## First Federal Savings Reports Record Year

Another year of progress and growth was enjoyed by the First Federal Savings and Loan Association of Ranger during 1964, according to secretary-treasurer's report given to members in the annual meeting Wednesday afternoon.

Lester Crossley, secretary-treasurer of the First Federal said that asset growth of \$131,331.81 during 1964 represented a 4.34 per cent increase over total assets held one year ago, and that assets at the end of 1964 stood at \$3,156,956.82.

Crossley said that the growth reflected a combination of increases of mortgage loans and savings balances outstanding. He added that the flow of personal savings appears to have been stimulated by increased personal income in the area.

## First Federal Savings Reports Record Year

Federal in 1964 totaled \$239,433.85, bringing total savings held by the association at year end to \$2,873,256.56.

The savings and loan institution also reported record annual dividend payments during 1964 totaling \$114,000.61, based on a regular dividend rate of 4 1/4 per cent. These dividends were paid or credited to the 1028 savers in the institution and represented quite a contribution to the general economy of the area.

New mortgage loans made by the association during 1964 amounted to \$424,086.42, and the total mortgage loans outstanding at the end of the year climbed to \$2,664,873.81.

In the annual report to the association's members Crossley commented: "Although competition for both mortgage loans and savings capital has been considerably greater this past year than in previous years, we are most pleased with the continued healthy growth and progress of our institution and its expanded services to this area.

Crossley foresaw the possibility of some pick-up in housing activities in our community during 1965. "A continuation of the present prosperity level, another tax cut, ample mortgage funds and favorable interest rates — all these factors suggest some strengthening in demand for single-family homes," Crossley said.

## Optimism Is Apparent For Olden Water Sale Okay During Eastland Meeting

"Water, water everywhere at Lake Leon — and Olden would like to buy some."

That's the oft-repeated refrain and although the citizens of Olden who met with the Eastland City Commission didn't get any definite commitment, the tone of the meeting appeared favorable toward their cause before it ended.

Mayor Frank Deaton and the Eastland commissioners promised to call a special meeting soon to meet with the Eastland County Water Supply District board to see what can be worked out.

During the Monday night get-together the equally oft-repeated problems were raised: that the District is supplying the cities of Eastland and Ranger to the capacity of its filtering system; that Eastland is currently using within some 300,000 gallons of its allotment on peak summer days; and that Eastland is the logical one to sell Olden the water if the problems can be ironed out.

The seven member Olden group, accompanied by Leon Decker, of the engineering firm that is mapping their proposed FHA water system, and commission talked for about an hour with the commission.

Another problem to be solved too, is the fact that Olden is considering a 40-year loan program on their system and therefore would be required by FHA to possess a completed 40-year agreement for the purchase of water. Eastland is presently in its 10th or 11th year of a 40-year contract with the District.

Oldenite Pat Moseley asked if the 50 additional customers anticipated on the Olden system would be too many to serve in addition to the present 58 now being served.

## Gorman Resident Is Victim Of Ditch Cave-In

Funeral service for John Lee Turner, 52, of Holliday, was held at 2 p. m. Monday in Gorman First Methodist Church with the Rev. Daves, pastor of the Holliday Methodist Church, officiating, assisted by Rev. B. C. Huddleston, pastor of the Gorman church.

Burial was in Gorman Cemetery with Masonic graveside rites.

Mr. Turner was killed Saturday afternoon in a ditch cave-in while working to repair a water main. He had served as water superintendent for one year for the city of Holliday, and prior to moving there he was employed by the city of Gorman for 19 years.

Born Dec. 20, 1913, at Elijah in Coryell County, he was married to Miss Nellis Sanders in Comanche County by his grandfather, the late Rev. C. B. Medart. He was a member of the First Methodist Church of Holliday and a Mason.

