The Eastland Mavericks will be taking a well-earned rest this Friday night with the first-off week of the season — in preparation for the last two hurdles of the year.

Top game Friday night will undoubtedly be the Albany Lion-Baird Bears dual, in Albany, which will probably decide the winner of 10-A competition.

The Mavs have gone eight straight games without a rest — and without a win. They'll battle DeLeon at Maverick Stadium Friday, Nov. 6, and Cross Plains in Buffalo Stadium Friday, Nov. 13 to close out the season.

Last week the Eastland leather slingers failed to put together the right combinations to beat Ranger, and suffered a 35-0 defeat. Ranger meets DeLeon this week and Clyde is at Cross Plains.

Albany leads the season records with no losses (three wins), followed by Baird with one loss (three wins). Baird leads for the season with seven wins to Albany's four.

Eastland is alone in the cellar with a zero percentage and 51 points for the season compared to their opponents' 234.

The Black and Reds have led but in one game — against Clyde which fans and critics alike agreed must surely have been one of the best games of the year, in any class.

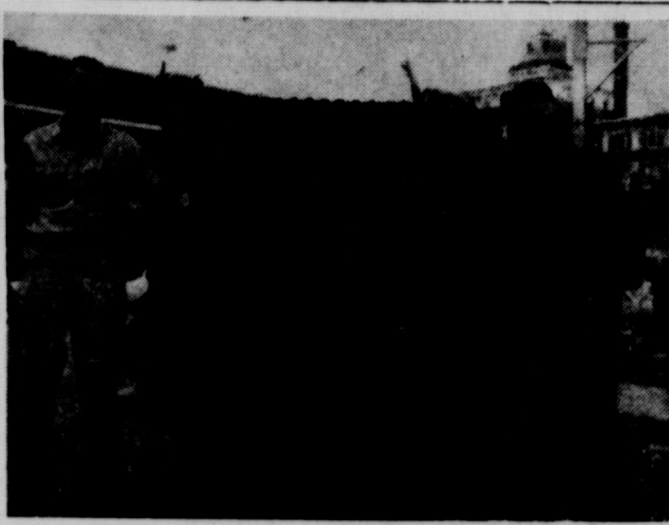

91st Court Jury Nixes Damages

A jury found in favor of the defendant in a \$5,000 damage suit heard this week in 91st District Court.

S. H. Bell of Cisco was asking damages from Kenneth Trice of Jones County as the result of an automobile accident which happened June 21, 1963, at the intersection of Ave. J. and 17th Street in Cisco.

The jury answered 11 issues in deciding that damages should not be awarded. They found that Mr. Trice had been speeding as driver of one of the vehicles involved in the accident, but that such speeding had not been the primary cause of the accident.

The jury held that Mr. Bell had failed to keep a proper lookout and that he had failed to apply his brakes in time, and that these two negligences were responsible for the accident.

In reply to the issue, "How much should the plaintiff (Mr. Bell) be awarded?" the jury answered, "None."

A suit involving a Ranger man, E. I. Wilhelm, asking \$14,035 from the Texas Employment Insurance Association, was to have been heard Wednesday by a jury.

State Asking \$1,439.80 From Co. In Escheat

The State of Texas is suing Eastland County again — for \$1,439.80 held in escheat money by the 91st District Court.

Under recent state legislation the state collects funds held in trusts and other sources for more than seven years, and legal proceedings are brought as a formality to obtain the funds. The present suit is for escheat monies dating to 1955 and 1956.

District Clerk Roy Lane is cited in the case, simply because as clerk of the court, he is custodian of these dormant accounts.

Demo Seaberry Tells GOPs Why He Is for Sen. Goldwater

Approximately 100 county Republicans heard Virgil T. Seaberry Jr., Eastland attorney and a Democrat, tell why he is for Sen. Barry Goldwater and against President Lyndon Johnson.

