The terms of Mayor Frank Deaton, Dr. M. A. Treadwell Jr. and Dale Troutt expire this year. Both Mayor Deaton and Commissioner Treadwell have filed for re-election, but Commissioner Troutt has moved from Eastland.

Mr. Verner is an automobile salesman for Pipkin's Motor Co. and has lived in Eastland since 1937, when he moved here from Mineral Wells.

He and Mrs. Verner live at 396 S. Hillcrest. An oil company consignee for 14 years, he was also in the tire business here for many years, up until 1960.

Hart, son of the late County Judge John Hart moved to Eastland last year from Midland and opened an office for the practice of law. On March 1, his firm merged with two other Eastland law firms. Dr. T. E. Payne, Veteran Eastland Doctor, Buried

Funeral services for Dr. Thomas Edgar Payne, 83, well known Eastland County physician, were held at 2 p.m. Thursday in the First Baptist Church of Eastland.

The Rev. P. D. O'Brien of Houston officiated and burial was in Eastland Cemetery with Arrington Hamner Funeral Home in charge.

Dr. Payne died in Eastland Memorial Hospital Wednesday morning following a long illness.

At one time Dr. Payne owned the only hospital in Eastland, which he sold in the late 1940s. He was born Nov. 15, 1881, in Garfield, Mo. and came to Texas in 1890. He married Nora Ballinger Dec. 24, 1904.

A graduate of the University of Texas Medical School at Galveston, he practiced in Scranton from 1910 to 1918 when he moved to Eastland, where he practiced until he became ill in late 1964.

Dr. Payne was a member of American Medical Assn. and First Baptist Church. Survivors include three daughters, Miss Velma Payne of Carlsbad, N. M., Miss Ima Payne of Austin and Miss Ivy Payne of Houston; and one brother Elvin D. Payne of Texarkana.

Olden Water System Appears 'On The Way'

The future looks bright for the flow of water through an Olden Water System after a community meeting Thursday night.

Over 100 persons attended the planning meeting and 23 brand new water customers signed up to join the system. The same number, 23, present customers indicated their intentions of joining the proposed Olden system, and as many more, said that they will join the system in the next few weeks, Treasurer Bill Hunter reported.

That amounts to some 69 customers for the system, which has a goal of 110, reflecting an optimistic future for the system, which will purchase water from Eastland and distribute it through an FHA-financed system in Olden.

A 30-year loan will be negotiated with the Farmers Home Administration to put the system into being.

Treasurer Hunter, who has the receipt book, said that persons who wish to sign up may contact him, or other members of the committee. The \$1,050 which was collected at the Thursday night meeting was placed in an interest-bearing account Friday, Hunter said.

Engineer for the Olden system is the Abilene firm of Yeatts and Decker and legal counsel is Dewey Cox of Ranger, who is drawing up a set of by-laws.

A visit of Gov. John B. Connally to Eastland County early next summer will climax the sixmonth EC-65 Eastland County industrialization program, pilot Texas county pro-

ject to expand presently operating industries and to secure new plants and payrolls. County community civic and business leaders initiated the pilot program last December

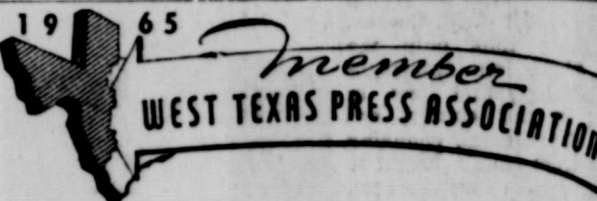

On the corner of Ammerman and Plummer, an intersection where many people pass by each day, there are shrubs planted right on the corner; thus another blind intersection.

The corner of Burkett and Green is another disgrace, it is absolutely impossible for the driver to see until he is already in the lane of traffic. These are not the only places in town but are among the worst. Isn't there something that can be done about this?

312 Retail Firms in Eastland County Do \$23.1 Million Annual Business

(Ed. Note: This local news item was prepared by a Census Bureau electronic computer and typed at 10 lines per second especially for The Telegram.)

Eastland County's 312 retail establishments had \$23.1 million in sales in 1963. Substantially unchanged from 1958, the U. S. Bureau of the Census has just reported after tabulating data gathered from all firms in the 1963 Census of Business. The last previous business census conducted by the Census Bureau, an

agency of the U. S. Department of Commerce, was in 1958.

