Takes Part In Meetings In N. Y., Philadelphia, Washington and Is Main Speaker At Providence

Mrs. Joseph M. Perkins arrived home by train Tuesday from points east, having left here Jan. 7 for New York City. She attended the National Citizens Commission for Public Schools in N. Y. The main speaker was Ambassador Conant, who flew from the embassy in Germany to make the talk. He contrasted the education of children on the European continent with the education of the American child. Ambassador Conant is former president of Harvard University. Mrs. Perkins is a member of the executive committee of the national board of the Woman's Medical

College of Pennsylvania as, incidentally, are Grace Kelly, who is the youngest member of the board, and Miss Kelly's mother, Margaret Kelly. Both Margaret Kelly and her husband, John, attended the executive committee meeting and dinner and Mrs. Kelly who is chairman of the endowment committee for the college — to raise \$4 million — was one of the speakers at the meeting. Mrs. Kelly wrote an article for Good Housekeeping magazine recently and is author of a newspaper syndicated column running currently, both about her famous daughter, and every penny she derives from these projects she gives to the endowment fund for the college, which is the only medical college exclusively for women in the United States, and is more than 100 years old. Mrs. Perkins gave the invoca-

tion at the dinner. General Drexel-Biddle, former ambassador, was one of the speakers. He told of the wonderful experiences of the graduates of the college who went into foreign fields as medical missionaries.

Mrs. Perkins then went to Boston for a visit with her brother and thence to Washington, D. C., to attend the General Federation of Women's Clubs' board meeting, which was attended also by Mrs. L. E. Dudley of Abilene, president of Texas Federation of Women's Clubs; Mrs. Van Hook Stubbs of Wortham, former state president and now GFWC mental health chairman; Mrs. J. Howard Hodge of Midland, former state president and now GFWC chairman of safety. Another Texas clubwoman who is on the GFWC board, Miss Ethel Foster of Sterling City, was unable to attend because she is hospitalized in Shannon Hospital, San Angelo, following a fall in which she suffered a double break to an ankle bone.

Mrs. Perkins, GFWC chairman of the Department of Education, conducted a panel on "The White House Conference on Education", she attended in Washington Nov. 28-Dec. 1, assisted by 10 state presidents, including Mrs. Dudley of Texas.

Other events of the GFWC board meeting included luncheon at the Netherlands Embassy and a Congressional Reception. From Washington, Mrs. Perkins returned to New York, where she heard "Tales of Hoffman" in the grand old Metropolitan Opera

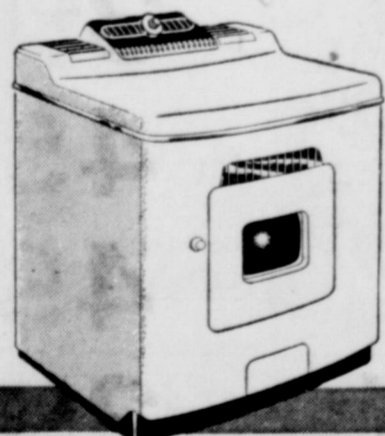

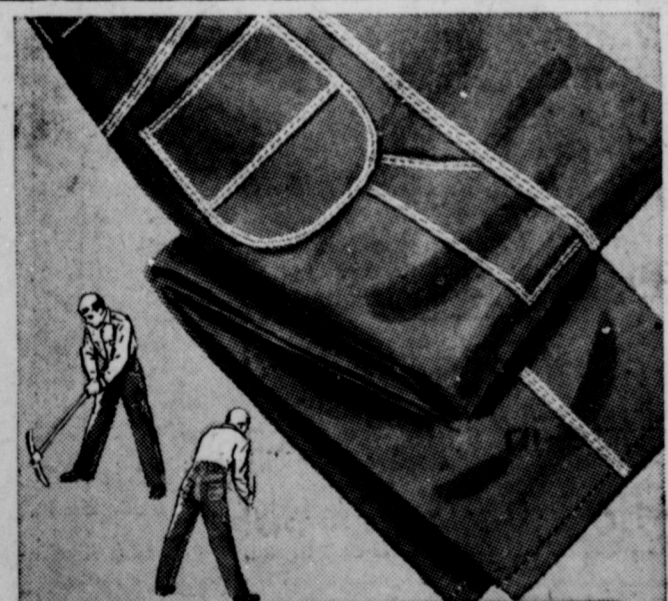

Reserve Units Ease Draft Obligations

The Eastland County Selective Service Board has warned that males who fail to register within five days after their 18th birthday could be punished.