Surviving are his wife; two sons, Jimmy Turner and Arthur Dale Turner of Holliday five daughters, Miss Jo Nell Turner, a student at Midwestern College at Wichita Falls, Darlene, Dorothy, Gloria Fay, and Effie Estelle Turner, all of the home; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. A. N. Turner of Gorman; and six sisters, Mrs. Juanita Spence of Carbon, Mrs. Nettie Denton and Mrs. Dorothy Beatty, both of Gorman, Mrs. Leoda Leathers of Canon City, Colo., Mrs. Helen Denton of Big Lake, Mrs. Vada Bell Collins of McCamey; and one brother, Lonnie Turner of Waco.

Mayor Deaton explained that they probably would not, but if Eastland continues to gain in water customers in the future as it has in the past few years, it would be impossible with the present allotment of 1,800,000 gallons.

"How long will your water flooding project go?" Moseley asked, referring to the Great Western Drilling Co. operation at Lake Eastland which is buying treated water from Eastland. "We don't know," the mayor replied.

How much would additional filtering equipment at the plant cost? an Olden resident asked. "A lot," he was told, and that it would probably require a bond issue election in Eastland and Ranger.

"I don't know how the other commissioners feel," the Mayor Deaton said, "but I wouldn't want to have to vote more bonds for the filter plant."

"The district should increase its filtering facilities," Commissioner M. A. Treadwell said.

Can you grant us permission to deal with the District Board to purchase water? an Olden resident asked. "That seems like the place to start," Commissioner Curtis Koen replied.

"Would there be an objection?" Dr. Treadwell asked.

City Manager Lewis Tiner inserted that the city would probably hate to lose the some \$400 a month in water revenue from the present Olden customers. The Olden customers are using about a half million gallons a month and the water flooding program about four million, he said.

Mayor Deaton also suggested that the Eastland Commission meet with the Ranger commission on the matter so that problems and solutions

can be mutually worked out. Commissioner James Reid expressed the opinion that the service for the some 42 new customers wouldn't be too great a strain, and "not too drastic."

"We're not talking about much more water," Tiner said.

Commissioners Woen, who told the visitors "I personally want to see Olden get water for its system," said that he doubted that the people would approve additional bonds for expansion and enlargement.

Eastland presently stores a days supply of water and can run for a day even when the District system is out for any reason, Tiner explained.

The group was cordial expressing the hope that something can be worked out, agreeing that if Olden grows, it certainly will benefit Eastland. There are presently three different water systems (and rates) in Olden it was pointed out, making for considered inequities there.

No date was set for the Ranger and Water Board meetings.

The commissioners also agreed to look at, with a view to purchasing a 1965 model trash truck, which has been offered to the city at \$5,200 and the city's present four year old model, which has required extensive repairs the past few months. The two and a half ton eight-cylinder new model is ordinarily a \$10,200 rig. Tiner explained.

Commissioners looked at an unsolicited bid on sandblasting and painting the water towers on Park Hill in the amount of \$4,237.20 for the 23,500 square foot job.

They were unanimous in agreeing that "They like 'em black."

## Earnings Alone Don't Bar Receipt Of S. S. Dollars

"You don't have to retire completely to get social security benefits," H. L. Weatherly, social security field representative for Eastland County said today.  
"If you earn \$1200 or less in a year, you are considered to be completely retired and would be entitled to all your benefits," he said.  
"If you earn over \$1200 in a year, you may be considered partly retired and entitled to part of your social security benefits. For example, a worker would have only one dollar in benefits withheld for every two dollars earned between \$1200 and \$1700. For earnings over \$1700 annually, one dollar in benefits is withheld for each dollar of earnings."  
Weatherly emphasized the fact that, no matter how much you earn in a year, you can be paid your social security benefits for any month in which you neither earn over \$100 as an employee, nor render substantial services as a self-employed person.

