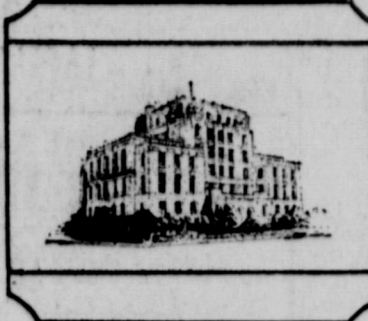

Charley Garrett Named Gorman Superintendent

Charlie L. Garrett, Ranger High School principal since 1955, has been appointed superintendent of the Gorman Public Schools effective July 1.

Garrett has been associated with the Ranger school system for 12 years, has submitted his resignation to the board of the Ranger Independent School District. His current contract runs through June 30, 1966.

Prior to becoming principal in 1955, Garrett had served as a classroom teacher for one year and junior assistant principal for one and one-half years. He came to Ranger from Carbon where he had been principal for eight and one-half years. Garrett has been in the teaching profession for 29 years and all his classroom service has been in Eastland County Schools.

A son of the late Mr. and Mrs. T. B. Garrett of Carbon, Garrett received his bachelor of science degree from Daniel Baker College, Brownwood, and later was awarded his master of education degree from Hardin-Simmons University, Abilene.

The Garretts, who reside at 709 Paige St., are active members of the First Methodist Church. He is serving his fifth year as chairman of the official board of the church.

Mr. and Mrs. Garrett have three children — two sons and a daughter. Their youngest son, Jim Tom, 15, lives with his parents and is a Ranger High School freshman.

Their other son, Chuck Garrett, resides in Fort Worth where he is employed by the Fort Worth Police Department. His wife is the former Cindy Halbrook of Ranger. The couple has one son, Kevin.

The Garrett's daughter, Sue, resides in Houston. Her husband is Billy Mac Nichols, also a Ranger native. The Nicholoses have two daughters — Kelly and Kim.

"Our stay in Ranger has been a most pleasant one," Garrett said Friday morning, "but the family is looking forward to moving to Gorman and getting settled on the new job."

Gilliam Named to E.C. Water Board Post This Week

Glyn Gilliam, president of Commercial State Bank, Ranger, has been appointed to the Eastland County Water Supply District board of directors.

Appointment was made during the board's regular meeting Thursday afternoon in Ranger.

Gilliam will serve out the unexpired term of W. F. Creager, former Rangerite who recently moved to Kaufmann.

During other action, the ECWSD directors heard a discussion of coming changes in the line carrying water from Lake Leon to the City of Ranger.

The new cloverleaf interchange of Interstate Highway 20 — to be erected in the vicinity of present Highway 80 west and the farm to market highway which goes to Lake Leon — will necessitate relocation of a 12-inch line.

A representative of Friese and Nichols, consulting engineers retained by the Eastland County Water Supply District, discussed the change with the directors.

The Fort Worth firm will make a recommendation for re-location of the line. The change, after okayed by the ECWSD board, must also be approved by state and federal agencies.

Mrs. Bratton Found 'Not Guilty' of Murder

Mrs. Susie Maurine Bratton walked out of the Eastland County Courthouse Thursday evening acquitted of the Sept. 30, 1963 slaying of her ex-husband, R. L. Bratton.

The 91st District Court jury took two and a half hours of deliberation Thursday afternoon, declaring the 43-year-old Ranger woman innocent of murder with malice in the rifle death of her former spouse.

The four-day trial had included extensive defense testimony, including that of Mrs. Bratton and the Brattons' daughter, about ill treatment by R. L. Bratton.

Jury foreman Steele Hill of Eastland handed the jury's verdict to Judge J. Frank Sparks at 4:12 p.m. The defense, presented by Eastland Attorney Bill Hart, had rested at 4:30 p.m. Wednesday and the state case, prosecuted by District-County Attorney Perry Brown, rested at 9:20 a.m. Thursday.

Brown told the jury in his closing argument that the woman would never have been indicted had she shot her ex-husband when he first arrived at her home threatening to kill her as she had testified.

