US Bond Sales For '56 Start Off Spiritedly

Savings Bonds purchases of the "E" and "H" series were \$17,814,531 during January, State Savings Bonds Chairman Nathan Adams, announced today. The total "E" sales amounted to \$13,328,031 and "H" sales amounted to \$4,486,500.

Ed Gossett, state co-chairman of the Savings Bonds committee, pointed out that last month's sales in Texas represented over 8 per cent of the 1956 goal of \$217,500,000.

Game Preserve Told How To Proceed On Task By Mauerman

Robert G. Mauerman, wildlife biologist of the Fish and Game Commission of Austin, was principal speaker at a largely attended meeting of the Sabanna Valley Game Preserve Association at Center Point School House, five miles south of Carbon.

Mr. Mauerman outlined for members the necessary steps for getting deer and turkey stocked on the preserve they have set up. He also conducted a round-table discussion.

In order to get deer stocked on the preserve, he said, it would be necessary to have a solid block of land not less than 10,000 acres, the owners of this land to sign individual contracts with the state.

Capt. Morahan Tells Increase Of Accidents

Rural motor vehicle traffic accidents are increasing, said Captain G. L. Morahan, commanding officer of the Abilene Highway Patrol district, and he cited that there were 111 motor vehicle accidents in January, 1956, as compared with 87 motor vehicle accidents in January, 1955.

The severity of the accidents is also increasing with the number as eight people died in January, 1956, as compared with six deaths in January, 1955; while 82 injuries occurred as compared to 50 injuries in 1955.

Jones County led the 13-county patrol district with 20 accidents in January 1956, including two fatal accidents with four deaths, five injury accidents with nine people injured and property damage to all vehicles involved of \$10,105.00. Taylor County was second with 19 accidents, no fatal accidents, 11 injury accidents with 17 people injured, and property damage of \$7,590.00.

Captain Morahan stated that the increase in accidents can be charged to a combination of causes, increase in traffic volume, weather, disregard for traffic rules, "disregard for the rights of your fellow driver," and fatigue.

Patrolmen of the Abilene Patrol district increased their efforts in an attempt to curb the increase of traffic accidents, as 969 traffic arrests were made in January and 914 warnings were made.

Speed is still the leader in the field of hazardous violations with 642 arrests and 430 warnings.

Comanche Trail 1st In Scout Gains In Three-State Area

Eastland Boy Scout leaders have every reason to be proud of the membership gains, which has been made throughout the eight and one half counties, served by the Comanche Trail Council, Eastland County is in Comanche Trail.

"The council ranks first among 36 councils in Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico in highest per cent of membership gain, with 23.4 per cent gain in boys. There are 1968 boys in the Scouting movement in our area," according to W. Doyle Graves of Stephenville, chairman of organization and extension.

The council rated second in the highest per cent of new units gained in the three-state-area with 31.3 per cent. There are 84 Cub Packs, Scout troops and Explorer posts in this area.

Coffee Drinkers Find Beverage Cost Increasing

Wholesale coffee prices have now jumped to \$1 a pound, according to information received from Dallas wholesale distributors, and it is predicted that housewives will be paying at least that much and maybe more at the retail level within a few days.

Several coffee roasters boosted their wholesale prices another 4c a pound Tuesday, the third time this month. The total wholesale advance since Feb. 1 has been 9c.

As of today, coffee has not reached the \$1 a pound mark in Eastland since coffee stock on hand was bought at lower prices. It is said however, that with coffee wholesaling at \$1 a pound the retailer would have to sell it for at least \$1.05 to get his freight and handling costs out of it.

He was ordained in Dallas at the Sacred Heart Cathedral. He is now connected with work at the Cathedral in Dallas. Father McCoy will represent the Roman Catholic Religion on the panel.