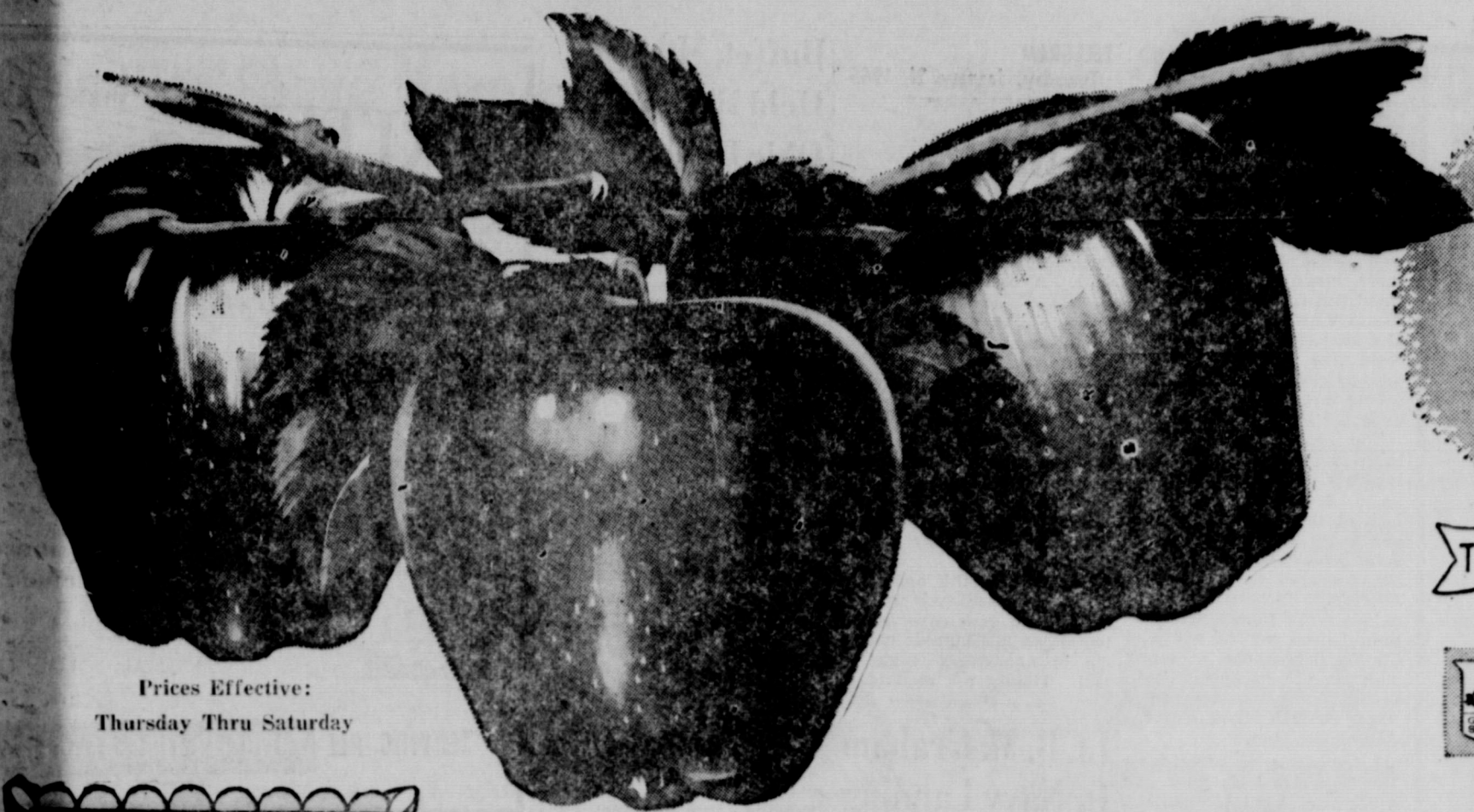

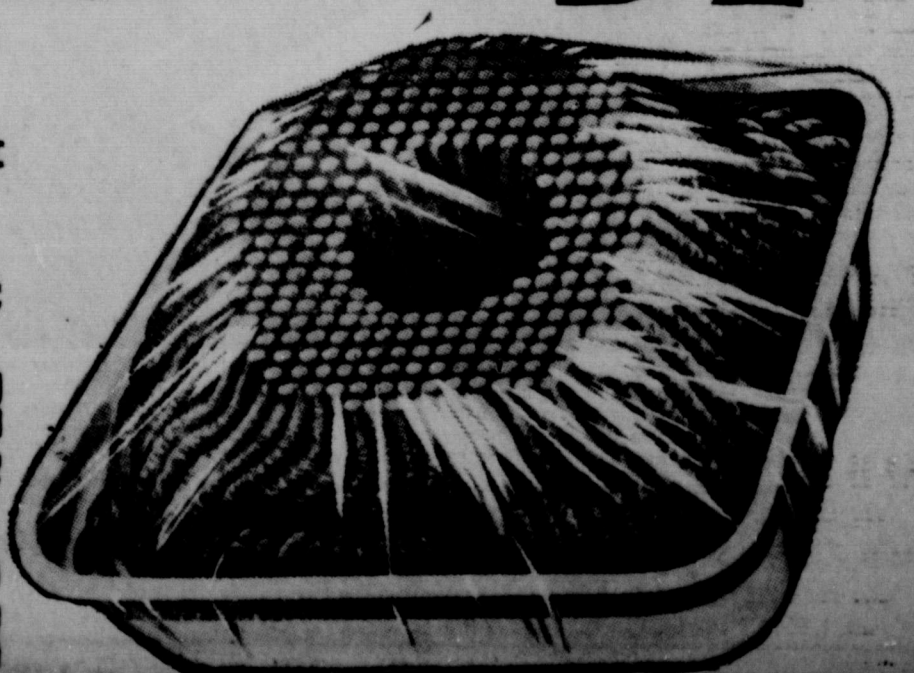

One she serves frequently at bridge club is:

### JACK STRAW CASSEROLE

1 4-ounce can shoe string potatoes  
One 6 1-2, 7 or 9 1-2 ounce can drained tuna.  
One three-ounce can boiled sliced mushrooms  
1-4 cup sliced pimientos  
One can of fancy mixed Chinese vegetables

Save one cup potatoes for topping. Bake uncovered 20-30 minutes at 375 degrees.

### GREEN RICE

2 cups cooked rice  
One tall can evaporated milk  
2 eggs beaten  
One small onion, grated  
1-4 lb. Old English cheese  
Garlic, one clove  
one-third cup oil or oleo  
Salt and pepper  
Put container in pan of water at 350 degrees, one hr.

### GRIT SOUFFLE

Boil three cups water. Add 1 tsp. salt and dash of garlic, red pepper or dash tabasco.  
Boil hard and slowly add 1 cup quick cooking grits. When begins to thicken add one stick oleo. Then add 1-2 cup sharp

grated cheese or one package jalapeno cheese.

When thickened add 1-2 cup sweet milk and 2 beaten eggs. Put in buttered casserole and cook uncovered 45 minutes at 350 degrees. Put cheese on top. Serve with ham or chicken.

### SHRIMP, JELLO SALAD

One pkg. lemon Jello  
1 cup boiling water  
Cool until partly jelled and whip one cup whipping cream and fold into Jello, then add 1-2 cup chipped celery, green olives. Pour into molds and chill.

### DRESSING

Dilute one-third pint real mayonnaise with cream. Add 1-2 lb. of shrimp, 1-4 cup pimiento, lemon juice and scraped onion. Pour over salad.

### MAMA-O POUND CAKE

1 cup butter or 2 sticks oleo  
1 3-4 cup sugar  
2 cups cake flour  
3 teaspoons lemon juice  
5 eggs (6 if small)  
Use tube pan. Cream butter and sugar well. Add lemon juice. Beat in whole eggs one at a time. Add sifted flour and mix well. Cook 325 degrees, for one hour.