Speaking in the 91st District Court room Tuesday evening, Seaberry began by saying that he felt at home in the courtroom, but a bit strange talking to Republicans. Then,

"I am a Democrat, believing the traditional principals of the Democratic Party as practiced by Thomas Jefferson," he said. "The Republican Party has traditionally advocated a strong central government, but this year this is reversed," he said.

"Mr. Goldwater is for states' rights, and Johnson is for extending the powers of the government."

"Anybody who asks me to vote a straight party ticket regardless of the candidates, is insulting my patriotism," the attorney said.

"Ralph Yarborough has not represented Texas. He voted

Who Sets Insurance Rates? Rotarians Told at Meeting

"Who and What Makes Automobile Insurance Rates in Texas?" was program for the Eastland Rotary Club Monday as members learned that they, as drivers and pedestrians, are responsible.

Abstractor - Insurance Man Earl Bender was program chairman and arranged for a slide film presentation, narrated by Pat Miller, in which the method of insurance rate setting was discussed.

Miller pointed out with the presentation that automobile insurance rates are higher in 36 other states than in Texas. (Massachusetts is highest; Wyoming lowest). The statewide average rate for private passenger car, he said, is \$48.15 per year, \$20.06 for property damage and \$28.09 for bodily injury.

"The cost," per day he said, "is about equal to a pack of cigarettes, less than a pound of pork chops or a half gallon of milk."

The state insurance board sets the rates that are to be charged but they do not make them, he pointed out. The insurance premium dollar is divided like this: 63 cents for loss & loss adjustment costs; five cents to pay taxes and license fees 27 cents for overhead, sales expense and other costs of doing business; and finally, five cents for insurance company profit, it is hoped.

Why do rates go up? Well increased new car costs (\$2,250 in 1954 compared to \$2,828 today); increase repair costs; increased medical expenses (up a third over the nation and half in some states); and public apathy, Miller explained.

Unnecessary litigation is another factor, he said, as are padded, fraudulent claims. Miller also explained why males under 25 are required to pay higher insurance rates.

When will insurance costs go down? "When fewer insured vehicles are involved in accidents and when the average cost of paying for those insured accidents goes down," Miller said.

Second stop will be at the Ed Harrison ranch, between Desdemona and Gorman. The last stop, prior to lunch at the above cafe, will be at the Keith Whitt place.

After lunch, Wilson will show some of his cattle at both the Charley Underwood place, as well as at his ranch west of town.

The last stop will be at the Dr. D. V. Rodgers ranch, five miles west of Gorman. Breeders and ranchers, not only from Eastland but also from all adjoining counties, are invited to participate in the all day affair.

A more neighborly explanation of the old European custom of blazing bonfires on Halloween is found in Sir James Frazer's classic book on primitive customs, "The Golden Bough." He points out that the souls of the departed were supposed to visit their old homes in order to warm themselves by the fire and to bask in the good cheer provided by their affectionate kinfolk.

The Irish say that jack-o'-lanterns originated with a man named Jack who was doomed to walk the earth with his lantern until Judgment Day because he was unable to enter either heaven or hell.

Even after November 1 became a Christian feast day, honoring all saints, the peasants clung to the old pagan beliefs and customs. The hold day traces back to 610 A. D. when Emperor Phocas gave the Roman Pantheon to Pope Boniface IV as a church.

But when the Druids were calling the shots, they combined their fear of ghosts with fun and rejoicing. A three-day celebration centered around Halloween. The festivities included roasting of nuts and apples as symbols of the harvest.

Today, the trappings of ancient rituals are still with us on Halloween - grotesque masks, witches, black cats, white ghosts. But the glamour of mystery and awe that clung to the annual observance.