"The deceased was as good a man as the defendant was a woman," Brown said, and stressed that Bratton had been shot in the back.

Mrs. Bratton had testified that Bratton had threatened her with death if she tried to leave him. She said they were married in 1943, divorced in 1945, and then entered into a common law marriage until she divorced him in 1961.

In his round of argument, Hart told how Bratton had abused the defendant for 16 years. He discredited character witnesses for Bratton, including those who testified they played poker, shot craps and drank with Bratton. He urged the jury to remember that there were no witnesses to the shooting except the defendant.

After recess for lunch from 12:10 to 1:30 p.m. Brown began his closing arguments. He downgraded evidence introduced and berated Mrs. Bratton's testimony. He asked the jury to render a death sentence or the number of years that deemed right for the crime — suggesting from 25 years to life.

Brown quoted Bible texts concerning the death penalty

Water Board Vote Called For April 6

Four directors will be elected to the Board of Directors of the Eastland County Water Supply District, at an election called for Tuesday, April 6.

Voting will be in the two precincts of the district — in Eastland at the Justice of the Peace office in the basement of the courthouse, and in Ranger at the chamber of commerce office. A. H. Powell will be election judge in Ranger and H. E. Pittman, judge in Eastland.

The names of J. T. Smith and L. L. Bruce will appear on the Ranger ballot and the names of H. T. Wilson and M. H. Perry will be on the Eastland ballot.

Qualified voters will be those persons who have taxable property in the district, duly rendered for taxation. Write-ins of qualified persons, those with taxable property within the district, will be permitted.

All lists on the ballot but Bruce are seeking re-election to the board.

E. B. Pruet of Ranger is president of the board and the election was called on Feb. 11.

Other directors are Charles Freyschlag and T. M. Fuller, both of Eastland and Dave Pickrell, E. F. Arterburn and C. F. Creager, all of Ranger.

THERE'S PROBABLY a little less urgency about getting up early in the morning these days out at Mr. Marshal T. Berry's comfortable home in the Pleasant Hill community. He sold his dairy herd recently and, for the first time in 17 years, the milking chore consists of one cow.

Darrell Taylor of Rising Star bought the 40 Berry milkers along with the assorted equipment that goes into a modern dairy barn. The one remaining cow is sort of a problem. She gives about three gallons of milk per day, and the Berrys have milk to spare.

IT WAS IN the mid-forties that Mr. Berry started his dairy — hand milking his cows. He sold milk through the dairymen's association that serves this area. Before long, he built a Grade A dairy barn and added electric milking. He was a pioneer in the Eastland County Dairy Association and served as its secretary for a good many years.

Mr. Berry was born in Navarro County at Dawson and came to Eastland County first in 1928 where he married his wife, the former Mittie Garrett, a native of Carbon. After a few years, the Berrys went back to Dawson County and remained until 1943. They've lived in Pleasant Hill ever since.

The Berrys have two daughters — Mrs. Don Williams of Abilene and Mrs. Jerry Lyon of Cisco. Both are college graduates and teachers. The family belongs to the Methodist church in Carbon, are members of the Farm Bureau, and take part in community activities generally.

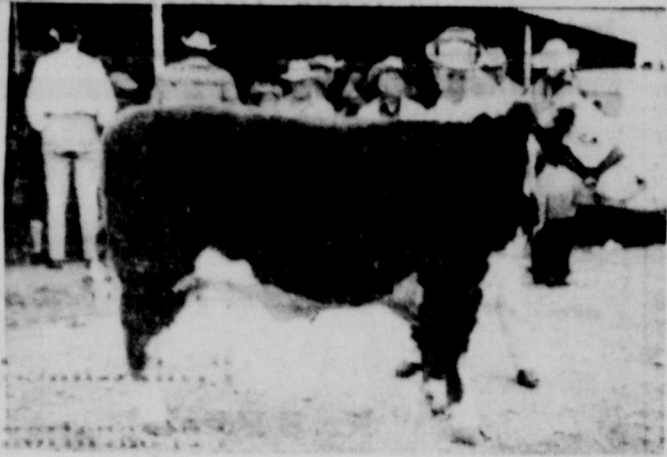
