County Asked to Accept Leon Area Roads for Maintenance

Stalled apparently is a request by the Eastland County Water Board for Eastland County to accept certain roads north of Lake Leon for maintenance and upkeep.

Request was repeated during a special session of the county commissioners court Monday when water board members attended, asking that the county accept a conveyance of certain roads to and through the Utey Cabin Sites, west of Lone Cedar Country Club.

The board asking earlier that the roads be maintained by the county, apparently had been told that the county could not maintain private roads because of an alleged indictment from 91st District Court. The board arranged to have the roads "conveyed" to the county so they could be maintained.

During the meeting Commissioner Glenn Justice, in whose precinct most of the

roads are, said that he could accept the "graveled roads for maintenance, but could not accept the paved, hard-topped road because he had no way to maintain them."

"There are some ten tax-paying permanent residents in the area," Water Board secretary - treasurer Lester Crosley told the court.

The instrument of conveyance which apparently has not been filed, was examined during the meeting and a discussion followed about certain parts of the road which are owned by the County Country Club, and therefore "unconveyable." Commissioner C. B. Dill of Cisco reminded the visitors of the indictment.

Commissioners Tip Arther (whose Precinct One includes the paved road from the FM 570 to the cattleguard on the country club road) and Justice agreed during the meeting to go to the site and inspect the roads to see what can be done.

Attending the meeting were C. B. Pruitt, board president. Members Dave Pickrell and Jim Smith; and Mr. Crosley.

Shooting, Stabbing Bring Charges

An 84-year-old Lake Leon resident is free on \$2,500 bond and a 43-year-old Dallas police character were being held in Eastland County Jail today. Both are charged with assault with intent to murder — in two separate incidents.

The 84-year-old was arrested Sunday after he cracked down on a neighbor with a double-barrelled shotgun. The neighbor, driving a pick-up at the time, was uninjured but his pickup had the paint kicked off it from the blast from about 75 feet, it is reported.

The Dallas man was charged after stabbing his estranged wife in the back, jabbing the lengthy blade to the hill. She was treated and released at Eastland Memorial Hospital for the injury, which reportedly barely missed her left lung.

It was the second attempt on her life by her husband who has yet not been able to make the \$3,500 bond set by Justice of the Peace Wells Dalton.

The Lake Leon area shooting was the result of a lengthy feud over boundary and crossing rights.

Another out-of-towner is being held on bond.

'County Interstate 20 Span To Be Completed in 4 Years'

Interstate 20 through Eastland County will be completed in about four years," Phillip L. Wilson, supervising design engineer, Design Division, Texas Highway Department, told the Eastland Lions Club Tuesday.

Special guest speaker as a part of Highway Week, Mr. Wilson pointed out that some 3,029 miles of the national interstate program will be built in Texas — at a cost of \$2.2 billion which is less than is costing in other states.

Robby Martin, design engineer from the Brownwood District office, introduced Mr.

Wilson, who explained that the state had 1,013 miles of the proposed interstate system built to date, has 504 miles presently under contract and 316 miles already up to adequate standards.

In emphasizing the theme of Highway Way which is "Mobility — Your Fifth Freedom," Wilson said the state has 26,000 miles of primary roadways and 37,000 miles of secondary or farm-to-market-type highways.

In the Eastland area, there are 357 miles of highway now under construction, he said, at a cost of \$18 million. Another 262 miles are set for seal coating and 261 more programmed for construction, to cost \$17 million.

"We're building interstate roads in Texas for some \$600,000 per mile and it's costing a million plus a mile in other states," he said.

states," he said. In answer to a question from County Judge Scott Bailey, Wilson described the differences between expressways (not fully controlled accesses) and freeways (fully controlled accesses).
Some \$400 million is spent yearly in Texas in the design, construction and maintenance of highways, he said. And the 66,000 miles of roadway in the state represents a \$4 billion investment.

James Smith was program chairman and arranged for the special Highway Week presentation. The week has been proclaimed by proclamation of Mayor Frank Deaton and by Gov. John Connally.
"We were not a wealthy nation when we began improving our highways," Wilson said. "But the roads themselves helped us create new wealth, in business and industry and land values. So it was not our wealth that made our highways possible. Rather, it was our highways that made our wealth possible."
And in Texas, he said, we have a "pay as you ride economy."
Highway Week is sponsored by the Texas Good Roads Association, a non-profit organization dedicated to bettering highway travel.

