## Plans Underway For Fandangle Event At Albany

ALBANY — Reshaping a ranch stock tank, bulldozers are recreating in a pasture just outside Albany's city limits the Clear Fork of the Brazos River as background for Albany's outdoor summer show, the Fort Griffin Fandangle. The 1965 version of the spectacle, originated in 1938 and performed periodically since, is scheduled for production on two weekends in June, 18-19, 24-25-26.

For the first time in its history, the show is to have its own especially designed theater, with an expanse of Shackelford County prairie as its stage setting. The Fandangle, a theatrical recreation of the Old West is a dramatic project which includes in its cast not only 300 Albany actors but herds of longhorn cattle and buffalo.

Terraces cut in a hillside provide audience seating adapted to a natural setting, fulfilling a dream long held by the Fandangle production staff of having a theater exactly suited to the needs of the unique show.

The Fandangle is an all-Albany production, produced, written, directed, and performed exclusively by Albany people. Its new theater has been designed by Albany engineers and is being built by Albany construction firms as a contribution to the community-wide endeavor.

The board of directors of the Eastland County Historical Survey Committee will hold their next meeting in Cisco at 5 p. m. Monday, March 29, at the First National Bank's community conference room, according to an announcement by Chairman Mike Collins.

Mr. Collins, who attended a state meeting of county chairmen in Austin last Tuesday, reported that Dr. Rupert Richardson of Abilene, a member of the State Historical Survey Committee, has been named chairman of Region Three, which is composed of 15 counties, including Eastland.

County Judge Scott Bailey, who also attended the Austin meeting with Mr. Collins and County Historical Director Gene Baker of Gorman, was appointed regional coordinator.

The Austin meeting was held to inform new county chairmen on their duties and those of division chairmen they will appoint. Members of the survey committee will be made then. Gov. Connally attended the Austin luncheon Tuesday and spoke to the 240 registered, among whom were some 40 senators and representatives.



maining threads of a loose button on a jacket or coat, if you cannot re-sew it immediately. The tape should hold the threads in place until you can re-sew it.

If your wooden salad bowls are dry and rough from continued washing, here's a simple remedy. Rub a little salad oil into the grain of the wood, repeating until bowls regain some of their glossy finish.

Tired of tossed salads? Try this cucumber salad. Combine sour cream, chopped pecans, grated onion, lemon juice and salt. Mix these well and add to chilled thin slices of cucumber. Arrange on crisp bed of salad greens.

Don't store leather gloves in air-tight plastic containers — for the leather needs to breathe or it will discolor. To keep gloves clean, store them covered with tissue paper rather than in the plastic.

Pills belong in bottles. Definitely not on your sweaters. Yet, the fiber ends of some modern-day fabrics tend to roll into tiny hard balls — or pills — that stick tight to the fabric. This pilling increases during wearing and laundering because the balls catch other surfaces, particularly of the same fabric, to form more pills.

You can reduce pilling by turning the garment inside out when you wash it. For further protection, place the "pilly" item in a mesh bag for laundering.

If your garment already has pills, the job is more difficult. You have to remove them one by one. Pull the cloth firmly over a curved surface (so the pills stand up and away from the fabric), then cut them off carefully with a scissors or razor blade.

When you go to the grocery store, do you buy the biggest eggs you can find so you get the most for your money? If you do, you may be making a mistake.

There's more to an egg than its size. Quality, too, must be considered. Egg graders in the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Agricultural Marketing Service have special ratings for each of these factors.

The quality of a carton of eggs is graded U.S. Grade AA or Fresh Fancy Quality, U.S. Grade A or U.S. Grade B. These quality grades depend upon shell characteristics, spread of the egg when broken, thickness of the white, and firmness and size of the yolk.

Sizes are based on weight alone. They include Jumbo, Extra Large, Large, Medium, Small, and Peewee. Most common are Extra Large eggs which must weigh 27 ounces per dozen; Large eggs, which weigh 24 ounces; Medium, 21 ounces; and Small eggs, 18 ounces.

