The Mavericks led 53-51 going into the final quarter but the Bears outscored them 25-18 in that frame (in the final eight minutes in fact) to win the game and tie up the district standings. Both teams now carry a 7-1 record.

Three key men fouled out during the last quarter adding to the Mavericks' problems. Taking the bench via the foul route were Terry Treadwell, Mike Miller and Jim Herridge.

Miller was high for the team with 26 points followed by Herridge, a sophomore, with 18.

Bobby Black and Tommy Barton made 25 and 23 points, respectively, to lead the win for the Bears. Maxie Gordon aided the cause with 13.

Baird also won the girls game 66-42 with Marsha Treadwell high for Eastland with 23. Carolyn Key ripped the nets for 14 and Mary Clark added five. Carolyn Thomas, Sue Underwood and Marilyn Huckaby all played good defense.

## Infant X-Ray Proposed In Rotary Talk

Mrs. Eureka Ferguson of Abilene, and a native Eastlander, presented a program Monday at the Rotary Club meeting on the "Eureka infant X-Ray Foundation."

Mrs. Ferguson accepts every opportunity she can to speak to groups, "Anyone who will listen," she said, on the horrible possibilities of birth defects. Her inspiration in the founding of Eureka Infant X-Ray Foundation was her granddaughter, who had bone abnormalities and prenatal defects which weren't discovered until she was three years old.

The granddaughter, Shere Lynne Stubbs, as a result of having both hips out of socket since birth, has undergone many costly and painful operations and has spent many years in bed-traction and steel and plaster casts. The realization is that if Shere was X-rayed at birth this defect might have been discovered; thus, treatment could have begun earlier.

Mrs. Ferguson, daughter of Mrs. Millie Drake of Eastland and ex-movie star of the 20's, is putting up a "well worth while" fight in order that other children might not have to suffer as her granddaughter has.

The Eureka Infant X-Ray Foundation was established in Abilene as a non-profitable organization. Not only does it provide information to parents concerning the need of finding birth defects at an early stage, but also helps those whose parents can't afford the cost of X-rays by furnishing part of the cost for them.

Established by herself, this foundation provides that all new born infants be X-rayed for birth defects. If X-rays are made by the Eureka Foundation and a birth defect is sighted that early in the infants life, a higher possibility could be given that the child, with correct treatment and medication, would become a healthy, normal adult, she said.

## There Is No Such Thing As An 'Off-Election' Year

(An Editorial)

Today is Thursday and citizens have only through Saturday to qualify to vote in 1965 elections.

And poll tax sales are lagging in Eastland County. The tax office is offering a public service in announcing its intention of remaining open Saturday — but that's no reason to wait. Get 'em today. And remember too, that mailed applications must be in the hands of the tax office before the deadline — post marks do not count.

It's every person's own business whether he wants to equip himself to vote this year, but we would at least remind the public that the term "off-election" year is somewhat deceptive. And at no other time have Eastland Countians had more reason to be qualified voters, what with the EC-65 program now in progress. We have no idea what we may be called on to do in the future to help our county expand industrially, and some sort of election might be necessary. You'd want to be prepared to voice your vote.

And too, there's a vacancy in our 91st District Court which may at some time in the future require the casting of a ballot by a qualified voter.

In Eastland, a city election is certain in April, when three members of the City Commission will be chosen for three-year terms. There'll be a school board election with three posts to be voted on.

And what about local option? One never knows and it's best to be prepared to vote — regardless of your convictions.

Through Wednesday morning there had been 837 poll tax receipts and 113 exemptions issued by the tax office. (Most of the 113 exemptions are for 21-year-olds, which represents a goodly-sized new voting group.)

Beyond that, it cannot be predicted in January what other elections will arise before the year is out.

There already are strong signs that there will be a state constitutional election as a result of the legislative session now underway.

For example, Gov. John Connally Monday told the State Democratic Executive Committee he hopes Texans will have the opportunity to vote again this year on a constitutional amendment to repeal the poll tax. Connally urged the committee members to support an all-out drive for poll tax payments this week in anticipation of such an election.

Locally, elections could be called during 1965 on which citizens would want to vote. These could include bond issues or, conceivably, a wet-dry election. We say simply these are possibilities, without having any foreknowledge that such proposals are in the making.

