The lights go on and the curtain goes up at 8 p. m. Friday at the Eastland Elementary School Auditorium stage for the Eastland Civic Theatre's "Evening of One Acts."

Ticket sales have been brisk and attendance is expected to be good for both the Friday and Saturday evening performances.

Three one-act plays will be presented each evening and a bounty of mirth and entertainment is assured. Director and designer for the event is Mrs. Virginia W. Russell. Margie Chaney is in charge of makeup.

To be seen are "The Dear Departed," "Playgoers" and "Sparkin'" — starring Eastland residents in makeup and costumes. The Civic League and Garden Club is sponsor.

"The Dear Departed," written by Stanley Houghton, concerns two families of a lower middle class district town, grieving the loss of their father and making haste to divide his belongings.

EC-65 Site Seminar Tour of County Set to Roll Thursday at 8:30

Optimistic community leaders from Eastland, Ranger, Cisco, Rising Star and Gorman will attend the third of a series of five EC-65 industrialization seminars to be held Thursday.

The seminar project for the day will be a tour and discussion of "industrial sites."

Highlight of the day will be a tour to inspect possible locations for new industry

plants in Cisco, Eastland, Ranger, Gorman and Rising Star.

EC-65 is the industrial development pilot project which is being sponsored by Eastland County business and civic leaders in cooperation with the Texas Industrial Commission.

The Thursday morning tour will begin from the office of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce. Cisco Junior College is furnishing transportation for the group.

Following a noon luncheon at the American Legion Hall in Rising Star, three experts on industrial property will

participate in a panel discussion on "sites."

Panelists will include Robert L. Shaw, Representative of Watson and Watson Industrial Realtors of Dallas and a member of the American Society of Industrial Realtors; Homer Tanner, Manager of the Brownwood Chamber of Commerce; and L. P. Vinet, Assistant Director of Industrial Development for the Texas and Pacific Railroad.



Poll Tax Sales Hit 2,940 In Eastland County

Sale of poll tax in Eastland County this year was "way down" compared to sales in 1963, according to Tax Collector Edgar Altom. There was a total of 2,940 sales this year, 4,738 in 1963.

Of course 1964 was a general election year which would account for the high sales then.

This year, 1,266 poll taxes were paid at the court house and sub-stations held the following numbers: Cisco, 744; Ranger, 524; Gorman, 242; and Rising Star, 164, Mr. Altom said.

In 1962, 3,982 poll taxes were paid.

Overage exemptions are not included in this report.

County Farm Bureau Launches Special Week

The week of Feb. 8-13 has been officially designated "Farm Bureau Membership Week" in Eastland County.

The local county farm organization will have a special enrollment drive underway as part of a statewide effort to push Farm Bureau membership in Texas to 100,000 by Oct. 31. President Jack Cozart has announced.

An official proclamation signed by County Judge Scott Bailey called for citizens "to give due recognition to this observance honoring the Eastland County Farm Bureau."

Earlier Gov. John Connally proclaimed the same period as "Farm Bureau Membership Week in Texas." The statewide drive is to be launched with big area rallies Feb. 2 in San Antonio and Feb. 4 in Lubbock and Dallas.

John Love of Ranger is chairman of the local county Farm Bureau Membership Committee. Other volunteers who will be working on the drive are: John Love, Mitchell Campbell, Cyrus Justice, R. L. Ricks, B. T. Graham, Sam Kimmell, Glenn Jordan and Albert Hendricks.

The committee chairman said every farmer and rancher in the county is needed "as a member and a leader" by the Farm Bureau.

"Each of us in agriculture has too great an outlay in our business not to do all that we can to protect our investment in capital, time, and labor," he declared.

The Judge's proclamation pointed out the importance of agriculture "to the economic well-being of the county, and the high standard of living made possible by the "productive efficiency of our farmers and ranchers."

The proclamation is as follows:

"WHEREAS, agriculture is essential to the economic well-being of Eastland County, our State and the Nation; and

"WHEREAS, the productive efficiency of our farmers and ranchers have enabled our citizens to enjoy the highest

Sickness Declines After Siege Closes Schools Here

The flu-like illness which has put so many Eastland people to bed this week is slowly easing off, an Eastland physician said at mid-week.

With the height of the attacks reported during the weekend, the number of ill was near-epidemic stage and closed Eastland schools Monday morning, at least through Wednesday. There were 122 students absent Friday and almost 160 absent Monday morning.

Fewer cases were being reported at mid-week and the ill were regaining strength, the physician said. Symptoms are headache, fever, cough, sore throat and upset stomachs.

Hospitals throughout the county were full and physicians were urging restraint in exposure and careful personal care.

Churches reported extremely low attendance Sunday. School was expected to resume Thursday morning. Virtually every family reported one or more members ill with the new sickness.