The next time you reach for a carton of eggs, remember that big eggs are not necessarily top quality nor small eggs of lower quality.

Homemakers who are planning to paper a room this spring may be doing some fancy figuring to determine how much to buy. This information can help persons figure the needs for a given room.

A single roll of wallpaper covers 36 square feet, and a double roll, 72.

Figure the area of each wall — the height times the width — and add these together. Subtract the area of each window and door opening. Multiply by 1.1 — to take care of waste and matching.

You now have the area to be covered. So divide this by 72 or 36, depending on which size roll you wish to buy — single or double.

Ironing will go much faster and the results will look smoother if an ironing board is well-padded. Use two or three thin sheets of cotton padding instead of one, and see how much faster the ironing goes.

Treat a good egg right. Keep it clean, covered and cold. Study the label on the carton before you buy eggs.

A basic rule, whether you're cooking eggs in water, frying pan or oven: Cook them with low to moderate, even heat. Like all protein foods, eggs cooked at too high a heat become tough and leathery.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF EASTLAND COUNTY WATER SUPPLY DISTRICT:

1. That an election be held on April 6, 1965, in Eastland County Water Supply District as created by House Bill No. 888, passed by the Fifty-First Legislature, and as amended by House Bill No. 845 by the Fifty - Third Legislature, for the purpose of electing (4) Directors of said District.

2. For the purpose of said election, Eastland County Water Supply District is divided into two election precincts. All of the territory of the District contained in the City of Ranger shall be known as the "Ranger Precinct" and all of the territory of the District contained in the City of Eastland shall be known

as the "Eastland Precinct."

3. (A) The election in the Ranger Precinct shall be held at the Chamber of Commerce Office in Ranger, Texas, A. H. Powell is hereby appointed as Presiding Judge for said election, and he shall appoint as assistants an Assistant Judge and two (2) Clerks to assist him in holding said election.

(B) The election in the Eastland Precinct shall be held at the Justice of the Peace No. 1, County Court House in the City of Eastland, J. H. Pittman is hereby appointed as Presiding Judge for said election, and he shall appoint an Assistant Judge and two (2) Clerks to assist him in holding said election.

4. Only qualified voters residing in Eastland County Water Supply District who own taxable property therein, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be entitled to vote at said election.

5. Mr. J. T. Smith, Mr. L. L. Bruce, Mrs. Tom Wilson, and Mr. M. H. Perry have made application to this Board to have their names printed on the ballot and such application are hereby granted. The ballot, however, shall be large enough to permit the writing in of other names.

6. The ballots for said election shall have printed thereon the following:

Each voter shall leave in the ballot the names of the four (4) candidates for whom he desires to vote. The four (4) candidates receiving the highest number of votes shall be elected.

7. No person shall be elected a Director unless he resides in and owns taxable property in the District. No member of the governing body of the City of Ranger or the City of Eastland and no employee of either of said cities shall be elected as Director.

8. Notice of said election shall be given by publishing a copy of this order in the Ranger Times and in the Eastland Telegram newspapers of general circulation published within said District one time, such publication to be at least ten (10) days before the 6th day of April, 1965.

Mrs. Collie read a letter which was sent to Mrs. Crowell from a Korean missionary, Lela Johnston. Miss Johnston works as physical therapist in a hospital in Seoul. In her letter the missionary related that she had been studying the Korean language over two years. She had sent Mrs. Crowell a Christmas card on which was a copy of the painting, "Korean Angelus," by famous Korean artist, Kim Ki Chang.

The unusually cold March has not damaged peach, pear, apple and pecan trees, reports County Agent J. M. Cooper. The recent 72-hour freezing spell left little or no evidence of damage. Only those trees that were in full bloom — a few early peaches, most plums and some apricots — had serious damage.

Mr. Cooper believed that the county's substantial number of commercial fruit orchards are safe. And it's too early for nut trees to be putting out, so they're safe.

Perhaps the cold March weather will have a deadly effect on the numerous worms, flies, hoppers and the like that plague orchards.