For whatever eventuality may come, citizens will want to be qualified to vote.

Ironically it might be — remember you'll need a poll tax receipt to vote for the repeal of the poll tax.

## Eugene Witt, 96, Resident 65 Years Buried Tuesday

Funeral services for Eugene Witt, 96, were held Tuesday at 2:30 p.m. in the First Baptist Church with Rev. Hoston Brewer, pastor, officiating. Burial was in Eastland Cemetery under direction of Arrington Hamner Funeral Home.

A former pharmacist and car dealer in Eastland, he died at 8:30 a.m. Sunday in an Eastland rest home after eight months illness.

He was born Oct. 12, 1868 in Morristown, Tenn., moved to Arkansas with his parents in 1881 and came to Texas in 1904. He and a brother established Witt Brothers Drug Store here and later, Mr. Witt became Ford dealer for Eastland. Until retiring in 1960, he served as Eastland sanitation officer.

He was a member of Eastland Masonic Lodge No. 476 and of the First Baptist Church.

Survivors include a sister, Mrs. Nora Andrews of Eastland, and several nieces and nephews.

The nephews were pallbearers.

## Site-Tour of County Is Feb. 4 EC-65 Seminar

The next seminar for EC-65 will be held on Thursday, February 4, beginning in Cisco and continuing in area towns before concluding with lunch and a briefing session in Rising Star, according to the Texas Industrial Commission.

EC-65, the pilot program for industrial development, is sponsored by leaders from Eastland County in cooperation with the Texas Industrial Commission. This third seminar in a series of five so called "Plant Sites," a panel of experts from around the state will visit various sites in each community throughout the county and then hold a critique on how to improve and sell the properties to manufacturing companies.

The group will meet in Cisco at the Chamber of Commerce office at 8:30 a.m. on February 4. They will board a bus which is being provided by Cisco Junior College and then visit sites in Cisco, Eastland, Ranger, Gorman, and Rising Star. They will have lunch in Rising Star at the American Legion Hall and hold their briefing session there.

Anyone who wishes to join the tour in any town may do so.

The first two sessions were called "Community Betterment" and "Research and Analysis." The fourth and fifth seminars will be held in Gorman and Cisco on the subjects "Industrial Financing" and "How to Find Prospects." There is a possibility that Governor John Connally will attend the last seminar, according to a county spokesman.

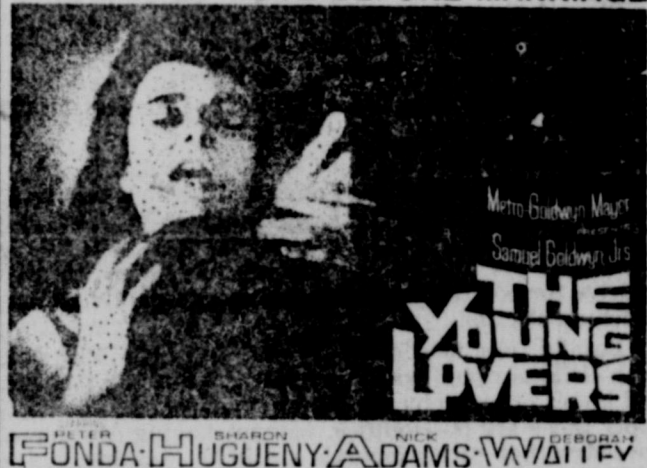

## Comanche Trail Explorers Will 'Compete' With Pros

Explorers in the fourteen Posts in the Comanche Trail Council, Boy Scouts of America, will be competing against two of the top champions in bowling and golf as a part of Sports That Last A Lifetime, a new national sports and physical fitness program.

