## Cisco Blanks Ranger, 14-0, In 5th Annual Peanut Bowl Grid Classic

The Cisco Junior College Wranglers earned their fourth Peanut Bowl trophy in Eastland Saturday night by downsing the powerful Ranger Junior College Rangers 14-0 in the annual classic in Maverick Stadium.

A near-capacity crowd watched the grid dual between the defensive giants highlighted by Bowl color with half-time spectacle and pre-game festivities.

It was a hard-fought, grueling battle down to the wire as Cisco chalked up 127 yards in penalties and the Rangers were handed setbacks totaling 95 yards. The Wranglers scored twice in the second quarter and held off a last-second Ranger drive that died on the one-foot line to claim the win.

Most of us keep wishing for things we don't have — but what else is there to wish for?

ther was able to cross the other's rigidly-guarded double-stripe, the pearly gates to coveted pay territory.

The Ranger High Bulldogs are rated favorites to win the Friday night tussle.

But, as followers of both schoolboy grid crews know, that's just paper stuff.

Past history has proven on countless occasions that when the Red & Black Mavericks of Eastland collide with the Maroon & White of Ranger anything can happen — and it usually does.

Despite the fact that the outcome of this Eastland - Ranger pigskin war of '64 won't be determined until that fateful final gun, here's the way, record-wise, the two squads stack up:

Ranger's starting offensive team averages 173.4 pounds per man — more than 20 pounds more than the 150.2 pounds average of the Mavericks. But a comparison of backfield weights shows Eastland with a slight advantage. The Mavs' four starters in the secondary tip the beam at an even 165 pounds while the Bulldog backfield quartet averages 163.5 pounds.

The Ranger starting line averages a hefty 179 pounds compared to Eastland's average of 153 pounds-per-man in the forward wall.

Since the start of the 1964 schoolboy grid season on Sept. 4, the Ranger High Bull-

(Continued from Page One) tract offered by the club in which the club would pay \$1 a year to the city for rights to use the 300 by 1,300 - foot tract of land on the extreme eastern edge of the airport for a range. The club now has 43 paid members. Tiner reported, with \$0,000 liability insurance coverage. The lease was negotiated for one year with provisions for the city's protection in case of default by the club.

Entry to the range is to be carefully protected, it was reported, to keep traffic from crossing the airport runway and other facilities at the site. Entry will be through the west gate, thence northward along the fence line.

The commission also formally approved the change in franchise of the city taxi service from Sam Wallace to S. B. (Fritz) Jones.

# A Look at New Caledonia And Australian Reflections

New Caledonia is one of the larger islands discovered by Captain Cook and Noumea is the capital city. When we went ashore from the launch from the ship we were greeted by a loud barking dog who,

of course, was barking in French as he is on a French island. The whole island is French, with no English residents. We took the usual guided shore tour and for three hours we rode around, visiting churches and viewing the

country from Mount Coffyn. There we were treated to the sight of eight children and three adults getting out of one automobile.

Our tour was not up to the usual standard of excellence, but there were two places of interest that were outstanding; the aquarium and a bakery that provided us with some of the finest freshly baked French bread that we have ever tasted.

The aquarium is wonderful, with dozens of tanks of seawater in which live tropical sea plant and sea animals including fish in odd shapes and colors. It is said to be the only aquarium where sea coral is alive and growing indoors.

One other sight that interested me in particular was the blue and red colored smoke coming from the chimneys of a large nickel smelter. Nickel is mined in New Caledonia in considerable quantity.

As I think back over my Australia experiences there are a few that I shall remember always.

The koala bears climbing to the thin top branches of the eucalyptus trees to eat the tender young leaves, with an occasional leap from branch to branch, and the kangaroo mother, four feet tall, with her young "joey" snuggling inside her pouch with only his head outside. He was the size of a small house cat and I stroked his pretty head.

