# Price, Rent Control Laws **Under Study**

WASHINGTON, July 16 (P) Despite disclosure by President Roosevelt that specific methods of holding down rents and prices during the war emergency were under consideration, congressional leaders said today it would be many weeks before legislation on the subject could even be brought up

Less coolness was evidenced in congressional quarters, however, toward another administration plan which would affect directly the lives of millions of Americans -the request which Mr. Roosevelt sent to congress yesterday for au-thority to order extension of daylight saving time wherever neces-

The president backed up the request with the argument that general use of daylight saving would conserve an estimated 736,282,000 kilowatt hours of energy annually which would help offset developing shortages of power needed for defense production.

Chairman Lea (D-Calif) of the house interstate commerce com-mittee announced he would introduce a bill carrying the desired authority and hearings would start early next week. The reaction of many legislators was summed up by Senator Bone (D-Wash) who said that if daylight saving could "accomplish industrial objects for national defense, there probably

mational decense, there probably will be no opposition."

The related questions of rent and price control were brought up at President Roosevelt's press conference yesterday, and the chief executive reported that pegging of rents in defense centers was under study.

# US, Argentina Negotiate New Trade Treaty

WASHINGTON, July 13. (AP) The United States has opened discussion with Argentina for large purchases of strategic minerals and metals as the latest step in a program expected to result in pur-chases of \$500,000,000 worth of defense raw materials annually from

the other American republics.
Discussions with Argentina quickly followed conclusion of an agreement with Mexico for acqui-sition by this country of lead, mercury, antimony, tungsten and other vitally needed raw materials in quantities estimated at \$100,000,000

Similar pacts calling for large purchases of strategic and essential minerals and metals already have been negotiated with several ther American nations, notably Chile (copper and nitrates), Bolivia (tin), and Brazil.

Since German and Japanese buyers in other South and Central American countries have attempted to buy all available stocks when-ever they have been able to secure specific information, no details of prospective Argentine purchases have been made public.