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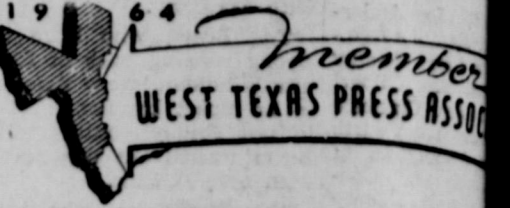

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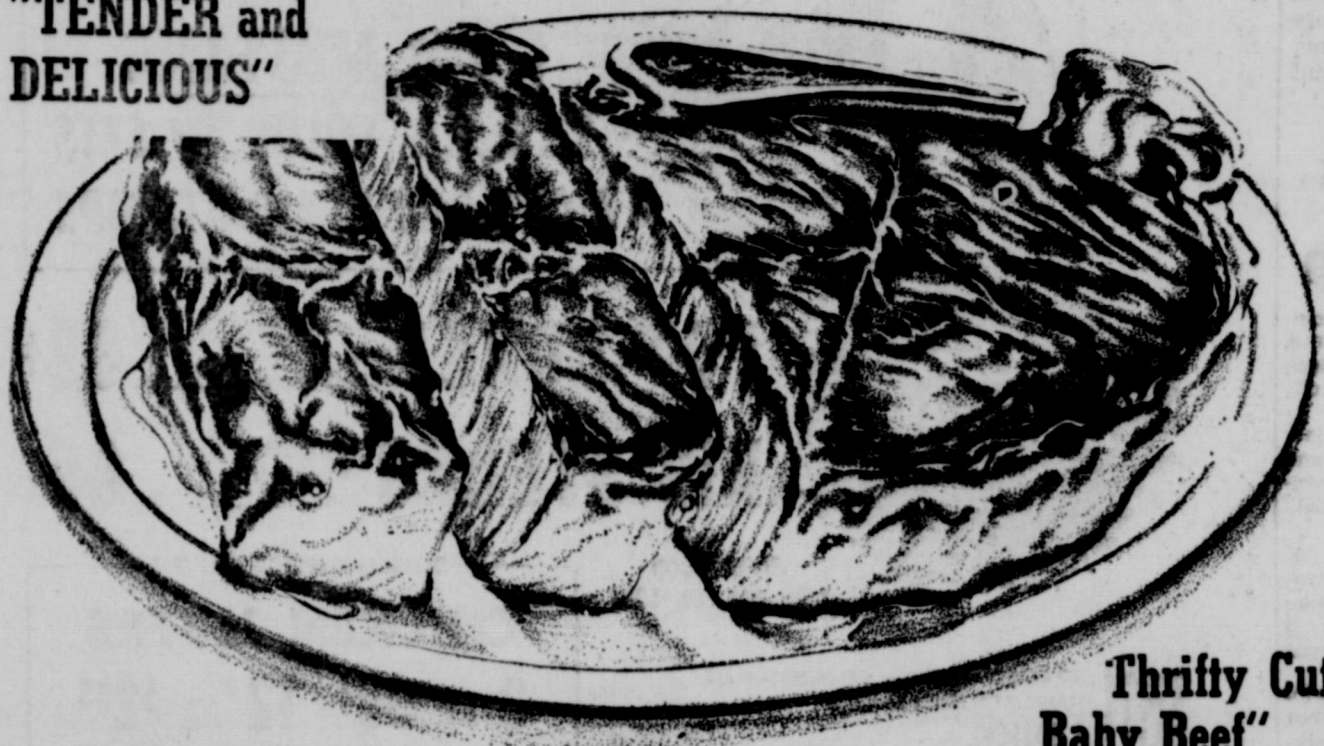

The band began the appearance on the east steps and drew laughs from the assembled crowd with "Billy Sol" words to a familiar tune.

County Chairman C. W. Hoffman Jr. of Eastland introduced Mr. Bush who spoke briefly to the crowd, made up of supporters from all over the county.

PRE-PAY PUBLIC PHONES SET FOR EASTLAND, RANGER

Engineering work is now underway which will mean improved service for users of public telephones in Ranger and Eastland, Bill Boothe, manager for Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, has announced.

The project will change public telephones in the two cities from "post-pay" to "pre-pay." The project is expected to be completed in April.

With "pre-pay" telephone service, the user must deposit two nickels or a dime before he receives a dial tone. He can then dial his local number or the operator to place a long distance call. If he dials "operator" or if his local number is busy, his money is automatically returned when he hangs up the receiver.

With the present, "post-pay" system, the user is instructed by the card on the public telephone to wait until his party has answered on a local call before depositing his dime. A tone on the line lets the caller know the called party has answered. On long distance calls, the caller is instructed not to deposit any money until the operator asks him to do so.

Post-pay public telephones were installed when Ranger and Eastland changed from manual to dial service. Studies at that time showed that this was the most practical and economical way to serve both communities.

"The decision to change to 'pre-pay' service was brought about by increased usage and growth of the two cities," Boothe pointed out.