### CRAB STUFFED POTATOES

4 medium potatoes  
1 6-ounce can of crabmeat  
1-2 cup butter  
1-2 cup light cream  
1 teaspoon salt  
4 teaspoons grated onion  
1 cup grated sharp cheese  
Cayenne pepper and paprika  
Bake potatoes, scoop out and

mash fine. Add crabmeat and restuff. Refill potato skins and heat in oven 15 minutes.

### SHRIMP RICE MacDOINE

3 tbs. vegetable oil  
1 bunch green onion (chopped fine) about 1 cup  
1 clove garlic (chopped)  
1 green pepper (chopped) about 1 cup

1 cup rice (uncooked)  
1 tsp. salt  
1-2 tsp. accent  
2 cans shrimp (5 oz.)  
1 6-oz. can mushrooms (cut)  
1-4 cup pimiento (chopped)  
1 bay leaf  
2 cups water  
Brown rice in oil. Add onions, seasoning and everything else. Add water, cover and cook 15-20 minutes. Serves 6.

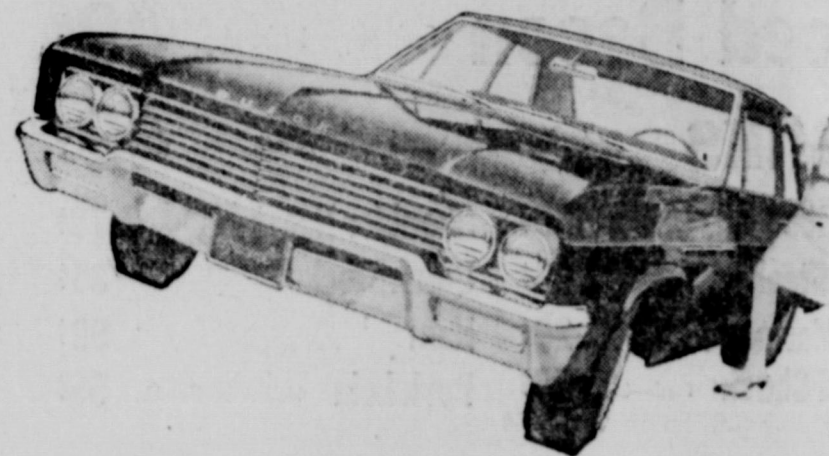

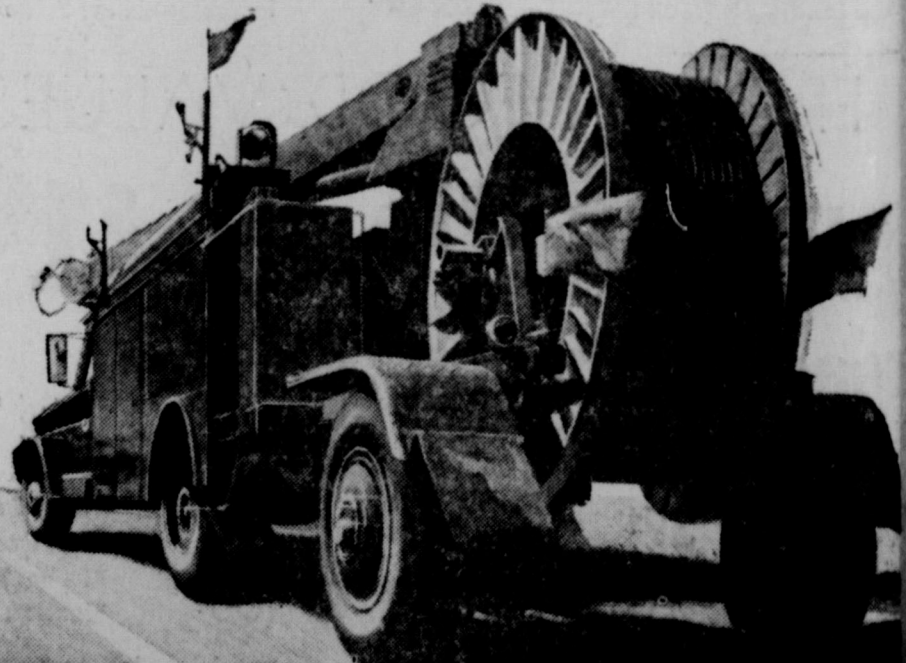

# State Capital NEWS

By Vern Sanford

**AUSTIN** — Surprises come fast and furious on the political scene in Austin.

First surprise of the new year was the resignation of Ernest O. Thompson.

