When buying fresh mushrooms at the market, choose those that are clean and white to creamy white in color. The caps of the mushrooms should be closed or partially opened, not fully opened. The gills (the fluted formation between the cap and stem) should be light in color, not brown or black. One pound of fresh mushrooms, cooked and drained, is equivalent to three 4-ounce cans of drained mushrooms. When buying flower seeds, look for new varieties listed as F1 hybrids. These are among your best buys. Seeds from these hybrids cost more than

Did you know that vegetables cooked one day then reheated and served the next lose some of their nutrients? Vitamin C losses are particularly noticeable. The vegetables will have only three-fourths as much Vitamin C after 1 day in the refrigerator as when freshly cooked.

After 2 days, the vitamin C content drops to two-thirds and after 3 days it's down to a third or half of its original value.
