

ARE YOU A SICK AMERICAN?

A letter by an unnamed San Franciscan in Copley news papers of California has been reprinted by a number of Arizona publishers. The writer tells of his great-grandmother's journal, a diary of her trip across the plains. On the trail, they encountered sickness and hunger, heat, cold, death and birth "like beads strung on a thread of hope."

"As I read," he wrote, "I began to think about America and what it stands for; and I thought about our enemies and what they intend to do to America . . .

"And, suddenly, I realize that I am a sick American I am sick of bureaucrats who tell me that my enemy is not really my enemy and that I should live together with murderers and tyrants. I am sick of government that hasn't the guts to clean traitors out of its own office. And I am sick of being a nice, pleasant guy about it.

"I am sick of my country being ridiculed all over the world. I am sick of pink-fingered diplomats and lily-livered politicians who place personal career above the fate of The Flag.

"I am sick of 40 years of relentless, creeping, cancerous its avowed purpose of conquering our Flag and seeing it trampled in the mud under Russian boots. I am sick of my genteel desire to stand pat and pray while the enemy ad-

"I am sick of educators who teach tolerance of subversion and clergymen who would have me quail at the specter of battle and turn my cheek in fear of the enemy.

"In all honesty, I am sick of the man who let these things come to be; myself. And by the living God who made me, Sir, I am a sick American who intends to get well."

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

> ferent phases 'The Cub Scout program, for boys of 8, 9, and 10 years

> "The cub program is carried on in the home and in small neighborhood groups, dens, meeting weekly under the leadership of a woman called a Den Mother, assisted by a Boy Scout called a Den Chief. There is an age - graded program of achievement leading to the ranks of Wolf, Bear and Lion. By encouraging the den and its members to start projects ing the parent to certify that boys have done their best in meeting each achievement the program provides opportunities for close parent-boy relationship.

"Boy scouting is a program for boys, age 11 through 17. designed primarily to achieve objectives in character building, citizenship training, and physical fitness,

"It seeks thru a vigorous outdoor program to inculcate in boys concepts of honor. luty to God and country, service to others and self-respect. The fundamental unit for the achievement of these goals is the Patrol - a group of boys numbering four to eight members - who elect their own patrol leader.

"A Troop, made up of one or more patrols, is led by a scoutmaster (with assistants according to need) whose primary role is to train and guide boy leaders to run their own troop. This he does thru a representative body known as the patrol leaders council. In this council patrol leaders report patrol ideas for activity and take council decisions and plans back to their patrols. In this fashion boys experience self-government and democratic living on a level they can understand.

"Exploring is a program for high-school age boys, designed to provide opportunities for them to explore adult-like roles and promted by the Boy Scouts of America to teach and re-enforce certain broad ethical aims.

"Exploring places emphasis on providing experience in developing social skills (2) learning about a variety of vocations, (3) developing an appreciation of the out-ofdoors, () encouraging personal fitness, () giving service to the community, and (6) enlarging the concept of the responsibilities and benefits of citizenship in a free society. "As I have stated before, the fundamental aims of the boy scout movement are character development, citizenship training and physical
