Action Is Not Likely Soon In Court Vacancy

The best guess of political leaders today was that Governor John Connally would take no action to fill the vacant judgeship of the 91st District Court of Eastland County until after January 1, 1965.

Published reports Wednesday said that the governor was believed to be considering Frank Sparks and Earl Connor, two Eastland attorneys, for the post. Sparks had the backing of the attorneys of the county. Both are veteran Eastland County lawyers.

The 91st district court bench has been vacant since the death Dec. 13 of Judge Turner M. Collie.

Political leaders said that Sen. Tom Creighton, Rep. Wayne Gibbens, State Committeeman David Clemens of Mineral Wells, and Mike Collins of Eastland were advising the governor in the matter.

Mr. Collins told this newspaper that he was making no recommendation but was passing on to the governor's office any information that he might have and that he was available to make a trip to Austin if the governor asked him to do so.

Speculation that the governor was working on the matter and might make an appointment this week was discounted.

'Eastlanders' Debt Share Is Low'

ED NOTE — This is the concluding installment from a report issued by the Municipal Advisory Council of Texas about Eastland's financial condition.)

Tax-paying Eastland residents have an indebtedness of \$94.34 per capita through their three taxing bodies, according to an estimated debt statement issued as of Sept. 30, this year.

Tax-payers who live inside the city limits owe a proportionate 9.15 per cent of the county's \$26,765 debt; 42.30 per cent of the Eastland Independent School District indebtedness; and of course 100 per cent of the City of Eastland's \$73,193 bond debt.

Only one taxing body, the Eastland County Water Supply District is debt free, according to the report.

Economic Background
County characteristics: An agricultural county of North Central Texas with principal products being peanuts, fruit, livestock and poultry. The value of all farm products sold

in 1959 was \$5.6 million. The county derives supplemental income from mineral production which was valued at \$4.7 million in 1962 and from some light industry.

"Local manufacturers produce gasoline, sheet metal products and women's garments. There are two small junior colleges in the county and two lakes (sic). Estimated retail sales for 1963 were \$20.6 million. The county's 1960 population was 19,526, down 18.4 per cent since 1950. Population characteristics: 98.2 per cent white, 1.8 per cent non-white, 57 per cent urban; 35 per cent of the labor force is white collar. Median family income in 1959 was \$3,324 as compared to the state average of \$4,884.

"Eastland is the county seat of Eastland County and a commercial center for the surrounding agricultural and petroleum producing area.

"The principal local manufacturer produces women's clothing. Dun and Bradstreet rates 138 business establishments; one bank held





DPS Estimates 190 Persons To Die in Holiday Mishaps

AUSTIN — The Texas Department of Public Safety estimated today that 190 persons will meet violent death during the coming Christmas-New Year's holiday season, including 105 traffic fatalities.

In addition to the traffic toll, it is estimated there will be 40 suicides and homicides and 45 accidental deaths other than traffic.

Col. Homer Garrison, Public Safety Director, said that the estimate is compiled by the DPS Statistical Services on the basis of past experience and the current traffic trend.

"The deaths that occur in traffic during the 11-day holiday period will be the tragic last additions to the worst year in Texas history for traffic fatalities," he said.

"The DPS is carrying out its annual special emphasis program called "Operation Deathwatch," Garrison reported. "From 12:01 a.m. December 24 until 11:59 p.m. January 3, 1965, we will use every available means to keep accidents at a minimum by promoting strict law observance.

"During this period the Department will tabulate all violent deaths and the totals will be officially announced three times daily as a means of keeping safety uppermost

in the minds of the traveling public.

"Throughout the entire holiday period extra patrolmen will be on duty to keep traffic moving safely. Many of our men will be giving up their own holiday in order to assure the safety and well-being of holiday motorists, but the most effective work in cutting down on death and injuries must be done by the drivers themselves."

According to Garrison, other state agencies and private organizations are cooperating in the safety drive. The Texas Highway Department is distributing reminders on danger spots, construction areas, and information on signs and markers to help keep drivers informed and alert.

The Texas Association of Broadcasters is conducting a campaign in which all drivers are urged to symbolize safe and legal driving by driving with their headlights on low beam during the holiday daylight hours.

The Texas Safety Association is distributing a kit of "Holiday Safety Materials" and is stressing the need for courtesy and caution during the holiday period.

