





Q. What is the name of this cut

Pork blade loin roast. Q. Where does it come from and how is it identified?

A. It is a wedge-shaped cut con-caining rib bones and blade bone from the shoulder end of the loin. Q. How is it prepared?

A. By roasting. The meat is seasoned with salt and pepper. Then it is placed fat side up on a rack in an open shallow roasting pan A roast meat thermometer is in seried so that its bulb is in the center of the largest muscle. The bulb should not touch bone or rest in fat. No water is added and the roast is not covered: roasting is to dry heat method. The meat is roasted in a moderate oven (350° F.) until well done. The internal temperature should reach 185° F. as indicated on the thermometer. Allow about 45 to 50 minutes per pound minutes per pound



For sectioning, choose heavy thin-skinned grapefruit (either pink or white-fleshed) and the Temple oranges, the variety similar to tangerines when it comes to easy peeling. Remove the peel, just as you'd pare an apple, and over a bowl (you'll want to save the juice) cut away all the outer white membrane. Then lift each section out, cutting away from the dividing membranes at each side.


