

County Steering Group Discusses Five Points For Industrialization

Detailing specifics of a proposed five-point industrialization program for Eastland County was business for a preliminary steering committee which met in Eastland Saturday morning.

The group decided to hold a training program for all cities and a combination get-together Nov. 5, place to be announced later. On that day, individual meetings will be held at the various towns and the joint meeting will be held in the evening.

The committee composed of the mayors of the various incorporated cities or their representatives and County Judge Scott Bailey met with Larry Milner, staff member of the Texas Industrial Commission at the Texas Electric Service Co. Reddy Room.

A discussion was held of the five points, which are:

1. Coordinating date about the county;
2. establishing local industry;
3. establishing a county-wide promotional program;
4. creating an Eastland County industrial sales team;
5. organizing a county-wide financing program.

Industry Pilot Program Is Opportunity For County

(An Editorial)

A group of Eastland County civic leaders, including the mayors of the six incorporated towns, gathered in Eastland Saturday morning to perfect a steering committee to guide a new industrial development program that the Texas Industrial Commission is sponsoring for the county.

This program is a pilot project to determine what the Commission and civic leaders can do in a county. Eastland County was selected by Governor John Connally as the site for the program, and this is an opportunity that Eastland County is accepting gratefully.

Director Harry Clark of the Commission outlined for some 60 county citizens at a meeting last Tuesday some of the things expected of them in the program. He promised that Larry Milner, the Commission's West Texas executive, would spend as much time as needed in Eastland County. He added that he, too, would be available from time to time for advisory work.

The committee's Saturday meeting was organizational in nature. It hoped to lay the ground work that would carry out the five-point program suggested by Mr. Clark: (1) Coordinate work in each community to provide needed information; (2) Study organization of a county-wide financing program for industry; (3) Create an industrial sales team for the county; (4) Create a county-wide promotional program with a paid staff; and (5) encourage establishment of local industry.

Since the pilot program has been ordered for the entire county, it seems reasonable to suggest that funds for a paid staff be provided by the county. Every taxpayer will benefit from any accomplishments of the program.

Eastland County certainly needs new industries — particularly some that would provide jobs for our young people. These youngsters need local opportunities and the county needs to keep them at home. There is an abundance of trainable labor in this area — people who would welcome such opportunities as might be the result of this pilot program.

Every citizen of the county sincerely appreciates the efforts of Governor Connally and the Industrial Commission to better our lot. Certainly, all of us will pledge our wholehearted cooperation. Here is an opportunity that must be grasped with both hands. There must be no jealousy or politics if the most good comes from this effort.

Although no rewards are guaranteed, it is good to know that a total of 317 new payrolls came to Texas last year through efforts in which the Texas Industrial Commission had a part. Nothing can be accomplished unless an effort is made.

Let's make a supreme effort!

Mavs Clipped 14-13 In Rising Star Thriller

In what surely must have been the most exciting dual played under lights Friday night the Eastland Mavericks gave the Rising Star Wildcats 48 minutes of hard-nosed football and their faithful fans a thrill a minute as they were edged out by the Cats 14-13.

The Wildcats scored first midway in the first quarter on a series that began when their Ace Quarterback Terry Geye dropped back to punt on a fourth and four situation, decided to try and went for a first down. He kept for another eight yards and a push through the middle picked up another first and put the ball on the Mav 15. After six more yards pked up the same way, Geye handed off to his Fullback Kenny Butler who edged around for the TD. Try for extra point was no good.

A bullseye 40-yard hurl from quick-thinking Quarterback Jerry McCullough to End Mike Miller set up the scoring for the Mavs late in the second quarter. Gaylon Griffin picked up four; McCullough kept for six and the first down. With seven minutes left in the half, an aerial intended for Miller went astray. Then an illegal use of hands on offense penalty cost the Mavs 15 yards and left them close to the goal, holding a fourth and 25 situation.

Once again the air paved the way when Miller pulled down a toss from McCullough good for the necessary 25 yards to save the drive. This put the ball right on the 10 with a new lease on life. The quarterback kept for no gain. John Moylan tried to no avail. A five-yard backfield in motion penalty plus other

groundless tries left the Eastlanders close but apparently stalled.