And the Texas Motor Transportation Association and its Council of Safety Supervisors is urging all members of the truck and bus industry to participate in the "Drive Lighted and Live" campaign.

Garrison pointed out that studies indicate that at least one violation of the law is involved in almost every incident of a traffic fatality. Speed too fast for conditions was the leading factor in the 1963 holiday season, with almost 35 per cent of the accidents being caused by this factor. Other frequent contributors were driving while intoxicated driving on the wrong side of the roadway, and failure to yield right of way.

"However," Garrison added, "if this tragedy could be laid to one single factor, I would say that general carelessness and inattentiveness would stand out as a main contributing cause."

"All drivers can do a great deal in keeping down the number of accidents," he concluded, "by following the five basic rules which professional drivers use. These rules are used so often they become habit and add an extra measure of protection when operating a motor vehicle. They are:

(1) AIM HIGH IN STEER-

ING — look farther down the highway than you normally do. You'll find your car steers better and you will be better prepared to anticipate another driver's actions.

(2) GET THE "BIG PICTURE" — be aware of what is going on around you at all times.

(3) KEEP YOUR EYES MOVING — to be an effectively safe driver you must see as much as possible of the conditions affecting your driving.

(4) MAKE SURE YOU ARE SEEN — even though you take an extra measure of caution, another driver might not . . . if there is any doubt as to whether or not an oncoming driver has noticed you, be ready to take evasive action.

(5) LEAVE YOURSELF AN OUT — some accidents may seem unavoidable, but if all drivers would follow this final rule and take necessary action to avoid an accident, the Texas death toll would drop sharply."

evolving pagan customs to Christian usage.

It was not until about 1043 that December 25th became Christmas day rather than Midwinter mass. The "twelve days" were a community celebration which Norman Conquest changed very little. In the approximate 500 years between Conquest of 1066 and Reformation of 1560 the principal innovations were the Carol which became a beautiful lyric art expression and the Nativity play which became a popular art form as a prelude to the secular theatre.

Underlying the traditional medieval celebrations were forces building in opposition which finally exploded in the Puritanism of Cromwell's Commonwealth and Protectorate. Public opinion under Puritan conscience was becoming increasingly incensed and offended at the disorders, drunkenness, gambling, and proverbial hell-raising of mid-winter fun of the masses. Also social and economic changes were inner-acting in a need for change — even as now, as agriculture revolted from feudalism provincial social customs became outmoded by urban growth; trade expanded as industrial revolution came closer to being. As these forces under the iron hand of old "wart nose" Cromwell destroyed monasterial life and increased the differences between the social group — the old feudal or rural Christmas of Manor House, Guild Hall, and Medieval Corporation was ended. Authorities used the army to enforce Puritan bans — but after the restoration of Charles II the "old" did not return, and decline in "Christmas" festival as a social custom continued until 1850.

Charles Dickens in 1843 as a radical humanitarian of the Christian Socialist school — was responsible for the modern rebirth of Christmas as a spiritual experience — emphasizing for the first time innocence of childhood, the tragedy of poverty, and the psychological needs of the fortunate to aid the helpless. Old Scrooge, a man of strong conviction, was a protest against the hypocrisy that had made a mockery of conventional Christmas sentiments. The ghosts of Christmas Present, Past, and Future are an emotional experience unsurpassed in the novelist art of any language. Dickens appealed to the romantic, challenged the humanitarian, and revived the religious conscience.

Rebirth of Christmas did not mean revival of "folk" custom — Twelfth-Night, Mumming, Wassailing, etc., were gone forever. The Carol and Nativity play were reborn, and the giving of presents was transferred from New Years to Christmas. This latter obsession with presents — has been thought by some to become another extraordinary popular delusion of merchant

motivation by way of Madison Avenue promotion greatly emphasized by the new mass modes of communication.

Here in the United States there were added three innovations. The adaption of Dutch Kris Kringle in early New York state — made popular by Clement Clark Moore's "The Night Before Christmas" of 1823 whose writing extended almost world-wide the acceptance of the "American" Santa Claus. The development of the Christmas card was a combination of circumstance of new postal efficiency with "Auld Lang Syne" feeling for distant acquaintances. By 1860 these cards had developed to a popular art form with famous talent competing for sizeable Victorian prizes. The third and last development was the amazing mass adoption in a short 50 years of the Christmas tree — first known to history in Germany about 1605.

interest have not the least opposition to these later day religiously unrelated modes.