The warm evening at Alice Springs on the pool terrace with dozens of guests seated around tables, eating and drinking. The soft moonlight filtered by the tall gum trees overshadowing the pool. The tranquility of the peaceful scene suddenly interrupted by a woman's shriek and a loud splash as two men tossed her fully clothed into the pool; and, two nights later, looking out from my sleeping car at the landscape gliding by, the tall rounded top ant hills among the trees. In some places they were so close together that they looked like old eroded gravestones in some long neglected graveyard, their names and dates long since faded away.

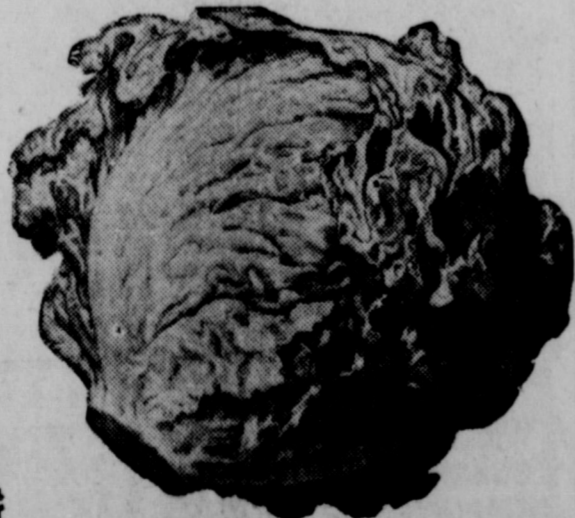

## 30 Peanut Tourers Find Crops Almost Up To Par

An interesting and educational tour of six peanut farms in the Gorman area of Eastland County was attended by 30 people last Thursday.

The tour was planned and led by County Agricultural Agent J. M. Cooper with the assistance of two members of his crop improvement committee, D. B. Warren of Gorman and Oscar Schaefer of Rising Star.

Although only 21,000 acres or 57 per cent of Eastland County's allotted acreage was planted this year, due to an extremely dry spring, it is felt that the big rains of August and September may bring the overall county production close to that of recent years.

The tour began at Vernon Files' farm, 2.5 miles south of Gorman.

The visitors, representing all parts of Eastland County, as well as Callahan and Comanche counties, observed a crop which was planted the last few days of July. It was determined that this crop was 79 days old and seemed to be in excellent condition from the standpoint of growth of vines and progress of fruiting.

B. C. Langley of the West Cross Timbers Experiment Station, Stephenville, predicted that this extremely late crop could, in another five or six weeks, develop an average or better yield of peanuts, providing a killing frost is delayed this long. Mr. Files' peanuts are of the Argentine variety.

## Accent on Health

Your PH is showing . . . it always does.

PH (personal hygiene) always shows, whether you've brushed your teeth or combed your hair. And whether or not you've had a bath is quite obvious, too, to those people who work or play around you.

Not only is PH — call it cleanliness if you like — an investment in success but it's a definite investment in health and a disease deterrent.

How is this so? With good PH you can often break the chain of disease transmission. Diseases don't just happen. The circle of disease transmission — simply means that germs which cause disease are permitted to enter your body by some process. For example, if you cut yourself and the wound is not properly cleaned, germs may enter the body and multiply, causing an infection. Or someone with the flu may cough or sneeze in your face. The virus, inhaled into your system, may cause you to have a case of the flu.

The circle, or spiral as it may become, continues when you pass the germ on to someone else.

Handwashing — thorough scrubbing with soap in hot running water — is one of the very best known ways of preventing the spread of disease.

A mother who does not wash her hands before fixing baby's bottle may quite unknowingly precipitate a case of diarrhea.

Or if you are eating out and visit a public restroom without thoroughly washing your hands you may be inviting a case of infectious hepatitis, diarrhea or worse.

The kitchen at home is certainly not immune. Food-handlers especially need to be conscientious handwashers, for their is the responsibility for what goes into the family's mouths. Handwashing is repeatedly emphasized in short courses for foodhandlers conducted by the State Health Department.

