all with private baths. The building has a 115 foot front and three dining areas, each air conditioned by refrigeration. The hotel has never been closed, although it has had five separate owners.

Victor Cornelius of Eastland has spent some \$90,000 in remodeling the hotel since he first bought it in 1949. He

sold it last year. Under terms of the auction sale, the building will go for cash to the highest bidder.

Cisco civic leaders have expressed the hope that the hotel will be sold and continued in operation.
