## EHS Student and Teacher Will Attend 3-Day Nuclear Symposium

One student and a teacher from Eastland High School will attend the fourth Texas Nuclear Science Symposium at the University of Texas June 7-10, under the sponsorship of Texas Electric Service Company, it was announced today by F. N. Sayre, Division Manager.

The student is Verrell Dean Boen, 307 South Oak. He will be accompanied by K. J. Norris, member of the school faculty and science teacher.

The symposium is being jointly sponsored by the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation and the University of Texas. The Foundation is made up of ten investor-owned electric utility companies in Texas, including Texas Electric Service Company.

Some 500 selected high school science students and teachers will attend the sessions in Austin, at which some of the nations outstanding nuclear scientists will speak.

The Foundation, which is co-sponsoring with the General Atomic Division of General Dynamics Corporation, the world's largest privately-financed research effort in the field of controlled nuclear fusion, is also seeking, through its sponsorship of science symposiums, to contribute to scientific education and understanding in Texas.

The meetings seek to bring to high school science students and teachers of Texas lectures on nuclear physics and related topics by outstanding scientists, and to provide the students with an opportunity to obtain answers to their questions on scientific careers and college curricula.

Speakers at this year's symposium will include two General Atomic scientists from San Diego, California: Dr. Frederic de Hoffman, president of General Atomic, and Dr. W. E. Drummond, theoretical physicist.

Other speakers will include: Dr. B. H. Almstead, professor of mechanical engineering, Dr. J. D. Gavenda, associate professor of physics, and Dr. W. T. Guy, Jr., professor of mathematics, all of the University of Texas; Dr. H. C. Thomas, chairman of the physics department at Texas Technological College, Dr. W. O. Milligan, vice-chancellor University, Dr. J. A. McIntire, professor of physics at Texas A&M University, and Howard R. Drew, executive vice-president of the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation.

Topics to be covered during the three-day session will include nuclear physics and nuclear reactors, thermonuclear fusion research, superconductivity, the wave nature of matter, cyclotrons and X-ray, electron and neutron diffraction methods. There will also be group discussion sessions and a tour of laboratory facilities at the University.

## Victor Hotel To Be Sold In Public Auction Tuesday

A foreclosure sale has been ordered for 2:30 p.m. Tuesday June 2, to sell the Victor Hotel in Cisco at public auction. The sale will be held in the hotel and three dining areas, each air conditioned by refrigeration. The hotel has never been closed, although it has had five separate owners.

The foreclosure suit was brought in 91st District Court in April to satisfy a judgment in the amount of \$43,102. It was in March, 1927, that a group of Cisco business men held the first meeting that resulted eventually in the hotel being erected here in 1928.

The brick building contains eight stories and 105 rooms, all with private baths. The building has a 115 foot front and three dining areas, each air conditioned by refrigeration. The hotel has never been closed, although it has had five separate owners.

Victor Cornelius of Eastland has spent some \$90,000 in remodeling the hotel since he first bought it in 1949. He sold it last year.

Under terms of the auction sale, the building will go for cash to the highest bidder. Cisco civic leaders have expressed the hope that the hotel will be sold and continued in operation.

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## Eastland's New Industrial Foundation And How It Grows -- A Story in Parts

(ED. NOTE: This is the first in a series of articles about Eastland's new industrial foundation corporation. The articles will explain the formation, purpose and scope of the foundation.)

The Eastland Industrial Foundation, Inc., a perpetual nonprofit corporation, has been incorporated by the State of Texas for this purpose.

"To promote industrial development for the City of Eastland and its trade territory" — Article Four of the Incorporation. The foundation will be able to conduct such business as executing leases, purchasing land, making notes and other necessary legal maneuvers in order to accomplish its purpose.

Founding directors are Virgil Seaberry Jr., M. H. Perry, Milton Fullen, Frank Sayre and H. T. Wilson. These men will serve until the first regular business meeting in September. Wilson has been elected temporary president; Mr. Sayre, secretary and treasurer; and Perry and Fullen, vice presidents.

First business to be conducted by the foundation will be the purchase of the Hollywood-Vassarette building, the arrangements for which are expected to be completed about his first of June.

The Eastland Chamber of

Commerce originally held the option to buy the building for \$30,000. The chamber, by official action, assigned that option and the liability to satisfy its certificate holders to the Foundation. The opportunity to purchase the facilities presented itself 29 months early, and the Foundation is attempting to secure ownership as assets for further industrial use.