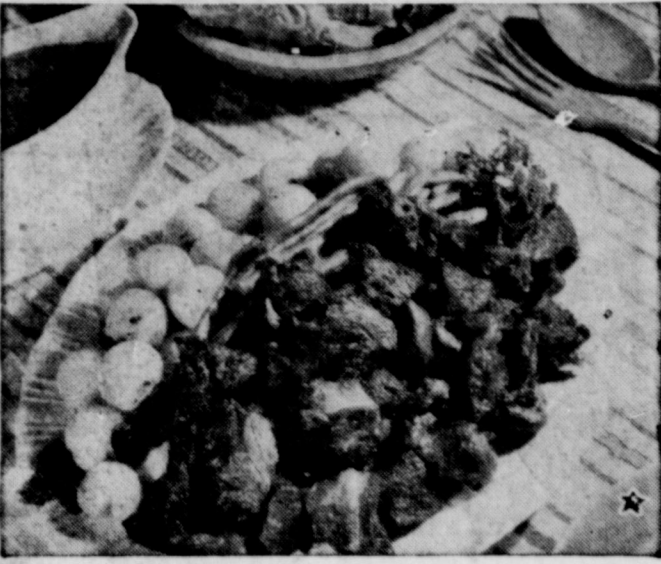

Graham Discusses Theology With Kai-Shek's On Formosa Island

 TAIPEI, Formosa — "We have tried everything the devil has to offer and found they don't hold water."
 The metaphors may be a little mixed up, but the woman doing the talking didn't seem to be. She was Madame Chiang Kai-shek, one of the world's most talented and beautiful women.
 The setting was ideal for polite chit-chat, but the chit-chat turned into theological discussion. Sitting across the table from Madame Chiang at the presidential palace was her husband, the Generalissimo, once ruler of the biggest nation on earth. He lost some of his world popularity when he committed the "great sin" of being opposed to Communism. U.S. Ambassador Karl L. Rankin was at one end of the table and his wife at the other. On each side of Madame Chiang was Billy Graham and Cliff Barrows, his music director. A few other guests were present, including Dr. Frank Graham founder of Christian College in Formosa, and Dr. Robert Pierce, head of World Vision.
 Chinese food was being served and for a few minutes there was a hum of conversation among the guests. Then Madame Chiang began asking questions. Most of her questions were directed at Billy Graham. The hum faded as everyone strained to hear the conversation between two of the world's most famous people.
 One of the first things she asked was "Are people saved who make a decision for Christ and then backslide?" Billy answered, "If the decision was genuine I believe the Bible teaches they are saved, but if a person has sincerely received Christ into his heart he isn't going to stay a backslider long. He will be so miserable that

he will ask God's forgiveness and resume living like a Christian. Some people who think confessing Christ gives them license to sin are just kidding themselves. They have never been saved."
 Madame Chiang has stated she was an intellectual Christian. For many years she believed in God with her head but not her heart. It was only in recent years, she said, that she experienced Christ in a real way and began to grow. The Generalissimo took little part in the conversation. He doesn't speak English. His face brightened occasionally when Dr. Frank Graham, a gifted linguist, or his wife would interpret a choice bit. Only an outstanding diplomat could have sat there looking pleasant while listening to words he couldn't understand.
 The next question Madame Chiang asked was this: "What about people who have never heard of Christ? When they die will they go to hell?"
 One person at the table replied immediately: "They are lost." Madame Chiang countered, "I don't believe that." Billy said: "I don't believe any man can set himself up as a judge and say whether these people are lost or saved. I think that rests in the providence of Almighty God, a God who is holy, pure and righteous. I do believe that the Spirit of God deals directly with some people who have never heard His message. Jungle savages have been found worshipping Christ who have never seen a Bible or listened to a preacher."
 One couldn't help but marvel at the nature of the conversation around the dinner table of Nationalist China's Number One family. All of the talk was about God, the Bible and Jesus Christ.
 After the guests left the table and retired to the drawing room Generalissimo answered a few questions through an interpreter. A faithful reader of the Bible, he said his favorite passage was the 23rd Psalm. He said that it was his dream to lead his people back to the mainland of China.
 In reply to the questions as to what would be his Number One prayer request to the Christians of the world, he said he would ask that people would be willing not only to pray about stopping Communism but to do something about it when they have finished praying.

