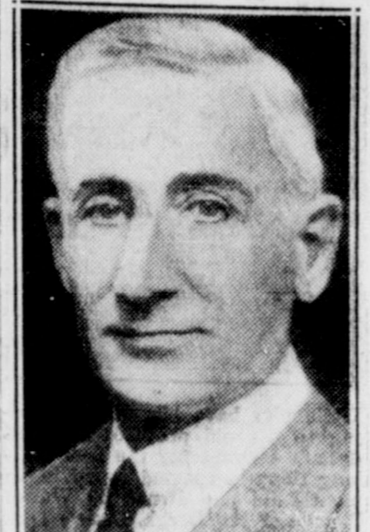

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AMONG THE POLITICAL SMASHERS

There are times when the unexpected happens. The American senate refused to sustain the Hoover veto of the Philippines freedom bill. First the house smashed his veto. Then the senate overwhelmed it by five votes more than the necessary two-thirds. Of course, the Filipinos, according to the bill enacted, will be given their freedom in ten years. Well, a lot of water will go down the stream before the coming of 1943. And it is safe to venture the prediction that the Filipinos will not be given complete independence in 1943 by an American president and congress then holding the reins of government. There is another man in the picture, a national lawmaker and a republican, who was hammered good and proper—McFadden of Pennsylvania reintroduced his resolution to impeach the president. Well, the McFadden resolution and indictment declared Herbert Hoover guilty of high crimes and misdemeanor. A motion to table carried by a vote of 342 to 11. Incidentally it was directed principally at alleged misconduct of the chief executive in international diplomacy and war debts. Democratic chiefs led the fight for the tabling of the resolution. There was only one republican vote against tabling. It was cast by the distinguished McFadden, republican of Pennsylvania, who never knows when he is disfigured past recognition. There were 10 democrats. Blanton and Patman and Sanders of Texas were among the 10. Patman and Blanton are ever ready "to stand up and be counted," but how did Sanders find his way into the knockout game? Again, why not let the dead bury the dead. Herbert Hoover retires March 4. Regardless of what is said and will be said by hysteric, he has had four years of hell in office and should be a happier man in the shades of private life. Since the passing of Calvin Coolidge his friends have announced that Hoover will be a candidate for the republican nomination four years hence, that the republican party will be organized and that the old guard and their followers will control the reorganization. No doubt the republican party will be reorganized in order to salvage all that can be saved from the wreckage, but the young republicans of America, including the progressive republicans of the western country, are organizing against the old guard and to a man they are fighting. Let time tell the story.