In the past the industrial committee of the chamber has been responsible for industrial expansion, but it is felt that the Foundation, working with the committee, the chamber and Eastland people in general will be able to handle business dealings regarding establishment of industry here. It will still be the business of all parties to encourage industrial prospects and to make every move possible

to get industry to locate here. The Foundation will have the responsibility of handling the "dollars and cents" business arrangements.

In the past, the theory has generally been, "We can raise the funds for sites and/or buildings when the opportunity comes." Today, the thinking is that it will be better to be prepared in advance, with a functioning organization with assets and tools to negotiate with prospective industry for the city and area.

Shareholders in the Foundation will have one vote per \$100 worth of stock, or multiple thereof. Since it is a nonprofit, tax-exempt corporation, no shareholder will ever receive any profit from its shares. Its articles spell out that in case the corporation is ever dissolved, any profits secured will be donated and transferred to another nonprofit, tax-exempt corporation or organization in the County.

The foundation — approach has proven highly successful for towns and cities in helping industries locate and put men to work.

The foundation is proposing to pay \$39,000 for the Hollywood - Vassarette building. How it will do this, and other important financing points will be explained in the next article.

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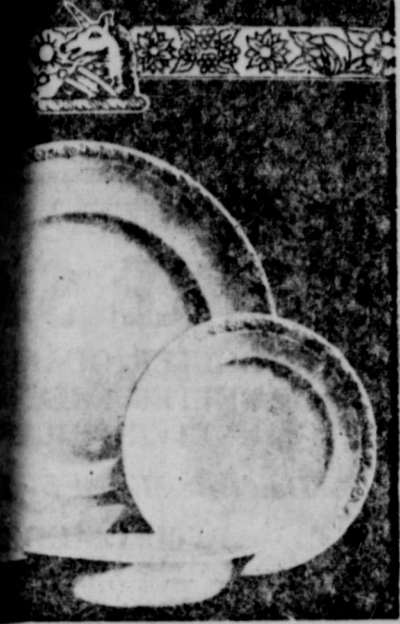

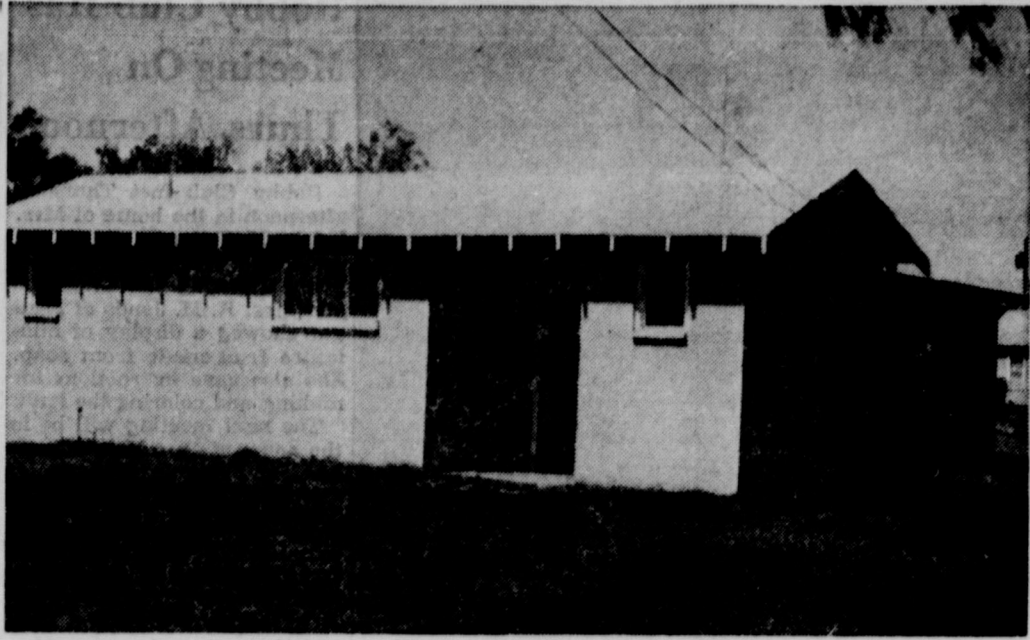
that "great day of God the Almighty" will start life anew under the thousand year reign of Christ, during which time the earth will grow to Edenic perfection.

Throughout the earth Jehovah's Witnesses use many corporations. Their principle corporation is the Watchtower Bible and Tract Society Pennsylvania, USA. This corporation was set up in 1884 under the name of Zion's Watchtower Tract Society. This was changed to its present name in 1896. The corporation maintains a registered headquarters at Pittsburgh where its annual meetings are held. In 1909, the staff of the corporation was transferred to Brooklyn, N. Y.

