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

actually started in George Washington's administration on the tai riff issue. It reached unsavory heights in the decades from the Civil War to the turn of the cen-

Lobbying activity in Washington today is very tame as compared with what the record shows it must have been back in the early 1870s when Jay Gould offered members of Congress \$1000 cash and \$5,-000 when the Bill was passed, plus \$10,000 of the bonds, to approve a railroad route across the con-

Even the ministers have lobbies in Washington — even the Indians. Educational institutions. churches, foundations, hundreds of big corporations, farmers' organizations, labor unions, and about everything and everybody have representatives in Washington. They are lobbyists. There are good apples and bad, but it is my bservation and experience that the vast majority are honest, sin-

cere, and serve a useful purpose. Pressures — yes. But to believe that there is widespread dishonesty is to destroy our confidence in our representative form of government. A scrutinizing investigation should be conducted into any wrongdoing. Lobbying laws now on the books should be strengthened and enforced. But there will always be a few rotten apples in the barrel, wherever the barrel is to be found.



95% Texans Affected By **Dental Disorder**

AUSTIN - Over 95 per cent of our population is aflicted with some sort of dental disorder. However, if parents took advantage of all the preventive measures available, their children would grow up relatively free from dental disorders, asserts Dr. Henry A. Holle, Commissioners of Health.

Since these dental disorders have their start in children, early attention to proper dental health procedures helps the child avoid the dental disease that plagues his parents, he said.

"Tooth decay," Dr. Holle said, "is probably the most widespread dental disorder among children and improper diet can be clamed for the large incidence of the disease. Sugar, one of the main factors in decay, is consumed in 10 times larger quantities today than it was 100 years ago."

He urged parents to substitute fresh fruits such as apples and oranges and uncooked vegetables such as carrots and celery for sweets as between-meal snacks for their children.

The toothbrush, Dr. Holle pointed out, is one of the best weapons against decay. He stressed, however, that to achieve maximum benefits the timing and method of toothbrushing are vitally import-


He explained that since toothbrushing removes bits of food which have become lodged in the teeth, the teeth should be brushed immediately after eating. The brush, he said, should be firm and small enough to get to all surfaces of the teeth easily. For best results, he suggested that the upper teeth be brushed down and the lower teeth brushed up.

Another weapon against decay, Dr. Holle said, is fluoridation of public water supplies.

"Scientific studies have shown that fluoridation has reduced tooth decay as much as 65 per cent," he sald. "No ill effects have been discovered from the measure which is currently in effect in more than 1,100 communities in the United

States.' In communities that have no public water supply it is suggested that children receive direct ap plications of a fluoride solution from their dentists. These treat ments have been found to reduce

decay up to 40 per cent. Parents are urged not to neg lect periodic dental for their children in order that small cavities and other irregularities can be de tected before they become serious. He also advised that early visits tend to eliminate any fears in the child, since little or no discomfort

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
