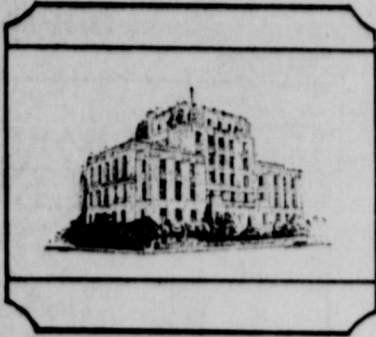

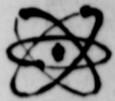

Mavs vs. Millsap Saturday at 10:15 In Region Playoff

Those hurdle-jumping, game-winning Eastland Mavericks will move up into the finals of the regional basketball tournament in Denton Saturday morning.

The Maverick Scoring Corp. wheeled and dealt Monday night to roll over Marble Falls, 72-52, in a Class A Bi-District contest in Brownwood.

Coach Denson Moody's Faithfuls put on a power defense show, and excelled just enough in the offense department to oust their South Texas rivals, please the hoard of Eastland fans that traveled to Brownwood to see the battle, and come home with the victory.

The highlight of the game came at the end of the second quarter of play when Mav Hayden Wilson hauled off and threw the roundball in for two from a distance of 75 feet.

Playing a close game during the first half, the Mighty Mavs came alive in the third period and racked up 26 points to give them a great advantage.

Millsap defeated Henrietta 66-53 Tuesday and are expected to be the first Maverick foe in Denton Saturday.

The Mustangs were unable to move the ball against the Maverick Defensive tactics. Both teams seemed to be playing rather slow in the first half, but as they loosened up, the Mavs began a scoring spree that was "just a little better" than that of Marble Falls.

The win gave the Big Red a berth in the Regional playoffs in Denton Saturday morning. The Mav's opponent awaited the outcome of the Henrietta - Millsap contest in Jacksboro Tuesday night.

Bi-district is, in effect, a first-round elimination for Regional contest. The Mav's will play two games, provided they come out victorious Saturday morning. The next game will be the same day.

Leading the Mavericks in scoring was Terry Treadwell with 29, Mike Miller with 22, Hayden Wilson with 10, James Whitehead with 1, Larry Wilson and Jim Herridge, both with five.

Portrait Of Judge Collie Unveiled In 91st Court

A formal portrait of the late Judge Turner M. Collie was unveiled and dedicated Wednesday morning in Eastland County's 91st District Court—the court over which he presided for 12 years.

Judge Collie, second judge to head the 91st Court, died in mid-December. He had just been re-elected to his fourth term.

A large delegation witnessed the ceremony in the courtroom Wednesday as Eastland Attorney Virgil T. Seaberry Jr., representing the Eastland County Bar Association, made remarks commemorating the portrait, which hangs above the bench, on the south wall of the court.

Among those present were Mrs. Collie, widow of the late District Judge, members of

the local bar, county officials, friends and spectators.

A native of Eastland County, Judge Collie was elected to the state legislature from this county in 1946 and served three terms. Earlier he had served as county clerk here.

Born March 2, 1899, in Cis-

co, he attended high school in Gorman and married the former Zula Overby of Eastland. He was a graduate of the Cumberland Law School in Cumberland, Tenn.

He was a member of the First Methodist Church and a former teacher of the Men's Bible Class, and a former scoutmaster for Eastland Boy Scout Troop 103.

I, Frank Deaton, in my capacity as Mayor of the City of Eastland, Texas, do hereby order that an election be held in said City on the 6th day of April, 1965, for the purpose of electing the following officials for said City:
Three Commissioners.
That in accordance with an order adopted by the City Commission of said City, said election shall be held at the following places in said City, and the following named persons are hereby appointed officers for said election.

In Election Precinct No. 1 at City Hall Building, in said City, with Mr. Pat Crawford as Presiding Judge, and Mr. Hoover Pittman as Alternate Presiding Judge, and said Presiding Judge shall appoint the necessary clerks to assist him which shall not exceed 6 clerks.