The Watchtower Bible and Tract Society of Brooklyn is a non-profit organization. It supervises the Bible education and ministerial work of Jehovah's Witnesses in the United States. It sets up where ever necessary branch offices in foreign countries. It sends missionaries all over the world. These include the graduates of the Watchtower Bible School of Gilead, an institution owned and operated by the New York corporation.

In August, 1942, the Watchtower Society sent two of such missionaries, Mr. and Mrs. John Mack Winston, to Eastland. After six months of intensive ministerial service, a small congregation was organized.

Jehovah's Witnesses met in the home of Mrs. Zettye Parrack, of 209 Neblett until the Kingdom Hall was built in 1957. Located at 204 North

Dixie, it was valued at \$4,500. Dedicated male members are appointed by the Society to act as overseers. Newly appointed presiding overseer Eugene Sipe who moved here in October of last year from Aztec, N. M.

The congregation meets Saturday and Sunday mornings for group witnessing, each one going forth to preach the message from door to door.

Jehovah's Witnesses conduct a regular schedule of five weekly classes in all their congregations. Their object is to develop each believer into a teacher. After a new student expresses his willingness he is assisted in practical field ministry.

"Since their beginning Jehovah's Witnesses have been a preaching fellowship," Sipe said, "the faith of each believing Christian in the organization is tested by his participation in the most important christian activity—the propagation of his faith.

"By plying this method," Sipe continued, "during the past 10 years the Witnesses have more than doubled their numbers throughout the world. Jehovah's Witnesses observe two ordinances. Baptism is by immersion, in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. It is an act of confession that he has dedicated himself to do the will of Jehovah God.

The Lord's death is commemorated once a year at Passover season.

Jehovah's Witnesses have no organizational objective similar to any orthodox church. The difference stems from a basic approach to the Bible. They see the Bible as a truly coherent story with its main theme being God's vindication by His chosen means, His Kingdom by Christ. To Jehovah's Witnesses the Bible reveals that originally God purposed to perform a great work, that it was interrupted by a challenger, that God set to work a strategy by which he could throw down the challenger, and bring to fulfillment His purposes. How God accomplishes this is what is

meant by His vindication. Jehovah must prove himself the supreme sovereign, winning universal domination after the rebellion in Eden. Individual salvation is secondary to God's vindication, being a means to that end.

The true God has a personal name to distinguish Him from all other false gods that are worshiped. That name is Jehovah. His first creation was his son, who was called the Word before coming to earth as a man. Jehovah's Witnesses therefore reject the doctrine of the Trinity.

After Adam sinned, he was sentenced, not to eternal torment, but to death. According to the scriptures, lower animals as well as man are

living souls. The soul that sins dies. For these reasons the Witnesses do not believe in the immortality of the human soul and eternal torment.

Jehovah's Witnesses do not believe that the Bible is only past history, but was written for this generation, that will see the settlement of the great issue of universal domination for the vindication of Jehovah's great name and word.

There are three different types of paradise. The first earthly paradise was lost when Adam sinned. The next paradise Jesus mentioned to the repentant thief. This is the paradise under the Kingdom, which will be restored to the earth after Jehovah is victorious at the battle of Armageddon. A spiritual paradise was begun at Pentecost. Beginning with the twelve apostles. God has been selecting a "little flock" of 144,000 that will share heavenly life and rulership with Christ. Only a remnant of this heavenly class are on earth today. However, there are a "great multitude" of "other sheep" who will inherit the earth now coming into the New World Society of Jehovah's Witnesses.

Those who die faithful will have a resurrection to life in a paradise earth under perfect conditions. There will be no more Adamic death. The world's end is near. Christendom will be judged for looking toward the United Nations for peace instead of expecting God's kingdom as mankind's only hope for peace.

Mr. Sipe added, "briefly other beliefs of Jehovah's Witnesses are that Christ died, not on a cross, but on an upright stake. The earth will never be destroyed, just this wicked system of things. Prayers must be directed to Jehovah through Christ, the son. A christian can have no part in interfaith movements. The seventh-day sabbath observance was fulfilled with the old law covenant under Moses. Christians today keep every day a christian sabbath.

Consuming blood by mouth or veins would be breaking the everlasting covenant, concerning the sanctity of blood. All human laws that do not conflict with God's laws should be obeyed.

"Our purpose is to carry out the final work of preaching" this good news of the kingdom" that is to precede the final war of Armageddon, directing the people of goodwill to the kingdom of God as mankind's only hope," Mr. Sipe concluded.
