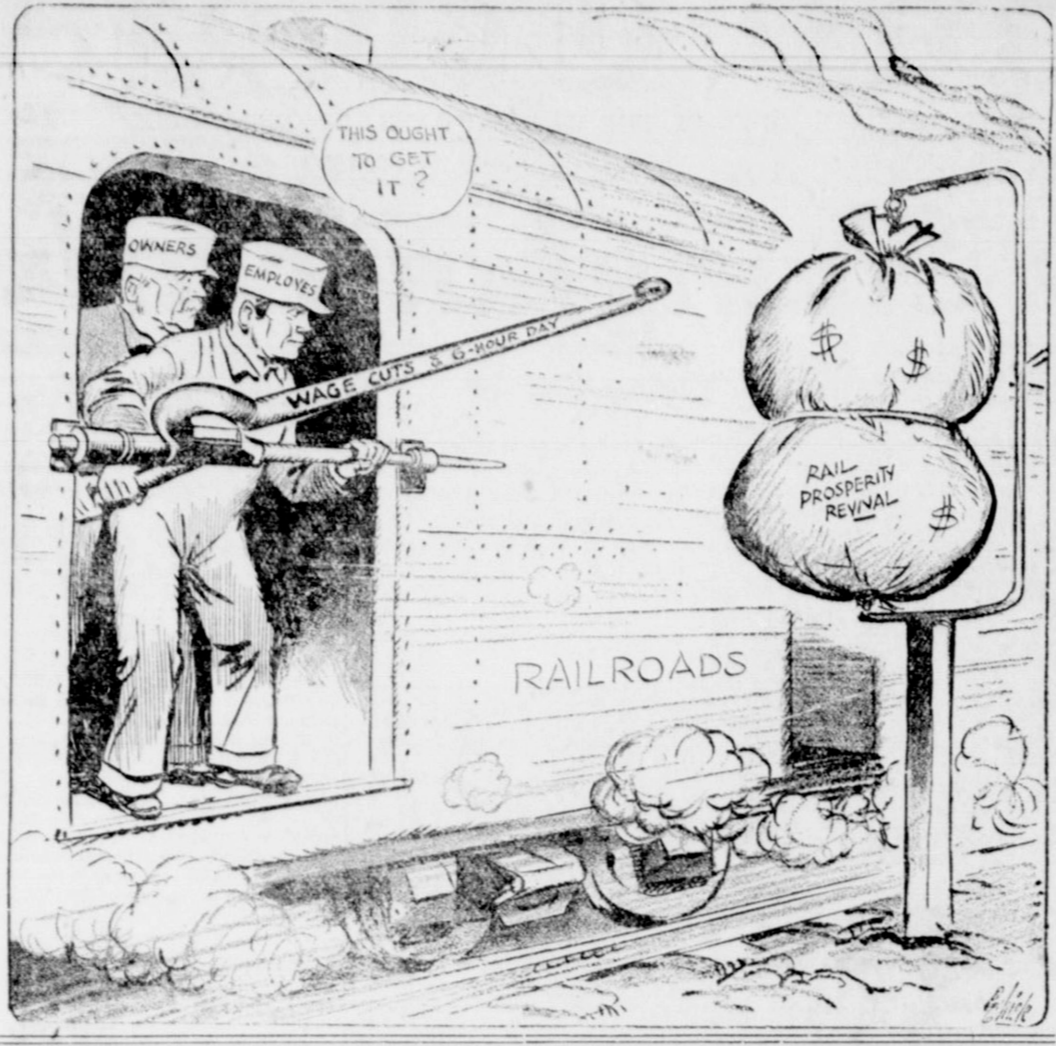
GETTING OUT OF HAND

construction bill by merely declaring the bill passed without one word of debate. "There is no reason to object," Garner said, cutting him off with the gravel.
Another democrat made a motion which Garner opposed. Although it seemed to some in the gallery that the "yea" voices outnumbered the "noes," Garner held the motion defeated and moved on quickly to other business before anybody could call for a count of noses.
Garner's firm-handed rule does not appear to curtail his popularity. He has an outspoken way, blunt but softened by a friendly manner. A stranger appeared at his door the other day.
"What the hell do you want?" Garner asked.
"I would like to see you a few minutes," the stranger replied.
"Get on inside then," Garner said.
Yet he made those words sound like the friendly greeting of a southern host welcoming an old friend in for fried chicken.