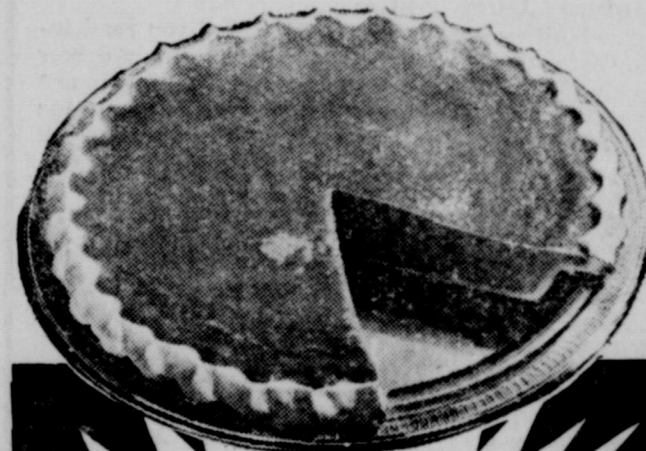

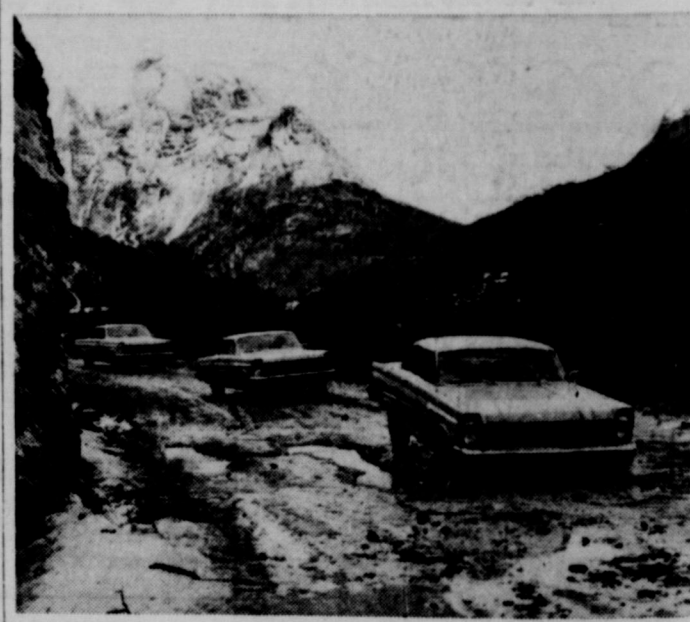

for the civil rights bill (which Johnson labeled "the first step toward a dictatorship" when he was a senator), and for continuing foreign aid to Indonesia even after Surkarno told us to take our foreign aid "and go to Hell." "Now Ralph won't even comment on these issues. He had a right to vote as he saw fit, but he also has the obligation to explain his stands," he said.

In comparing the two national platforms, Seaberry noted that the GOP platform calls for a balanced budget to end inflation, whereas the Democratic platform stresses continued economy in government. "We'll be bankrupt, if we're not already, if we continue the present economy," he said. The national debt is 320 billion and a billion a month due in interest.

"The Republican platform calls for retaining the oil depletion allowance and the Democratic platform makes no comment, although we know that Humphrey, the darling of ADA wants to eliminate the depletion allowance." "The Republican platform says we can't buy friendship and let's quit giving foreign aid away trying."

"I can't figure out what the Democratic platform says but I know we've shipped a lot of wheat and are giving complete manufacturing plants to communist nations — a nuclear plant to Rumania right now."

"Cuba — 'The GOP doesn't have a lot to be happy after the way Eisenhower welcomed Castro in this country,' Seaberry said. 'And Kennedy reached his peak in welding the people of this country together on the Cuban missile buildup crisis. The U. S. backed him, but he apparently made a deal and backed down.'"

"This is the first time in many years I've had an opportunity to vote 'for' someone. Mr. Goldwater is a rarity. He's an honest politician and you don't find many of them left in Washington." (Seaberry said later I've already voted absentee because I was afraid I might die before election day and sure wanted my vote to count.)

"Goldwater's honesty often gets him into trouble," he said, "because the Democrats take his honest, straightforward remarks and twist them. (He told the people in Fort Worth he was against the TFX contract going to Convair because their's was an inferior, more expensive design; he told the people of Tennessee that something should be done with TVA; and he told retired people in Florida that he voted against medicare because it would bankrupt the social security program.)"

