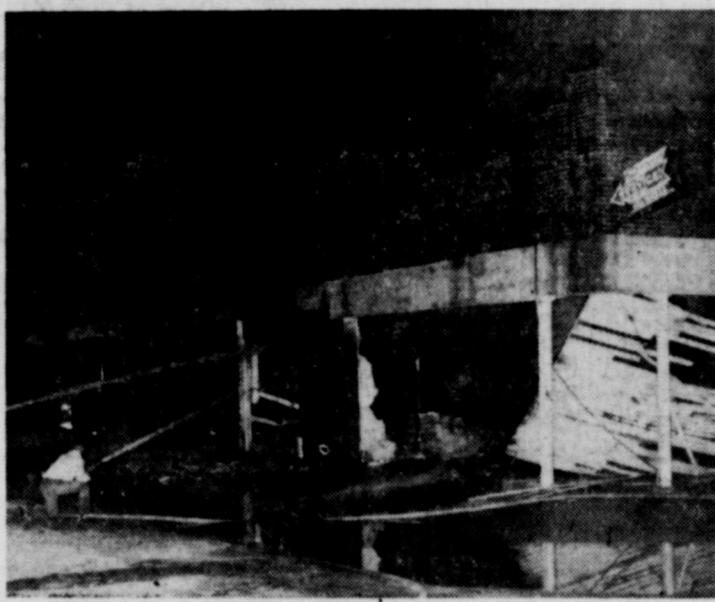

Costly Blaze Occurs At Ford Dealership

An \$80,000 fire of undetermined origin swept through the Bagwell-Roberson Motor Co. at Ranger shortly after midnight Sunday night, completely destroying the building and 19 cars, 17 of which were new.

The fire was reported at 12:08 a.m. Monday morning by Carl Page who lives near the scene of the blaze at 460 W. Main Street.

Firemen reported however, that the building was burning fiercely when they arrived. Shortly after the firemen arrived five or six gasoline drums began exploding, spreading the fire over the entire building and through the composition roof.

The building, about 150 by 200 feet, belonged to Morris Leveille, of Ranger.

Firemen battled the blaze with all their equipment for about two hours and sprinkled the smoldering ruins until about 5:45 Monday morning. Most attention was spotted on the mechanical shop during the first stages of the fire but as the exploding gasoline drums spread the fire, the firemen attempted to save the parts and supply and office furniture at the front of the building.

However, when windows in front of the building were broken by water pressure the flame spread quickly to that portion of the building.

One new car was rolled out of the show room in the front part of the building. However, it showed considerable smoke damage.

Don Butler, police officer on duty at the time of the fire, said that he had driven by the motor company "about 15 or 20 minutes before the fire but had not seen any smoke or a blaze. The cause of the fire has not been determined.

Fire Chief Charlie Isabell said that \$30,000 of the loss on the equipment and fixtures were covered by insurance and that the building carried \$12,500 in insurance.

ing in which students may obtain swimming instruction.

The school in small craft will offer training in canoeing, sailing, boating, including outboard motor safety, also instruction in small craft handling, safety, self rescue and rescue of others. Marine spike seamanship, care and repair of equipment. This school will offer formal courses in swimming, lifesaving, or first aid.

At these schools one can become a well-qualified instructor of swimming and lifesaving, first aid, boating, canoeing, or sailing for camps, recreation and park departments, youth groups and other community agencies. The students learn by doing. In an informal atmosphere, authorities in aquatic and safety education give instruction in the improvement of personal skills, teaching principles and methods, and programming for camps, beaches, pools, and community groups.

The students follow an intensive 10 day schedule of daily classes, evening seminars, and recreational activities. They must remain at the school for the entire 10 days.

The nominal fee of \$50 covers and lodgings, textbooks and other materials, and the emblem or insignia emblem.

Qualifications include persons who are age 18 or over and certified by a physician to be in sound physical condition and who plan to use this training to teach others. To enroll for water safety instructor training a person must be a better than average swimmer. To enroll for first aid instructor training swimming ability is not required. To enroll in a small craft school they must hold senior lifesaving certificates or have equivalent training. Previous small craft experience or aquatic school or water safety instructor training would be helpful.

Further information and an application to enroll in any of these schools can be obtained from the office of the Eastland County Red Cross located in the courthouse in Eastland. The office is open in the afternoons and the telephone number is 453.

Wildcat Location Staked Near Rising Star

A wildcat location has been staked three miles west of Rising Star in southern Eastland County.

The venture is W. C. Estes of Brownwood No. 1 W. C. Milling, et al. Site is 1,960 feet from the north and 2,000 feet from the west lines of Section 17, Block 2 ETRR Survey.

Proposed depth is 1,500 feet with rotary.

A regular field location was staked two miles northeast of Eastland. It is W. D. Evans of Angleton, Tex., No. 2 Levi R. Vangeem.

Having a proposed depth of 1,999 feet with cable tools, it is 948 feet from the north and 150 feet from the east lines of Section 12, Block 4, H&TC Survey.

Jarbo Oil Co. Inc., of Houston No. 3 B. P. Barber has been completed as a regular field producer three miles northeast of Eastland in Section 2, Block 4, H&TC Survey.

Daily potential was 17 barrels of 39 gravity oil, flowing through a 14-64-inch choke with 400 pounds on casing and 300 on tubing. Flow was from open hole at 1,459-1,781 feet. Pay was topped at 1,429. Gas-oil ratio was 200-1.