**Road Work Seen As Benefit For Deer Hunters**

AUSTIN — Texas hunters, poised for what could be the greatest deer harvest, were admonished by J. B. Phillips, law enforcement coordinator for the Parks and Wildlife Department "to begin getting in their road work."

He cautioned that "all too many" nimrods spoil the sport of going afield for lack of condition.

"Each year," he advised, "our snowballing soft way of life sends more people after their favorite target in increasingly poor physical condition."

"Of course, it's too late now, what with the regular season opening at mid-November, to get all muscled up. But as your physician will agree, you can work off some of the rough edges."

"I am told that plain, old-fashioned walking may do the job. At least, it can ease the transition from routine chair calisthenics to the rigors of the hunt."

Phillips said nowadays, with more and more people having year - round air conditioning at home as well as at offices, the mere "exposure" to fresh air can be a trial for some hunters. "Then," he said, "if you blend in a wet Texas norther, the average inactive person really gets the crucial test."

He added statistics show that heart attacks are a major cause of hunter ailments in the field.

"Our best advice then is," he said, "for the hunter to begin as early as possible in pre-acclimation routine. And we are told if he does nothing better than 'get his legs in shape' he will have automatically enhanced his own physical welfare for the big hunt. Of course, simple deep breathing exercises will help."

Phillips continued the best counsel is to have a checkup before the annual field invasion particularly for those over-weight and past middle age.



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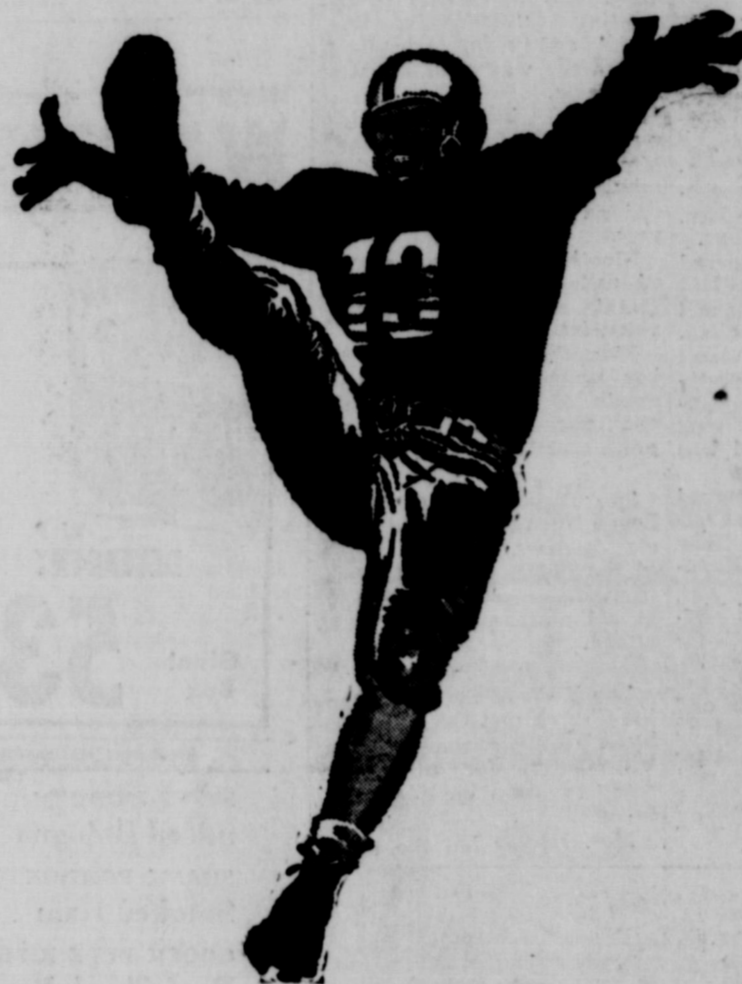