"There'll be no money in the social security program in five years unless taxes are raised to put it there, and cost of administering the program has increased 56 percent in the past six years."

"I believe Goldwater wants to stop communism abroad and socialism at home and reduce the power of the President. He will also, if elected, Seaberry said, appoint some able lawyers to the Supreme Court, where we've lost more freedom from

cast-off politicians there passing laws.

"I'm against LBJ because of Duval County and because I think LBJ is for 'LBJ'. I agree that he is surely most experienced and capable of being becoming a great president. IF he would put the needs of the United States first, but I don't think he can change overnight and do that."

"There are a lot of politicians and businessmen who are publicly supporting Johnson because of what they think he can do for them. In the voting booths they may vote differently."

Seaberry commended Cong. Omar Burleson to the Republicans and called him a good, honest representative.

Hitting hard at what he called the "smirking" campaign of Democratic slogans, the attorney closed by stating that the matter is basically a moral and religious issue. "It's a matter of 'right and wrong', good and evil, whether we believe in a God and in a devil and whether we believe as we've been taught, that power will corrupt." "The basic belief of conservatism is a belief in a Supreme Being and the obligation to take a stand for right and not for expediency. What to do? Vote for the best man, try to influence your uncommitted friends — and pray."

State Capital NEWS

By Vern Sanford

AUSTIN — An increase of \$107,000,000 in state expenditures for higher education and doubled tuitions in state colleges and universities is proposed.

Texas Commission on Higher Education recommends a \$457,100,000 budget for upper level institutions during the 1965-67 biennium. Figure includes \$307,500,000 for 22 state-supported senior colleges and universities.

Tuitions under the Commission's recommendation would be hiked from \$50 to \$100 a semester. Last increase was in 1957, when the rate was raised from \$25. If the legislature approves this hike, revenues would be boosted \$33,000,000 — leaving some \$74,000,000 more needed from tax refunds.

Gov. John Connally returned from the Southern Governors' Conference in San Antonio with a new honor and a new assignment.

Already chairman of the National Democratic Governors' Caucus, he was unanimously elected chairman of the South-

ern Conference of chief executives.

In a three-day session, the governors discussed a variety of state problems and adopted 14 resolutions. Among the latter was one urging a federal constitutional amendment to permit states to take other factors than population into consideration in reapportioning their senates. Resolution was aimed at nullifying a U. S. Supreme Court decision ordering both houses of state legislatures apportioned on the basis of population alone.

Three governors blocked action on Alabama Gov. George Wallace's resolution calling on the federal government to leave operation of public schools entirely in the hands of states.

State Democratic Committee has authorized Chairman Marvin Watson of Daingerfield to enter a bid for the 1968 Democratic Convention in Texas.

Watson will name a committee to consider possible host cities.

Witnesses protesting adoption of three high school biology textbooks charged that evolution is an atheistic, unscientific and materialistic

theory that should not be taught in public schools.

State Textbook Committee took protests into consideration after a public hearing. Actually, eight books on the list were opposed. Principal targets were the three books developed by the National Science Foundation.

Texas Railroad Commission set oil production for November at 28.4 per cent of potential.

Figure represents a slight increase over October, which was limited to 2,860,000 barrels daily under a 27.9 per cent of potential order.

Employment statistics from the Texas Employment Commission shows a big increase in August. There were 3,322,370 jobholders in the non-farm category in July, compared with 3,325,600 in August. More significant was a drop in unemployment: 152,500 were looking for work in August, compared to 159,500 in July, and 174,500 in August of 1963.

Governor's Committee on Aging, chaired by State Senator Walter H. Richter of Gonzales, will ask the next Legislature to establish a permanent Texas Commission on Aging.

Purpose of the Commission would be to work with community groups interested in the problems of Texas' senior citizens and to coordinate efforts of local organizations with those of state agencies.