Then came an even greater surprise as the Legislature was out to open and everything as in readiness under the management . . . pre-empted with problems of the old and new . . . Gov. Th. Connally named House speaker Byron Tunnell to fill Thompson's old post.

Thompson, once the battling mayor of Amarillo and more than 30 years a rapper on the Railroad Commission, had been ill for many months. Only recently had he been moved from an Amarillo hospital to his home.

Tunnell is an East Texan. He's the first person from the East Texas oil area to serve on the Railroad Commission in 23 years. He was just beginning his third term as legislator from the Tyler-Kilgore region and expected to preside for a second term as House Speaker.

Immediately upon learning of Tunnell's appointment, Rep. Ben Barnes of De Leon, Tunnell's first lieutenant during the 1963 session, began contacting Legislators about the speakership. Barnes already had announced as a candidate for Speaker of the 1967 session.

Most observers feel the 59th session may run through the summer. Certainly it will dominate the 1965 Texas political scene.

These results seem likely: . . . Lawmakers will spend

a record amount of money, much of it to uplift higher education. Budget proposals of both Governor Connally and the Legislative Budget Board awaited Senators and Representatives at their capitol desks.

. . . School teachers will get the \$45 a month pay raise they are asking. But they will have to figure out who is going to foot the bill.

. . . A few more exemptions are going to be removed from the state sales tax. Just enough to balance the budget, but not enough to hurt much.

. . . Commission on Higher Education will be reorganized along lines recommended by Governor Connally. But the successor agency may not get all the power Connally would like it to have.

. . . Stormy hearings will be held over legalizing horse race betting and sale of liquor by the drink. Both proposals may move farther than they ever have before. Maybe all the way.

. . . A congressional reapportionment bill eventually will be adopted. However, it's difficult to see any agreement on legislative redistricting.

Other key issues which will occupy the 59th Legislature are statewide water planning and financing, oil and gas tract pooling, mental health and tuberculosis programs, criminal code revision, judicial redistricting, state property tax repeal, extension of the medical care for the aged program as authorized by constitutional amendment voted on November 3, equal rights for women, gasoline tax exemptions for municipal bus lines, and enlargement of state tourist and industrial attraction programs.

Before the end of 1965, Texas will have 1,623 miles of super roads. Total interstate highway system designated for Texas is 3,025 miles. California, heretofore the

leader, has a designated interstate system of 2,173 miles. Interstate construction in Texas costs \$610,000 a mile, compared with about \$1,000,000 nationwide.

Railroad Commission is having a difficult time getting rid of more than 107,000 barrels of oil, impounded because of illegal production. Some of it has been tied up since 1933.

About 70,000 barrels of this oil has been stored in Beacon Tanks in East Texas for close to 30 years. State can't find a buyer for it because Federal law prohibits the sale of illegal oil into interstate commerce, says Fred Young, attorney for the Commission.

Young said the counties have received some benefits from the Commissions problem. When a well is shut down on an illegal production order, oil at the well is impounded in tanks at the well site. When oil operators want to use their tanks, the Railroad Commission will let them give the impounded oil to counties for road construction free.

State Board of Education voted 13-5 to comply with the 1964 Civil Rights law, a necessary ingredient for acceptance of some \$37,000,000 in Federal funds for public school operation.

But the Texas Commission on Higher Education, which will administer the new Federal college construction grant program, says it has not been requested to sign any such agreement.