Perhaps though all of us are becoming conscious of a need for a de-emphasis of materialism and possibly a re-determination of "humanitarian" conscience as applied to the present circumstance of the underling man in urbanized loneliness, economic insecurity, psychic frustration, and social bewilderment — what with contemporary religious insincerity world-wide political instillation of "humanitarian" conity. All this and science too — where change and advance are accepted beyond the significant comprehension of all of us.



SAFE GIFTS FROM SANTA IS LOGAN OF TEXAS SOCIETY

Christmas memo to Texas on trees and toys: It is a needless eye accident that wrecks your family's happiness.

The Texas Society for the Prevention of Blindness cautions today that accidents around the Christmas tree will be the principal cause of eye injuries during the Yule season. The Society's warning came as part of its annual "Safe Gifts From Santa" campaign.

The traditional family Christmas tree with its fragile decorations has damaged many eyes in recent years, reported Senator Criss Cole, State Chairman of the Texas Society. A sharp pine needle punctured the eye of a West

Coast woman as she bent over to unplug the tree lights. A two-year-old was hospitalized after broken ornament fragments got into her left eye. An exploding Christmas tree light bulb cut the eye of a young Western boy.

"Throughout the holidays, remind all the family members, young and old alike, about the hazards of shattered ornaments and lights the pointed needles on wreaths and trees, the keen edges of wrapping materials, and the threat of fire," Senator Criss Cole said. "A good measure

of common sense will keep the holidays happy."

The Texas Society for the Prevention of Blindness estimates that eye accidents will strike nearly 12,800 American youngsters during the Christmas period. Wise toy purchases would do much to reduce this total.

"Youngsters often ask for Christmas toys that are too advanced for them," said Senator Criss Cole. "A normally safe toy such as a chemistry set or tool kit can cost an eye if mishandled in small or inexperienced hands. Make sure your child is capable of handling safely every playing thing he gets from Santa."

Missile-type toys like darts and archery sets are particularly dangerous to eyesight. Above all, if any of these gifts are on your Christmas list, make sure that the child is well grounded in the rules of safety before he uses them. Later may be too late.

Other toy-buying hints from the Texas Society:

Look for sturdy construction with shatter-resistant and non-flammable materials.

Toys should have no detachable parts, springs or gears that can fly into the eyes.

Edges should be smooth, corners rounded and mechanisms enclosed.

Try Live Tree This Christmas

Would you like to keep your Christmas tree for a long time after Christmas?

You can, according to Bill Smith, forester of the Texas A&M Agricultural Extension Service, provided you select a live tree that will grow in Texas.

"Live trees, with the roots wrapped in a ball of soil, are sold to be planted outdoors after Christmas," Smith points out.

Trees that may be expected to live in most areas of the state include arborvitae, Arizona cypress, eastern redcedar, and shortleaf pine. Other trees such as Douglas fir or Scotch pine should not be expected to live when planted in the Lone Star State. These species require cool and moist growing conditions unlike those found in Texas, Smith says.

To help the live Christmas tree survive after planting, he suggests these rules:

Do not move the tree indoors before it is to be decorated.

While the tree is in the house, be sure its roots do not dry out. This may require watering every day or two.

Plant the tree outdoors in a hole several inches larger

than the bundle of soil around the roots. Plant as soon as possible after Christmas.

It may be desirable to plant the tree outdoors in a location where it can be used as an outdoor Christmas tree in the following years.

For further information on the proper species of live Christmas trees for specific areas of Texas, Smith suggests that interested persons contact their local county agent's office.

FIRST

In Britain, it is the custom for children to leave their toys under the tree until the afternoon of Christmas Day. Santa Claus (Father Christmas) makes his Christmas Eve visit, however, filling the stockings left by the children at the hearth or beside their bed.

British legend says the stocking custom originated by accident. Once, St. Nicholas was making his descent down a chimney to leave some toys for a family of children and some gold coins fell from his pocket, dropping into a stocking hung by the hearth to dry. Since that time, Santa has always had something for every stocking.

Writers And Poets Helped Create Colorful Things About Christmas

Americans who dream of a white Christmas with Santa Claus popping down the chimney to the tune of "Jingle Bells" can thank assorted writers and poets and the northern climate. Christmas in the land of Christ's birth, however, is another matter.