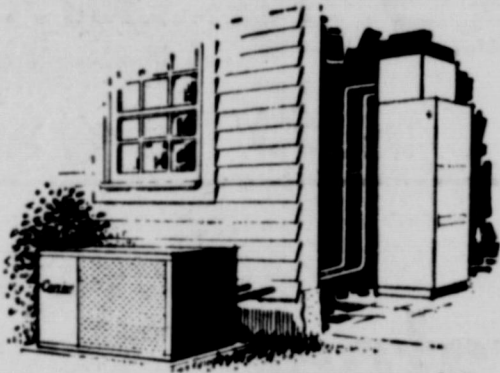

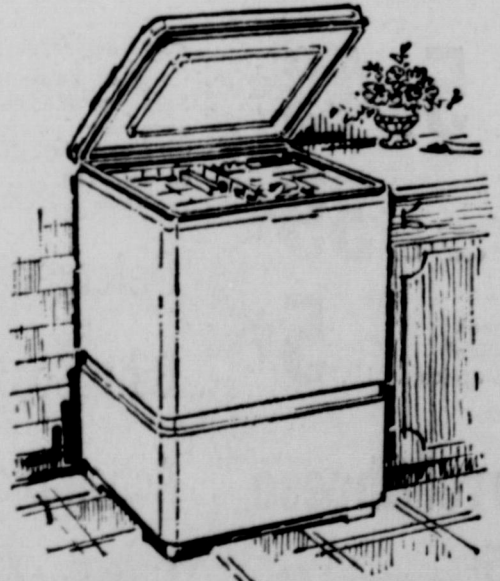

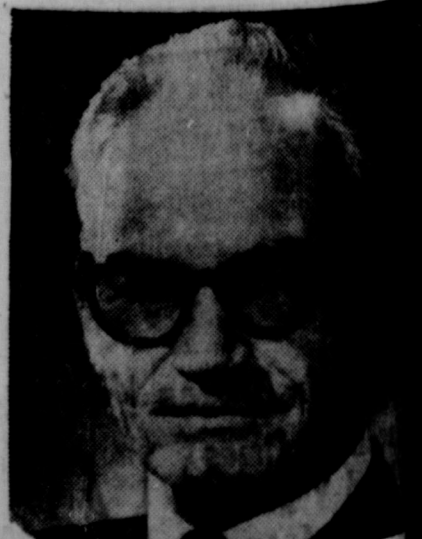

County Medical Society Supports Amendment No. 3

The president of the Eastland, Callahan, Throckmorton, Shackelford and Stephens County Medical Society, Dr. Luther Gohlke, said Friday that Texas voters will have an opportunity on November 3 to complete an outstanding program of hospital and medical care for the needy aged.

Dr. Gohlke said that Constitutional Amendment 3 would permit the State Legislature to broaden the existing Kerr-Mills program by providing health care benefits for those aged who truly need and want help, but who do not qualify for Old Age Assistance.

"This proposal, if approved, will enable the State of Texas to complete a program under the Kerr-Mills law which already is regarded as one of the finest in the nation," Dr. Gohlke declared.

The existing Kerr-Mills program was placed into operation in Texas on January 1, 1962. It provides a comprehensive program of hospital, medical, surgical, radiation, and nursing home benefits for those who qualify for Old Age Assistance. The State of Texas has purchased an insurance policy from Blue Cross for 229,000 needy aged, representing more than 30 per cent of the entire 65-and-over population. More than 7,500 patients are being hospitalized each month, while almost 11,000 are receiving nursing home care. "Complementing this fine State program, commercial insurance companies and Blue Cross - Blue Shield are offering policies which are specially tailored for the aged," Dr. Gohlke said. "As a result, Texas now ranks first among all states in the percentage of the aged who have one or more health insurance policies. Seventy-two per cent of the elderly in Texas are covered by health insurance. This compares with the national average of 60 per cent."

