Cong. Jim Wright To Keynote Demo Rally at Eastland



Congressman Jim Wright of Fort Worth, one of the nation's fast-rising party leaders, will deliver the keynote address at the Democratic Campaign Rally and Barbecue to be staged at City Park in Eastland next Thursday evening, Oct. 22.

Mike Collins of Eastland, county chairman and coordinator of the party event, said a large attendance is expected. In addition to Eastland Countians, party leaders from Taylor, Stephens, Callahan, Denton, Erath and Palo Pinto Counties are also due to be present.

Serving of the barbecue is scheduled to begin at 6:30 p.m., and the rally probably will kick off at 7:30, Collins said.

In addition to Congressman Wright, other dignitaries expected are Congressman Omar Burleson of the 17th District, who will introduce the Fort Worth speaker; State Senator Tom Creighton of Mineral Wells, and State Representative Wayne Gibbens of Breckenridge. Other party leaders will include Dave Clements of Mineral Wells and Randall Jackson of Abilene, state committeemen, and Mrs. Macon Boidy, state committee woman from Henrietta.

Cong. Wright has been travelling with the President Johnson campaign delegation, and will go to Big Spring from Eastland for a Democratic rally, and then to the Gulf Coast.

Tickets for the barbecue are priced at \$1.50 and Democrats are urged to purchase duets in advance since the caterer must be advised in advance how many plates are to be served.

Glenn Justice of Carbon is chairman of the ticket sales. They are available at the County Democratic headquarters on the south side of the square in Eastland.

Mavericks Lead Briefly, Beat by Clyde, 32-18

Up to strength and up to snuff, the Eastland Mavericks put on a football show Friday night that shocked their powerful opponents and made the district leading Clyde Bulldogs sweat to gain another victory 32-18.

Showing the spunk for which they're noted, the Mavericks called on the tossing arm of back-in-harness Quarterback Jerry McCullough, the catching and kicking skills of End Mike Miller and the bone rattling defense and huddle of the entire whole squad to give the Bulldogs, one of their toughest opponents, a run for the money.

Clyde scored first in the first period when Quarterback Buddy Howe passed to Halfback Jack Ralston for a 65-yard touchdown combination. Howe went on to run over the conversion.

Less than five minutes later, the Mavericks scored following a succession of ground-gaining drives, sparked by Halfback Wayne Waldon. On a fourth and one situation, McCullough tossed a short one to Miller for the first score. Halfback John Moylan flipped over for the tying two points.

The Bulldogs stuck again on the final play of the quarter with a 10-yard pass play from Howe to tailback Connie Raymos. Extra point try failed, making the score, Clyde 14, Eastland 8.

Early in the second quarter the Mavericks capitalized on a fumble that lead to paydirt. Capturing the ball at midfield, the Mavs picked up 25 on that long ball from McCullough to Miller's arms.

Moylan got about five on the ground, and the passing duo did it again for the score. Moylan ran over for two more putting the Mavericks out front, 16-14, for the first time this season.

The heads-up Clyde crew spoiled the local fans fun though by putting together another scoring combination late

in the first half for six more points.

Highlight of the third quarter followed a tremendous kick-off boot by Miller that put the ball way back in Clyde territory and fleet 135-pound End Larry Wilson trapped a Bulldog behind the goal line for a safety and two more points for the Eastland tally.

The last quarter belonged to Clyde and they scored two more, once on a 25-yard pass and run play from Howe to Raymos, and again on a five-yard run by Wingback Butch Wagner.

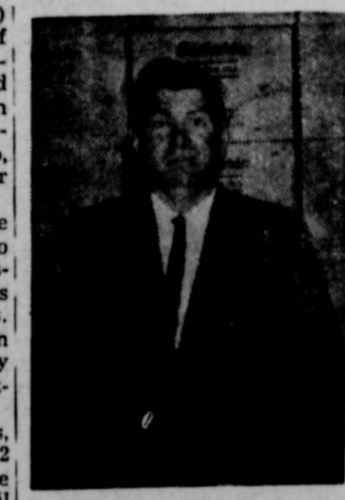
DICK COOKSEY IS NEW AREA GULF OIL DISTRIBUTOR

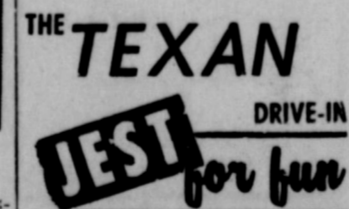

Traffic Mishaps On Increase In Eastland County

Two fatalities in Eastland County during the month of September were listed in the rural monthly traffic accident summary released by the Department of Public Safety.

There were three personal injury accidents with 10 persons injured and 12 property damage accidents resulting in \$9,590 damage.

A comparison of accidents for the first nine months of this year with the first nine months of 1963 shows seven fatalities this year and six last year, 52 personal injury accidents this year and 46 last year, 107 property damage accidents this year and 81 last year. Total number injured so far this year is 80 compared to 78 last year.

COUNTY BUDGET, RETURNS OKAYED BY COMMISSIONERS

The County Commissioners Court in a special session Thursday approved the county budget without contest, okayed the returns of the recent Gorman local option election and set monies aside for some new specific projects.

The court put \$1,000 into the special county-city hospital fund, for possible use for repairs being proposed there. This amounts to half of what the anticipated cost is estimated to be. The court agreed to cooperate on a share-and-share alike basis in making repairs to the hospital.

Another \$500 was put into the general fund for use in the individual precincts for historical marking purposes. This will likely be used on a request basis, for marking old

cemeteries in the county, it was reported.

Another \$25,000 was set aside for the purchase of right of way next year. The budget was approved, based on an anticipated 85 per cent estimated tax collection, where actual collections have been running close to 92 per cent.