Several cases have been noticed within the county of boys waiting far beyond the five day period to complete their registration.

There are certain program available in reserve corps and guard units. Military obligations to the government may be fulfilled under either of the plans.

The reserve plans are:

The FIRST PROGRAM: An 8-year enlistment in the Army Reserve with a draft deferment status for persons between 17 and 18½ years of age. In the beginning of such enlistment, persons will be required to take six months active duty training; upon completion, the individual returns to his home town and participates in training with a Reserve unit of his choice until he completes his 8-year enlistment. Participation with a Reserve unit includes 48 weekly drills and 15 days summer training each year. The latter training period normally will occur in the summer at a camp in your own, or a nearby state. If you are in high school the 6 months active training will be deferred until you are graduated. This Reserve enlistment provides a small amount of training and permits you to continue higher education, or a job, with the least amount of interference.

Billy Graham To Have Audience With Indian Prime Minister, Nehru

PALAMCOTTAH, India — Billy Graham, who will preach to over half a million people during his three-week tour of India, will have an audience with Prime Minister Nehru and President Rajendra Prasad next Saturday in Delhi.

The famed evangelist already has spoken to over 400,000 and recorded 7,000 decisions for Jesus Christ in a land where Christians are in a minority.

The tour will be concluded Feb. 8 with a rally in Calcutta.

During his talk with top men of India Billy is expected to say again as he did in talks with Churchill, President Eisenhower, Queen Elizabeth and Queen Wilhelmina, that the problems of the world are caused by human nature and not the atomic bomb. He will name sin as the cause of the world's problems and Jesus Christ as the answer. He does not pull punches when it comes to a man's position in life.

The largest crowd to hear Billy in India gathered in Kottayam. Over 100,000 sat on the spit level hills surrounding the platform. It was reported to be the largest religious gathering in the history of the nation. On two other nights there were crowds of 75,000 and 85,000.

Kottayam is a city of only 50,000 population and most of the people walked in from the surrounding countryside. People who walked five to 10 miles said they thanked God for a full moon. The light helped them to see deadly cobras along the jungle trails. Americans wouldn't walk 10 miles to church along a paved sidewalk in broad daylight.

Visitors filled all hotels and vacant rooms. Many slept in the open. The town ran dangerously low on food and more rice had to be rushed in to feed the hungry people. Five thousand people would gather each morning in a field for prayer meeting.

Billy and his party drove Monday from Kottayam to Palamcottah, over 140 miles through fertile land dotted with palm and rubber trees. Wild monkeys scampered around the car en route. They encountered two flag-waving parades of Communist youths. Billy stopped the car and preached to them from the Bible as they gathered around him, waving hammer and sickle. One youth kept his arm raised in a token of strength, but dropped his eyes when Billy talked about Jesus Christ.

People gathered in many villages along the way to wave as Billy came by. He is now about as well known in India as his native North Carolina.

Fifty thousand are expected here for the Tuesday and Wednesday night meetings.

Pioneer Conference basketball standings are in for a shaking this week as members face their first full slate of loop action.

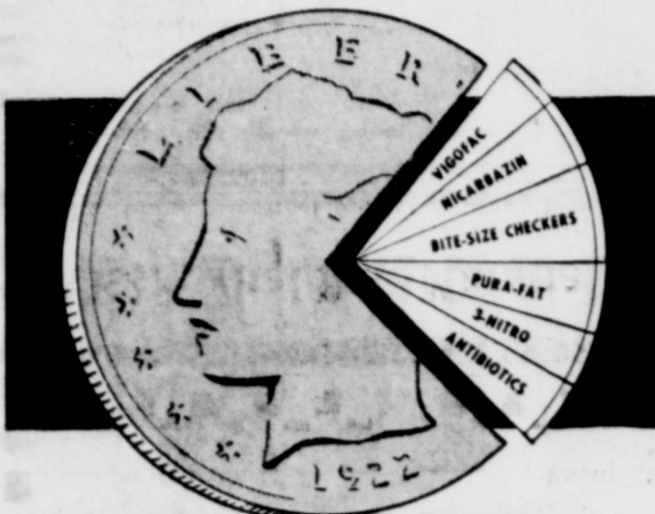
San Angelo's Rams are tied at one victory and no losses with Arlington State and Tarleton State for the PC lead.