What is Christmas like in Bethlehem?

There's generally no snow, for one thing, for winters are mild in the Judean Hills around Bethlehem, reports World Book Encyclopedia. No Santa Claus listens to children's pleas, for he's an American invention based on a European saint. And there's probably no decorated Christmas tree in the village square; that custom originated in Germany.

Instead, the focal point of Christmas in Bethlehem is the Church of St. Mary of the Nativity, supposedly built over the spot where Jesus was born. Here pilgrims from all over the world gather on Christmas Eve. First there is

carol-singing in the square facing the church. Then all enter for the solemn midnight mass. After the service, an image of Christ is carried in a procession down into the grotto, and is placed in a manger where it lies until January 6, the Feast of the Epiphany.

After this ceremony, some may wander into the fields outside the town, where perhaps shepherds long ago heard the news of the birth of Christ.

All this takes place, of course, on the eve of December 25. But that's not the end of Christmas in Bethlehem. For the Eastern Orthodox churches celebrate the holiday on January 6, and the Armenians observe it on January 18, which is January 6 according to the old style, or Julian calendar.

Regional Social Security Office Now 25 Years Old

On December 18, 1939, a Social Security Field Office was opened in Abilene with Eastland County as part of its service area. At that time, no monthly benefit claims were possible, as such did not start until January 1940. The initial foursome that staffed the office, with the late William O. King as manager, were primarily concerned with the issuance of social security cards, investigation of tax returns containing incorrect or omitted account numbers for the employees shown thereon and answering questions about the checks which would begin with January 1940. The benefit scale at that time was to be a minimum of \$10 a month and a

maximum of \$41.20 a month for insured persons over age 65 who were no longer earning as much as \$15 per month. A total of \$85 per month could be paid to a surviving family with at least 3 persons eligible for monthly checks.

Now, 25 years later, the Abilene office supervises the monthly issuance of some 32,000 checks totaling some \$1,765,000, handling some 150 new claims each week and handling several hundred inquiries and notices pertaining to the suspension reinstatement or termination of monthly checks.

Twenty-five years ago a representative of the Abilene office visited this county rather infrequently. Now such visits are made 8-9 times a month to Rising Star, Ranger, Gorman, Eastland, and Cisco. Schedules for such visits are available at all post offices. The staff now totals 24 persons with R. R. Tuley, Jr., as district manager and H. L. Weatherly as the representative who normally visits this county.

Hints Given On Buying Holiday Season Foods

When selecting candied fruits and nuts for holiday baking and snacking, check the prices of the various size packages. Generally, the larger the quantity, the lower the cost per ounce says Mrs. Gwen Clyatt Extension consumer marketing specialist at Texas A&M.

"Since these holiday treats are family favorites even after the holidays are gone, consider selecting the larger packages. The candied fruits keep well in air-tight jars, and unused nuts store well in the freezer," Mrs. Clyatt says.

Supplies of walnuts, filberts and almonds are expected to be large this year. Pecan production will be smaller than usual, however, harvest forecasts indicate.

Good eating at low prices is available for consumers who look to the less tender cuts of beef, such as pot roasts and stew meats. The current abundant beef supplies make these cuts even more of a bargain than usual.

Select roasts or steaks from the chuck or round, sirloin tip, brisket and short ribs — all of which should be braised or simmered in liquid.

Fork prices are down so pork chops, roasts, spareribs and other fresh pork cuts are good values this week.

Fresh vegetable selections continue varied and good quality. These include eggplant, cauliflower, collards, mustard greens, head lettuce, rutabaga and sweet potatoes.

Apples continue plentiful, with bagging sizes the most reasonable in price. Citrus items, especially grapefruit and oranges, are cheaper by the bag. Prices are lower this week on small size tangerines. Bananas show good quality at pleasing prices, and cranberries, grapes and pears are other good fruit choices.

CHRISTMAS TAMALES
A popular Christmas dish in Central America is tamales or nacatamales. Nacatamales are carefully prepared and cooked for several hours. The ground corn meal, turkey, vegetables, spices and seasonings. In quantities of about one pound the stuffing is wrapped in banana leaves and then boiled or steamed for several hours.

BIRDS AND BEES
Cranberry growers know all about the birds and the bees. And, many of us might not enjoy this holiday fruit if such were not true.

Cranberry growers build homes for swallows near their cranberry bogs. The birds eat destructive insects which would harm the crop.