Retail trade in the county meant jobs (exclusive of proprietors) for 731 men and women and a yearly payroll of \$1.9 million.

In volume of business the county's food stores had sales of \$5.9 million, an increase of 4 per cent from 1958. In other retail business — the county's eating and drinking places had sales of \$944 thousand, and gasoline service stations had sales of \$5.0 million; Gen-

eral merchandise group stores had sales of \$2.0 million; and lumber, building materials, hardware and farm equipment dealers had sales of \$1.6 million.

For the state as a whole, the Census Bureau reported 96,406 retail establishments with sales of \$127,154 million, up 18 per cent from 1958.

Census reports to be issued during the next few months will give state and county figures on wholesale and service trades, manufacturing and mineral industries.

Figures on number of establishments and sales volume for major types of retail establishments in each county are provided in the printed report: 1963 Census of Business, Retail Trade, Texas, available at \$1.00 from Superintendent of Documents, Washington, D. C. 20402 and at U. S. Department of Commerce Field offices.

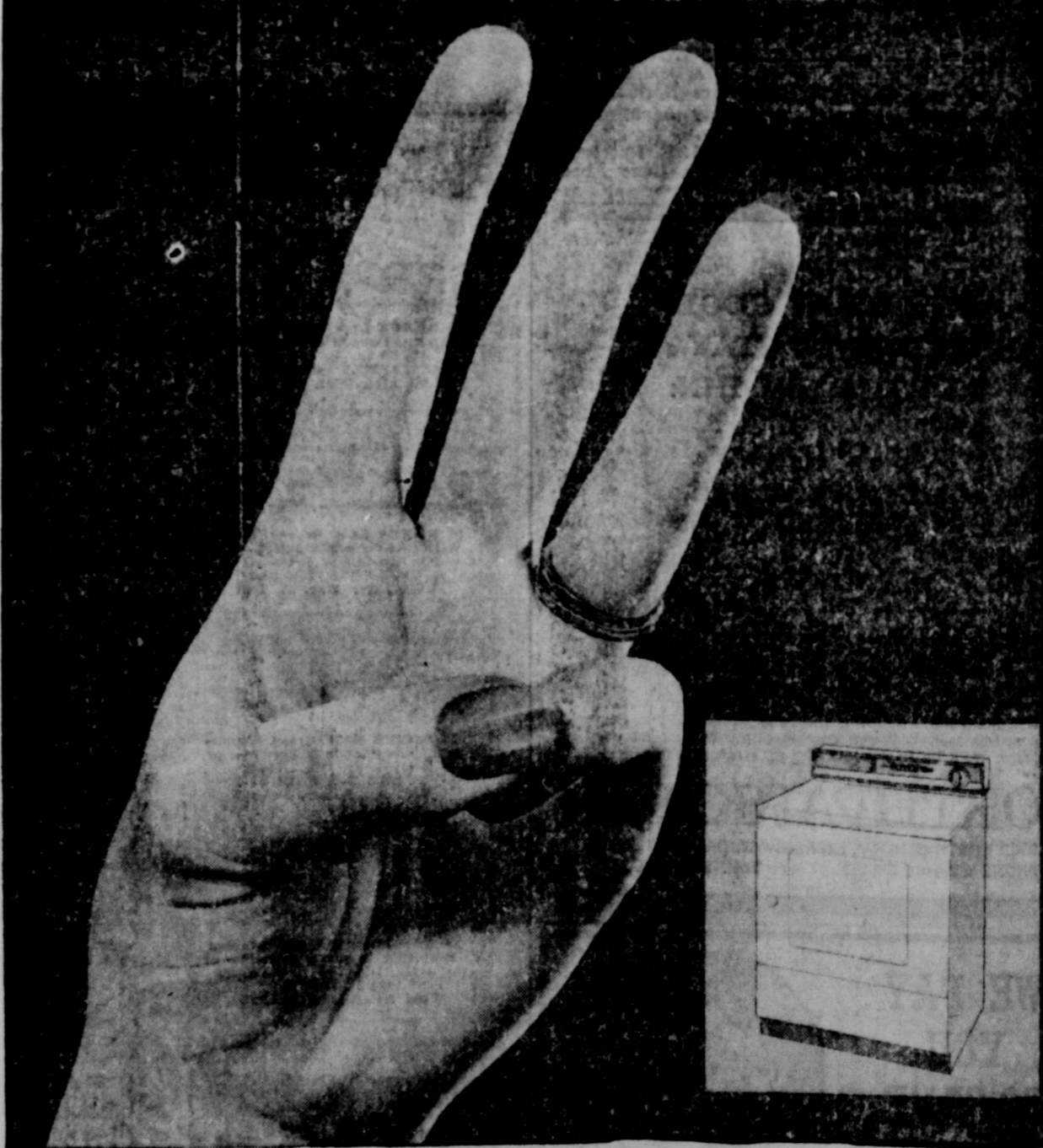

Local Plant Force Exceeds Expectations, Manager Says

"The work force quality at the Eastland Hollywood-Vasarette plant far exceeds my company's expectations," Don Vieregger, local manager, told the Eastland Lions Club this week.

This plant has the highest efficiency rating of any of the Munsingwear plants, he said, as he explained that with the present 200 employees, some 800 dozen brassieres are man-

ufactured each day, with a total net retail value of some \$16,000.

Neal Edwards was program chairman and introduced Mr. Vieregger.

Outlining Munsingwear's gigantic national structure, Mr. Vieregger explained that the company is among the nation's leading clothing industries. He also described the current expansion program

which will increase this plant's size by 10,800 square feet, up to 22,440 square feet, its work force by 100 employees, up to 300 in a year's time, its production up 300 dozen to 900 dozen in a year, and its payroll up to \$650,000 in a year.

"And our faculty will undoubtedly be full again in a year or 18 months," he said, "possibly requiring further expansion." He told how the company's girder production is being moved from the Chicago area to other Texas plants, and the Eastland plant will probably have to absorb part of these plants present brassiere production.

The Hollywood plant has been in Eastland about 18 years.

MEDICAL CARE OR "MEDICARE" WHICH DO YOU WANT?