The County medical society president said that many of the Texas aged who actually need and want medical help already are receiving it. He cited the comprehensive statewide survey conducted by Bel-den Associates of Dallas. That study confirmed that health

insurance is helping finance many of the costs of hospital and medical care. In view of others with sufficient incomes and savings, those who are helped financially by their families and by their children, and those who have expressed the belief that they should take care of themselves, Bel-den has concluded that there apparently remains about 3 per cent of all aged Texans who need and want outside help.

Dr. Gohlke reiterated that Texas voters can assist those remaining aged who need and want help by voting for Constitutional Amendment 3 at the election on November 3.

Crew Leaders Are Named For Census Of Farms

Floyd Myron Johnson of Albany and Susan Eloise Parker of Comanche have been named as crew leaders for the 1964 Census of Agriculture. Percy R. Millard, director of the regional office of the U.S. Bureau of the Census at Dallas, announced today. The new crew leaders are two of about 1,825 persons throughout the U.S. to receive this appointment.

The new crew leaders will supervise a team of census enumerators who will visit all farms and ranches in Eastland and adjoining counties to collect official census questionnaires from farm operators. Enumeration of all farms in the county will take place in November and early December. The census will be taken in the following way: Shortly after November 5, the Bureau of the Census, an agency of the U.S. Department of Commerce, will mail census questionnaires to all rural boxholders. Those required to fill out the forms should do so and hold the questionnaires until a census enumerator comes to collect them. At that time, the enumerator will help answer any questions that may have proved troublesome.

The crew leaders are key persons in conducting a Census of Agriculture. They recruit and train the enumerators, schedule their work, review the accuracy of completed forms, and conduct difficult interviews.

The Census of Agriculture is taken every five years in years ending in "4" and "9" to gather information on the nation's agricultural resources and improvements and information is vital in making decisions affecting many segments of the U.S. economy. Data gathered include the number and size of farms, acreage and harvest of crops, livestock inventories, and information on farm equipment and improvements and income and some production expenditures.

The information will be published starting in 1965 for counties, States, and the nation.

USDA Food Donations Make Local School Meals Tasty

Food donations of the U. S. Department of Agriculture have helped make low-cost meals for schools possible for the last 18 years. This year, 31 different foods are being distributed to schools in Arkansas, Colorado, Kansas, Louisiana, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Texas.

According to Mrs. G. L. Wingate, cook at Eastland High School, Eastland schools have always used USDA-donated foods in preparing school lunches, which serves over 400 students in high school.

Under this program, schools receive such items as turkey, ground meat, roast, chicken, flour, butter, shortening,

meal, green beans, corn, fruits and cracked wheat, which is used in preparing cakes and rolls, Mrs. Wingate said.

Lyla Clark Kay, supervisor, visited Eastland High School during the first week of October and found the lunch room conditions excellent.

School lunches today are better than ever. Such favorites as fried chicken and roast turkey are seen often on school lunch menus. Mr. John Slaughter, southwest area food distribution director, said.

Fresh Bartlett pears now are being purchased for school lunch use, although canned fruits make up the biggest portion of fruit allotments. Canned fruits which have been donated for use during this school year are apples and applesauce, apricots, cherries, peaches, pineapple and plums.

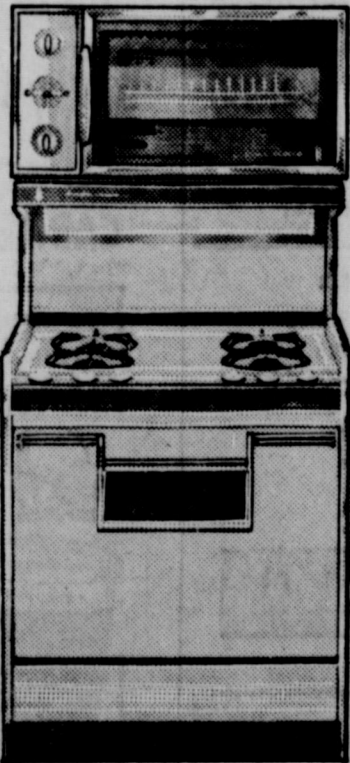

President Leon Musgrove presided.

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
