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A BIBLE THOUGHT FOR TODAY

RETURN TO THE LORD: Let the wicked forsake his way, and the unrighteous man his thoughts: and let him return unto the Lord, and he will have mercy upon him: and to our God, for he will abundantly pardon.—Isaiah 55: 7.

"FEAR THE BASIS OF THIS TROUBLE"—BARUCH

Financier Barney Baruch, in his clash with Senator Tom Connally before a senate committee, prophesied that "a balanced budget would bring money flowing here from all the world and provide people with means to earn their daily bread with great rapidity." His theory is that any change in the revaluation of the dollar "will scare everybody." Indeed, the eminent personage in the world of finance and politics has convinced himself at least that "fear is the basis" of conditions as they are and responsible for economic disorders.

Well, Tom Connally, a veteran of two wars is not timid. He is not afraid of ghosts. He believes it to be the duty as well as the province of public servants to march onward—to blaze new trails if new trails are necessary in order to get out of the Ditch of Despond. Connally demands a square deal for all. He cannot be muzzled, he has the courage of his convictions.

His closing words to Financier Baruch are placed in the record for the information and the edification of the people of Texas and adjoining states: "I don't think there is anything to be afraid of. I think the thing to do is to act and get started. We have been talking about this thing many weeks, and there is more gold in the United States today than when we started talking about it and certainly this government can declare an embargo against gold shipment at any time and for any purpose just the way 22 other nations have done, until we get our new basis settled. I do not think we should lose a pound of gold. This government is big enough to settle this question. I am talking for the producer, for the people out of work who cannot get work until we get going, for the weak investor and the weak debtor, both of which are being compromised to death by the rich and the smart who know what they are doing.

"Baruch very well knows these men. He will agree that when two men sit down to adjust anything, the man who is strong, the man who can hire good lawyers, the man who has enough money to buy food and wait, the man with the most knowledge, is in much better condition to do this so called adjusting than the helpless, the hungry, the man in fear of the bankruptcy court, and the investing widow and orphan. I speak for a square deal for all. I speak for a square deal at the same time embracing everybody. I am against continued hundreds of millions being paid out to help special classes of debtors while the taxpayer foots the bill and the average citizens hopeless and depressed."

Financier Baruch's program of proposals has been given to the reading public. His warning has been given space. Boiled down, his advice is that congress must balance the budget, stop talking about currency inflation and scale down its debt structure "to bring about economic recovery." This has been the program of the great engineer and his advisers. "How far did they get?" All the issues were submitted to the American electorate. They rejected at the ballot box the proposals and the sponsors of the proposals. If this is to be a nationwide campaign of education, Barney Baruch launched the movement and Tom Connally of Texas sent it bowling along the broad highways of the nation.

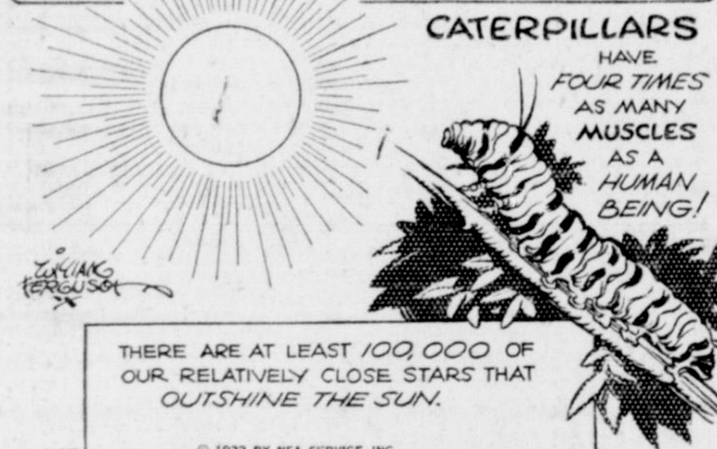