Then with only some two minutes left, after three tries waiting arms again for a short hurl and the lanky Miller went over for the score. The refreshing norther blew in just as the Mavericks put their scores on the board. Miller followed up with the extra point kick and Eastland led 7-6 as the half ended.

The third stanza was scoreless but the Mavs had a drive going that put them deep into Wildcat territory, but the heat Star wall of defense.

The fourth quarter spelled the excitement with a capital "E" when the Wildcats scored less than four minutes before the final whistle after a

McCullough kept for six yards and Moylan was hit earlier next to lose a yard or two. Then on a third and four, Halfback Mickey Sargent took the mail and bounded over — putting the score at 14-13.

Details Of Soil Bank Land Grazing Announced by ASC

Eastland County has been approved for haying and grazing soil bank and diverted acreage, according to Jesse J. Fullen, County Manager. Written approval must be obtained from the office, he said.

Sign up for the 1965 wheat program will extend through Oct. 2, Meredith announced, and the program is similar to the 1964 program except that diverted acreage and certificate rates have been increased.

Farmers with cotton allotments may file request waiver not later than Sept. 15 if failure to plant was due to abnormal conditions on the farm. Peanut farmers may file the request not later than Nov. 1.

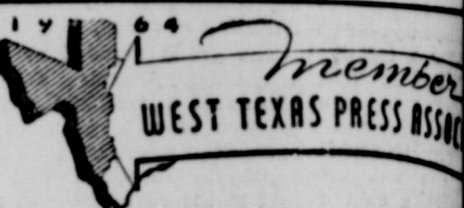

ASC Office Ready To Open Winter Legume Crop Plans

The Eastland County ASCS Office will begin taking applications for winter legume and rye cover crop practices Monday morning, Sept. 1. The cover crop practices are similar to what they have been in the past years.

In making the announcement, Elmer Blackwell, chairman of the County ASC Committee, stated that Federal cost-sharing at 50 per cent of the average cost of seed and fertilizer will be available to

all Eastland County farmers for these practices. The practices are adapted to take care of severe wind erosion, susceptible croplands, and as soil building practices.

Mr. Blackwell stated also that there was a great need for these practices this year due to extreme drought conditions which caused the vegetative cover to be very scarce on much of the county's 167,000 acres of cropland.

Mr. Blackwell said that the Federal cost-share for the rye cover crop practice would be \$1.25 per acre and would be approved in the amount not to exceed a farm's effective peanut allotment for 1964. He added that the winter legume cover crop practice would be available to all other farms in an amount not to exceed 100 acres. Federal cost-share for winter legumes is approximately \$2.55 per acre for Austrian Winter and Dixie Wonder Peas and \$2.30 per acre for vetch including the recommended fertilizer.

Mr. Blackwell emphasized that in order to be eligible for Federal cost-share on these practices, a producer must file a request for Federal cost-sharing prior to starting the practice. Additional instructions and information may be obtained at the County ASCS Office in Eastland.

Gorman Liquor Election Anticipated For Oct. 10

Saturday, Oct. 10, is considered most likely date for the election in Gorman at which the legalization of liquor sales will be decided.

The petitions were returned to the county clerk's office Thursday afternoon bearing 138 names. This number had been considered adequate for calling of the election, based on laws pertaining to such election. (In 1960, year used as test in this case, 552 Gorman residents voted, and a fourth of that number is 138.)

However, signatures on the petitions had not been certified by the county clerk Friday afternoon, and aren't expected to be until Monday morning just before the regular monthly county commissioners meet. The county judge and one commissioner are expected to be absent from the Monday meeting, when Judge Scott Bailey and Commissioner C. B. Dill of Cisco are out of town attending the T&P Railway Co. hearing in Ft. Worth Mon.

If the other three commissioners are present, it will represent a quorum and business can be transacted, however.

Because residences aren't uniformly numbered in Gorman, some question existed as to whether the "addresses" listed on the petitions, which in many cases were "In city limits of Gorman", would be legally qualified. An opinion from the county attorney's office was expected to clarify that matter, it was reported.

If the signatures are qualified as legal voters and if the addresses are accepted as actually being within the corporate limits of Gorman, commissioners are required by law to call the election within 30 days and not less than 20 days, making the 10th of October most likely voting day, it is said.

Proposition to be decided, as spelled out in the petitions, is for or against the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages for off-premise consumption only.