Mr. Pat Crawford and Mr. Hoover Pittman are hereby appointed Deputy Clerks for absentee voting. The absentee voting for the above designated election shall be held at City Hall within said City and said place of absentee voting shall remain open for at least eight hours on each day for absentee voting which is not a Saturday, a Sunday, or an official State holiday, beginning on the 20th day and continuing through the 4th day preceding the date of said election. Said place of voting shall remain open between the hours of 8 a. m. and 5 p. m. on each for said absentee voting.

That said election shall be held in accordance with the Election Code of this State and only resident qualified voters of said city shall be eligible to vote at said election. That the City Secretary shall give notice of said election by posting a copy of this order in each of the election precincts of said city, which posting shall be done not less than 30 days prior to date fixed for said election.

That immediately after said election is held, the officers holding the same shall make returns of the result thereof to the Mayor of this city as required by the Election Code of this State.

A copy of this order shall also serve as a writ of election which shall be delivered to the above appointed Presiding Judge, for said election.

FFA Week Being Observed Locally

The largest farm boy's organization in the world, the Future Farmers of America, will highlight the celebration of National F.F.A. week Feb. 21-27 with various activities throughout the United States.

F.F.A. Week is observed traditionally during the birthday of George Washington, America's first scientific farmer. The membership of F.F.A. has grown to more

than 380,000 during the organization's 35 years of existence. The forty thousand Texas Future Farmers are high school age boys enrolled in vocational agriculture courses in which they study practical and scientific methods of farming and receive leadership training.

Each boy is required to have a supervised farming program of livestock, poultry or crops under the direction of a vocational agriculture teacher who is an agriculture college graduate.

The boys participate in area and state judging contests in dairy cattle, livestock, meat products, milk products, poultry, land use, crops, and land judging.

Each Future Farmer is given the opportunity to work for advancement in the degrees offered by the local chapter and state association. The three degrees offered are: Greenhand, Chapter Farmer and Lone Star Farmer. American Farmer, the highest degree, is awarded by the National Future Farmers of America.

Everyone is familiar with the emblem of the F.F.A. There are five units in the emblem — the plow, the rising sun, an owl and a cross section of an ear of corn, on which is mounted the American Eagle, national bird of the United States. The owl is a symbol of knowledge and wisdom, the plow stands for labor and tillage of the soil, the cross section of the ear of corn is a native American crop and is grown in every state of the Union and the eagle is indicative of the national scope of the Future Farmers organization.

The Eastland Chapter of the F.F.A. is especially proud to emphasize the building of a new vocational agriculture building. This building will house the vocational agriculture classroom, shop and office. It's exterior is nearing completion and the interior work is progressing nicely. Officials expect the building to be completed by March 15.

Eastland F.F.A. boys are eagerly awaiting the Eastland County Livestock Show to be held March 11-13, which will give them a chance to exhibit their projects into which they have poured such care.

Advisor of the Eastland F.F.A. is Vocational Agriculture Teacher W. L. (Dub) Sims, who is a 1962 graduate of Texas A&M University. Current officers are Mike Lewis, president; Jim Jordan, vice-president; Charles Moseley, secretary; Bill Boles, treasurer; Steve Perdue, reporter; and Sam Beggs, sentinel.

scholars have joined the faculty, and the student body has become the second largest in the U.S. The current enrollment of about 1,425 day students is surpassed only by Harvard University.

Dean Keeton served on the University Law School faculty from 1932 to 1946, before leaving to become dean of the University of Oklahoma Law School. Three years later he returned to UT to become Law School dean. During World War II he was on leave to serve as counsel for the Petroleum Administration for War and the Office of Price Administration.

In 1961 he was president of the Association of American Law Schools, a learned society and accrediting agency composed of representatives from more than 100 of the nation's leading law schools. Dean Keeton earned a Doctor of Juridical Science degree from Harvard University in 1936 and both Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Laws degree from The University of Texas in 1931.

Dean Keeton is a specialist in torts — the segment of law which deals with suits filed by one individual against another for damages. He is an editor of "Law of Torts," an American Casebook series, and serves on the American Law Institute's advisory committee for revision of the Restatement of the Law of Torts.

He has written extensively for various law journals, especially the Texas Law Review, and is a member of the State Bar of Texas, American Bar Association, Phi Beta Kappa and Order of the Coif, national legal society.