It takes less equipment to operate "post-pay" public telephone service.

Making the change to the new "pre-pay" type service requires considerable engineering and the manufacture and installation of new and additional equipment.

"It is by no means a simple task," Boothe pointed out.

Telephone systems are engineered and planned with the individual community in mind. The systems are literally tailored or made for each city. This also applies to coin or public telephone service, the manager added.

"Since 'pre-pay' service is the most common for public usage, the new system will be of particular benefit to Ranger and Eastland visitors and tourists stopping in the two cities," Boothe said.

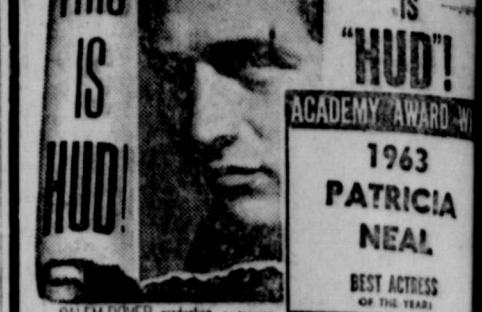

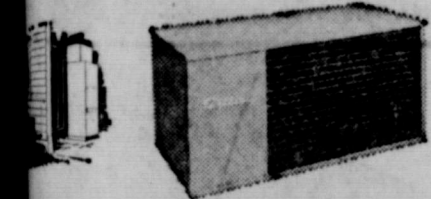

350 People Assisted By Salvation Army Through UF Money

The Salvation Army of Eastland receives \$1,000 a year from the United Fund, according to James Smith, chairman. Two-thirds of this money is spent in Eastland helping transit people and for others who may need help.

The remaining one-third is sent to the district office in Dallas, he said.

During 1963 the Salvation Army served 350 persons, with an average cost of 88 cents per person.

It bought groceries and clothing; supplied lodging, meals and transportation for needy people; purchased a cook stove for a family of eight; and sent four boys to summer camp, H. T. Wilson, secretary and treasurer, said.

The following men have been serving as committeemen: Charles Freyschlag, Everett Plowman, Luce Pittman and Ray Laney.

The local Salvation Army is constantly sought by less fortunates for help. Just this week a transit Latin American family was directed to the committeemen after asking, "Mister, who's the Salvation Army here?"

One of our local united fund agencies is taking positive action in attempting to curb the rise in crime and delinquency. The National Council on Crime and Delinquency, supported through the Texas United Fund, to which the Eastland campaign contributes, is exerting dynamic leadership in resolving the problems in the field of correction and probation.

A national problem of great and growing gravity is the rise in crime and delinquency throughout the country. More than 2 million serious crimes were recorded in America in 1962 — an increase of six percent over 1961. And while the 1963 totals aren't in yet, no one expects them to show any improvement.

That is four serious crimes every minute of the day and night in this country with an economic loss of \$550 million a year in stolen property alone!

Worse still, so many young people are involved these days in acts of vandalism, disorder, violence, car theft, and drug addiction. And so many of them seem to be headed for a wasted lifetime on the "treadmill of crime" — out-of-the-courts and jails and back in again — with a human loss to the communities and the nation that cannot be reckoned in dollars and cents.

Australian - Style Cattle Raising

My original plan was to leave Mount Isa and its rich mine by plane and fly directly to Sydney, but as I had the time and the inclination to see more of the state of Queensland, I decided to travel the entire distance by train. This was a roundabout and slow journey of over 1,700 miles but I am glad that I chose that route.

I left Mount Isa on a Monday morning, and all that day my train ran through sparsely settled dry desert lands, with some trees. The train was slow yet the equipment was excellent and food in the dining car was better than good. Although the sleeping car had only "twinettes," accommodating two passengers to a room, I did not have a roommate, and next forenoon, I was in Townsville on the east coast. The Mount Isa mine has a copper fabricating plant at Townsville, and the city is one of the more populated places in Queensland.

It was hot, with the temperature above ninety, and no cooling breeze. That night I left on the train for Brisbane, and just before the train pulled out a man appeared who was to have the upper berth in my twinette.

Next morning we became acquainted and he proved to be an agreeable companion who knew the country intimately because he is the government man who looks after all cattle in the great state of Queensland, which is sometimes called, "the Texas of Australia," probably because it is cattle country and now has a recently developed oilfield, and also a gas field that eventually will supply natural gas to some of the large cities.