Governor Connally appointed Dr. McIver Furman of Corpus Christi to the Texas Commission on Alcoholism and reappointed Dr. Ira Woods of Grapevine and Dr. N. 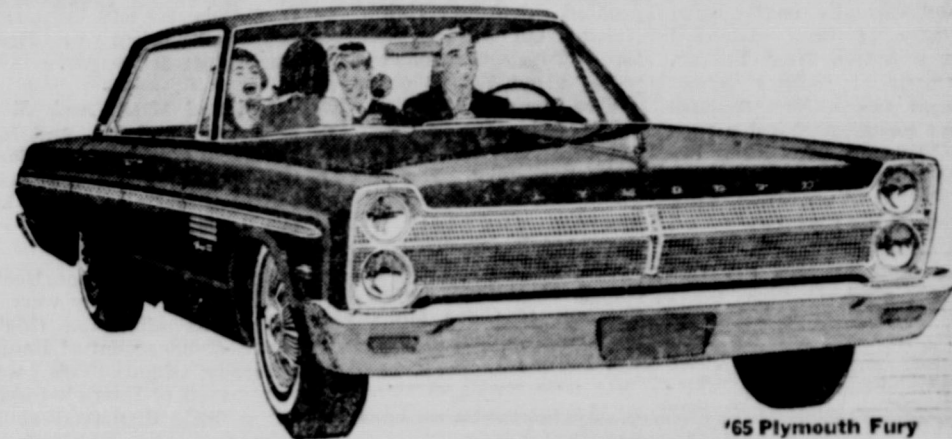

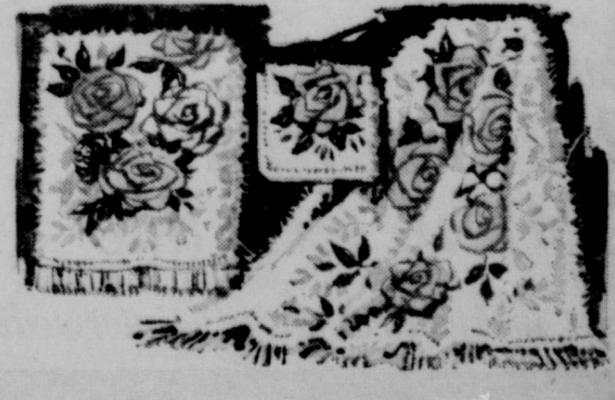

## Review Of Tom Lea's King Ranch Is Rotary Program In Eastland

A review of a "Texas book about a Texas institution" was program for the Eastland Rotary Club Monday as Cisco Attorney W. B. Wright shared Tom Lea's two-volume Southwest classic on the King Ranch.

H. T. Wilson was program chairman and introduced Wright who explained that the book carries the King Ranch copyright, indicating that it was written, if not at their request, at least through their editing. "Because there's but one disparaging incident in the work."

Published in 1937, the book(s) was published in Texas, and logically begins with the story of Capt. Richard King, a native New Yorker, who with 11 months school amassed one of the nation's largest fortunes. First a runaway seaman who later became a captain and partner in a river-boat operation, King purchased his first Texas land for two cent an acre (15,000 acres) and in 1854 his first stud for \$600.

In '54 another 54,000 acres were purchased and his partner was mysteriously killed in 1855. King and his river-

boat partner joined forces in 1860 and were set just right to profit during the Civil War by running cotton down the Rio Grande to Mexico where it was sold profitably by the Confederacy to the British. In 1857 Partner Kennedy sold out, leaving King sole owner of the growing empire, which adopted its famous Running W brand in '67, and started cattle drives to Abilene, Kansas in 1870.

King died in 1886 leaving a son - in - law to operate the spread, which by 1906 contained a million acres. The Ranch operation was incorporated in 1934 after having granted drilling rights to the Humble Oil Co. the year before. Today the ranch comprises about 726,000 acres.