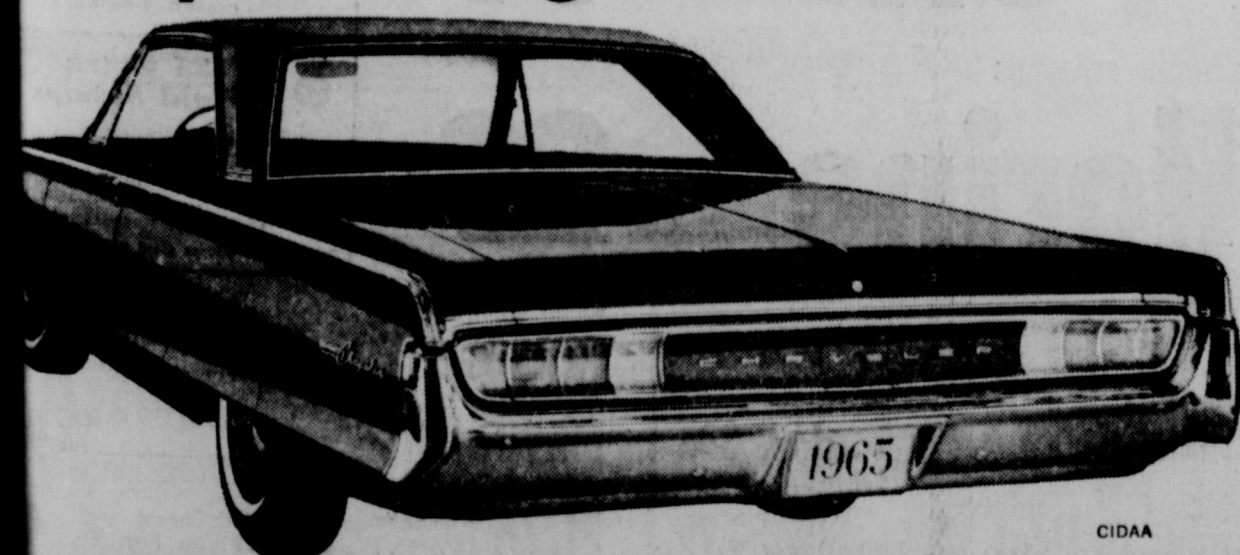

El Paso Man Is Named District Farm Agent

John E. Burleson, El Paso County Agricultural Agent since 1960, on March 1 will become district agricultural agent for Extension District 8 with headquarters at Stephenville. Burleson replaces R. G. Burwell who retired on January 31, 1965. The Central Texas district is composed of 20 counties, including Eastland County.

In making the announcement, Director John E. Hutchison, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, said Burleson has made an outstanding record in each of the positions he has held since joining the Extension Service in 1951. He is a native of Eastland County but did most of his growing up on a Comanche County farm.

The new district agent is a graduate of De Leon High School, Tarleton State College and Texas Technological College with a B. S. degree in horticulture. He has also done graduate work during summer sessions at Texas A&M and Colorado State Universi-

ties and regular sessions at Texas Western College. He served in the U. S. Navy during 1945 and 1946.

Burleson was first employed by the Texas Extension Service in 1951 as an assistant county agricultural agent in training in Hood County. He was transferred to Johnson County within the year as assistant county agent and to Tarrant County in 1953. He was named county agricultural agent for Navarro County in 1954 where he served until his transfer to El Paso County.

The convention, which shapes up as one of the largest ever held by the national association, is expected to attract some 1,000 delegates — college administrators, faculty, members of boards of trustees, and representatives of state departments of education and universities.

Governor Connally has demonstrated wide interest in education needs of the nation as well as his own state, said Edmund J. Gleazer, Jr., executive director of AAJC. He showed his concern by appointing a high-level Commission on Education Beyond the High School, which has recommended sweeping changes in public higher education in Texas.

Texas, a pioneer in junior college development, has 45 junior colleges enrolling some 50,000 students.

Connally was inaugurated as the 38th governor of Texas in 1963. In line with his campaign theme, he proposed and supported an aggressive program to the 58th legislature with primary emphasis on excellence in education as the vital key to the future of Texas.