Queensland is much larger than Texas, and is an important agricultural area with great fields of sugar cane and citrus fruits. The train ran close to the coast in places, and as there is a considerable difference in water level

Vets Questions And Answers

Q — Are veterans ever required to pay for care received in Veterans Administration hospitals?
A — The circumstances under which a veteran might be charged for care received in a VA hospital arise rarely. It is possible that a veteran admitted to a VA hospital, is later determined not to have a legal entitlement. In such a case the veteran would be billed for his care. Also a veteran may be admitted for injuries sustained in an automobile or industrial accident and "third party" liability determined later. If the veteran is awarded damages based wholly or in part on the cost of the medical services involved, the VA may seek payment.

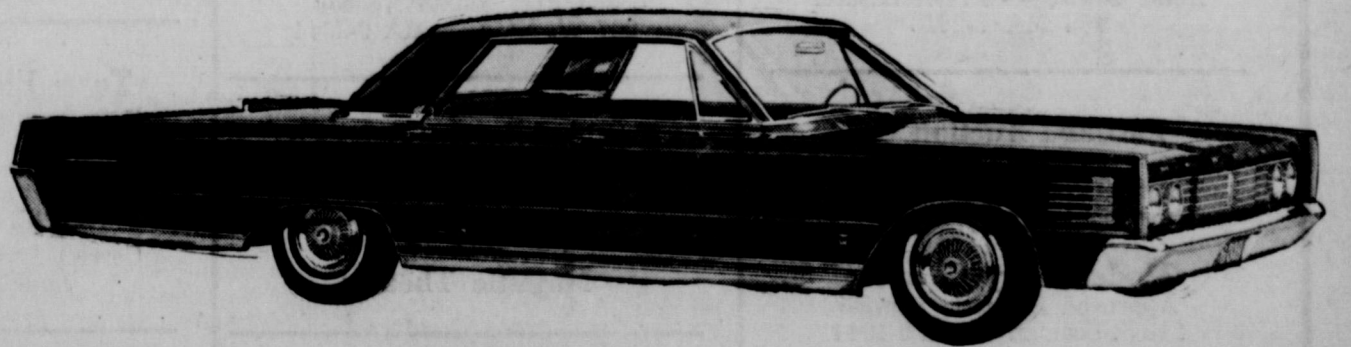

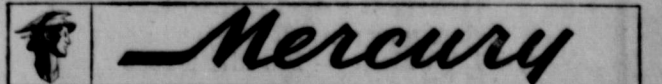

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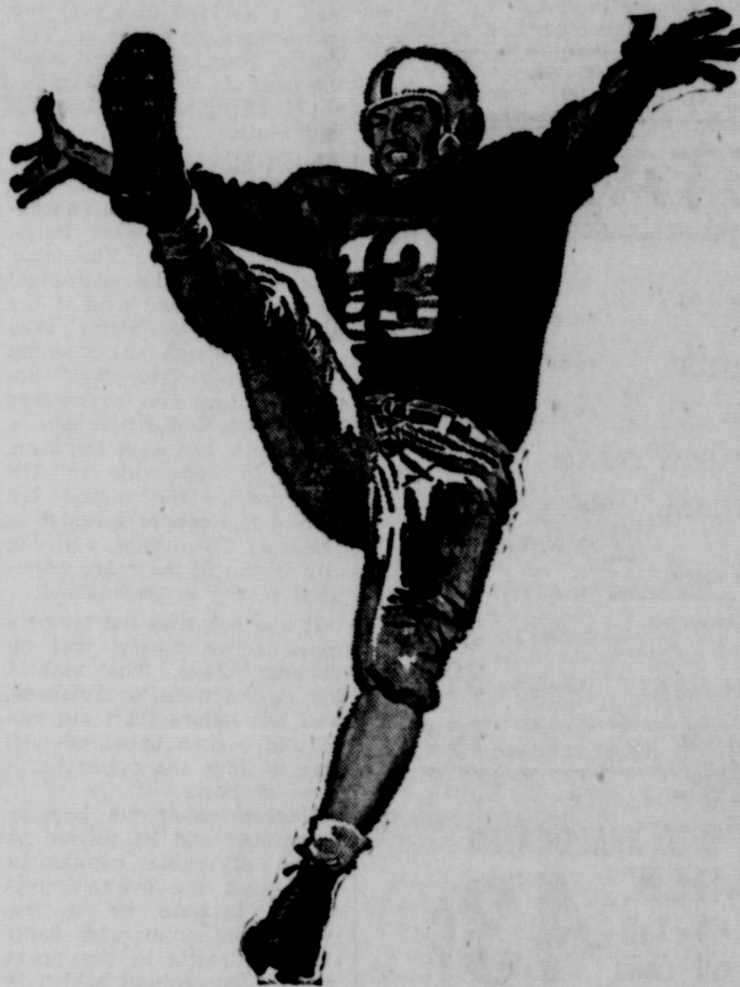