Survivors include his wife; three brothers, Earl and Edd of Wilmer, Ark. and Guy of Stephenville; two sisters, Mrs. Viola Wall of Monticello, Ark. and Mrs. Berna Burnett of Ashland, Mo.





Auto Plates On Sale At Courthouse

License plates went on sale Monday in Eastland County and throughout the state and will end April 1. Mr. J. C. Whately of Eastland, with his purchase of both commercial and passenger plates, was the first person to purchase license plates in Eastland, according to Tax Assessor-Collector Edgar Altom.

Three things are required to obtain plates for your car—the money, current registration receipt and certificate of title. Lost receipts or ownership papers may be replaced easily by sending 25 cents for each duplicate desired to the Department's Motor Vehicle Division in Austin, 40th and Jackson Streets.

Receipts may also be obtained from the county in which the vehicle was registered. To issue a duplicate, the department must first have your license number, make and vehicle identification number.

Approximately a quarter-million more vehicles have been registered yearly in the state since World War II, a trend which is expected to continue.

Although you may not be among the first to get your plates this year, you won't want to wait until the last few days to make the purchase.

Substitutions will be open on March 1 at the Cisco Chamber of Commerce office; in Ranger at L&J Supply Co., at 122 Main St.; in Gorman at Todd's Variety Store; and in Rising Star at Jenkin's Insurance Agency.

Sale of the fat steers, lambs and pigs will be held at the Eastland Auction Sales Barn, Hwy. 80 East on the last night of the show. Judging of all divisions will be on March 12 and 13th prior to the auction.

Committees from all over the county have been named and some have been working on plans for the events for the past several weeks, Kimmell said.

Rainfall In County Is 2.10 Inches

Rainfall in Eastland County started the year "ahead of the game" with 2.10 inches measured during January, nearly three-quarters of an inch above average, and just less than during the same month last year.

Average for January is 1.37 inches and 2.48 inches were measured in that month of 1964, according to official county weather observer James Smith of Eastland.

Rain fell on five days this January, and accounted for good "seasoning" in spite of high, heavy and drying winds throughout the month. On the second day of the month, .05 inch fell; .3 inch on the third; .30 inch on the ninth; .37 inch on the 21st; and .65 of an inch on the 22nd.

Temperatures have ranged from a low of 21 degrees on the 11th to a 70 on the 26th. Sunday night's low was 22 with 30 degrees registered at 7 a.m.

County Peanut Crop Yields Just Under 20 - Bushel Acres

Eastland County's 1964 peanut crop totals 14,083,428 pounds for just less than a 20-bushel per acre yield, Gilbert Meredith, Agricultural Stabilization Conservation Committee manager, has announced.

A total of 23,585 acres, or 57 per cent, of the allotted acreage was planted in 1964, he said.

Average poundage is 597 in 1964, compared to an average of 520-pounds per acre, also

Peanut Economy Is Program For Eastland Lions

Peanut production in the United States has reached the million ton level for the first time in history, Ross Wilson, manager of the Southwestern Peanut Growers Association, told the Eastland Lions Club Tuesday.

And in Texas, 125,000 tons of peanuts were harvested from 32,000 fewer acres than in 1963, he said.

Since Eastland County farmers only got to plant 57 per cent of their allotted acreage this past season because of the lack of rain, the total production in the county is expected to be down, he pointed out.

The enormous national peanut crop represents revenue of about \$243 million, Wilson said, and guessed Eastland County's crop revenue to be between a million and a half to two million dollars.

Mr. Wilson was the guest of County Agent J. M. Cooper, program chairman for the day, as was Mr. D. B. Warren of Gorman.

Other guests included Joe Dennis of Ranger and Mike Collins and Ben McKinnis, both of Eastland.

Vice President Ed Etheridge presided in the absence of President Leon Musgrove.

In emphasizing the nutritional value of the peanut, Mr. Wilson also pointed out that the national per capita consumption of peanuts has increased to 7.1 pounds per year, which benefits the peanut raising economy.

just under 20 bushels to the acre, in 1963, he said.

This harvest came from 525 farms in the county, Meredith pointed out.

Peanut producers in the Southwest area have harvested and marketed a record high yield of peanuts, according to the Southwestern Peanut Growers Association, with figures up through mid-January, showing a total of 125,174 tons in Texas. In 1962, yield was 613 pounds (over 20 bushels) per acre, from 29,402 acres.

Of that tonnage inspected in Texas, 3,537 tons or 2.7 per cent are segregated Two (3 and 4 per cent damaged kernels), and 2,455 tons graded segregation Three (over 4 per cent damaged kernels), the association reports, adding that acres planted to peanuts in the state in 1964 were 32,000 less than in 1963 because of drought.