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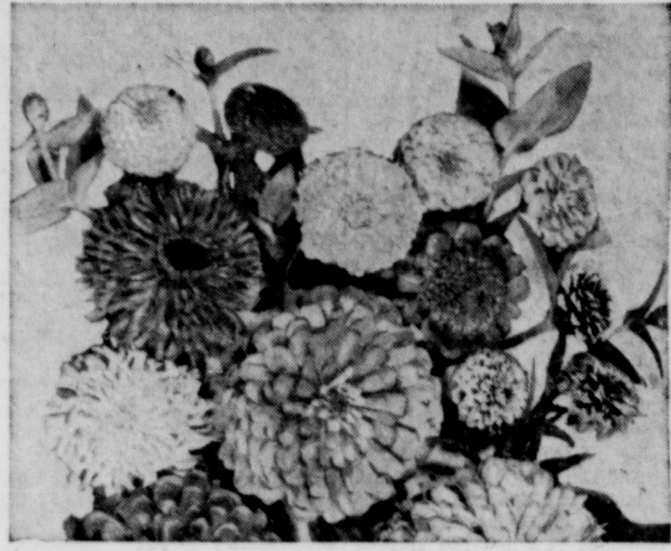

Enough Different Zinnias To Plant a Whole Garden



Big and Small, All the Blossoms Illustrated Are Zinnias.

Zinnias, the native American flowers which are the easiest of annuals to grow from seed, excel all other annuals in the variety of their colors, forms and sizes. There is hardly a garden role for which one of its many varieties cannot be used. A beautiful garden can be planted with zinnias alone, and if all of its charming colors, and various forms are used, your friends will find it difficult to believe that such an effect was produced with different varieties of one flower.

Planting such a garden offers no difficulties. Seed can be sown direct in the garden to germinate in a few days and flower in a few weeks. Somewhat earlier flowers can be obtained by starting seeds in the house, or a cold frame, to be transferred to the garden when freezing weather ends.

In a zinnia border, it would be well to avoid seed of mixed colors, and do your own color composing with groups or masses, each of a single color, attractively placed in harmonious contrast with each other.

In the background the giants can be used, 3 to 4 feet tall. In this size you may select from two different forms, the dahlia flowered and the cactus. The first have flat petals formally arranged on 4-inch blooms of white, cream, yellow, red, rose, pink, lavender or purple flowers, in various tones. In pleasing contrast to these, cactus flowered zinnias have charmingly irregular curled petals, and grow even larger in size. There are white, scarlet, pink, and yellow varieties with flowers 5 inches across. With groups of these large flowers arranged so that each group enhances the beauty of its neighbors, a decorative effect can be achieved difficult to surpass with any other flowers.

For the border foreground there are lower growing zinnias, with smaller flowers, but borne in greater profusion. They grow in low bushes from which armfuls of blossoms can be cut to use in bouquets. The secret of making them bloom profusely is never to allow flowers to fade on the plant.

Fantasy zinnias, 2 1/2 feet tall, have shaggy flowers like the cactus type, and lovely lavender, orange, rose and scarlet colors.

The flowers of Hageana Zinnias growing 18 inches tall, resemble small dahlias, with each pointed petal tipped with a contrasting color, including yellow, crimson, maroon, pink and orange.

Lower growing kinds with small double flowers of conventional form, in brilliant red, pink, yellow and orange, include Tom Thumb, 6 inches tall; Cupid, 12 inches; and Lilliputs 12 to 15 inches.

All zinnias need room to develop branches so do not crowd them. Give even the smallest kind a foot of room to grow in and the giants twice this space. They revel in warm sunshine and increase the abundance of their flowers as the days grow shorter, continuing until frost.

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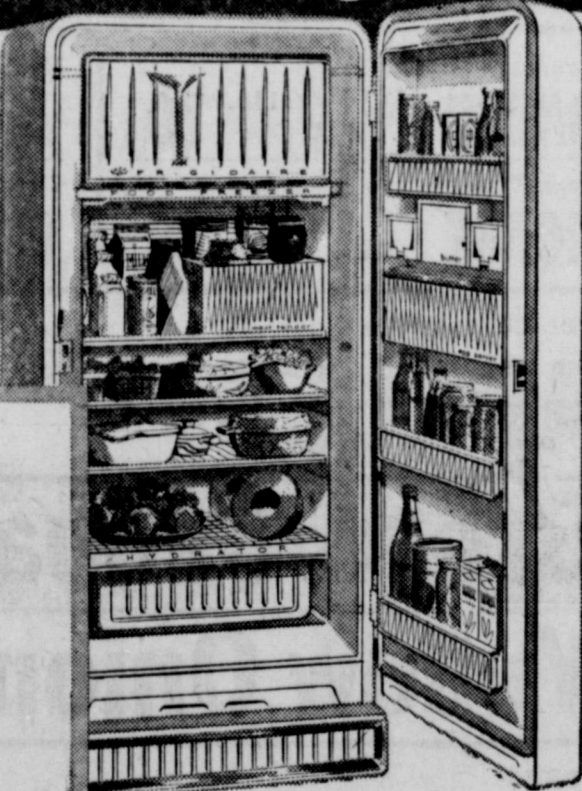