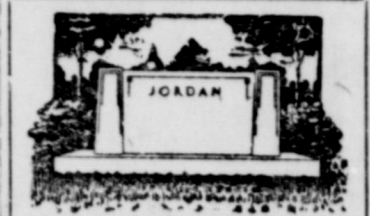

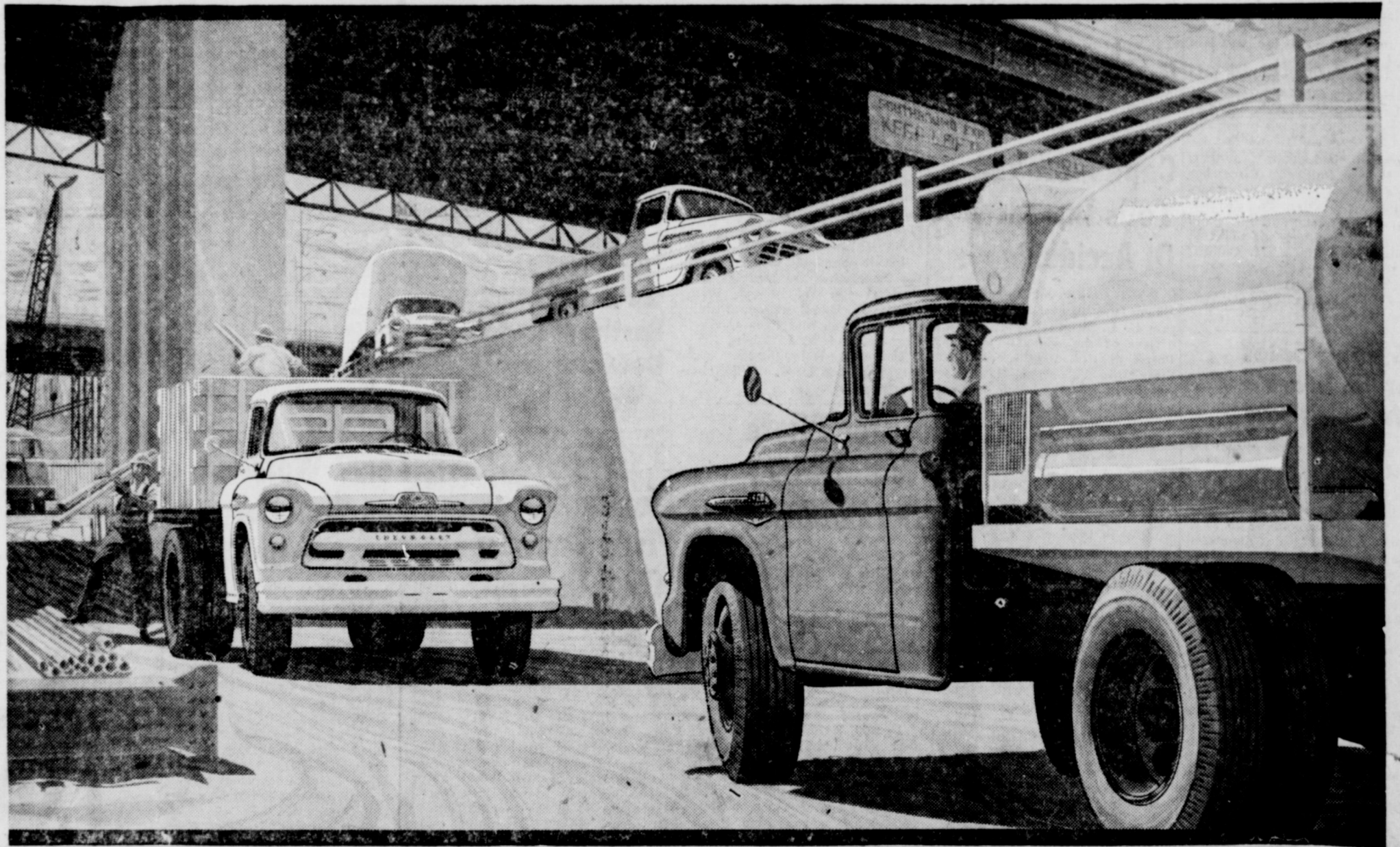

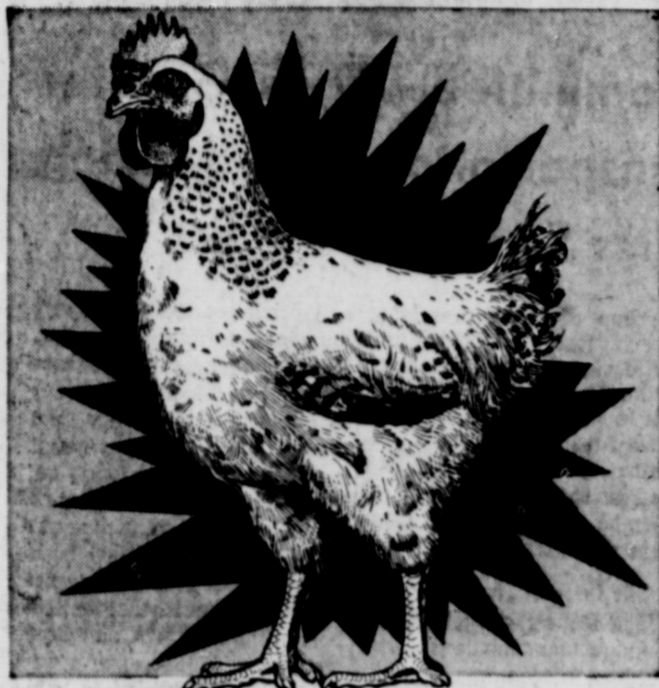

Q. What is the name of this cut of meat?
A. Pork blade loin roast.
Q. Where does it come from and how is it identified?
A. It is a wedge-shaped cut containing rib bones and blade bone from the shoulder end of the loin.
Q. How is it prepared?
A. By roasting. The meat is seasoned with salt and pepper. Then it is placed fat side up on a rack in an open shallow roasting pan. A roast meat thermometer is inserted so that its bulb is in the center of the largest muscle. The bulb should not touch bone or rest in fat. No water is added and the roast is not covered; roasting is a dry heat method. The meat is roasted in a moderate oven (350° F.) until well done. The internal temperature should reach 185° F. as indicated on the thermometer. Allow about 45 to 60 minutes per pound.

Presidential Committee Urges Greater Freedom in Transportation Rate Making Report Cites Savings to Public

Dallas, Texas — At the second session of the 84th Congress, one of the important legislative items to be considered is the Report of the Presidential Advisory Committee on Transport Policy. The Report contains recommendations for building a sound transportation system to serve the nation in peace and war.

More Transportation for Less Money

According to the Committee, the national transportation policy should stress competition, not government regulation, as the determining factor in setting carriers' charges for their services.

By placing all common carriers on a competitive rate-making basis, each mode of transport will be encouraged to develop its inherent advantages and pass on the resulting savings in lower rates to shippers. And because shipping costs are included in the price of almost every commodity, lowered shipping costs can easily mushroom into tremendous savings to the public.