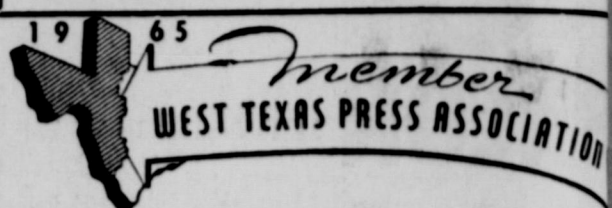

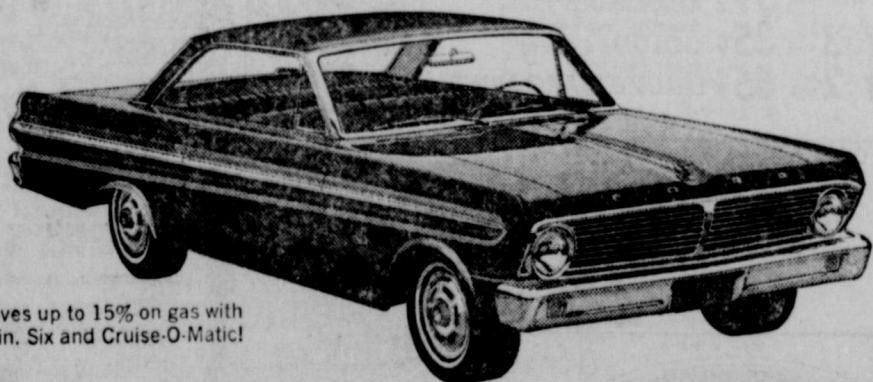

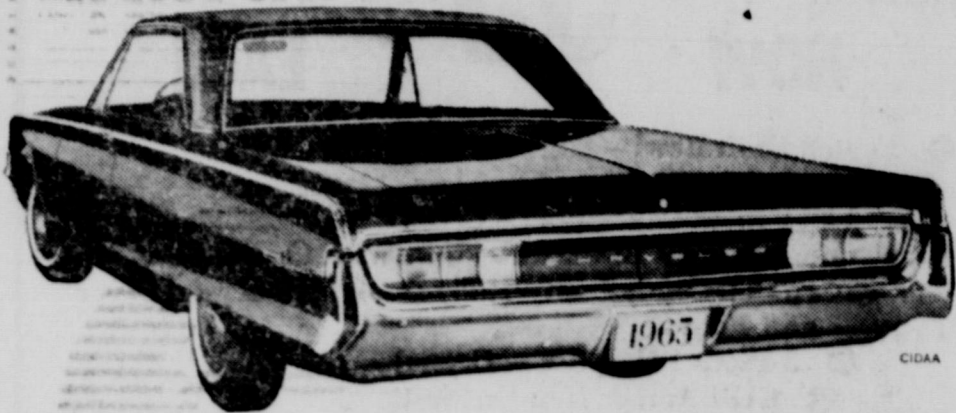

## 10 PERSONS KILLED IN '64 IN COUNTY TRAFFIC MISHAPS

The rural December traffic accident summary for Eastland County has been reported as follows:

No fatalities, eight personal injuries, and 13 accidents resulting in property damage. There were 13 persons injured and a total of \$10,790 in property damage.

Comparing traffic accidents occurring in 1964 with those in 1963, reports read as follows:

1964, 7 fatal accidents, 1963 — 6; 1964, 75 personal injury accidents, 1963 — 67; and 1964, 149 property damage accidents, 1963 — 118, making a total of 231 accidents in 1964 and 191 in 1963.

There were 10 deaths in 1964, only 6 in 1963; 114 persons injured in 1964 and 108 in 1963. The total amount of property damage in 1964 was \$141,590 and \$129,545 in 1963.

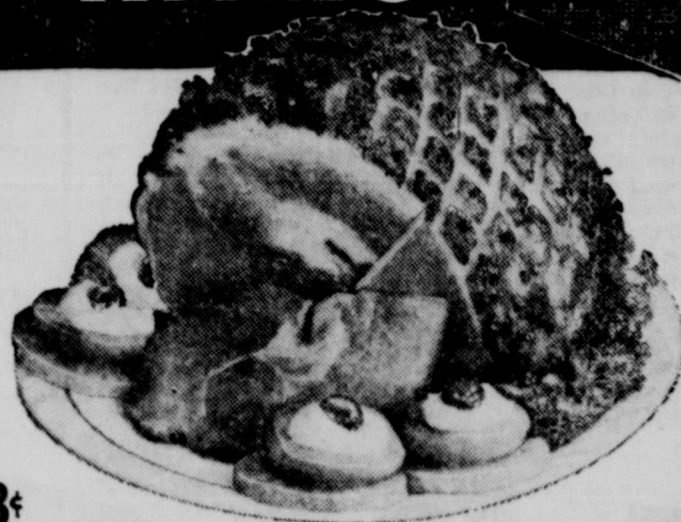