'65 Automobiles Reflect Up Value

With Spring just around the corner and Vacation time fast approaching, more and more Eastland Countians and area residents are going to begin thinking about a brand new automobile for their family's enjoyment and comfort.

What better place than in Eastland, "The New Car Capital," to look at the '65s. And the widest possible choice of make and model is available in Eastland, where members of the Eastland New Car and Truck Dealers Association welcome visitors every day.

And the prospective buyer will have a field day in Eastland because of the wide choice, the friendly service and "home-town" trading hospitality.

Following the trend of the

past several years, the 1965 model cars reflect increased value while offering the prospective buyer the widest choice of body styles, engines, transmissions and suspension systems in the history of the industry.

This year he may select from 343 body styles, up from 336 last year. A wide range of optional equipment also permits him to tailor the basic car to fill almost any need or desire.

Setting a new high for a single year, 16 passenger car bodies are all new and 10 other lines have made sweeping changes. Most models are longer, wider and offer greater interior space.

The improved performance trend is continued with vehicles operating better under all kinds of driving conditions.

Increased use of galvanized steel and changes in car design to keep water from collecting in underbody areas add to corrosion resistance. Aluminum trim is in wider use than a year ago but stainless steel still predominates.

ENGINES

Manufacturers this year offer 40 different basic engines, a new high for the industry. In addition a wide range of optional equipment, such as multiple carburetors and special camshafts, augment these basic powerplants.

Much of the improved performance in the '65 engines results from larger valves contributing to better breathing. Better design also provides more power output per pound of engine weight. Cylinder wall thickness has been reduced and combustion chambers are more efficient. Engines run quieter and greater care has been taken to stop engine noise and vibration from reaching the passenger compartment.

Many cars have increased fuel tank capacity and a number are utilizing cross flow or horizontal radiators instead of the traditional vertical type.

CHASSIS

Several cars have adopted perimeter type frames and a number are offering new rear axles and improved ball joints in their suspension systems.

In the transmission field, variable pitch stator blades appear to be favored over fixed position blades. A definite trend is showing this year in a switch from two-speed to three-speed automatic transmission. The call for "four-on-the-floor" manual transmissions is exceeding anticipated demands.

Less noticeable but equally important is the large number of transmission refinements that are making possible smoother and more accurate automatic shifting, particularly in the middle range of operation.

Brakes show a big improvement with a number of cars featuring increased ribs and

flanges to aid heat dissipation. The tendency of some vehicles to shudder under certain stopping conditions has been reduced.

Disc brakes are coming into prominence this year appearing in 10 different lines of cars, usually as optional equipment. With one exception, this marks the first time disc brakes have been used on American cars since 1949 and the first time this type brake is being used on a heavy car.

BODIES

New frame designs linked with curved glass side windows are providing increased passenger comfort through greater shoulder, hip and leg room. Flatter front doors and larger entrances and exits are a feature of many models. Several have completely redesigned their ventilating systems to provide a larger supply of fresh air and to minimize wind noise.

Engineers have been paying increased attention to the various elements of the electrical system seeking to fool-proof the entire network. The '65s reflect this work most noticeably in the ignition system.

Included in numerous other improvements for the new models are windshield wipers that clean larger areas, interval adjustable wipers, third seat heaters for station wagons, telescoping steering columns, simplified air conditioning and heater controls, and systems that lock or unlock all four doors simultaneously.

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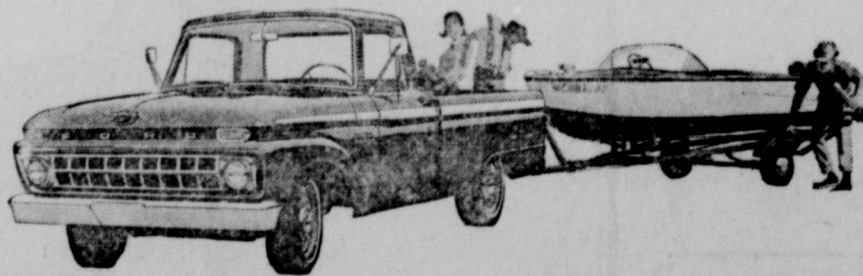