Mr. Lou Jenkins of Cisco Junior College appeared before the commission and invited commissioners to attend or send mechanical personnel to a special diesel mechanics school being started soon at the Cisco college.

The court also granted tax evaluation relief to a county citizen after hearing him report changes in his property. The Gorman vote canvassed 401 against legal sale of intoxicants and 91 for.

So when the UF volunteer workers ask for your donations, remember, your gift will be divided up ten different ways, and you'll want to make your gift substantial enough to include a fair amount for each agency.

For the record, here's how each Eastland UF dollar is divided: Expenses, one cent; Teen Age League, 11 cents; Little League, 13 cents; Texas United Fund, six cents (which is further divided between 143 separate worthwhile agencies); Texas Rehabilitation, three cents; United Cerebral Palsy, two cents; Salvation Army, 13 cents; Y.M.C.A., 14 cents; Red Cross, 18 cents; and Boy Scouts, 19 cents.

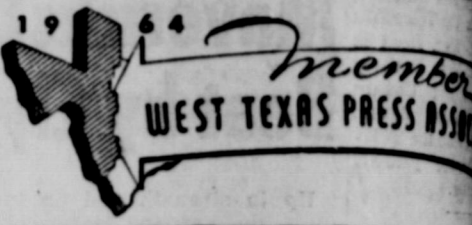

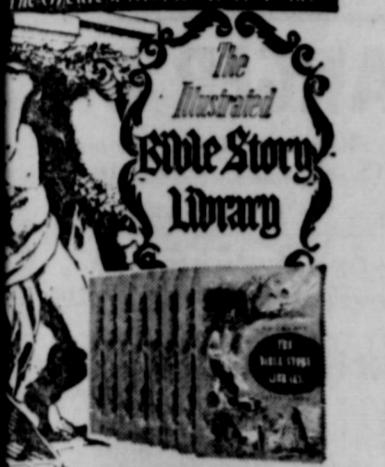

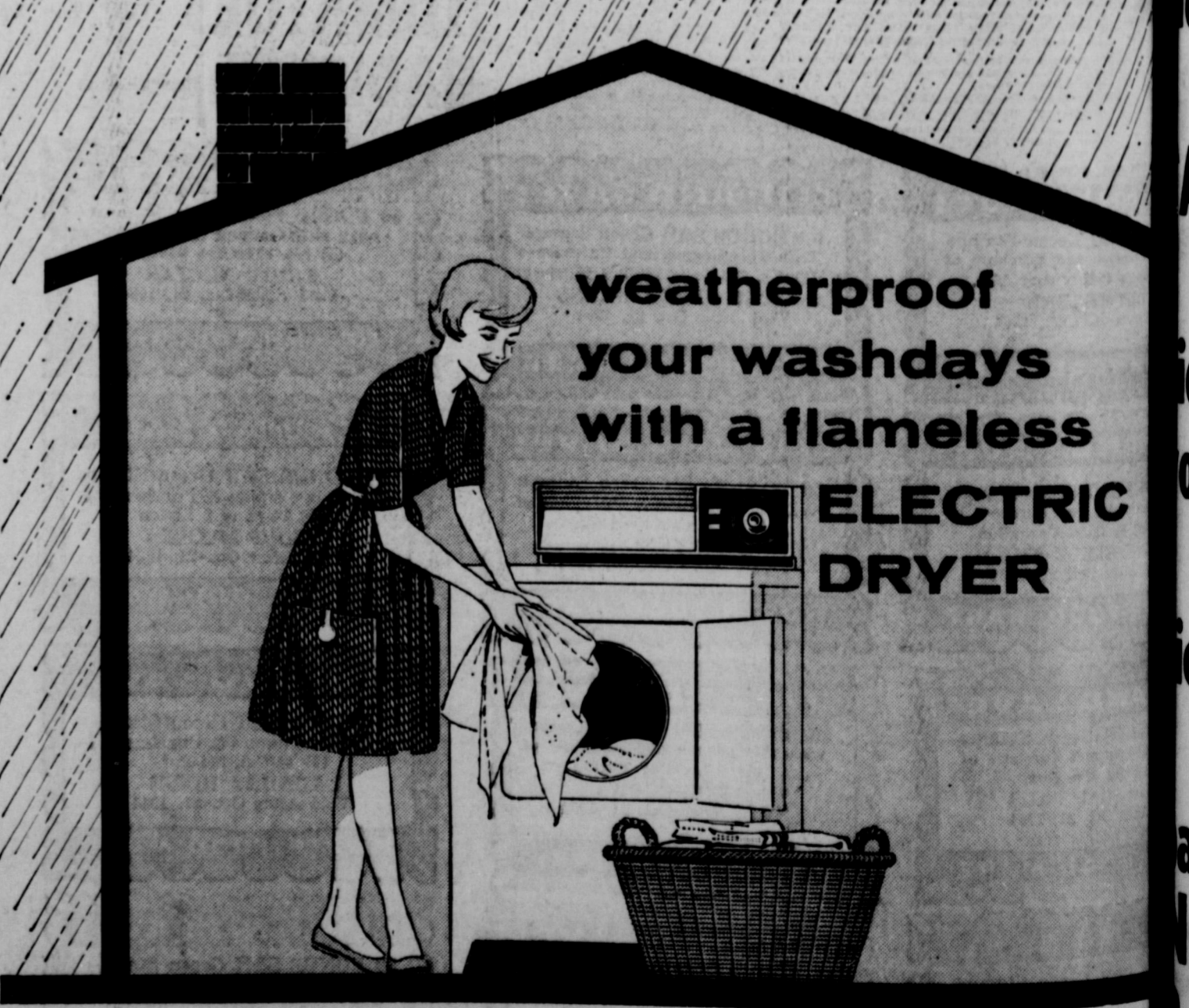