Tonnage going under loan in the Southwest is the largest since 1955, the association reports, with the total about 46,200 tons through mid-January. Of this total, 15,987 is

stored in Texas, 29,264 in Oklahoma, 707 in Arizona and 246 in New Mexico. Shellers in Texas and Oklahoma purchased about 165,000 tons direct from producers in Texas and Oklahoma.





Eastland County Official Ends Long, Varied Career

 "Yes, I retired January 1, but I'm still working every day, trying to get all the yearly reports in, as well as the final report of my last four-year term."
 This statement was made by J. C. Allison, who at age 82, has finally decided to retire from a long and varied career.

14 Years Service
 His last post was that of tax assessor-collector for Eastland County. He is winding up 14 years in the courthouse, where he started as chief deputy for the then tax assessor-collector, Stanley Webb.

When Webb resigned the post, Allison was appointed for the remainder of that term and later won two four-year terms in the county elections.

Joseph Carroll Allison was born in Eastland County, four miles east of Carbon, on November 24, 1882, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Redmond Allison, farmers.

He first attended school at the now extinct Bear Springs School. "I always wanted to be a school teacher, and when I finished the rural, ungraded school, my father promised me and my brother \$225.00 each for further schooling, if we would help him make a cotton crop.

"Well, everything seemed against us and in the early fall we picked exactly one bale of cotton from 71 acres. Later rains made the cotton grow and we later harvested 30 bales.

"My brother and I were off to Sam Houston Normal Institute in Huntsville, and I got my two year certificate and then a permanent certificate to teach and taught my first school in Hamilton County.

"In Comanche County I taught in a rural school and two of my students are now prominent Eastland County citizens: T. E. Richardson, Eastland druggist and store owner, and the former Fannie Cannon, now the wife of Judge Elzo Bean and living in the southwest of Eastland County."

His first teaching in Eastland County was done at a school — "I can't remember the name" — about halfway between Sipe Springs and May.

Also Attended UT
 He later attended the University of Texas for two years, furthering his teaching preparation but never getting a degree.

He taught in Dickens and after marrying Edna Adkins, they both taught in Afton, near Dickens. She died in 1921, leaving him with two sons, Carroll, who died in California in 1964 and Joe Winston, now a Baptist preacher, living in Clarendon.

In 1922 he married Lillie May Shelburne in Abilene. They have seven children: Mrs. W. S. Dikes of Irving; John Allison, a chemical engineer for El Paso Natural Gas Co. in Farmington, N. M.; Mrs. W. L. Foster of Eastland; Rev. Grady Allison of Baytown; Nelson T. Allison, principal of Gonzales Elementary School in Odessa; Mrs. Bill Beatty of Robert Lee; and Rev. James C. Allison of Loving.

Baptist ministers, the husband of one daughter is a Baptist minister and the husband of another daughter is a Christian Church minister.

The entire Allison family has been active members of Baptist churches and Mr. and Mrs. Allison are now members of Bethel Baptist, where he teaches the Sunday School Class for men 45 years of age and older.

Formerly at Breck
 Before moving back to Eastland County, Allison was principal of Breckenridge High School for two years and superintendent five years.

In 1911 he, with a partner, bought the Eastland Chronicle and he worked as a newspaper-man for one year. He had done newspaper work while at the U of T.

"The paper just wouldn't make enough to support two families so I started back at other work. I kept my interest in the paper for eight years, but sold it when I was appointed principal of Eastland High School in 1919 at a salary of \$2,000 per year."

During the summer of 1922, he taught at Simmons College, (now Hardin - Simmons University.)

Following seven years at Eastland High as principal and math teacher, he became secretary-treasurer of a paving and pipeline construction company.

Then the depression days came and there were years of bookkeeping for different firms in Eastland; several at a time.

Some of these jobs included city tax assessor and collector; 14 years with International Harvester dealers. These various jobs brought him along to the chief deputy's spot in the county tax assessor-collector's office 14 years ago.

Baptist of Year
 In 1958, he was chosen Baptist Father of the Year for Texas, being nominated by his church here. He thinks having so many sons and sons-in-law in the ministry is what won the award for him. He has been a Baptist deacon since 1926.

An avid reader of the Abilene Reporter-News' two papers a day, he says "I had to take the paper for my children, five of whom are graduates of Hardin - Simmons. They wanted the college and town news. Then when they all were gone, the Reporter News had become a habit."

During the depression years, Allison moved his family to a farm, 2½ miles south of Eastland. He walked that distance to and from work in Eastland each day. To this day he has not owned another car. His family attributes his trim physique, healthy, unlined face and general good health to his daily walks of some 20 city blocks to and from his work.

For years he has been a familiar figure, always well groomed and with a light step, making his way on West Commerce Street.

"I'll watch a lot of television and I'll play dominoes with some of my shut-in friends," he said when asked how he will spend his retirement. — Abilene Reporter News.

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
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