TEXAS today has one of the nation's finest, most comprehensive programs of medical care for the aged. These programs—the Texas approach, we call it—include medical benefits to Old Age Assistance recipients and extensive health cost protection through the use of special insurance plans for the aged. The Texas legislature is also expected to implement a medical care plan for those who are not on Old Age Assistance but who do need help in meeting medical expenses.

Consider these facts:

- 229,000 needy aged, representing 30 percent of Texas' entire aged population, now have a Blue Cross-Blue Shield health insurance policy paid for by the State,
- This State program provides hospital, medical, surgical, x-ray, and nursing home benefits,
- 72% of the aged in Texas now have one or more health insurance policies,
- Through the "Texas 65 Health Insurance Plan," Blue Cross' "Senior Texan Service," and other special programs offered to the aged by private companies, health insurance is available to all who want it at a reasonable cost,
- Studies by Belden Associates indicate that only a small percentage of the aged actually still need and want help in paying health costs (these aged would be covered by the program now being considered by the Texas Legislature).

In view of these facts, the national "medicare" tax proposal (the King-Anderson bill, H.R. 1) is not needed. "Medicare" benefits are very limited, covering about one quarter (25%) of the total yearly health care costs of the average aged person. "Medicare" would not cover physicians' services or surgical charges, nor would it cover the cost of drugs outside of institutional care.

The "medicare" proposal is an extremely expensive one. While we all are starting to enjoy a reduction in federal income taxes as a result of action by Congress last year, the "medicare" program would cost an estimated \$1.7 billion dollars in additional taxes the first year. "Medicare" would increase payroll taxes to cover everyone over 65—even the wealthy. The employee who now pays a maximum tax of \$174 annually would find the amount for Social Security benefits and "medicare" increased to \$291 by 1971. Employers would pay a similar increase for each employee, thus resulting in higher prices for goods and services.

The Texas approach of providing medical, surgical and hospital care to those who need it is a more comprehensive, more economical program than "medicare," and it provides more benefits. If you object to paying higher payroll taxes for an undesirable, unneeded program, write your Congressman today. Ask him to oppose the "medicare" tax proposal, mentioning the programs for the aged now available in Texas. Ask him to support the Herlong-Curtis Elder Care Bill (H.R. 3727), which would make possible the broadening of the existing Texas program to provide medical, hospital and nursing home care for those few remaining aged who are still in need of help.