Bees perform another valuable service-pollination. Cranberry pollen is too heavy to be carried by the wind, so bees pollinate the flowers. Growers have found that the number of bees present per acre of berries has a direct bearing on the cranberry crop.

CHOICE OF TREES
In New England and the Northeast, balsam fir and white spruce are the most popular Christmas trees, while Pennsylvanians often prefer Scotch pine, spruce and red pine.

In the South, red cedar and the scarce but beautiful holly tree are often used, as well as pine.

In the West, cedars and Arizona cypress are favorites, and on the West Coast a wide variety of trees, Douglas fir, blue spruce, Engelman spruce and other locally grown trees are all popular.

Fallen Leaves Can Boost Next Year's Garden

Jack Frost and freezing weather and the leaves come tumbling down. Naturally, they clutter yards and gardens but can be a boost to next year's flower or vegetable garden if handled properly.

Put them in a compost pile, says Dr. Charles D. Welch, soil chemist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Although it may be easier to burn them, the extra time required to put the leaves in a compost pile will return big dividends.

The compost can be used next year to increase organic matter in the soil or for mulching flowers, shrubs or vegetables. Organic matter increases the soil's ability to and makes the soil easier to work, explains Welch. Mulches are valuable for controlling soil temperature and conserving moisture.

Making a compost pile is a simple operation. Scrap lumber or a few feet of net wire and four posts will take care of the enclosure, the chemist points out. Starting with a six-inch layer of leaves — for a four-foot square enclosure — dissolve about three-fourths cup of commercial fertilizer such as 12-12-12 in water and sprinkle the solution over the leaves. For each 50 square feet, spread about one pint of layer.

Alternate layers should be added until the pile reaches the desired height, suggests Welch. The top layer should be left somewhat saucer-shaped to aid in holding water on the leaves.

Decomposition will be enhanced if the leaves are turn-

ed and mixed occasionally and if water is added during dry periods. In areas where soils are acid, the chemist recommends adding a cup of lime to the fertilizer before spreading it on the leaves.



Building Survey Is Planned For Eastland County

FORT WORTH — An engineer from the Fort Worth District, U. S. Army Corps of Engineers, will conduct an updating survey of newly-constructed buildings in Eastland County during the week of December 21.

Col. F. P. Koish, district engineer, reported that Charles Dansby will do a detailed study of the new construction of buildings in this county to determine its protection factor as a fallout shelter in case of nuclear attack.

The results of this study, which is conducted each year in this county, will be turned over to the County Civil Defense Director through the State Civil Defense Coordinator. Engineer Cistrice has jurisdiction

over a 115 county area for this survey between Del Rio and Texarkana.



Some people enjoy a White Christmas while some people go swimming or picnicking on December 25. Some people say it's traditional to serve turkey at the holiday feast, while some people favor a Christmas goose, and still others contend that carp or fried eel is the very thing for a tasty Yuletide dish.

Around the world, Christmas customs vary, but on one point nearly all are agreed.

It's a season to celebrate. In the United States and Canada, the "melting pot" origins of the population result in a medley of Christmas traditions from all over. Americans and Canadians from Central Europe still prepare their traditional Yuletide foods with carp, while those from Italy might hanker for some Christmas captoni, made with fried eels.

Especially during a severe winter, residents of the North-

ern U. S. and Canada would be glad to change places, or at least change weather, with those Australians. South Americans and others who enjoy summer activities at Christmas.

On the other hand, North Americans have made their own contributions to Christmas around the world. For instance, there's Santa, white-bearded and red-suited, who is now replacing St. Nicholas and other Yule gift givers in many countries.

It grows high among the branches of oak trees, touching neither heaven nor earth. It was believed to be immune, therefore, to the malignant influence of evil spirits.

The Druids, from Gaul, settled in the northwest section of France now known as Brittany. The mistletoe is still popular in France, where it is called "gui."

CANDLEMAKING

Candlemaking is one of the world's oldest professions. Anton Will, a German immigrant, was one of the first candlemakers in the United States. He made candles over a kitchen stove in Syracuse, New York, about 1855, founded a firm which now makes can-

dles for the Vatican. Another American firm once fashioned candles in the likeness of Lillian Russell and also made the world's biggest wax lights, an 18-foot memorial candle lighted once a year at singer Enrico Caruso's tomb in Italy.