Prevents Monopoly

The Interstate Commerce Commission would retain its power to prevent effectively any carrier from becoming a monopoly or from engaging in any unjust or unreasonable rate cutting.

Under the recommendations of the Report, the railroads would not have any rights or privileges not enjoyed by other modes of transportation.

All of the carriers would be on an equal rate-making basis ... all enjoying the same rights

and privileges under precisely the same wording of the law. Where the inherent advantages made it possible for one carrier to establish a rate lower than that of some other carrier, it would be permitted to do so.

All the railroads seek, or all they are entitled to, is the right to compete on an equal basis with all other modes of transportation. That is what the Report of the Cabinet Committee recommends. The consuming public has everything to gain and nothing to lose by applying this principle of our free enterprise system to transportation.

Public Interest First

The Report contains many sound recommendations ... all designed to promote the public interest by making it possible for the railroads, trucks and inland water carriers to compete for the nation's traffic on an equal basis.

The Committee recommends that each carrier be given the freedom to offer the public the lowest possible rates, so long as such rates show a profit over and above the cost of providing the services and provided such rates are not unfair.

Then lift each section out, cutting away from the dividing membranes at each side.

The mixed fruit has endless uses. Plain fruit cups are good menu items for breakfast, lunch or dinner. The sections can be used in salads, or to garnish meat or fish dishes. And however they're used, they lend refreshment and nutrition to a meal.
