Run-Off Election Is Slated On June 6 To Decide Sheriff Race

Eastland County voters will pick a sheriff in the June 6 run-off election and voters in Eastland, Ranger and Olden will decide between two run-off candidates for county commissioner.

It was Monday morning before it was definitely established who the run-off candidates in the two races would be, because of slow returns

from the Ranger and Rising Star boxes.

Former county Sheriff J. B. Williams will be opponent to ticket-leader L. E. (Lefty) Sublett for the sheriff's office, and Earl Blackwell and Danny Woods will be seeking the Precinct One Commission post.

Sublett led the five-man sheriff's race throughout, but

second-place position alternated between Williams and Bob Patterson as "partial" and "incomplete" returns filtered into the vote-counting center Saturday night.

Ranger reported their final count to this newspaper at 1 a.m. Sunday and Rising Star's final tallies weren't brought in until Monday morning.

The much-watched county

attorney's race was decisively decided Saturday night before 8:30. Perry T. Brown of Rising Star polled 3,650 votes to defeat Incumbent Earl Conner Jr., who got 2,093.

Votes were canvassed Tuesday.

In the sheriff's race, Sublett got 1,987; Williams, 1,438; and Patterson, 1,375. Woods lead the five-man commission race, polling 1,120, but his opponent too was undecided until final returns came in. Blackwell and O. R. Ervin tettered back and forth in the partials for second place, but Blackwell came out in the run-off slot with 581, to Ervin's 531.

Buck Collins, Rising Star Commissioner, regained his position over a ballot opponent and a write-in opponent. In that race, Collins got 365; R. L. Carter, 247; and Write-In Tarver, 58.

U. S. Senator Ralph Yarborough carried the county by some 200 votes, (losing to McLendon by 11 votes at Eastland).

Gov. Connally, who promised Eastland County during his first campaign that he would make it the pilot site for his industrial development program, carried the county handily, 3,935 to 1,684 for Don Yarborough.

Eastland County continued to shower its approval on Cong. Omar Burleson by giving him a total county vote of 4,053, compared to his opponent's 1,670.

State Rep. Wayne Gibbons got 3,903 votes to his opponent's 1,722.

O. L. Stamey earned the two-year County School Superintendent office with 3,437, to his opponent's 2,141.

In Eastland and Ranger, constables remained. Porter Woods of Eastland downed his opponent, 1,016 to 500, and Ralph Veal of Ranger won, 691 to 437.

County Democratic Chairman A. E. Crawley drew 5,393 votes for re-election. And local precinct chairmen were also reelected — J. V. Heyser of Cisco got 1,455; Don Pierson of Eastland, 1,210; and Calvin Brown of Ranger, 1,035.

A total of 5,905 votes were cast in the county.

Rotary Hears Missile Program

The importance of the Nike-Hercules missile in the Air Defense Command was program for the Eastland Rotary Club Monday.

Henry Pullman, who has been a guest of the Army on missile tours, was program chairman and introduced Capt. Tom Liberton of the 5th Missile Battalion, Dyes AFB, who spoke and showed two films.

The two Abilene Nike units protect Dyes AFB, a Strategic Air Command base, from foreign attack, the officer said. One of the films showed the mission of the missile battalion and the other showed the capability of the Hercules in action.

President Mac Beazley presided and Secretary Don Vierger instructed the guests.

Counting Votes Cost \$1,433, For an Average 24c Per Vote Cast

Your Democratic right to vote is dollars and cents expensive. In fact in Eastland County the average cost of counting each vote last Saturday was 24 cents.

That cost-per-ballot went up or down, depending on which box you voted in. In precincts where there are few votes, the cost, naturally goes up.

For example, it cost the county \$1.49 to count each of the 54 votes in the Pioneer box.

The absentee vote was the cheapest (at .16 2-3 cents per vote), and the giant box of the county, the one in Cisco with 1,503 votes Saturday, cost .17 2-3 cents per vote.

Total cost to the county for counting the 5,915 votes was \$1,433, not including election supplies and other essentials. The \$1,433 was the amount paid 108 election workers, who worked a total of 1,433 hours at \$1 an hour.

The cost per vote by box ran like this:

Eastland, 20 workers, 236½ hours, 1,272 votes cast, for .18 2-3 cents per vote.

Ranger, 14 workers, 223 hours, 1,161 votes, for .19 1-5 cents per vote.







A Look at Cook Islands

At Sea: Thursday, April 2, 1964
About noon yesterday our ship sighted the island of Rarotonga, the largest island of the Cook Island group. These islands were named for Captain Cook, but strangely enough he did not discover Rarotonga, despite its size. Prior to 1888 Rarotonga was ruled by the London Missionary Society, and from then until 1901 the island was a British Protectorate. Since 1901 the island has been a dependency of New Zealand.

The people on Rarotonga are Polynesians, closely related to the Maoris of New Zealand. They are happy, progressive and very good looking. Like most of the islanders of the South Pacific they love to dance to native music and they are perfectly at home in or on the water. This island has an area of 26 square miles with a population of about 9,000. Most of it is mountainous, with the highest peaks reaching an altitude of 2100 feet. With its mean annual temperature of 78 degrees and with annual rainfall averaging 85 inches it is a pleasant place.

Large ships cannot land at the island because of offshore reefs, so our ship stayed a mile or more away and small boats brought twenty or thirty islanders dressed in native costumes aboard to perform native dances and to sell island wares to us passengers. Also the island postmaster came aboard and brought his post office stamp, and while the dancing was going on up on the boat deck he was busy in the Purser's Office hand stamping over a thousand letters and post cards bearing Cook Island postage stamps. All of these pieces of mail have remained on board the Monterey and the air mail will take to the sky at Auckland, New Zealand, while regular mail will remain on board until reaching its various destinations, or points from which it will be forwarded.

After the natives came aboard the Monterey started its engines and slowly cruised all around the island to the place where the islanders were taken aboard, and the small boats were waiting there to take them off and return them to the island. It was a great day for the ship's camera enthusiasts and hundreds of pictures were taken of the pretty girls and the native members.

For the last two days the sea has been a bit rough, nothing violent but just a little more motion than we have had since leaving California. Late in the evening those on deck were treated to a view of great white clouds in the east illuminated by frequent bright flashes of beautiful lightning. No thunder was heard and the lightning could have been hundreds of miles away.

The ship's morning paper, The Polynesian, says that somewhere on our way between Rarotonga and Auckland we cross the International Date line, being at a point 180 degrees east and also west of the zero meridian at Greenwich, England. And as we are going in a westerly direction we will lose one day. However, as we again cross the date line between Australia and the United States we will regain the lost day so we will arrive in our homeland without loss or gain of time.

We are due to arrive at Auckland on Monday morning, April 6 and the ship will be there until late evening on Tuesday when it will leave for Sydney, Australia. We have been told that while in port we can place local and long distance telephone calls from our stateroom. There are telephone directories available for all of the cities where the ship calls. There is no charge for local calls from the ship. This ship is really being run for the pleasure and convenience of its passengers.


